

### 1950 ROLLINS ALUMNI FUND FACTS

There were 495 contributors (9 gave twice) to the annual Rollins Alumni Loyalty Fund this year. By averaging \$4.15 each, they reimbursed the College for \$2,054.40 of the \$2,826.79 spent during the first 6 months of 1949-50 in underwriting all services of the Alumni Office, such as publishing and mailing THE ROLLINS ALUMNI RECORD, to every former Rollins Student on the active mailing list.

The Honor Roll of the 495, who generously did their part before the close of the College fiscal year on June 30, appears at the head of their

Class Notes in this issue.

The standing of each Class is printed on the back page.

However, here are some special credits due:

FOR Participation—to the Gay 90's, leading with 27 contributing members; closely followed by the Class of 1948 with 24; and the Classes of 1930 and 1936 tying for third place with 20 each.

FOR TOTALS ACHIEVED—to the Class of 1935, with \$122; the Class of 1910, with \$116; and the Class of 1938, with \$115.

FOR BEST AVERAGES—to the Class of 1910, with \$14.50; the Class of 1913, with \$11.67; and the Class of 1926, nearly matching them with \$11.00 each.

And not only 9 members of the Class of 1950 responded this year of their Commencement, but 6 former members of the Class of 1951 and even 1, originally of the Class of 1952, repaid their enjoyment of being kept informed about Rollins and their collegemates through the Alumni publications.

## Rollins Grants Degrees to 170 Seniors At Climax of 1950 Commencement Week

At 10:00 A. M. on June 1, 1950, the largest Senior Class in Rollins history marched with the Faculty in full academic dress into Knowles Memorial Chapel to receive degrees and special honors from the College

before their assembled families and friends.

Dr. Eugene R. Smith, invited to give the Commencement Address, chose as his topic Keeping Ahead of Progress. "Each of us is an important member of many partnerships," he declared. "A good partner does not think first of his own rights but sees more deeply into the truth that even personal success depends on intelligent cooperation." "Man cannot, however, solve his problems of self and keep ahead of material progress unless he also realizes and lives up to his partnership with God," which, Dr. Smith said in concluding, gives "meaning and satisfaction to all the other relationships of life."

After Dr. Paul A. Wagner, president, personally handed each of the 170 candidates for degrees from Rollins their diplomas, the following Senior awards were made: Kendrick E. Fenderson Jr., ODK trophy for leadership and service; Carol A. Posten, Libra cup for all-round campus leadership; Robert H. Akerman, James W. Ogilvie Jr., William R. Smythe Jr., Vincent A. Rapetti and Thomas Mullen, the \$100 General Reeve Awards for maintaining highest scholarship throughout their last three undergraduate years; and, finally, to Hugh C. Davis, Henry R. Gooch and Jack T. Sayers, the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Medallions for characteristics of heart and mind exemplified by the late Mr. Sullivan.

This was the first time that Rollins College has bestowed three Sullivan Medallions upon the same occasion. However, special permission to do so was granted, in view of the equally fine individual calibre of all three recipients this year.

The annual celebration of Commencement Week at Rollins opened on the preceding Friday with Honors Day in the Annie Russell Theatre, where academic prizes and athletic awards were distributed among the entire student body.

Seniors attended their last classes on Saturday and the Student Council sponsored an all-College dance in their honor at the Orlando Country Club that evening.

The Rev. James L. Duncan, rector of All Saints Episcopal Church in Winter Park, delivered the Baccalaureate Sermon in Knowles Memorial Chapel and the graduating Class participated for the last time in a regular Sunday morning service at Rollins as undergraduates.

The Faculty-Student diamond ball game in the Sandspur Bowl, scheduled to follow the final Faculty Meeting on Monday afternoon, was rained out. However, there was a full moon that evening when Dr. and Mrs. Wagner were hosts for the Faculty-Senior party on the spacious lawn of the President's residence. Each group hilariously impersonated the other in prearranged skits on the well lighted terrace after Mrs. Wagner had graciously served dessert and coffee. And the Wagners invited their guests to stay and dance after the good-natured evening of entertainment.

Class Day exercises were held in the Center Patio on campus Monday afternoon. Here, members of the Senior Class received individual recognitions for excellence in science, art, economics, dramatics, and poetry.

Mary Delano gave the Class Prophecy and William W. Schafer read their Last Will and Testament. Choir keys and athletic letters and keys, to those who had won two or more letters in major sports, were then awarded.

The Senior men who were members of OOOO were then made known and handed membership keys. Dean Arthur D. Enyart, who for so many years has awarded the prized OOOO trophy but would retire as Dean of Men this Commencement, was touched to find himself the elected recipient at this time. He is the first member of the Faculty ever to be made a member and awarded the top honor of this elite Rollins men-students' organization. President and Mrs. Wagner had given a reception in Dean Enyart's honor for the entire College a few days before.

