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

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

The School of Education's growing programs help current and future educators think critically, solve problems creatively, and develop solutions to today's most critical education challenges. Three tenets—deep learning, bringing theory to life, and making a difference—shape the School's approach, both in and out of the classroom, to preparing leaders who understand the crucial role of education in fostering a diverse and democratic society.

Whether at the graduate or undergraduate level, Merrimack's School of Education offers multiple opportunities for students to connect theory, research, and practice. Dan W. Butin, Ph.D., Associate Professor and Founding Dean of the School of Education, explains the School's guiding philosophy, "Our dynamic and responsive programs connect education with communities—cultivating intellectual leaders who are grounded in integrity and devoted to the betterment of the public good."

Making huge strides in a few short years

Since its founding four years ago, the School of Education has established a reputation for innovation and attracted an ever-increasing number of applicants from the region and around the country.

At the undergraduate level, the School of Education has developed programs in Education, Human Development, and STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) Education. As testament to the School's growing popularity, Human Development is currently the third-largest major at Merrimack.

The School has also recently launched a Bachelor's Degree Completion Program in Child, Family, and Community Studies. With looming legislation that requires childcare providers to have a Bachelor's degree, this structured, cohort-based program allows students with an Associate's degree to earn a Bachelor's degree in two years. The program's success has been astonishing, with four cohorts of approximately 15 students currently running.

In addition, the School's graduate programs continue to flourish. In the 2012–2013 school year, more than 200 graduate students pursued a Master of Education (M.Ed.) in Teacher Education, Higher Education, or Community Engagement. Ninety of these students were in the School of Education's graduate Fellowship programs. Highly selective programs, they provide full-tuition fellowships that are supported by year-long, site-based clinical residencies—allowing students to earn their degree in just one year.

Bringing theory to life while making a difference

"Hands-on experience is a hallmark of our programs, offering our students ways to integrate and enhance their theory-based courses," says Dr. Butin. "But in order to have a robust, on-site program, partnerships are key. We are so lucky and thankful to have incredible partners with regional nonprofits, area schools, and school systems."

Field experiences can be seen across all of the School of Education programs. For example, all undergraduates begin with site visits, volunteer work, and service-learning in their first years and expand the number of hours and responsibilities as they progress through their programs. The culminating experience for all future teachers is the semester-long student-teaching experience, the practicum. During the practicum, students synthesize and develop their education philosophy, create a portfolio, and establish meaningful professional relationships with their students, cooperating teachers, and colleagues.

Merrimack offers other fun ways for students to participate in the field. For instance, the Education Club recently conducted a "Reach Out and Read" event at the Shawsheen Elementary School in Andover, Massachusetts. Undergraduate students read Dr. Seuss classics to 180 kindergarten through second grade students and led a fun, interactive activity to wrap up the event.

Additionally, graduate Fellowship students participate in intensive, on-site residencies for nine months or more, focusing

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on areas of Education, Community Engagement, and Higher Education. Education Fellows acquire teaching experience in surrounding public and parochial schools. To prepare for administrative leadership in colleges and universities, Higher Education Fellows work at four-year and two-year institutions as well as organizations including Massachusetts Campus Compact (MACC), a nonprofit coalition of college and university presidents committed to developing civic involvement. Community Engagement Fellows train to become nonprofit leaders, social change activists, and shapers of the national service learning movement through experience at local and national organizations including the Greater Lawrence Community Partnerships for Children and Habitat for Humanity.


Dr. Butin comments on the impact of Fellows' community involvement, "Our Fellowship programs have really taken off and are gaining national recognition. They are incredibly powerful because they allow students to link theory with action and classroom learning with real-world experience."

Creating positive change beyond Merrimack

In addition to helping students become leaders in the field of education, Merrimack also organizes programs for accomplished education leaders, both in the community and around the country. The School's Leadership Think Tanks bring together leaders from regional school districts to collaborate on educational innovation and problem solving. Each Think Tank is co-led by a School of Education faculty member and an expert practitioner from within the group. Through these dynamic working sessions—held seven to eight times per year on Merrimack's campus—educators explore contemporary topics including "Connected Learning and Social Media" and "Addressing Student Anxiety: Causes, Manifestations, and Interventions."

