A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE LSU LAW CENTER

The L.S.U. Board of Supervisors voted to begin planning for a school of law at Baton Rouge in 1904. The first classes began in 1906 with 19 students enrolled. The state Supreme Court notified the University President in the same year that graduates would be admitted to the bar after graduation, without further examination.

As of 1980, the Law Center had a student population of approximately 800 and nearly 40 faculty members. For many graduates, 1906 may truly be viewed as "the good old days," since the automatic admission is no longer the rule.

The law school originally was part of the University, under the guidance of its own dean, the first of whom was Dr. Joseph J. Kelly, a member of the Illinois Bar who had particular expertise in the Civil Law.

The facilities were particularly limited in the early years. The first classes were held in the basement of the main campus library. But the early emphasis on the Civil Law has not changed from the early days when Dean Kelly included a foundation in Roman Law as an important element of the education program.

In 1910, Professor Robert Lee Tullis became Dean. His impact upon the Law Center was so great that the competition for top honors in Moot Court still bears his name. During his tenure, the course requirements were expanded to three years. In 1911, a student could be admitted after one year of college and could receive a "Bachelor of Laws" degree after three years of study.

During Robert Lee Tullis' term, Professor Ira S. Flory joined the law faculty. Students of the Modern Law Center will associate the name "Flory" with the Flory Trial Club, which sponsors mock trial competition. Flory joined the faculty in 1912 and remained for thirty-eight years, less a short period during the first World War. Professor Flory was the first to actively seek alumni support in the form of financial contributions, particularly toward funding an adequate library. In 1924, partly because of

his efforts, the school was admitted to the Association of American Law Schools, and shortly thereafter, the approval of the A.B.A. Council on legal education was secured as well.

In a 1964 article on the history of the law school, Dean Paul M. Hebert noted the impact of Tullis and Flory:

"Through the accomplishments of these two great men . . . aided by additions to the Faculty, such as Harriet S. Dagget and others . . . the solid basis for further development was laid."

In 1935 the law school at L.S.U. received an expanded budget and a new dean, Frederick K. Beutel. Beutel was a nationally respected expert in Negotiable Instruments, and was able in a short two years term to expand the law school greatly. During Beutel's leadership, the first full-time Law Librarian joined the faculty. Leaverworth Colby gave the library an expanded capacity for research and growth. In 1937 Beutel left L.S.U. for a professorship at William and Mary. But before he left, the Law School had its own building, known as Leche Hall, and modeled after the U.S. Supreme Court building.

Following Beutel's term, the tenure of Dean Paul M. Hebert began. Dean Hebert made such an impact upon the school that it was renamed the Paul M. Hebert Law Center in 1979. Dean Hebert's first term lasted only two years. During the interim, several law professors served as acting deans. The progress of the Law Center didn't stop there. Several major developments took place between 1939 and 1959 when Dean Hebert returned.

In 1938, the Louisiana State Law Institute was established, as was the Louisiana Law Review.