Class Day exercises culminated with the annual tree planting ceremony and the singing of the Rollins Alma Mater. That evening President and Mrs. Wagner were at home to the Seniors and their families.

President Wagner, Dean Stone, Dean Enyart and Dean Cleveland were among the early risers and added greatly to the fun of this occasion. Dr. Norman E. Gilbert, Dr. James E. Bell and Director of Athletics Jack McDowall were invaluable as Faculty aides to Fleet Peeples who, for over two decades, has served as master chef for this sunrise breakfast in the open. (This year Fleet did double duty, running a ferry service across Lake Virginia.) Howard McDonald, Rodman Lehman and Guy Colado, Alumni standbys for many years completed the camfire staff. But fully fifty Alumni were kept busy welcoming, registering and serving all those enjoying this final informal party for the Seniors before they donned caps and gowns for the main event that day.

## Around the Horseshoe

By the time that April rolled around the Horseshoe, Seniors were once more beginning to assume those haggard looks that only a college senior can have when the end of his college days are approaching. April not only brought haggard looks but intense athletic activity both at the crew dock on Lake Maitland and on the baseball diamond at Harper-Sheppard Field.

Brad's Boys started the month out right by scalping the Dartmouth Indians and then one week later scuttling the Washington and Lee Generals. American International College was the next victim for the Tar sweepslingers as they were apparently well on their way to annex a second State title. In the Florida Championship Regatta held on Lake Maitland on May 13 Tampa University the dark horse of the contest proved that they were a top flight crew by nosing out the Tars for first place by a very narrow margin. On May 20 the Tars journeyed to Poughkeepsie, N. Y., for the annual Dad Vail Regatta. Here again as they had proved in years past the long months of strenuous practice and the canny coaching of Doc Bradley paid off once again. Beating out 8 other crews they gave the powerful Boston University 8 such a race that they were only beaten by one and eight-tenths seconds for first place.

At the annual crew banquet given by Coach Bradley, Pete Sholley of West Newton, Mass., was elected crew captain for the past year. Pete has the distinction of rowing in every varsity race for the past 4 years, quite an enviable record.

The baseball team not to be outdone by the crew for athletic honors began to really shift into high gear. Behind the sterling pitching of Jim Covello, Big John Gray and Clyde Stevens the Tars polished off Tampa and Miami in short order. The next 2 games the Tars played host to the University of Florida Gators. Spectacular playing by the Gators gave them the edge of victory in both of these contests. The Tars then journeyed to North Carolina where they trimmed the North Carolina Tar Heels in one game and lost in the second of the series. After losing to N. C. State they decided that what they needed was some of that good old Florida sun so back they came. Their next victories came when they swept a series from the University of Miami Hurricanes. This was followed by a victory over the Stetson Hatters. Joe's Boys then journeyed to Gainesville for the 2 remaining games with the University of Florida that were to decide the State Championship. The Tars had to win both of them to annex the title. In the first game behind the excellent pitching of Big John Gray the Tars shellacked the Gators 17 to 8. In the second game of the series which was tight from start to finish the Tars nosed the U. of F. out by the slim score of 2 to 1. And so for a third year the Tars won the State baseball crown.

Throughout the year another team that has been making a name for themselves has been the girls basketball team. During their season they

piled up a record of 15 wins and no losses.

The Rollins Golf team was sparked by the sterling playing of such performers as Billy Key, Clyde Kelley, Jupe Arnold and Jimmy Brass. They compiled a good record in both their local matches and the out-of-town contests, even taking the State team championship from Miami Univ.

The traditional Rollins Campus Sing took place in the Annie Russell Theatre on April 14. The Phi Mu sorority under the direction of Margaret Bell won the cup for the third consecutive year. The Delta Chis won the

men's cup.

The Independent Women's Show was another highlight of the month of May. It was written by Jim Bedortha and the music arranged by Ed Cushing. The plot revolves around 2 students who are blasted into the world of tomorrow by a time machine. The entire cast under the very capable direction of Fred Taylor turned in an excellent performance and had the audience both rolling in the aisles with laughter and applauding madly for more.

The final Annie Russell production of the year was "The Taming of the Shrew." This was very well received. Prof. Howard Bailey as Petruchio tamed in expert fashion Lydia Dorsett who played the part of

Shakespeare's famous shrew.

The middle of May saw the publication of the poetry book "Six Guys and a Gal." This book was the compiled poetry of Paul Bissell, Gordon Clark, Roy Whidden, Richard Glatthar, Harold McKinney, Hall Tennis and Marilyn Briggs, all members of Dr. Wattles Poetry class. This publication of poetical works is the second in Rollins history. The first, "Rollins Book of Verse," was published in 1929 by the late Jessie Rittenhouse, former Faculty member.

