Dean Charles A. Welch Retires

Dr. Charles A. Welch, Dean of the Rollins College Roy E. Crummer School of Finance and Business Administration, was awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws degree during Commencement exercises held for the Class of 1977.

Dr. Welch was presented the honor by Rollins President Dr. Jack B. Critchfield.

Welsh received his B.S., M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from New York University. He also studied at New York Universities Graduate School of Arts and Pure Science, and at the Graduate School of Columbia University.

Prior to his appointment as Associate Professor of Business Administration at Rollins in 1955, Dr. Welch served as Chairman of American University's Economics Department as well as Chief of the Division of Economics and Senior Specialist in Industrial Organization

and Corporate Finance of the Legislative Reference Service. He was also a consulting economist in the Department of Justice for several years.

Appointed Dean of the Crummer School in 1965, Dr. Charles A. Welch is a member of the American Economics Association and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He is a senior member of the American Institute of Industrial Engineers and is a management fellow of the Florida Power Corporation.

Dr. Welch has written numerous publications, including *Economic Prospects of the Cross-Florida Barge Canal* (1959); *Report on Small Business* (1947); and *Patents and Competition in the Automobile Industry* (1948).

Dr. Welch's retirement is effective June 1, 1977.

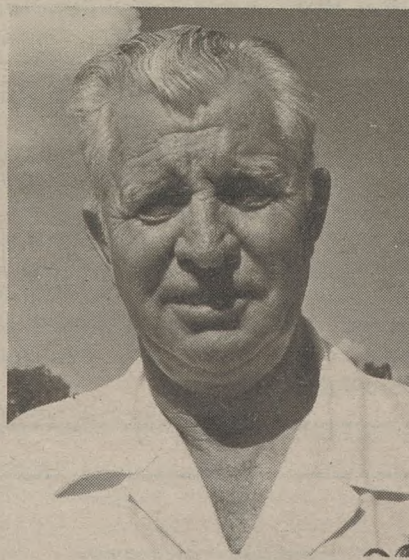

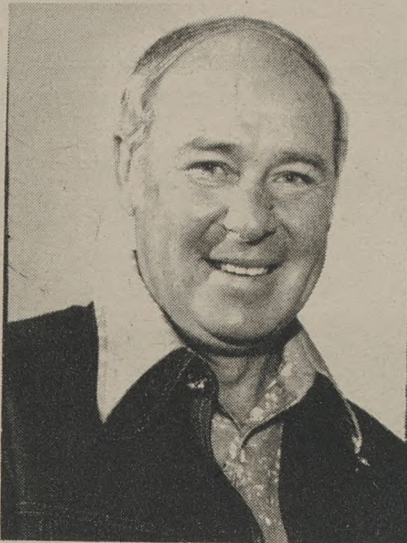

As an advance degree holder in the education profession, I can say that an advance degree in Education does have impact on individuals earning power, and is also true in many other professions.

Rollins Club

The Rollins Club (Central Florida Alumni Club) has had a very active year offering local alumni a variety of activities. The attendance at their events was exceptionally high. The Board of Directors and The Alumni Office Staff sincerely appreciate the assistance received from members of The Rollins Club. I urge alumni residents of Central Florida to join the Rollins Club.

The Rollins Club has presented the Association with a check for \$250.00 for a membership in the Hugh F. McKean Society. We are pleased to receive this contribution which outwardly demonstrates the Club's concern for the financial welfare of the College and the students studying here.

College Sets Largest Annual Budget

Rollins College will have the largest annual budget in its history, \$9.9 million. All but \$620,000 will come from tuition, fees, endowment income, auxiliary enterprise income, government grants and trust funds. The \$620,000 needed to balance the budget must be raised from alumni, friends, parents, trustees, businesses and corporations. These constituencies believe in Rollins College as a viable alternative to private higher education and are willing to support the students and faculty through monetary gifts to the College.

The Alumni Association budget for FY 78 is \$77,000. With approximately 16,000 active alumni on the rolls, the prorations of budgetary expenditures per alum is \$5.00. This means it costs the Alumni Association \$5.00 per alumnus to provide services, record keeping, communications, etc. We urge each alum to consider a thoughtful, responsive contribution to the Alumni Association this year. Your gift helps pay for the operation of the Alumni Association and gives needed financial assistance to the College.

