Thursday Sept 7<sup>th</sup> 1797 11

Began at Nichols Rock so called  
being at the head of the Tide on  
Pondwote River being the lower  
or Southern Boundary of the Land  
Purchased by Government of the  
Indians. and from said Rock  
Run East 4<sup>th</sup> Mile on a  
Hemlock this Mile level Land  
and tolerable good something more  
the 2<sup>d</sup> Mile

on a hard Maple this Mile a  
plantation of Timber Maple Birch  
Pine & Hemlock considerable timber  
destroyed by a Fire in June  
3<sup>d</sup> Mile a Run good hard Land  
the 4<sup>th</sup> Mile

on a Hemlock this last mile in  
quit is good Land we continue  
on 7 Rods or 140 Rods & come to  
Land flowed by Leonard's Mill  
we then Offset South 80 Rods then  
East 176 Rods then South 20 Rods  
then East 9<sup>th</sup> Rods to the Pond called  
Nichols Pond or Great East Pond  
& Run East 20 Rods

then <sup>2</sup> North 34 Rods  
then East 60 Rods  
then North 66 Rods which brings  
us to our Line which we left on  
the East Side of the Pond here we  
Calculate & find we have passed the  
Settles & are 163 Rods on the belt  
Monday 11<sup>th</sup>

Continue our course East &  
Mark Settles on  
dead Ash in low Land the Land  
in Gen<sup>l</sup> is low & Burnt & but little  
Green Timber some Meadows  
Settles  
with<sup>d</sup> on a heath East Settles Chiefly  
open heath a few dead Spruces -  
Settles

At a White pine East Settles Chiefly  
Heath & Meadows & some very good  
260 Rods toward the Settles Cross  
a branch of Great works Stream  
Twin being very Crooked -  
Settles  
with<sup>d</sup> a white Birch the East Settles  
there is some fine intervals &

good meadows - here we saw <sup>3</sup>  
of it Rain hard & made us very  
uncomfortable -

Tuesday 12

Continued on 186 Rods & crossed  
a branch of Gt. North Runing  
South & the Land good

10 Miles

a heap of Stones on a Ridge of Rock  
the Land in genl. for the last mile  
is burnt except on the <sup>at ground of</sup> intervals  
Continued 80 Rods & crossed  
Stream Runing South at 110 Rods  
crossed it again Runing North &  
proceed on to the line of the Lottery  
Land which is exactly 11 Miles from  
the Rock & here we mark a Bush  
& put N of the line & is mark'd as follows

⊕ P. H. S. J. S. E. C. J. P. 1797

this corner is about 6 Rods North  
of the 4 Miles mark on the West line  
of the Lottery Land & is Township No

26 -

Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup>

we now Run North on the West  
line of the Lottery Land from the

<sup>40</sup>  
The Corner which is about 40 Rods  
West of a Bad Hill sometimes  
called Saddle Back Mountain  
from the Top of which is an  
extensive prospect to the West as  
far as Pembroke River & the whole  
Country betwixt this & the River  
which appears to be almost level  
& a great part of it burnt land  
the Great works Stream which  
Passes thro' this level Country  
is very brooked & has fine  
Meadows on its Banks on  
which there is at present large  
Quantities of Hay cut.

The Country is rather low in  
many places but chiefly capable  
of Improvement either as Grass  
Land or tillage except those

Heaths which cannot be im-  
proved to any Advantage at  
present -

we leave our corner as marked  
before & Run North on 1<sup>st</sup> Line 2  
Mile & Cross a small Brook which  
Runs West & is probably a Branch  
of G<sup>t</sup> Works from the corner to  
this Brook is good Land &  
fine Oak timber -

The Land holds good for the 1<sup>st</sup> Mile &  
then low Burnt Land we proceed on  
North to the corner of N<sup>o</sup> 26 Lottery  
Township & on about 10 Rods &  
Cross the North Branch of Great Works  
a deep dead Stream Running West  
& very crooked -

Thursday 14

Continue in low land for some  
way then thro high Green woods  
about a mile then into Burnt  
Land & bad travelling, and toward  
Night Crossed Sunnyside Stream

Three times and Camp Little  
past the Stream in Burnt Land.

~~Thursday~~ Friday 15

Continued in low Land for some  
time then thro, Greenwood for about  
one mile then into Burnt Land  
& had traveling

Continued our Course Little  
in Burnt Land then into low  
Greenwood Land & came to the  
Corner of N<sup>o</sup> 32 & N<sup>o</sup> 30 and before  
we came to the 2<sup>d</sup> mile crossed the  
Main Branch of Sunbaze -  
a handsome Stream & good  
interval continued 1 mile in  
open Land like O<sup>d</sup> Fields & Camp

Saturday 16

Continued to the Corner of N<sup>o</sup> 30  
which is on the banks of O<sup>d</sup>  
Laminoid Stream here is large  
Grass Meadows



here the meadows extend East to  
the mountains which are perhaps  
30 Miles distant

we go down Old Lammond  
thro' burnt Land & very bad  
travelling the whole Country here  
appears to be burnt and yet the  
Soil appears to be excellent and  
will admit of any kind of Cultiv<sup>ation</sup>  
Sunday 17.