The School of Education also houses the Center for Engaged Democracy, a central hub for developing, coordinating, and furthering the adoption of academic programs focused on community engagement. To rally support, the Center organizes an array of research, advocacy, and learning opportunities. This incubator for civic engagement was recently recognized by the U.S. Department of Education for its role in promoting a civic-minded campus.

Ryan Matthews, BA'12 and Higher Education Fellow MEd'13 Awarded a Fulbright Scholarshi to Study in Turkey

If there ever was a student able to deliver on the Fulbright Program's mission to promote international goodwill through the exchange of students—it's Ryan Matthews. In the spring of 2013, Ryan was awarded the prestigious Fulbright Scholarship to study and teach in Turkey during the upcoming academic year.

Scholar in and out of the classroom

As an undergraduate student at Merrimack, Ryan studied romance languages, specifically Italian and French, as well as Jewish-Christian-Muslim Relations. Continuing his education at Merrimack as a graduate student in the Higher Education Fellowship program, he worked for Dr. Dan Butin, Dean of the School of Education, and collaborated on a website for the Center for Engaged Democracy, a hub for academic programs focused on civic and community engagement. Ryan's advisor, Dr. Susan Marine, describes him as, "incredibly bright, talented, and committed to fostering intercultural understanding."

Ryan's work outside of the classroom distinguishes him as well. Ryan spent the past few summers volunteering with the Augustinians in San Gimignano, Italy to help the friars take care of and manage groups of visitors from across the world. While in San Gimignano, he met another Augustinian who invited Ryan to his home in Kinshasa in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, where he stayed for about a month. Dr. Marine comments on Ryan's competence as a world traveler, "Ryan has a deep commitment to learning as much as possible about other people and places."

Ambassador in and out of the classroom

Ryan first learned about the Fulbright Program from an Arabic instructor from Tunisia in the United States on a Fulbright Scholarship. He applied for and was awarded an English teaching assistantship, and will be placed in a university to assistant teach English for a full academic year while he receives Turkish language instruction.

"I love languages," explains Ryan, "so the program is perfect is me. I'm able to have the chance to study an unfamiliar language from what I'm familiar with and teach others English in the process. I'm also extremely interested in the history of Turkey, building upon what I learned in my courses in Jewish-Christian-Muslim Relations." While Ryan will certainly gain immeasurable benefits from his Fulbright experience, Dr. Marine is focused on what he'll give back, "Ryan will be an excellent ambassador for the United States, building bridges of understanding between our country and others. Plus, he is very easy going, and takes adversity well, so whatever the challenges his time in Turkey may bring, I am confident he is up for them! Ryan's approachability and enthusiasm for adventure will serve him well as he embarks upon his journey."

Ryan looks forward to his Turkish adventure, commenting, "The most exciting thing for me is exploring a country, language, and culture that is completely new to me. It's tough to pinpoint why I find it so exciting, but I find it very rewarding to be dropped into situations where everything is completely unfamiliar." There's no doubt that Ryan's time in Turkey will help make the world a little more cohesive as he forges connections with diverse and interesting people all across the globe.

THE PHILBRIGHT PROCEASE

Launched in 1946 under President Harry S. Truman, the Fulbright Program currently awards approximately 1,900 grants annually in all fields of study, and operates in more than 140 countries worldwide.

Overall, the Fulbright Program has provided more than 318,000 U.S. and international participants, chosen for their academic excellence and leadership potential, with the opportunity to observe one another's political, economic, and cultural institutions; exchange ideas; and embark on joint ventures of importance to the general welfare of the world's inhabitants.