Rollins College Statistics

Rollins College School of Continuing Education and Master's Degree Programs continue to make an impact on the citizenry of Central Florida. Rollins College, through its undergraduate evening programs has granted degrees (Bachelor of General Studies, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and Associate of Arts) to nearly two thousand local residents and has added an additional 371 graduates this year. Rollins College School of Continuing Education programs are offered at the college campus, Patrick Air Force Base in Cocoa and in several satellite centers. The SCE has also graduated 71 candidates for the degree of Master of Science in Criminal Justice.

The professional and career personnel in Education continue to seek Rollins Graduate Programs in Education in their quest for advanced educational training. Rollins College has graduated 789 candidates for the Master of Arts in Teaching, 426 candidates for the Masters of Education and 50 Specialist in Education. The Department of Education graduated 121 advanced degree candidates this year with a grand total of 1387 degrees granted. A new Master's degree program in Education, Master of Arts in Education, Master of Arts in Guidance and Counseling, had its first degree recipient this year.

The Department of Economics and Business Administration has impressive statistics in granting advance

degrees (Master of Business Administration and Master of Science in Management). A total of 863 degrees have been awarded with 197 being earned this year.

Nearly 10,000 persons of the 16,000 persons on the Alumni Association rolls are classified as Regular Rollins Graduate or Regular Rollins Non-graduate. These identification codes exist to enable us to identify alumni and their graduate/non-graduate status with the college. The college day school program graduated 263 Bachelor of Arts students and 6 Honors in Bachelor of Arts candidates this year. A preliminary report on the Class of '77 states that a very high percent of those graduates have been accepted or are anticipating acceptance to graduate school (77 or 35%), with five graduates accepted in Medical schools, five in Law school, seven have received graduate fellowships and assistantships, nineteen have accepted positions with business and education; and many more grads are awaiting acceptance to a variety of professional and advanced degree programs.

Rollins College has granted approximately one thousand degrees to eligible candidates this past year. This single fact is very impressive. It demonstrates the degree of impact Rollins College has on the local community and private higher education.

Kresge Appoints Alumni Publications Committee

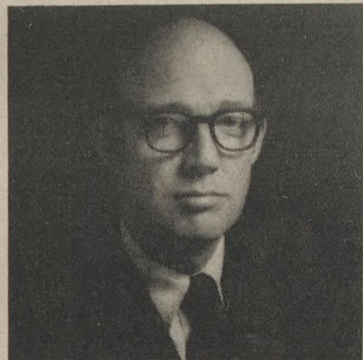

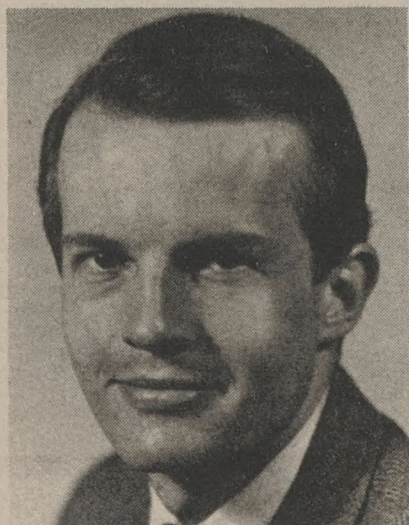

Alumni Can Benefit from New Annuity Agreements Program Offered

Rollins College recently received its permit from the Florida Department of Insurance to offer annuity agreements to its Alumni and Friends. Now, for the first time, Rollins is able to assist its friends while its friends are assisting the College.

These annuity agreements are backed by the assets of Rollins College as well as with 100% of the consideration which the annuitant contributes for the annuity. Even if the College were to discontinue operation before the annuitant dies, the annuity contract is still safe.

Many of the Alumni and Friends have expressed their desires to help Rollins, but need the security of retaining their assets for their own financial security. Now, they can help Rollins while still having that desired security for their futures.

