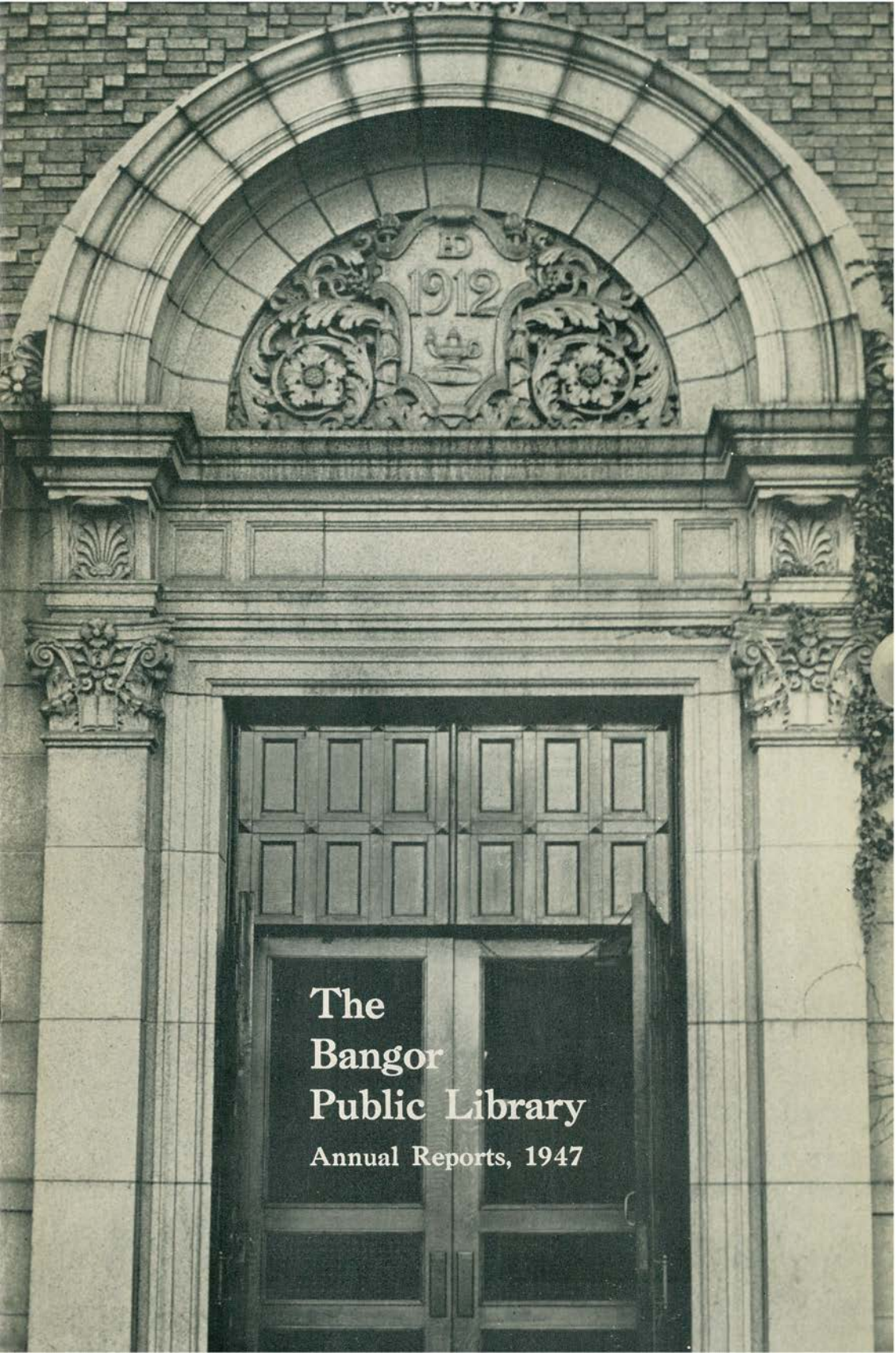

Report of the Librarian

To the Board of Managers of the Bangor Public Library:

The library now contains 251,116 books. That is 8.42 books per capita. During the year 11,000 books were added and 3,696 were removed, making a net gain of 7,304 in 1947.