Fulbright U.S. student alumni populate a range of professions and include ambassadors, members of Congress, judges, heads of corporations, university presidents, journalists, artists, professors, and teachers. Bose Corporation founder Amar Bose, actor John Lithgow, composer Philip Glass, opera singer Renee Fleming, and economist Joseph Stiglitz are among notable former grantees.





SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH FACILITIES ON CAMPUS

The CBBS facilities include a fully equipped modern molecular biology laboratory, including Applied Biosciences real-time PCR Light Cycler, Shimadzu UV-1800 and BioSpec-nano spectrophotometers, LI-COR DNA sequence analyzer; a micro-injection station; a cell culture facility; and an imaging suite.

Students collaborate with faculty and industry researchers

Step inside Merrimack's Center for Biotechnology and Biomedical Sciences (CBBS) and you'll find science students shoulder to shoulder with professors and corporate scientists toiling to unlock the mysteries of cell biology. You'll hear industry pioneers at the CBBS-sponsored "Bio to Business" conference discussing how they brought scientific discoveries and technical innovations to market. And, you'll see CBBS undergraduate fellows who participated in a genome-sequencing project over intersession guiding genetics students in their own DNA sequencing projects. These unique experiences, rarely found on a college campus, are just a few of the exciting interdisciplinary initiatives spearheaded by the CBBS.

At CBBS's fully equipped, modern laboratory housed in the Mendel Science Center, biology, chemistry, and engineering students conduct research with faculty and corporate partners, including Nexcelom Bioscience. This local biotechnology company enjoys a three-year partnership with Merrimack, launched only months after the start of the CBBS. Located in neighboring Lawrence, Massachusetts, Nexcelom is a leading manufacturer of image-based cytometry equipment, tools that measure and characterize cells.

Collaboration advances scientific discovery

Right on campus, Nexcelom's corporate scientists perform experiments that test their state-of-the-art automated cell counter, called the Cellometer[®]. CBBS faculty assist with research design and recruit undergraduates to work on projects as interns. In 2011, biology major Alisha Wilkinson '12 interned at CBBS alongside Charlotte Berkes, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Biology at Merrimack. Together, they studied the *Histoplasma capsulatum* microbe, the leading cause of respiratory fungal infections worldwide. Working in partnership with Nexcelom, the team tracked the growth of the disease-causing fungi during infection.

Alisha and fellow Merrimack student, Ben Paradis '12 also worked with Dr. Berkes and Nexcelom scientist Leo Li-Yang Chan to co-author a scientific paper based on the research, titled "Rapid quantification of pathogenic fungi by Cellometer image-based cytometry," published in the *Journal of Microbiological Methods*. Consistent with the spirit of innovation, Dr. Berkes, Alisha, and Ben also presented their findings online in a peer-reviewed video journal of biological, medical, chemical, and physical research, called the *Journal of Visualized Experiments* (jove.com). Filmed at the CBBS, this video demonstrated their methodology for using the Cellometer to quantify fungi, and will soon become available for scientists and students around the world to see.

Collaboration offers career-defining experiences

For Dr. Berkes, collaboration with Nexcelom furthers her professional interest in immunology, cell biology, and genetics. It also enables her to develop new ways to use cytometry technology in research and in the classroom. Dr. Berkes, who earned her B.S. at Pennsylvania State University, Ph.D. at University of Washington, and completed her postdoctoral fellowship at the University of California, San Francisco, explains "It is a natural fit, as I came to Merrimack with previous experience studying fungi and diseases caused by

fungal pathogens." For Alisha, the hands-on experience offered invaluable insights as she considered careers in scientific research. In fact, today, Alisha works as a staff assistant in the gastrointestinal unit at Massachusetts General Hospital. And, for Ben, the experience led to a job after graduation at Nexcelom as a technical support specialist, serving as a liaison between the company and scientists who use the Cellometer.