Other athletic events during the months of April and May that attracted both student and outside interest were the Rollins Intramural Horse Show, the Water Carnival and the Girls Intramural Swimming Meet. Our tennis squad also piled up an enviable record during April and May, beating such teams as Presbyterian College and Stetson Uni-

versity.

The Rollins Newsreel staff which was going great guns by this time elected Bill Frangus as the new Editor-in-chief for the coming school year. The second edition of the Newsreel certainly shows the time and effort that the entire staff put into making this record of Rollins events for posterity.

During the latter part of April at a surprise ceremony in Knowles Memorial Chapel Dr. Hamilton Holt, our beloved "Prexy" was presented with the Algernon Sidney Sullivan Award. The presentation was made

by President Paul A. Wagner and Dean Theodore S. Darrah.

of the regular Sunday morning service in Knowles Memorial Chapel. The Sullivan Medallion has never before been awarded at Rollins except during Founder's Week and at Commencement exercises, but the College and friends filled the pews that morning.

Dr. Holt, greatly benefitted by the mild Florida winter climate, attended this last regular service of worship at the College before enplaning for his home in Woodstock, Connecticut, completely unaware of the honor to be conferred upon

During the preceding three months, while he was enjoying the gracious hospitality of Professor and Mrs. Hugh McKean's home on Genius Drive in Winter Park, President and Mrs. Wagner, the Rollins Students and friends in the College community had shown Dr. Holt many social courtesies. And, just before his sojourn ended, Mr. and Mrs. McKean were hosts at a beautifully appointed reception in his honor.

On April 30, Dean Theodore S. Darrah paid special tribute to Dr. Holt. Upon descending from the pulpit, Dean Darrah formally presented Dr. Holt to President Wagner

With words of affectionate esteem Dr. Wagner then bestowed this most cherished recognition at Rollins of high ideals, service to others and quality of character, upon his distinguished predecessor.

Visibly moved, Dr. Holt observed afterwards that after presiding on similar occasions for over twenty years he fully shared the reaction of humility of the other recipients.

## Campus Improvements Well Under Way

A generous friend of Rollins College has given \$63,600 to make Knowles Hall one of the most modern and fully equipped science laboratories on any campus in Florida. The Biology and Botany departments will be on the second floor, with Chemistry and Physics occupying the first floor and basement. The new equipment and apparatus have already been ordered and will be delivered and installed in September.

The basement of the new Mills Memorial Library, now under construction, will house a visual aids centre including two broadcasting and two control rooms for radio purposes, projection, microfilm and photographic dark rooms.

Ben Aycrigg '49, who has been assisting in the Admissions Office since last spring, will move over to the new Rollins library to supervise the visual aids centre. And Hank Gooch '50 has been added to the Admissions staff.

Director of Admissions Jack Rich '38 reports that a maximum of 498 boarding students are expected this fall. The College decided to increase the boarding capacity to 498, which brings the total enrollment figure to 640. The quota last year was 625. There has been an increase of 30 per cent in applications from Freshman boarding men over the same period one year ago.

To accommodate the extra boarders, the Beanery is being enlarged and Rollins has taken over 500 Chase, at Virginia Court and Chase Avenue, as a dormitory for Independent men. Pinehurst is being completely renovated for Freshman girls. And Mrs. Burke will be back as resident head of Chase Hall, which will again house Freshman men.

## Tar Athletes Making Headlines

Two members of the Rollins baseball teams coached by Joe Justice '40 have signed contracts with professional ball clubs. Clyde Stevens x51 is burning up the Florida State League with the Sanford Giants and was selected for the All Star Team. The New York Yankees have signed Big John Gray x51 on a contract and now have him farmed to Amsterdam, N. Y. Stevens' contract is with the New York Giant system. The Tar baseball team copped the third State championship title in 3 straight years this spring.

Betty Rowland x51 won the sixth women's National Collegiate golf crown on June 17. She fired five birdies at Grace Lenczyk, runner-up, from Stetson University. Peggy Kirk '43 reached the finals in the 21st Women's Western Open Golf championship. Then she met Mrs. Babe Didrikson Zaharias.

Ricardo Balbiers '50, Tar tennis ace from Chili, battled his way to the finals of the intercollegiate tennis tournament, has since been semifinalist at Rye and quarter-finalist in the New York State Championship play.

Shirley Fry '49 went to the quarter-finals at Wimbledon and Nancy Morrison '49 reached the finals of the Kent County Tournament in England this summer. Nancy lost to Gussy Moran.