Continue down Stream to the  
Main River & then up the River  
to where Gen Town was enclosed  
here I ought to give a Description  
of Old Lammond Stream & the Land  
on the same the Stream is dead  
in General & has good intervals  
& grass meadows the Land adjoining  
is mostly burnt Land but good on  
the Stream about 12 Miles from the  
Main River is an excellent Mill  
seat -

And on a small stream which  
empties into this stream on the  
South Side is the Indian Red  
Paint & it is said there is good  
Iron Ore

Monday 18<sup>th</sup>

Proceeded up River to the North  
End of the Purchase & Mk<sup>d</sup> a White  
Pine on the East Side of the River  
1797. N. W. C. N<sup>o</sup> 1 & S. T.

Then Run East

1 Mile Mk<sup>d</sup> on a White Pine  
this Mile Gen. Law Land Timber  
Pine Spruce & Hemlock

Continue go Road & Cross a deep  
dead Brook Running South

Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup>

Continue at 11 Pally Cross a  
small Brook Running S. Westerly  
2 Mile

Mk<sup>d</sup> on a Birch the last Mile  
is in Gen. Law Cedar & Spruce Land

at 13 Tally & 12 Rods Crof. on the Billie  
Crof a Small Brook Running North  
3<sup>d</sup> Mile

M<sup>d</sup> on a Norway Pine last mile  
Chiefly low Land and some good  
Pine Timber at 32 Miles Crof  
God Brook Running Southly about  
2 Rods wide & a Dead Stream which  
we Crof & camp

Wednesday 20

4 Mile

M<sup>d</sup> on a White Pine last mile  
Chiefly level Land

5 Mile

M<sup>d</sup> on a Hemlock this mile is  
Chiefly hard wood and excellent Land  
we continue 40 Rods & strike a Lake  
about 3 Miles long from N. to South  
& is 240 Rods wide the Land about  
this Lake is high hard wood Land  
& of a good Quality. this Lake we  
call Tanners Lake


6 Mile

M<sup>d</sup> on a Birch in hard wood  
Land we continue to Birghans  
Lim & Mark a Bush 6 M. 100 Rod  
& from this we shape our course

for the Mouth of Cold Brook where  
we arrive & Camp

Friday 22

Continue West 2 Mile & Crossed  
Papadunk & continued to the  
Main River & M<sup>d</sup> on Oct 1797

S.T & P.H. N<sup>o</sup>. 1. which is the Centre  
Line of Township N<sup>o</sup>. 1 on the East  
Side of the River beginning at the  
Upper end to Number 

Monday 25

Measure the width of the River against  
the S.W. Corner of N<sup>o</sup>. 1 East Side which  
is 61 Rods then Cross Old Lammond  
Island which is 124 Rods & the River  
on the East Side of the Island is 4  
Rods wide here we mark the S.W.  
Corner of N<sup>o</sup>. 1. & Camp

Tuesday 26

Continue East on the S Line of N<sup>o</sup>. 1  
1 Mile  
M<sup>d</sup> a Norway Pine Land burnt &  
poor -

2 Mile

At on a Hemlock in the Western  
Edge of Green Land last Mile poor  
Burnt Land we Run 6 Tally in  
fine hardwood Land at 9 Tally  
cross a Brook Running North  
& good Land

3 Mile

At on a Dry Pine the chief of  
the last Mile is good Land.

Wednesday 27

Continue East to the Line of  
the Lottery Land & Mark a  
White Pine 1797. & S.T. N1 & N2  
now Run South

1 Mile

At in low burnt Land.

2 Mile

At in low Burnt Land

Thursday 28

3 Mile Still low Burnt Land  
5 Tally on 4 1/2 Mile Cross a small  
Brook Running Southly the Land  
very good

4<sup>th</sup> Mile in Old Lammond Meadow  
the East Mile chiefly level Burnt  
Land

Friday 29<sup>th</sup>  
5<sup>th</sup> Mile in Old Lammond Meadow  
Continue 7/8 Rods & Strike Old  
Lammond Stream ~~Continue~~  
Cross it & go 200 Rods in the  
Meadow then into intervals a  
Small distance then Burnt  
Land & Mark a Stake N 2 & N 3  
this Bound is one Rod South of  
a Small Brook we now Run  
West 40 Rods & Camp

East Mile chiefly Poor Land or

but some poor Burnt Land

Road & strike the River & M<sup>d</sup>

Went up River to Run the North  
Range of the E. Township and  
against the Center of Little  
Sugar Island here we M<sup>d</sup> on

Oak on the East Side of the River  
one Rod from the Shore

Continue East on good Land

11 Tally & Camp -

Continue East at 14 Tally Cross a  
Small Brook Running North  
1 Mile

Met on a Poplar the first  $\frac{3}{4}$  of  
a Mile Cross by the River which  
Runs southerly Round Great  
Sugar Island - Land good -