Another Nexcelom intern, Danny Laverty '13, will further his interest in science in a Ph.D. program at Johns Hopkins University. And, Merrimack student Stephanie Saldi '13, received a stipend funded by Nexcelom to spend the summer working as one of two undergraduate fellows at the biotech firm. Dr. Janine LeBlanc-Straceski, director of the CBBS, values the myriad opportunities the corporate partnership offers Merrimack students, "Working side-by-side with industry professionals from Nexcelom, our students are able to bridge the gap between academic theory and the practice of the scientific enterprise."

Beyond enhancing student and faculty growth, the successful partnership between Merrimack and Nexcelom helps advance science and the commercial application of science to improve human health for all.

LOOK UP!

- Right now, the telescopic highlight is Saturn and its main moon, Titan, which appears as a star circling the planet. For most people, viewing the rings of Saturn is an oh-my-gosh moment. In June, Saturn appears in the southeast at dusk, and in September, it will appear in the south.
- On August 12, you can view a fireworks show—the famous Perseids meteor shower. For optimal viewing, find a comfortable spot with a clear horizon, and look to the northeast. The show starts around midnight and lasts until twilight. During this time, you can expect about 60 meteors or streaks of light per hour, including shooting stars known as "torches of the Gods."
- The most spectacular sky show this year is expected to be "the comet of the century," the Comet ISON. Currently about five times further from the sun than the earth. the comet will pass within a million miles of the sun, causing it to heat up, generate a long tail, and become very bright. In fact, it will get so hot that it may fragment, which could spoil the show. If it stays together, however, then it should be visible during the day, particularly if you block the sun with your hand. This sky show will take place toward the end of November and into early December.

The Mendel observatory will hold viewing events during this time, which will be posted online at: merrimack. edu/community/observatory/. We invite you to come by and "look up" with us!


Star light, star bright

Merrimack College Awarded Prominent Grant from National Science Foundation

In May 2013, Merrimack College received the exciting news that The National Science Foundation (NSF) awarded the School of Science and Engineering a grant of nearly \$500,000 to participate in Foundations for STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) Success. This initiative—part of a \$10 million grant program jointly funded by the NSF, Intel, and General Electric, provides resources for hands-on learning opportunities with the goal of retaining undergraduate students in the disciplines of engineering and computer science.


"Being recognized by NSF is further proof of the cutting-edge, scholarly work that occurs at Merrimack College," said Dr. Christopher E. Hopey, President. Dr. Modica-Napolitano, Provost and Vice-President for Academic Affairs, added, "This award is a testament of our faculty's commitment to strengthening our curriculum as well as ensuring the best possible educational experience and outcomes for each of our science and engineering students." Merrimack joins other institutions of higher education including Syracuse University, University of Texas at Austin, and Cornell University who have been awarded grants to participate in Foundations for STEM Success.

Francis E. Girard School of Business and International Commerce

Repaying generosity with generosity









Since Frank E. Girard made the \$2.5 million donation to the school that now bears his name, the Francis E. Girard School of Business and International Commerce has made incredible strides. Now boasting a graduate program; distinguished faculty members; innovative curriculum; career-focused mentoring, co-op, and internship programs; and a growing number of students, the Girard School of Business has made its benefactor proud. "When I look at the Girard School, I am most proud of how much it has grown and the quality of the graduates it produces, says Girard. To me, it's a place where students work hard, demonstrate exceptional


work ethic and determination seeming to out-achieve many of their contemporaries at other schools."

Countless Merrimack students have benefited from Girard's gift over the years—whether through scholarships, better classrooms and curriculum, or an improved ability to attract sought-after faculty members. It is this last point that really strikes home with Girard, "Faculty is one of the biggest elements to any school's success. The addition of the graduate program at Merrimack has been extremely gratifying. You can't accomplish something like that unless you have

the right people in place. The faculty I've met seem to share an abiding commitment to the College. They see their role as more than a job. Rather, Merrimack is a community to which they belong."

