In a nationally broadcast State of the Union Address, President Carter called for the resumption of registration for the mili+ tary draft. Soon every male between the ages of 18 to 26 will be required to register.
" I can't see any reason for registration if you don't have a draft soon afterwords," states National Guard Recruiter, Roqer McCullough.
"You'll be in biq trouble if you don't reqister. The government will crack down hard on the registration evaders," McCullough added.

From Cindy Pio

To all personnel concerned:
During the one-and-a-half years I have been here as a full-time instructor, I have had my share of academic difficulties with students. Unfortunately, these difficulties also include those with athletes. In past quarters, at least one (and usually more) student has come to me to plead with me to change his/her grade, as the earned (!) grade has made him/ her ineligible for his/her particular varsity sport. A few times last year, even some athletic staff and office personnel came to me to enquire about a possible grade change. I'm pleased to see that this practice has stopped.

This quarter, I have a particularly distressing problem. It has come to my attention that several students in my Psych. 101 classes have taken it upon themselves to set up a smallscale cheating operation. number of the students have been named by several of the other students in the classes, independently of each other. A large percentage of those involved in the cheating are athletes; the rest are nonathletes.

While I am unable to directly do anything punitive to those involved, as I have not caught them actively cheating, I have been forced to set up much stricter procedures to help minimize further cheating. Unfortunately, these controls have made it much more difficult for many of my students to take and complete exams. But everyone is forced to pay for the mistakes of a few.

Because of this, and previous problems, I feel compelled to request a small favor. Please advise your athletes to use wise judgment before signing up for one of my classes. I expect all of my students to study seriously, regardless of their athletic status. If an athlete, or any other student for that matter, expects a free ride in my classes, please steer him or her away from psychology. If an athlete is seriously interested in taking a course from me, please ask him/her to take the course during a quarter other than the one right before their season opens. This seems to be an especially hard time for them in my courses.

If you have any questions about this letter, please feel free to see me. Thank you for your time and attention.

CHUCK SCHAEFFER: "Every young person, male or female, should devote two years to their country. Whether it be in the armed forces or some other type of government work."

CLAIR ABBOTT: "No opinion yet. There are a lot of pros and cons. I'd like to know what exactly the objectives are. I'll just wait and see."

In a poll taken by the newspaper staff, the following question was asked,

The poll shows that the Air Force would be the most popular choice, with 25 percent of the students. Many students feel that the Air Force is the safest and easist branch of the service. There are other reasons however,
"I'll go to the Air Force because I can't swim," remarks Edia Woodard.

For a person who is looking for an easy way out of the armed services, the reserves seem like the best alterntive to take. If you join a reserve (National Guard or Coast fuard) you cannot be drafted. You must fulfill, however, a six year obligation. If you phtan on joining the reserves you better hurry. Once the draft starts, the chance of getting into the reserves is about zero.

In a interview with a Army recruiter who wishes to remain annoymous, he had these remarks dbout the draft.
"Every American should serve two years for his country in the service. There is a place for women in the army. But they should not be forced to be in combat. They could hold down desk jobs and other similar types of jobs. I think for a person who wishes to remain at home, the best move would be to join the National ruard. However, if war broke out tommorrow, the National Guard would have to fight. All the Army has now is a bunch of flunkies and droupouts."

"Sneaking from my own exper ience, I feel that a photoaranher receives a feeling of accomplishment and self satisfaction," remarks Mr. Person. INTEREST HIGH
"There is a great deal of interest here. I have never had to cancel any classes because of low enrollment the past seven years except for one or two summer classes." TWO CLASSES
In Princinles of Photoqraphy the students start out as if they know very little on how to use an adjustable camera. From there they are taught how to use the darkroom and then photographic composition.