Some of the benefits and provisions of the Rollins Annuity are described in the following typical questions and answers:

Q. What is a Rollins College Annuity?

A. It is a legal contract stating that, for a specified sum of money, the donor is guaranteed to receive an annual income from the college for as long as he lives.

Q. Can I be sure my Rollins College Annuity will be safe?

A. Yes, by law, the college must maintain asset reserves equal to all the outstanding annuity obligations. In addition, the college maintains a 25% surplus asset. Your annuity investment is legally separated from all other college funds until the time of your death.

Q. Are there any special fees?

A. There are no fees charged the annuitant.

Q. Is there permanence to my annuity?

A. You cannot outlive the income payments from your annuity. You may be entitled to a guaranteed income rate as high as 10%.

Q. What happens to my annuity after I die?

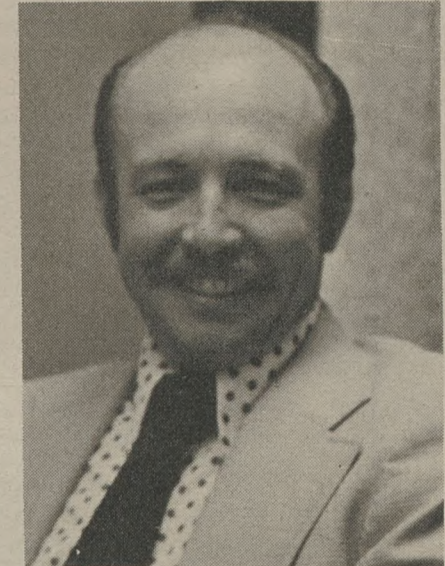
A. After your death, the principal of the annuity will be used by the Rollins College for its general purposes.

Q. Are there tax benefits for my Rollins College annuity?

A. Yes, the initial investment is treated as a charitable contribution with consequent tax advantages. The annuity fund compounds tax free to you. A portion of your annuity payments are also tax free. Rollins College will send you all the documents and information you will need to claim the tax privileges to which your annuity entitles you.

Q. May I include a survivor-beneficiary in my annuity agreement?

A. Yes. If you so direct, the income from your annuity will be paid to a "survivor-beneficiary" throughout his lifetime, after your death.

Q. May I use securities, real estate or other negotiable assets as the principal for a Rollins College Annuity?

A. Yes. Please request further information regarding the related transfer procedures and tax privileges. If you send your date of birth, together with an indication of the value and type of principal (i.e., stocks, bonds, real estate, personal property, etc.), for your Rollins College Annuity, tax and income calculations will be sent to you promptly.

Q. Do I have to wait until I retire to begin receiving income from my gift annuity?

A. No. Income can start any time, according to the dictates of your contract. However, under normal circumstances, the highest net yield will be realized by starting your payments at the time of your retirement.

Q. Is a gift annuity a desirable producing plan for a widow?

A. Yes. Many widows prefer gift annuities because they represent a guaranteed income without having to worry about investment management or the fluctuating national economy.

Q. What happens if I lose my annuity agreement?

A. Nothing. Your income continues and a duplicate copy of the agreement will be sent to you upon request.

Q. Are my income payments always the same?

A. Yes, they are always the same. No matter what the economy does or whether the stock market goes up or down, your monthly payments will not fluctuate.

Q. How do I collect my payments?

A. They will come to you regularly through the mail.

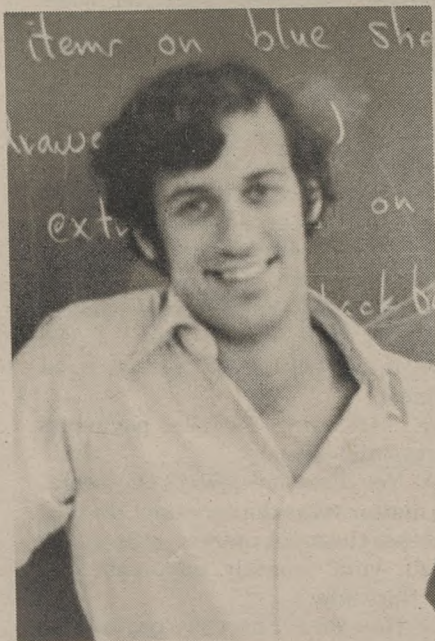

Premedical Tales by Hoffman

Having traveled through four years of Rollins' Pre-Med Program I can honestly say it is a well-rounded major for any student genuinely interested in a Health-Related Professional School. The program is designed to meet the minimum pre-requisites for most medical schools. If a pre-med student had to choose a Biology or Chemistry major