Calhoun Dickson x53 and Doris Jensen x51 have been playing in the amateur tennis circuit.

### **Rollins Gives Bird Sanctuary to State**

In a brief ceremony, on the grounds, President Wagner handed Governor Warren of Florida the papers transferring ownership of the bird and plant sanctuary belonging to the College to the State Park System on May 7. The sanctuary consists of 150 acres on Fort George Island, near Jacksonville.

Mrs. Millar Wilson, whose father was John F. Rollins and once owned the property, donated the sanctuary to the College. Following the transfer of the deed, she gave a buffet tea for the 50 invited guests attending the ceremony.

The Rollins gift specifies that the sanctuary must be kept by the State for research by college groups and is not to be opened to the general public.

Active members of the Rollins Alumni Club of Central Florida packed picnic lunches and drove over to the Rollins Pelican at New Smyrna Beach with their whole families on June 4.

## In Memoriam

Mrs. Henry Nickel (Carrie Ensminger) passed away on April 27, 1950, in Sanford, Florida. Mrs. Nickel attended Rollins from 1900 to 1906, when she received the B.A. degree from the College. Until her recent death, Mrs. Nickel served as her Class correspondent for THE ROLLINS ALUMNI RECORD. She is survived by her husband, their daughter, Mrs. Edward T. Simpson, her brother, Rev. Fred P. Ensminger '97 and sister Mrs. Harry Kent (Mary Ensminger '98A).

Dr. Fred Lewis Pattee, professor of American literature at Rollins College from 1928 to 1941, died at his home in Winter Park on Saturday, May 6, 1950. A noted novelist, teacher, lecturer and poet, Dr. Pattee is most widely known for his histories of American literature published in 1896 and 1915. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. John M. Stetson of Williamsburg, Virginia.

Harry Nelson Dickson, who atended Rollins College 1898-99, passed away in Orlando on May 12, 1950. President and one of the founders of Dickson & Ives Inc., Mr. Dickson was an active member and past president of the Greater Orlando Chamber of Commerce and a member of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Rotary Club and First Methodist Church. He is survived by his wife and four children, Mrs. Thomas J. Wells of Dayton, Ohio, Mrs. John O'Rourke, Nelson Dickson and Bryan Dickson, all of Orlando, three grandchildren and his mother, Mrs. H. H. Dickson.

Mrs. Nina Swearingen Woodruff, who returned home to Orlando a year ago, died May 28, 1950. She attended Rollins College 1916-17. Mrs. Woodruff had retired two years ago after serving in clerical duty with the Veterans' Administration in Washington, D. C., for 32 years. She was a member of the First Baptist Church in Orlando and is survived by her mother, two brothers, Clyde S. Swearingen and Sidney J. Swearingen and one sister, Mrs. Frank Gordon, all of Orlando.

Leon D. Lewis suffered a heart attack and died in St. Petersburg, Florida, on May 31, 1950. Mr. Lewis attended Rollins from 1913 to 1917 when he enlisted and served with the U. S. Navy for eighteen months during World War I. A member of a pioneer St. Petersburg family, he was a prominent businessman and yachtsman there. Mr. Lewis served the St. Petersburg Port Authority since its creation by City Council in 1939 and, in 1947, was made chairman. Active in civic affairs, he was a former director of the local American Red Cross, president of the Red Cross Life Saving Corps, commodore of the Yacht Club, a member of the American Legion, Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Club, Lakewood Country Club, Propeller Club and Bath Club. He is survived by his wife, the former Eva D. Endicott.

Mrs. Hattie Corrin Strong passed away in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, on June 6, 1950. An internationally known philanthropist, Mrs. Strong established the Hattie M. Strong Foundation in 1927 to help

selected young men and women of all countries to obtain higher education. She gave Strong and Corrin Halls to Rollins College, and there are monuments of her benefactions at several other colleges as well as the YWCA building in Washington, D. C. Mrs. Strong was vice chairman general of the United States Flag Association, honorary chairman, Women's Division, of the National Amateur Athletic Federation and honorary president of the Rochester, New York, YWCA. Among the many honors she received during her lifetime are: the Order of the Chevalier of the Legion of Honor, France; Gold Medal, Reconnaissance Francaise, France; Order of St. Sava, Yugoslavia; Doctor of Laws, George Washington University; and Cross of Honor, United States Flag Association. In 1939, Rollins College conferred upon Mrs. Strong the Rollins Decoration of Honor. She is survived by her son, L. Corrin Strong, who is a Trustee of Rollins College, and several grandchildren.

Chauncey Webster lost his life on June 26, 1950, in a tractor accident on his farm in Clinton Corners, New York. Mr. Webster studied at the Rollins Conservatory from 1899 until 1904. He is survived by his wife and a son and daughter.