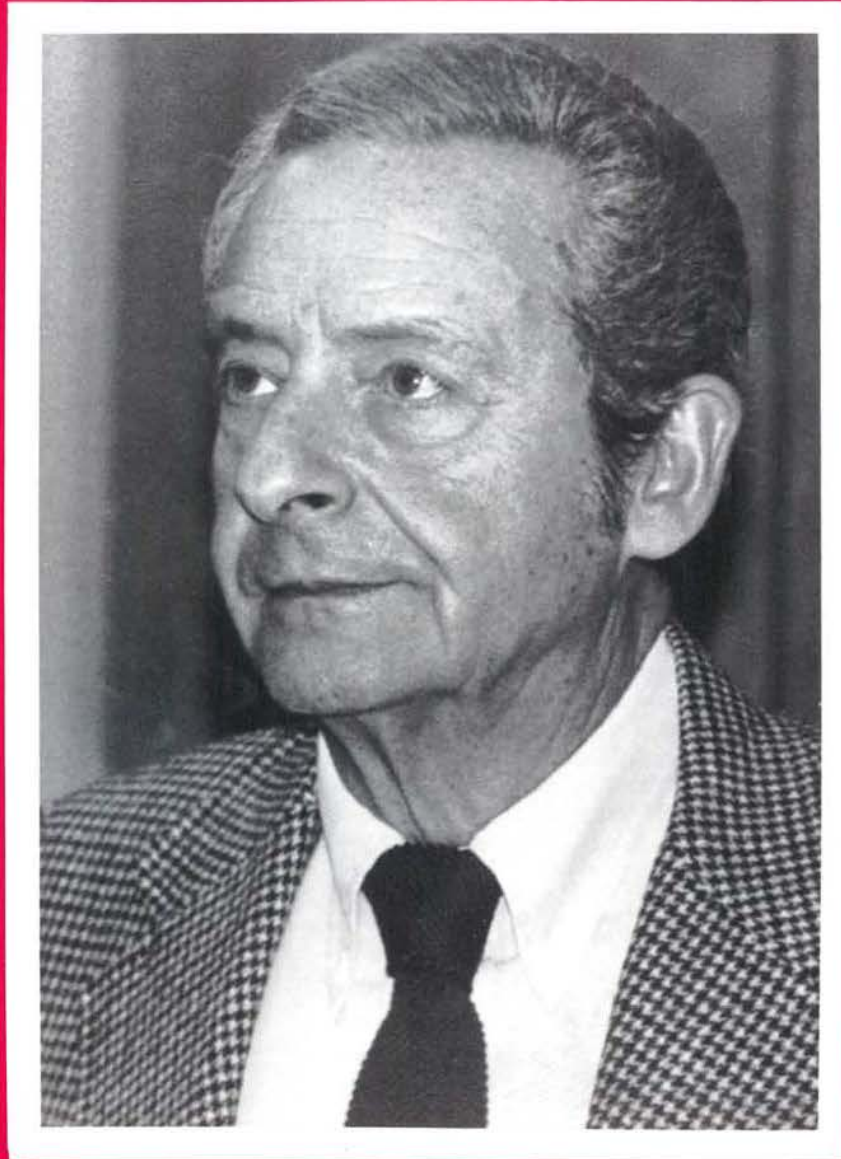
In 1978, the L.S.U. Board of Supervisors completed the separation of the Law School from the Baton Rouge campus. This allowed the Law School to have its own chancellor and to establish its own policies and programs separate from the L.S.U. campus. This separate status was an idea promoted first by Dean Hebert, whose dream was realized a year after his death. In fact, Dean Hebert was lobbying for the separate status when he was stricken by a fatal heart attack.

The Law Center's first chancellor, William D. Hawkland, was appointed in 1979, ending the dual deanship of Winston Day and Howard L'Enfant. Chancellor Hawkland's professional credentials attest to his stature as one of the country's leading jurists. He has played major roles in the adoption of the U.C.C. in many states and has influenced legislators considering this issue nationwide. He is also a scholar in the field of banking law.

It was from Illinois that the Law Center lured Hawkland, convincing him to undertake the administrative duties which so many institutions had unsuccessfully sought to have him accept. His mission has been to bring this institution to the forefront of legal education. Under his vision and leadership, the Center's library has grown to be one of the largest in the nation. The faculty has expanded its scope to include outstanding professors not only in the Civil Law but also renowned professors from around the nation. The course offerings have been expanded to include instruction in both Civil and Common Law, resulting in a more comparative law degree. Through the tough financial times facing the state, he has guided the Law Center making it the most efficient branch of the LSU System. The scholarly writings of the faculty are some of the most cited works of any faculty in the nation. Finally, under his leadership, the Law Center has begun the implementation of a long range master plan, designed to bring the institution into the 21st century.