Mentors make a difference

Girard graduated from Merrimack in 1962 with a degree in business administration, but it wasn't always clear that he was on the college track. In fact, it took some convincing for Girard to pursue a bachelor's degree. "I was fortunate enough to have had mentors who gave me terrific guidance. I trained and worked as a commercial



photographer while taking evening classes at Merrimack to earn an Associate's degree. As an employee of Craig Systems, Inc., I worked as a full-time industrial photographer. Erick Kauders, President of Craig, took an interest in me and told me that he didn't think I would meet my full potential by continuing to work at his company. He encouraged me to go to college full-time to earn my Bachelor's degree.

To help me pay for it, he offered to give me all of the professional photography equipment I would need to work my way through college by doing freelance photography jobs."

With this generous proposition before him, Girard went to visit Father Smith, Merrimack's Director of Admissions, explaining that he wanted to move from the evening program to the day program. "Father Smith told me that my high school preparation was not sufficient. I had to convince him to give me a chance and let me in on a probationary semester."

The rest, as they say, is history. By the end of the first semester, Girard achieved the second-best grades in the business school and went on to become an elected member of student council. News Editor of The Warrior (now

The Beacon), and president of his fraternity, Sigma Beta Kappa. In his senior year, Frank was recruited by two major IT corporations, but signed up for active military service. After that, he held many major corporate roles, eventually becoming President and CEO of Boston Technology, and later, Vice Chairman and CEO of Comverse Network Systems.

When asked what he attributes his success to, he acknowledges Merrimack's role. "Through their guidance and direction, Merrimack's faculty really inspired me and gave me confidence. Professor Savoy, my economics professor, engendered my love for economics, which I still have to this day. As a freshman, he inspired me in this direction and helped me discover that 'I do best what I like best'."

Sharing success. Creating a legacy.

When Girard was leading Boston Technology, an employee came into his office and asked if he know how many Merrimack graduates were working at the company. While he was always supportive of hiring Merrimack students, Girard was surprised to learn that there were 13 Merrimack alums on staff in the home office. "Someone suggested that we take a group photo, which made its way to the College.

Around this same time, our company had just gone public and I'd rung the bell on the New York Stock Exchange. The stock was performing really well and sales were growing rapidly. Let's face it: the timing could not have been better for Merrimack to approach me about giving back to the school, which I really wanted to do. After reviewing several options, I decided to exercise most of them. I finally had a chance to share my success and that was important to me."

Asked why he gives, he says, "I can't think of a better thing to do. Not only is it personally gratifying, but the college has a way of recognizing it, without being overly grandiose, and showing their appreciation in many ways that are not public. Anyone giving to the school—colleagues of mine, people I know well, and friends, all say the same thing—'we did what we thought was right and we feel good about it.' Giving back is very, very gratifying, but the payback isn't in dollars; it's in good, psychic rewards."

"The physical campus enhancements are truly impressive. But, underlying this is the change that has come with our new leadership in Dr. Hopey and his untiring determination to make Merrimack an outstanding institution. I understand that we will be entertaining the largest freshman class in history this fall. We will expand the number of graduate degrees and continue to expand our presence in Division I athletics. Most important, we continue to improve our recognition as a quality educational institution with regional and national recognition. Clearly, I am proud to be an alumnus of Merrimack."

Now retired, Girard participates in some board activities and enjoys golfing, photography, and traveling with his wife, Henriette. But thoughts of Merrimack are never far from his mind. "My grandson, Chris, is attending Merrimack in the fall and I couldn't be more delighted. I think he's going to be a terrific addition."

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Sarah Wooley '14, a double major in Athletic Training and Spanish, realized the benefits of cultural immersion during her participation in Crossing Borders. "A trip highlight was my stay with host families in Spain and Morocco, which really helped me engage in their culture. My favorite aspect, though, was interacting with students in Morocco who were around my age. This experience complemented my academics. Seeing things firsthand that I'd learned about in class gave me a greater appreciation for them."

