SCHOOLS

In Two Villages Epidemic Of Diphtheria Feared

Danville, Ohio, March 28. — The schools of this place and of the City were closed Monday morning for a period of one week on account of the fear of a diphtheria epidemic. A young daughter of Mr. Charles Kaylor of this place was seriously ill with the disease and it is believed that there have been several exposures among the school children. No other cases have developed.