Saul Litvinoff is one of those rare human beings who has gained rich intellectual development; acute sharpening of his intuitive capacity; deep grasp of the conflicts, aspirations, and tendencies of human beings; & a broad perception of alternative answers to the questions raised by the unlimited number of interests seeking recognition and the limited number of means available for their satisfaction. He has first-hand knowledge of the Civil Law being a civilian whose first law degree was earned in Argentina, a civil law country

Litvinoff, as a great legal scholar, and an outstanding professor of law, has a sharp understanding of sociological factors, a generous perception of the limitations of the mind, and an enlightened comprehension of history and its lines of development

In the revision of law, Saul Litvinoff has performed well indeed that most difficult, technical and complex activity: the reform of the Civil Code. No legislative task is more challenging and difficult than those involving the revision of the Civil Law, particularly in the field of obligations

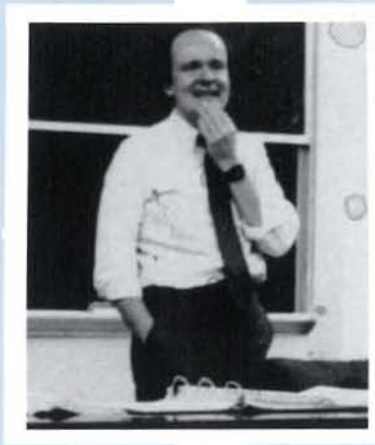
The academic contributions of Litvinoff have enriched the Law of Louisiana. He wrote the first comprehensive treatise on the Law of Obligations, as well as perceptive essays on important civil law subjects, such as legal acts, legal personality, nullities and vices of consent. He has trained young lawyers in the understanding and operation of Civil Law and Common Law institutions. He has shown the existing connections between Louisiana Law and French and Spanish Law, and has identified the graft of Common Law materials in the main body of the Roman Law which was inherited by Louisiana. Never provincial nor short-sighted in his teachings, Litvinoff has built an enduring bridge between the Civil Law of Obligations in Louisiana and the most advanced versions of the Civil Law in the modern world

The exceptional teaching abilities of Litvinoff are perceptible in his two course-books on Obligations and Sales & Lease, both of which are an excellent combination of case-law materials, statutory law texts, and problems. They provide an attractive synthesis of Civil Law and Common Law approaches to teaching methodologies. Litvinoff's Civil Law classes are good evidence, easily recognized by his students and his teaching colleagues, of his flexible perception of legal institutions and their functioning in social reality. Hundreds and hundreds of young, eager, and intelligent minds have been influenced by the consistent and comprehensive teaching of a civilian able and prepared to show the way for rational solutions to problems

The contributions of Saul Litvinoff to the Law of Louisiana are deep and extended. They are illuminated by a logical and coherent transparency, which will endure and survive the pressure of strong, contemporary, though passing events. A notable equilibrium has been achieved by him between the lasting values of Romanistic contributions, and the changing needs of a dynamic and expansive world.

LAW LIBRARY



The Law Library, one of the largest in the nation, is a comprehensive legal research facility. It contains the largest collection of legal materials in Louisiana, as well as facilities for computer-assisted legal research. The Library houses more than 340,000 volumes, 500,000 microforms, and 80,000 records. Current serial subscriptions exceed 4,600. The collection contains the statutes and reports of federal and state jurisdictions in the United States as well as extensive collections of law journals, citators, digests, encyclopedias, and treatises. There are also substantial collections of comparative, international, foreign law, including materials from Europe, Latin America, and countries of the British Commonwealth. Computer services provide on line access to bibliographic and legal information databases, including LEXIS, WESTLAW, and STAIRS (the statute and bill status system of the Louisiana Legislature). The Library is a U.S. government documents depository and a Louisiana state documents depository. It is also a depository for the records and briefs of the Louisiana Supreme Court and Courts of Appeal. Library resources include reading rooms, study carrels, and audio-visual facilities.