and then fulfill all the necessary courses from the other fields of study, he or she would have no time to explore the other arts in a fine arts curriculum. This is why Rollins offers a pre-medical major; to allow a student to prepare for Medical College but also to graduate with a B.A. degree.

The course load of the average pre-med student is not easy. Each term usually consists of three science

courses with labs plus another course. The personal atmosphere at Rollins allows the classes to be small so the faculty is usually available to the students. None of our classes had the intense competition that is usually spoken of in pre-med classes. For a dedicated student, the program is a learning experience that has its own rewards. In addition to a career in medicine the pre-med committee also steers students toward optometry, dentistry, osteopathic and veterinary medicine. And while every student may hope for admission to medical school, each of these can be viable alternatives.

Helping Dr. Hellwege present the pre-med program each year to incoming freshmen, I was sometimes distressed at the lack of preparation of many students. The attrition rate of 50% the first term is due primarily to the lack of desire and application of each student. This rate could be changed by recruiting better students and by distributing more information about the difficulty of the program to new students.

The competition of so many good students trying to get into medical schools is very stiff. Having been through the application process, I found out the hard way. I was not accepted to the eight medical schools to which I applied, but I was granted admission to my first choice College of Optometry.

I am very excited about Optometry and believe that Rollins' Pre-Med Program did an excellent job of preparing me for my future career.

Perhaps this is the best place to thank all of my professors, especially the Pre-Med Committee, for a tremendous four years of undergraduate study.

This sentiment, put forth by D.L. Lieberman, may ring true for many would-be pre-med students. The whole medical field is highly competitive and requires a great deal of hard work. But this dream of becoming a medical doctor can become a reality. Successful acceptance into medical school does not depend solely on the pre-med student nor the pre-medical program at his undergraduate school. The secret to success lies within the student and his school both.

"As a Rollins pre-med student who has 'made it', I feel the pre-medical program here is tops. The curriculum is broad; it includes adequate preparation in the sciences yet allows ample courses in humanities and the social sciences. A plus for the Rollins program is that it is not a rigid one. It requires basic courses in Math, Physics, Biology and Chemistry, but is flexible in allowing choices for upper division science electives. It also allows time for students to delve into other areas of interest. I had an interest in the Behavioral Sciences and was able to take many courses in Psychology and Sociology.

The pre-medical committee includes professors from all three college divisions and each takes a personal interest in the curriculum and in its students. The curriculum is constantly reviewed and updated to

insure that its pre-med students meet the basic medical school requirements. It is also geared to provide adequate preparation for the Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) and the new Medical College Admissions Assessment Program (MCAAP). Most importantly, it acts as a counseling service to assist students in obtaining their goals of being admitted to a professional education in the health-care field. It attempts to find the best candidates for medical school, and tries to steer those not as qualified to a medically related field early in their college career.

One of the advantages of Rollins' small pre-med program is the student-teacher ratio. It is small, and very advantageous. Professors learn to know students as persons, and are in a much better position to write favorable recommendations about a student having known him in and out of the classroom.

For myself, the closer relationships between students and teachers was one of the best opportunities Rollins had to offer. Students were able to work side by side with their professors. Teachers and students

were able to view each other as fellow scientists. Also, the curriculum allows for independent on or off campus study, including research projects and internships at local health facilities. These are valuable learning experiences that add considerable to the program.

While the pre-medical curriculum and faculty are important, the pre-med student himself plays a key role in his successful acceptance into medical school. Pre-medicine cannot merely be a college major or a field of study, it must become a manner of thinking, a way of life. Only when this occurs will a pre-medical student become a medical student.