Augustinian pilgrimage

Another flagship short-term study abroad program is the annual pilgrimage to Pellegrinaggio, Italy. To personally experience the Augustinian characteristics of community, spirituality, and service, Merrimack pilgrims visit sites that were important to St. Augustine of Hippo Regius and Augustinian friars. Father Jim Wenzel led the first pilgrimage in March of 2000. Since that time, more than 400 alumni, faculty, staff, and students across the extended Merrimack community have participated in this distinctive learning opportunity.

Father Wenzel comments, "I think it is unique to have representatives from all areas of the College, young and old, students, and faculty. It has pleased me very much to see that each year, a distinct community of friends develops and grows prior to and especially during the journey itself. It is truly representative of St. Augustine's emphasis on a community of friends as a distinct locus for the presence of God."

Students prepare for the pilgrimage by participating in pretrip monthly seminars. In addition to traveling to Spain and Morocco, Sarah Wooley also took advantage of the opportunity to travel to Italy this past spring.

This year, the Pellegrinaggio trip happened to fall on Holy Week. Father Wenzel expressed the thrill of being in Rome from the Wednesday of Holy Week until Easter Sunday and participating in Liturgies celebrated by newly elected Pope Francis. "There was even greater joy in Rome because of Francis' recent election as Pope. It was an electrifying experience. This opportunity allowed our participants to understand that we are a worldwide church."

"Study abroad is recommended for all students across all majors who wish to expand their understanding of themselves, the world, and critical global issues," says Bent. "As St. Augustine said, 'The world is a book, and the person who does not travel reads only one page.' In that vein, we hope our students take advantage of opportunities to be well-read, well-traveled global citizens."

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Q&A WITH AUTHOR LAURIE FARIA STOLARZ, '94

Merrimack alumna Laurie Faria Stolarz

is the author of several popular young adult novels including the *Touch* series (the latest release of which is *Deadly Little Lessons*), *Project 17*, and *Bleed* (all published by Disney/Hyperion Books for Children), as well as the bestselling *Blue is for Nightmares* series. With more than a million books sold worldwide, Stolarz's titles have been included on numerous award lists, including the Quick Pick for Reluctant Readers list, and the Top Ten Teen Pick list, both through the American Library Association.

U: What is the key to creating a successful book series?

A It's essential to have a relatable main character—no matter how extraordinary he or she is—who will sustain the reader's interest throughout the course of each novel in the series. It's important to put that character in a compelling

situation—one that hooks the readers' attention from the very first page and keeps them turning pages until the very end of each book.

Each book in the series needs to show the main character's growth (or arc) as he or she is presented with a unique set of challenges and learns a new lesson each time. In my books, my main character often has a secret, as well as a group of flawed and intriguing friends. I also incorporate humor to help lighten those darker moments. Last, incorporating elements of suspense (including cliffhangers) is definitely key, no matter the genre, because it leaves readers begging for more.

Did you have aspirations of becoming an author while attending Merrimack?

A Yes, but I never thought it was something that I would actually be able to do. I majored in business because I wanted to be able to support myself. Getting a business degree was both practical and "safe."

Growing up, money was tight, and the idea of becoming a writer seemed far more of a pipe dream than something I could one day accomplish, let alone support myself doing. Both of my older brothers majored in business in college—one of whom is also a Merrimack alum—and became successful. I'd planned on following in their footsteps.

0: Did your professors help influence your career direction?

A Even though I never thought that becoming a writer was a realistic goal, during my freshman year, Professor MaryKay Mahoney stopped me after class one day to ask me if I'd ever thought about pursuing writing in a more serious way. She told me how talented she thought I was and that I owed it to myself to pursue that talent. I'm forever grateful for her encouragement, because those words put the possibility inside my head.

Though I didn't have the confidence at the time to make the leap from business, it was nice to be recognized for something I'd always wanted to pursue. In the end, I'm grateful for my business degree, because as a writer I run my own business. Though I have editors, agents, and publicists, I do a lot of my own marketing as an author and having this background helps immensely.

0: When is the last time you visited Merrimack?

A I was on campus this past fall when I was guest speaker in one of Dr. Mahoney's creative writing classes.

