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Education Wins Continuing Accreditation

The NCATE (National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education) Unit Accreditation Board has approved UND's education unit with all 18 standards met at the basic (undergraduate) and advanced (graduate) levels. In UND's case, the education unit includes those programs in the College of Education and Human Development dedicated to teacher and administrator education and programs in other colleges which lead to teaching certificates, endorsements, or credentials. Faculty in the College of Arts and Sciences, Fine Arts and Communication, Business and Public Administration, and Engineering and Mines are involved in this work.

Confirmation of state approval of all UND education programs presented was received Oct. 17. The state team cited UND's education programs for strength in use of multiple sources of data in student admissions and monitoring of progress. The basic programs approved at UND prepare teachers in biology, biological and physical science, business education, chemistry, communication, early childhood education, earth science, elementary education, English, French, geography, German, industrial technology, marketing education, mathematics, middle school education, music, physical education, physics, physical science, social studies, Spanish, theatre arts, visual arts. Endorsement programs in athletic coaching, bilingual education, and kindergarten were also approved. Programs for educators approved at the advanced level prepare counselors for schools, principals, reading specialists, special educators, including speech language pathologists, and school superintendents as well as enabling teachers to engage in advanced study of teaching and learning. -- Mary Harris, Dean, College of Education and Human Development.

Nominations Invited For Clifford Faculty Achievement Award

Nominations/applications are invited for the UND Foundation Thomas J. Clifford Faculty Achievement Award for Excellence in Research. The winner of this award will receive a plaque and a check for \$2,000 at the 1997 Founders Day Banquet on Feb. 27.

The following information should be provided:

1. A listing of publications of significant, original and high-quality research, scholarly, and creative contributions in nationally recognized professional journals that are refereed by peer reviewers and/or a listing of juried competitions and invited performances;

2. Overall scholarly activities, such as service as a reviewer of research proposals for federal agencies or other funding sources, service as a referee or editor for professional journals, and contributions to training students in research, scholarly, and creative endeavors;

3. Potential for significant contributions to enhancing the effectiveness

of the subject matter taught in the classroom.

Faculty, staff and students may make nominations, and faculty are invited to nominate themselves. Since the Committee will not engage in the gathering of documentation, each nomination or application must be accompanied by thorough evidence of the nominee's qualifications for the award. Five copies of each nomination and supporting documentation should be received at the Office of Research and Program Development no later than Monday, Jan. 13.

Since previous awardees are ineligible for nomination until five years have passed, Arthur Buckley (1996), Sharon and Richard Wilsnack (1995), Michael Anderegg (1994), Robert Nordlie (1993), and David Hein (1992) may not be nominated this year.

The awardee will be selected by the same committee that selects the Fellows of the University Award for Departmental Excellence in Research. This committee includes the director of the Office of Research and Program Development (Chair), the dean of the Graduate School, the chair of the Faculty Research Committee, one faculty member from the Graduate Committee, and one faculty member from the Faculty Research Committee.

Update Files For Faculty Award Process

In preparation for the annual faculty award process, full-time faculty may wish to make sure that their personnel files are up to date. The file should contain a current resume, the most recent October supplement, a list of courses taught for the three most recent semesters, and, for graduate and professional faculty, the number of graduate student advisees. Faculty should be prepared to provide student evaluations for the past three years. -- Dan Rice, Director, Office of Instructional Development.

Guidelines Listed For Writing-Intensive Courses

Guidelines for Writing-Intensive (W) Courses to fulfill the third part of the General Education Communications Requirement follow. Writing-Intensive (W) courses are courses in any discipline and at any level that make writing a central part of the learning process. Compared to other courses which include writing, writing-intensive courses will generally involve:

* significantly more writing

* more attention to writing on the part of the instructor

more opportunities for students to work on their writing in conjunction with their normal course work.

Amount of Writing

Students in W courses are expected to write on a regular basis, producing a minimum of 10 typed, double-spaced pages (about 3,000 words) per credit hour. This writing may include both drafts and revisions, informal and formal, graded and upgraded work. A significant portion (about five pages per credit) should be finished, polished prose.

Instructional Strategies

Writing-intensive courses include instruction or quidance in clear written expression, through activities that promote student learning and encourage critical thinking. Examples of such activities include informal in-class writing, response journals, graduated or sequenced assignments, individual conferencing, peer response sessions, discussion of sample papers, and opportunities to revise.

Syllabus Documentation To ensure that students are aware of the special requirements of W courses, the syllabus and course documentation should specify:

- why writing is central to the course
- *
- how much writing will be required how this writing will be used in assessing the course grade

Recommendations and Procedures

Because writing-intensive courses are also response- or grading-intensive, the optimum size 1. for such classes is 25 students or fewer.

Both instructors and students are encouraged to use the resources of the 2. University Writing Program to support their work in writing-intensive courses.

Instructors proposing a course for W status should provide a copy of the syllabus along with a cover sheet that explains how the course falls within the guidelines listed above. Research Grants Available For Undergrads

ND EPSCoR (Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research) sponsors Research Experiences for Undergraduates (REU), which is modeled after the National Science Foundation REU. REU activities give undergraduates an opportunity to experience academic research firsthand and to learn about graduate school. The REU Program establishes undergraduates as full-fledged members of their respective research groups and grooms them for eventual careers in science, engineering and mathematics.

REU participants spend eight to 10 weeks conducting research during the summer months under the mentorship of North Dakota State University or the University of North Dakota faculty.