Trick nhotonraphy can be learned in Mr. Person's other class, Photography Techniques. Photography Techniaues will be offered in the Spring quarter. This is the only time that it will be offered this year

COST
A student must pay 45 dollars for three quarter hours and a five dollar lab fee. The students must also buy their own film and paper. The school supplies the cameras and and darkroom. This is reaarded to be a very qood deal as compared to other colleqes. Many colleqes require that you own your own camera, and buy all your film and paper nlus chem-
icals for the darkroom. PROBLEMS
Darkroom space is the biggest problem that faces Mr. Person and his students.
"Our dariroom is too small to faciliate all of our needs. 1 would like to have a large enough darkroom so that durinn class time every student could work in there and I could work with each student.

EXPENSIVE HOBBY
Many people feel that photography is too expensive of a hobby. Mr. Person feels that it could or could not be.
"Inflation, like everything else is hitting the photo market, especially in the paper and film made from silver. But if you look for the bargins you can keep it within your budget. However, the satisfaction that you derive from it is well worth it. CREATING COMPETION
Over the past seven years many of Mr. Person's students have gone on and become professional photographers.
"My wife says I better stop teaching," Person adds with a grin. "I have former students working here at Boone for several photography studios. I also have former students working in Ames and Neveda."

Ten of his students have gone on to the Hawkeye Institute in Waterloo to become professional photographers.

# Bears Find January A Cold Month 

One must wonder if Coach Hughes wishes January was finished. The Bears are 1-8 in this basketball month (at press time with Ellsworth closing out the month) while the Bears are 5-12 overa11, and $0-4$ in the Iowa JC conference. Boone averages 76.2 a game, and that ironically should win a few more games than five.
The Bears had a streak of four losses earlier but topped that with currently six straight winless tries. Most games however seem to be relatively close. A 81-75 loss to Ft. Dodge, a 85-83 heartbreaker to Creston, a 90-86 squeaker to Clarinda, and a 84-80 demoralizer to Council Bluffs. The only game Boone should have not gone to was, against Iowa State Junior Varsity at Ames. It ended 98-60. Contrary to popular belief, the Cyclones did not win it on a last second shot. Marvin "Blood" White accumulated 22 points in a losing effort.
Southwestern Community College of Creston beat Boone in Creston, as the Spartans put the ball in the basket during the waning moments of the contest in a 85-83 victory for them. Marvin White tallied 33 as teammate Larry Fuller notched 22. Bobby Smith netted 14. Boone outrebounded Southwestern 34-28, but committed 26 miscues. Boone led 47-37 at halftime. Against Council Bluffs, Larry Fuller scored 31. Marvin "Blood" White who averages 24.9 a game and 10
rebounds an outing, scored 20. Bobby Smith hit for 10. Boone averages 35.7 rebounds per contest. It obviously isn't going right for the Bear's as the Spartans got three chances for the basket in the last 5 seconds. This has been a grueling road trip for the Bears, to say the least. Nevertheless, in this game against a Nevada Las Vegas (Runnin Rebe1) type offensive team, the Bear defensive was superb until the bitter end. Creston had earlier this season, blasted Boone in a Holiday Classic, some two months ago. Versus Clarinda, Marvin paced Boone with 34 as Larry Fuller grabbed 15 rebounds while hitting for 27. Clarinda held a 47-44 edge edge at intermission. Chris Johnson's 12, assists helped keep the Bears in the game. He averages 9 a game, and is the team leader with 33 steals. Clarinda had three ballplayers in double figures. Boone took a 66-64 lead into the final stanza. Quenton Freeman, a quality guard, netted 38 to lead all scorers. Here again the Bears were plagued with 23 errors.
The Bears will really have their work cut out for them if they wish to finish at least a $.500 \%$ ball club. This road trip, of six straight away games couldn't have helped Boone. Of the remaining ten contests, six are here at the DrHACC gymnasium.

# Lady Bears Lose Heartbreakers 

Entering the Clarinda bout at home, the Lady Bears came off a thrilling and heartbreaking loss to Creston 71-69 in overtime.