What's the most outrageous thing you've done in the name of research?

In my field, research is essential. Not only do I try to keep current on teen culture, I often have to research the book's subject matter. Once, I had to figure out how to break into an abandoned mental institution, the former Danvers State Hospital, which was rumored to be haunted, in the middle of the night. I did this for my research on *Project 17*, which deals with the supernatural. I connected with a group of urban explorers and became so spooked by my research that I wasn't able to sleep at night.

What stimulates you intellectually?

A My work and my obsessive need to get things right. I'm also fascinated by holistic health and nutrition.

I absolutely love what I do and I'm grateful for that every day. I think the best part of my job is when someone writes to me saying that my books have gotten him or her to enjoy reading.

Though I loved telling stories as a young person, I wasn't an avid reader. As an adult who writes for teens, I knew I wanted to target young people who were like me—individuals who don't naturally gravitate toward reading for pleasure. It's a thrill to hear from those teens—to hear that my books helped change their attitudes about reading.

1 What's next for you?

A My Blue is for Nightmares series was recently optioned for a TV series by Persistent Entertainment and Blondie Girl Productions (Ashley Tisdale's production company). It was sold to ABC Family and went to the pilot stage, but it did not get picked up. That said, it was an amazing experience and I learned a lot through the process, starting with

initial vision meetings all the way to the pilot script.

I'm currently working on my 14th book for young adults. It's called *Welcome to the Dark House*, the first book in my new *Dark House* horror series with Disney/ Hyperion Books for Children. It will be out next winter.

It was the way he talked about her. The way his eyes filled up, like they could drown you in just one blink. The way his dimpled chin trembled when he spoke. How his voice was all splintery, slivered into a million pieces—all about her, about how much he loved her and couldn't accept that this had happened, that he had done it.

The trial had lasted a little over two weeks. But I watched it a lot longer than that. Thanks to Court TV and an old VCR, I watched every night before I went to bed and sometimes until the sky turned blue again. Some nights I just couldn't say good bye, couldn't bring myself to look into those watery eyes or hear that broken voice and shut the power off. That would be like abandoning him in some way—leaving him alone there in that cold, impersonal courtroom, trapped in the TV.

I'd play and replay the tape, noticing new things each time. Like that his hair was really dark, dark brown, rather than black like all the papers said. And that he had a Madonna-like mole on his bottom lip that moved with his mouth when he talked.

The tape became fuzzy in parts. Parts where it was his turn to talk about Melanie. When he said how nothing else meant anything, including prison, or death, or anything else they might do to him, if he couldn't see her everyday, if she couldn't read him one of her poems.

I just never knew someone could love that much.

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Merrimack Concludes 2012-2013 with the Most Championships Since 1999

Highlighted by the first-ever regular season championship for men's lacrosse, Merrimack's athletic programs won a combined five league championships in 2012–2013—the most in 14 years. The men's lacrosse team was ranked as high as third in the country, its highest ranking ever, while Corey Lunney was named the USILA National Player of the Year and a first-team All-American for the third time.

The women's golf team also led the way this spring. Only in its second season, the team won the ECAC Championship by 30 strokes. Men's tennis remained a model of consistency winning its second-straight Northeast-10 regular season and conference championship, while qualifying for its sixth-straight and sixth-ever NCAA Tournament. The men's tennis team will enter 2013–2014 with 22 straight conference victories.

Merrimack also enjoyed an outstanding fall season as men's soccer won its first Northeast-10 Championship since 1999 and won its first-ever NCAA Tournament. Meanwhile, the field hockey team won its second-straight and second-ever conference title and advanced to its second-straight NCAA Final Four.

In all, Merrimack won 55% of its games—the most since 2009–2010. In fact, the baseball team tied the school record for wins with 30, while reaching the Northeast-10 Championship for the first time since 1996.