2 Mile

Met on a Small Tree Land  
Low & poor - at 7 Tally Cross a  
Brook Running North -

3 Mile

Met a dead white pine the last  
Mile Burnt Land -

Continue 11 Tally & Camp



this is a tremendous Night "a  
Storm & Hurricane —

Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup>

this Day the Storm continues  
and is very severe - but continues  
15 Fally & 40 Rods & strike old  
Lummond 3 Rod wide Running  
N Westerly

4<sup>th</sup> Mile on a White Pine in  
Burnt Land last Mile chiefly  
Burnt Land - at 9 Fally & 6 Rods  
Crossed a considerable Brook  
Running North South -

5 Mile

at 11 Rod on a Dry Cedar the Land low  
& Burnt - at 5 Mile & 13 Fally  
at the corner on 3 White Berches  
1st & 2 Range 2 Townships —

Friday 6

Continued South 1 Mile & 4 Fally  
& crossed a Brook Running South

Southwesterly

Mk on being 14 Miles South on  
a Small Poplar & Burnt Land

& Chiefly Clay of the White kind

R 2 & 3. T. N. 2 - 1797 S. 7.

we now Run West 50 Rods

& Cross a Brook Running

South at 12 Tally Crossed

Old Linn road Running

Northerly Land good -

1 Mile

Mk on a cedar in Low Land

& Tally on 4 1/2 Miles Crossed a

Small Brook Running North

2 Miles

Mk on a Small White Birch

in Burnt Land last Mile

& struck Penobscot River

River to Capt. Mansell's  
Sunday 8

Continued at Capt Mans-

Thru hard.

Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup>

Crossed the River West of  
M<sup>o</sup> a corner on W Side  
N. E. C. 3<sup>rd</sup> D. & S. E. C. 2<sup>nd</sup> D.  
4 Township this is M<sup>o</sup> on a  
Bunk on the West Side of the River  
and is against Sunkhaye Pips  
& high Beiges Camp —

We now Run West 154 Rods  
& Strike the River which is that  
part of the Main River which  
Runs to the North of Orson  
& Cronos Islands —

We then Run N 19 Rods  
then W 0 Rods to w River  
then N 34 Rods  
then W 12 Rods to w River  
then N 16 Rods.  
then W 6 Rods  
then N 45° W 41 Rods  
then W 26 Rods to w River  
then N 45° W 66 Rods  
then N 0 Rods —  
then N 45° W 17 Rods to w River  
then N 22 Rods —  
then N 45° W 39 Rods to w River  
then N 44 Rods —  
then N 45° W 46 Rods to w River  
then N 14 Rods —

then  $N 45^{\circ} W$  120 Rods  
then  $W$  9 Rods to Birch Stream  
2 Rods North of the mouth  
the Stream is 5 Rods Wide  
we now run West 45 Rods  
then South 102 Rods -  
then  $W 45^{\circ} S$  62 Rods -  
then 100 Rods.

then  $S 45^{\circ} W$  14 Tally to a large  
Creek which is about 8 Rods  
wide & extend Northerly &  
from this Creek Westerly is good  
high Land for some way  
& from Birch Stream to this  
Creek the Land is good but  
rather too Low -  
we cross the Creek & continue  
the same course  $S 45^{\circ} W$  52 Rods  
then South 60 Rods which  
brings us to the Line on  
which we first started then East  
30 Rods to the River

about 6 Rods wide —

3<sup>d</sup> Mile  
Mr<sup>e</sup> on a white Birch —

the Land for the most part is  
Hardwood especially on the South  
- only Side of the River -

4<sup>th</sup> Mile

At a Hemlock last Mile is  
chiefly Hardwood Land & tolera-  
ble good - continue 12 Rods  
& strike a pond sometimes  
called Martins Pond we travel  
Round Southely in a horrid  
Swamp & Heath to our Line on  
the West Side & find the Width of the  
Pond 190 Rods where the line  
crosses

5<sup>th</sup> Mile

At on a White Pine the last  
Mile Pond & heath this Pond is  
about 12 Miles long and bounded  
on the Southern Side by a large  
Heath which extend Southely  
for 4 or 5 Miles

we continue from 45 Miles 1/4  
Road Cross good Land to Puyshaw  
Lake with a Cude, the same Mark  
as at Martins Pond this Bound is  
a few Rods N of a small Island  
we now Travell Southly come  
to Esq Mayners party who have

Running North Land good

M<sup>o</sup> a Maple last Mile good high  
Land Bush Maple Ash & Oak —  
Timber Continue 6 Tally & Cropld  
a small Brook Running North —

5 Mile

M<sup>o</sup> on a Bush last Mile chiefly  
Low Land Continue 9 Tally & 8 R  
& through the River a little South  
of J<sup>r</sup> Loring's House & M<sup>o</sup> a Stack  
18 2 R here we build a heap of  
Stones

NB the Line between the 384  
Quarter 2<sup>d</sup> Township on the East  
side of the River is not Run  
owing to Eng Chamberlens being