Home use of books in 1947 amounted to 308,058. That is 10.33 per capita, or 16.14 per registered borrower. There are 19,087 registered borrowers.

The library operated not merely from its central building, but from a total of 141 different locations: 1 central library, 2 branches, 117 collections in schools, and 21 collections in institutions. For 41 weeks the central library was open 72 hours a week. For the 11 weeks of summer the central library was open 54 hours a week.

Twelve per cent of the cost of running the library in 1947 was supplied by city appropriation and 88% was supplied from other sources, mostly income of trust funds. These percentages were the same as in 1946.

Other statistics, in form for easy comparison with previous years and prepared according to the standards of the American Library Association and the U. S. Office of Education, will be found on pages 17-26 of this report.

Employees of the library, in full-time equivalent, totalled 25.87. The turnover in staff was unusually heavy. There were seven resignations. The principal reason for changes was the departure of young married women to live at home. Alice G. Bibber, who had been assistant in charge of the Music Branch since it opened in 1929, retired voluntarily under the provisions of the Employees' Retirement System.

With the present number of employees it is not possible to give staff members free mornings on the days when they work evenings. The budget for 1948 provides enough additional help

to permit this. There is also the job of finding the right people.

A signal benefit was provided for the employees of the library during 1947 when the library, through the action of the City Council and city manager, became a local participating district in the Employees' Retirement System of the State of Maine. The library had previously no retirement system, though several insurance company plans had been investigated.

This retirement plan became effective on July 1, 1947. Of the 25 employees then eligible, 23 joined and 2 did not. All persons employed subsequently were required to join as a condition of employment. Voluntary retirement with benefits is at age 65; compulsory retirement is at age 70. There is a disability provision. The employee contributes 5% of pay or a percentage based on age at joining. The employer contributes an amount determined by actuarial computations to more than match the employee contribution and to provide full prior service benefits to be amortized in thirty years. The money needed for 1948 is a new item in our budget for city appropriation. The state provides the machinery for the retirement plan, but none of the money. The library, through the city appropriation, provides the employer's contribution.

Planning by the building committee of the Board of Managers and by the librarian for various alterations and additions to the building proceeded slowly in 1947. After examining the old wooden shelving being disposed of from Carnegie Hall at the University of Maine and consulting with four manufacturers of library shelving we have commissioned the Art Metal Construction Company to build the second half of our fourth tier of stack during 1948. The money for this capital improvement has been saved out of trust fund income over a number of years and is not included in the regular operating budget. This shelving, which will occupy the last space previously remaining in our stack room, will provide room for growth for five years. Coincident with this construction we plan to make a private office for the librarian in stack A, adjoining the present general office. We shall improve the lecture hall by putting ventilation windows high up in the east wall, installing darkening curtains in the skylight, and adding folding doors.

We are having plans drawn that will permit further growth in 1953 when the shelving to be added in 1948 shall have been filled. With these plans in hand we shall seek sources from which the cost of the necessary future construction may be met. The terms of gifts of the present trust funds make them unavailable for this purpose. Most important of the new plans will be a four-story addition, with elevator, to the present stack (book storage) building. Secondary improvements, that may or may not be separate projects, will be an expansion of the catalog room, expansions by means of mezzanine floors of the book capacity of the reference room and children's room alcove, and a door permitting passage between the main building and the stack building on the basement level.

The Bangor Public Library is not only complimented but should benefit substantially from being one of forty-nine libraries in the United States chosen to be studied during 1948 by the Public Library Inquiry of the Social Science Research Council. The inquiry, which is being made at the request of the American Library Association and is financed by a grant from the Carnegie Corporation of New York, is to enable librarians and library boards to understand the measure of their accomplishment in meeting the library needs of the American public. The Bangor Public Library is pleased to have a part in this valuable project. Preliminary steps in the inquiry were undertaken in 1947.