WOMEN'S GOLFER ALI REED QUALIFIES FOR NCAA TOURNAMENT

After finishing second at the NCAA Super Regionals in Illinois in early May, Sophomore Ali Reed qualified to compete in the NCAA Division II Women's Golf Tournament. As 1 of 12 qualifying individual golfers in the country, she competed against 11 individuals and 16 teams, finishing 49th overall at the LPGA International Legends Course in Daytona Beach, Florida.

VOEGELI INVITED TO PHILADELPHIA EAGLES TRAINING CAMP

Wide Receiver Isaiah Voegeli became the fourth Merrimack football player in two seasons to sign a NFL contract. The Northeast-10's Most Valuable Player signed with the Philadelphia Eagles and will attend Eagles' training camp this summer.

"I am speechless," said Voegeli. "I am so grateful for this opportunity. I can't thank head coach Dan Curran enough for his help and guidance and preparation to get me to this point. This is a dream come true that I've dreamt about since I was seven, to just have a shot and I've been blessed by this opportunity."


Voegeli leaves Merrimack as the most decorated offensive player in program history. He was a consensus All-American last fall breaking multiple Northeast-10 Conference records along with nearly every Merrimack College receiving record.

"We are so proud of Isaiah and all of his accomplishments and we couldn't be more excited for him as he moves on to the next phase of his career," said first-year head coach Dan Curran. "Very few people have the opportunity to play football at the highest level and I can't think of an individual who has earned it more than Isaiah. Isaiah has set the standard for all future offensive players at Merrimack with his unbelievable production, competitiveness, and work ethic."

Kathleen earned her B.A. degree in Sociology from Grand Valley State University and received her M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in Sociology from Western Michigan University. She came to UND in 1988, was promoted through the ranks to professor and was named Chester Fritz Distinguished Professor of Sociology in 2009. Her research focuses on teaching sociology, sexualities, and the career trajectories of chairs of graduate departments of sociology. As Interim Dean, she provided leadership and direction for 18 departments and several programs of study in the University's College of Arts and Sciences.

After 24 years at the University of North emphases to their social entrepreneurship Dakota (UND), Dean Kathy Tiemann is heading east to become Merrimack's Dean of the School of Liberal Arts. She also understands the value of keeping curriculum fresh and relevant, citing a recent collaborative effort she helped lead. "I'm working with the business school to add liberal arts


program—enabling students to select from specialized tracks in economics, sustainability, faith and culture, and global justice. Bundling courses creates relevant multi-disciplinary programs that students really value. I hope to explore similar curricula opportunities at Merrimack."

Integrating classroom lessons with hands-on experience is an integral part of Dean Tiemann's academic philosophy, which is why she encourages faculty to make in-class research part of the curriculum. "At UND, many of our students work with faculty on research projects and help present papers at professional meetings. I think it's important to give students a chance to be published and recognized for their work."

When asked about the value of a liberal arts education, Dean Tiemann was quick to respond. "A liberal arts education is a practical education. Most people change

their occupational identity approximately three times in their lifetimes. Look at all the specialized occupations that we were training people for 10 or 15 years ago that no longer exist. With a liberal arts education, students acquire valuable skills in reading, writing, and critical thinking that can be applied to new challenges. Those skills don't expire." To further emphasize the importance of the liberal arts, Dean Tiemann referenced C.S. Lewis' quote that while friendship, philosophy and art are unnecessary for survival, they, like liberal arts, "give value to survival."

Along with her partner, Reverend Doctor Gayle Baldwin, Dean Tiemann will be moving to the east coast with dogs Bogey and Putter. Self-proclaimed golf nuts, Tiemann says with a laugh, "We thought about naming one of the dogs Eagle, but that just seemed like too much pressure to put on an animal."



At Pfizer, Jack gained broad commercial leadership experience across a range of responsibilities. Prior to retiring, Jack was Vice President, Worldwide Marketing where he was responsible for Pfizer's Global Infectious Diseases and Respiratory Therapeutic groups. 


















From transforming the campus, to strengthening our faculty, to supporting our students—your generosity has made an immediate impact at Merrimack College.