Hard work and stiff competition begins upon entering the Rollins pre-med program as a freshman. The attrition rate for freshmen at most colleges is 50%. Many students enter pre-medicine without realizing the sacrifices and commitment it entails. A pre-medical student's mornings are spent in the classroom, as is the average student's. While other students have their afternoons free, the pre-med student must spend many afternoons in the laboratories.

The pre-med student has an adequate amount of free time, but he has to learn to use it wisely, taking time for study, becoming involved in worthwhile campus activities, and play.

Motivation is the key work in a pre-med student's life. He must be deeply motivated to becoming a doctor, and this commitment must show through in everything he does. Four years as a pre-med student involves lots of sacrifices. You must sincerely want to attend medical school and be willing to give up other wants for this. You have to set your priorities early and have the determination to stick to them. One needs the courage to make decisions and the faith to believe in them.

The pre-medical student cannot go it alone. He needs the backing of a loving and concerned family. He doesn't necessarily need financial backing from them; more importantly, he needs their emotional backing

to help him succeed. There may be times when a pre-med student wants to give up or when his priorities become sidetracked or confused. He needs someone to be concerned enough to step in and help him out.

Sound tough? It is. But it can be done and one can enjoy oneself and college life at the same time. There is time for outside employment, sports, music, campus service groups, and socializing. Extra-curricular activities are necessary for a balanced college life and they make returning to academics all the more worthwhile and fruitful. They help to develop discipline and leadership qualities to round out the pre-med student.

My four years at Rollins were ones of perseverance and hard work. I not only learned the course work, but I learned how to study efficiently. Through tutoring and lab assistantships I was given the opportunity to view the other side of the teacher-student relationship. I learned to work side by side with younger students, fellow classmates, and faculty.

There were times that I came close to quitting, times when my priorities became shifted, but the backing of my professors, family and fellow students helped me to work things out.

I also had a lot of fun. I became involved in college life at Rollins I am a member of Alpha Phi Sorority. I was an investigator on the Student Court, a representative on the Student Assembly, and a Chapel Belle. I sang in a church folk group, worked in the Chemistry and Biology Departments, and was employed part-time at Walt Disney World.

I can look back at these past four years and smile, knowing that I would do it all over again if I had to. I feel my family and Bishop Moore High School, Orlando, prepared me for the challenging years in pre-medicine at Rollins, and that Rollins has in turn prepared me for the more demanding years ahead in medical school. I am confident that, with the preparation I have received, I will be ready to face head on the years that lie ahead.

General Reeve Awards

Richard Atwood, Manuel Cachan, Barbara Johnson, Heidi McNaney, Douglas Oster and Jill Thibbitts were presented the General Reeve Awards for Scholarship during Commencement ceremonies for 263 graduates of the Class of 1977.

Established in 1945 by the late General Charles McCormick Reeve, the award is given "in recognition of high scholastic standing and is awarded at graduation each year to the five seniors who have maintained the highest scholastic record during their last three years at Rollins."

Five of the six graduates named are residents of Florida with Cachan, McNaney and Oster local residents from Orlando, Altamonte Springs and Winter Park respectively. Atwood resides in Jacksonville with Johnson being a native of Nashville, Tennessee.

Dr. Billy O. Wireman Named Dean Roy E. Crummer School

Dr. Billy O. Wireman, President of Eckerd College in St. Petersburg (Fla.) for the past nine years, has been named Dean of the Rollins College Roy E. Crummer School of Finance and Business Administration, according to an announcement made by Dr. Jack B. Critchfield, Rollins President.

Dr. Wireman's new position will become effective June 1, 1977. He replaces Dr. Charles Welsh who retired as the Rollins Business Dean after 22 years with the College.

"We are indeed fortunate that Dr. Wireman has expressed an interest to remain in the field of education," said Dr. Critchfield. "His extensive background in the area of educational administration and management will be very helpful in keeping the progress and full development of the Roy E. Crummer School as a major objective of the College."

In accepting the appointment Dr. Wireman said, "I am delighted to be at Rollins College where Dr. Critchfield and the faculty have done a marvelous job in building a strong Liberal Arts program. The prospect of combining administrative work, teaching and some consulting is very exciting." Dr. Wireman added that "the Rollins Business School will occupy a strategic position in the College's future. I look forward to working with the faculty in finding new links between the business and liberal arts programs."