Asphalt tile floors were installed in the central library in the historical room, reading room, reference room, and main desk. The interior of the stack building, the historical room, the rotunda and main stairs, and the foyer were painted. A case was built for phonograph discs. An extension of the main catalog on order since early in 1946 has not yet been delivered.

The city's World War II memorial Book of Honor prepared over the course of two years by the librarian and staff of the library, was dedicated at the Municipal Auditorium on Memorial Day, May 30, in the presence of some thousand citizens including the relatives of the 112 war dead. The book is on perpetual display in the foyer of the library. A page is turned each day.

The collection of phonograph records of music of lasting

value which it is intended to issue for home use, like books, which was mentioned in last year's annual report was begun and many records acquired. It has taken longer than anticipated both to acquire the records wanted and to arrange the details of handling them. The records are not yet ready for public use, but will be before long, when public announcement will be made.

The Rev. Warren J. Moulton, Ph. D., D. D., LL. D., a trustee of the Hersey Fund and a member of the Board of Managers of the Bangor Public Library from 1932 onwards and who was president of the Board of Managers from 1935 onwards, died on May 7, 1947. His portrait appears on page 2 of this booklet of reports. The resolutions in appreciation of his services adopted by the Board of Managers of the library appear on page 27.

Manning C. Moulton, M. D., was appointed a trustee of the Hersey Fund and a member of the Board of Managers of the library, succeeding Warren J. Moulton, and was welcomed at the board meeting of July 22, the first following his appointment.

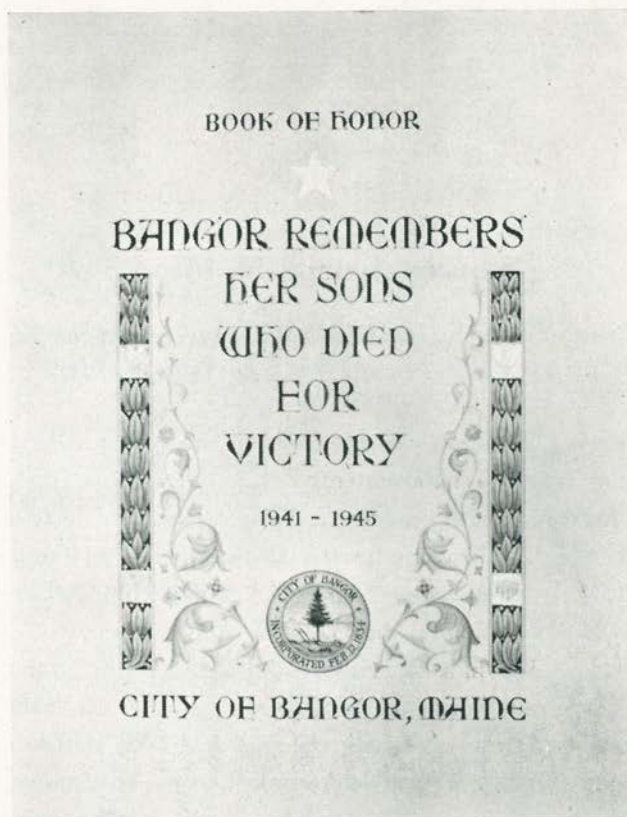
Warren Joseph Moulton

of the Bangor Public Library, July 22, 1947*

Warren J. Moulton was president of the Board of Managers and of the Trustees of the Bangor Public Library from February 8, 1935 until his death on May 7, 1947, a period of over twelve years. During all this time he was also a member of the finance committee. In these years the library grew from 168,439 volumes to 243,812 volumes and the staff from eighteen to twenty-four persons. Through his wisdom and foresight the affairs both of the governing boards and of the library as an institution moved in good order and with success. His high stature in the community brought respect and support to the institution.

Appreciating these things, his fellows on the governing boards now remember him with respect and affection and hereby inscribe their remembrance upon the permanent records of the library.
