Bangor May. 17. 1314

D- Sir

Should I be charged with long neglect in answering your last I should plead guilty. My apology is that a number of individuals in this village have been forming themselves into a "Reading-Room" association, have already collected many rare books; a variety of political & historical & literary miscellany; and a great number of files of newspapers; and are expecting to be incorporated at the next session of the Gen. Court. Those books, which your kindly communication mentioned, will be wanted for this establishment. Tho I, as an individual, should be glad of an immediate perusal of them; yet we will not trouble you any farther than to call on you for them when we shall become organized, & be in funds to pay for them.

Any geographical information as to this section of the District, within my power to communicate, shall on your solicitation, be at your service. This much I can now state, that by an Act passed "Feb^Y 28,1814" Bangor[#] was made half shire with <u>Castine</u> in this

THE FIRST LIBRARY IN BANGOR

This letter, just obtained by the Bangor Public Library, was written in 1814 by William D. Williamson, then postmaster in Bangor, to Rev. Jedediah Morse, preacher, pamphleteer, and geographer, of Charleston, Massachusetts.It contains the earliest known reference to a library in Bangor. The library, when opened, was called the Bangor Athenaeum. It was one of six libraries operating in Bangor in various times between 1814 and 1883 which, in the end, all merged into the Bangor Public Library, founded in 1883. In 1814 Bangor was in the District of Maine. a part of the State of Massachusetts.