A native of Jackson, Kentucky, Dr. Wireman was elected President of Eckerd College (St. Petersburg) in 1968. In 1972 he developed a major program, "To Make A Difference: A Suggested Blueprint for Eckerd College," which has evolved into Eckerd's current academic program

known as the "Eckerd College Concept." The program included many exciting concepts which led *Time Magazine* to make the statement that Eckerd came "...from a vacant lot to excellence in just six short years."

Dr. Wireman received his A.B. degree in History and Physical Education from Georgetown College in 1954. He later received the M.A. degree in Educational Administration and History from the University of Kentucky and his Ph.D. from George Peabody College in 1960.

Named in 1968 as one of the Outstanding Young Men of America, Dr. Wireman serves as a consultant and lecturer on both national and international educational problems. He has served on the Board of Directors of the American Management Associations and lectures frequently in Operation Enterprise, the AMA's program which brings sound management principles to college students.

Dr. Wireman has authored numerous articles and papers including "We Are The Epitome of the Now Generation," and "A 1976 Declaration of Education." He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Florida State Chamber of Commerce, the College Fund for Pinellas County, Inc., and the United Board of Christian Higher Education in Asia.

The former U.S. Marine Corps Officer is a former member of the Florida Council of 100, an organization of leading Florida businessmen and civic leaders who are devoted to improving the business and educational climate in the state.

Sidney Sullivan Winner Lewis Scott Lerman

The Sullivan Medallion Award was established more than thirty years ago by the New York Southern Society. It was established to perpetuate the memory and character of its founder, Algernon Sydney Sullivan, and to recognize, honor, and encourage in others those principles of love and service to man which were Mr. Sullivan's dominant characteristics. This award can never be won; it may only be bestowed, for it is given not as a reward, but to recognize a quality of life and attitude of spirit. Recipients are chosen whose characters promise and show that they are moving in the direction in which Mr. Sullivan lived.

This year's recipient, Lewis Scott Lerman, has continuously shown the qualities for which this award is given throughout his years here at Rollins. While at Rollins he was a member of O.D.K., chairman of Student Court,

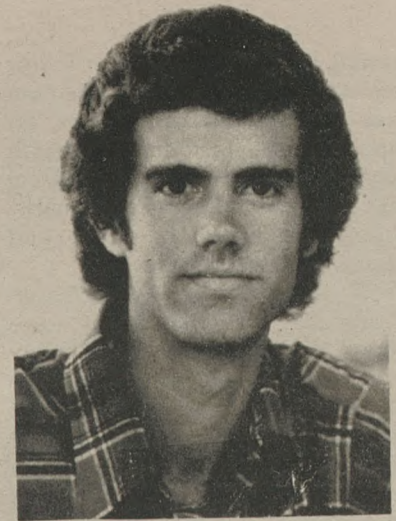
This fall Mr. Lerman will attend the University of Vermont working on a Masters Degree in Student Personnel Administration.

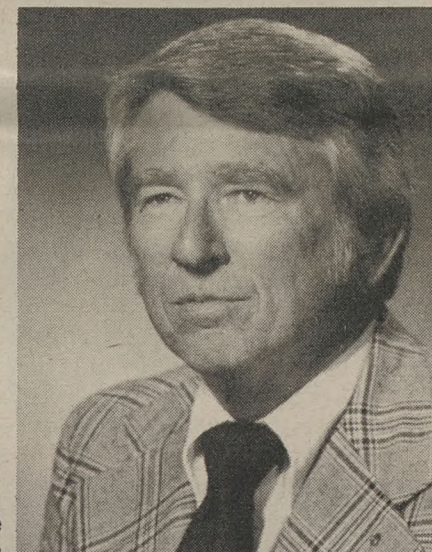
Reverend Campbell was honored with a reception the following Sunday at the First Congregational Church in Winter Park where she and her sister, Alice, still reside.

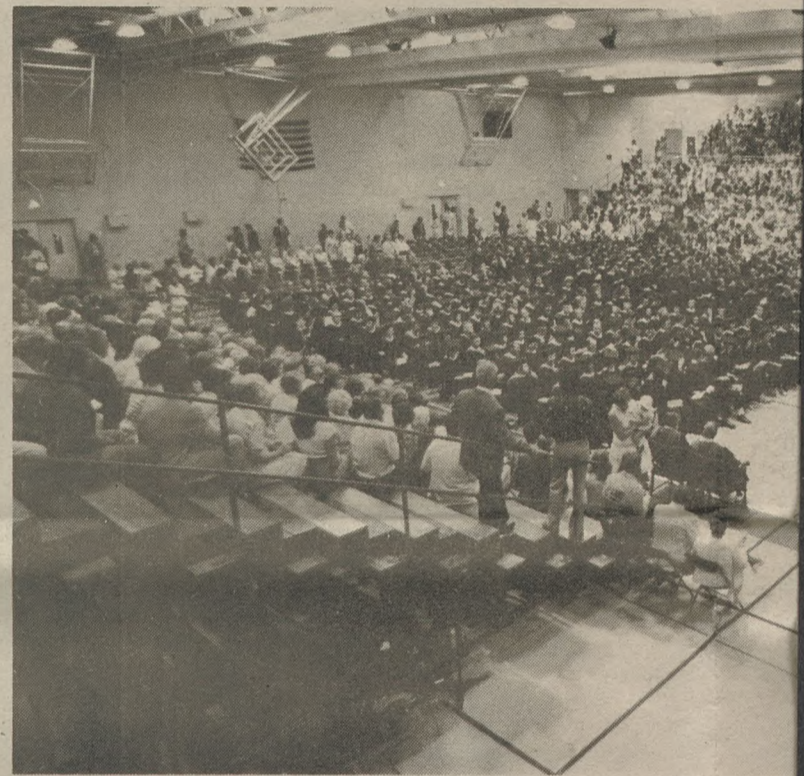

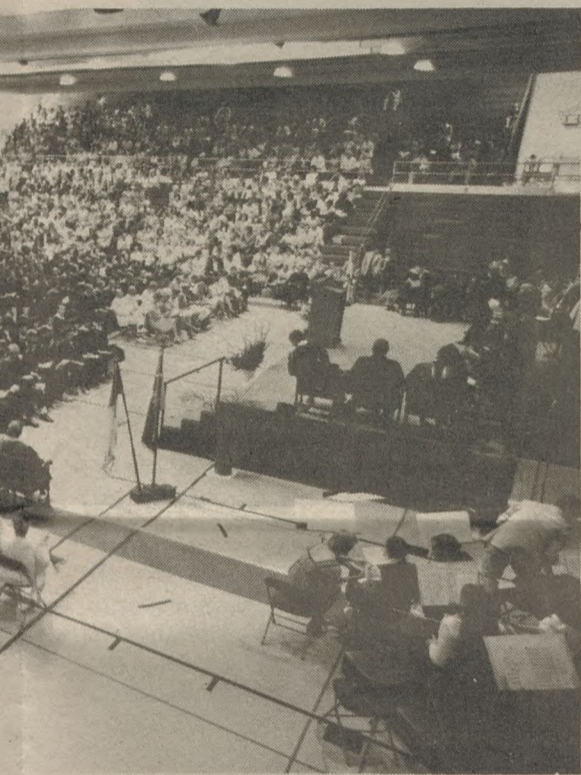

Arthur Vining Davis Fellowship Award - 1977

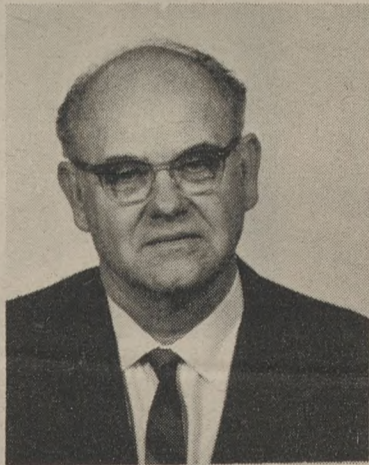
