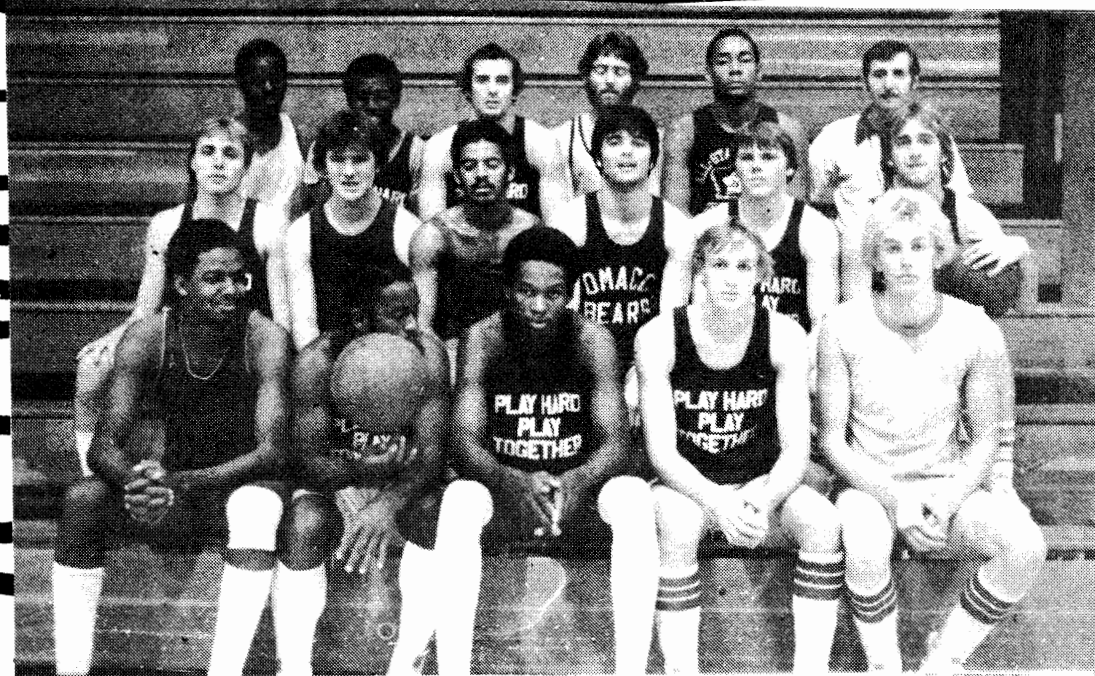

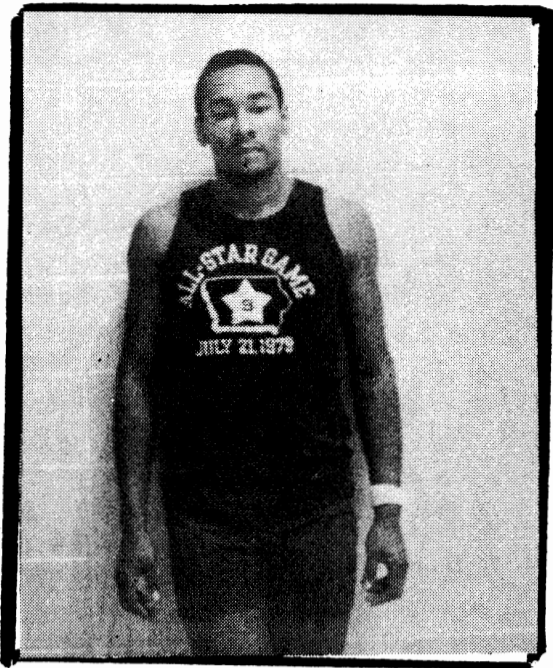

RICKY GALBREATH

One of the top finds for Coach Hughes, Galbreath was the leading rebounder in the Des Moines Metro Conference despite being only 6-4...averaged 14 rebounds per game and led Des Moines North in scoring with 17.9 per game average...scoring average was 6th best in Metro Conference...earned three varsity letters in basketball at East... had 35 blocked shots for season, most in Metro Conference...stands 6-4 and will play inside...potential to be best 6'4" center around.

MIKE COGDALL

Sophomore transfer student from Montana State, Mike is originally from Algona-Garrigan High School where he led his team to the Class 2A sub-state in 1978...was the leading scorer on his Garrigan team with a 19.7 average...had 76% shooting average at Garrigan and was team's leading rebounder with 184 for the season...excellent leaping ability and moves well under the basket along with good driving ability... very good chance of starting for Bears in 1979-80...should compliment team very well with overall ability.

KENDAL MARTIN

One of four holdovers from 1978-79 season Martin saw limited action a year ago after sustaining a knee injury in pre-season drills...a 6-3 sophomore, Martin is a graduate of Cedar Valley High School where he averaged 16 points and 12 rebounds per game...good rebounder with excellent inside moves...needs some work on ball handling and defense...named to second team all-conference in high school... also participated in state track meet in mile relay...was time in 52 seconds in 440-yard dash.

MIKE MUSSER

Part-time starter on Boone High team that compiled 6-13 mark in 1978-79... played in 13 games, missing portion of season due to apendectomy... averaged 7.6 points per game...stands 6-0 with excellent passing ability and good outside shooter.

RANDY BARKEMA

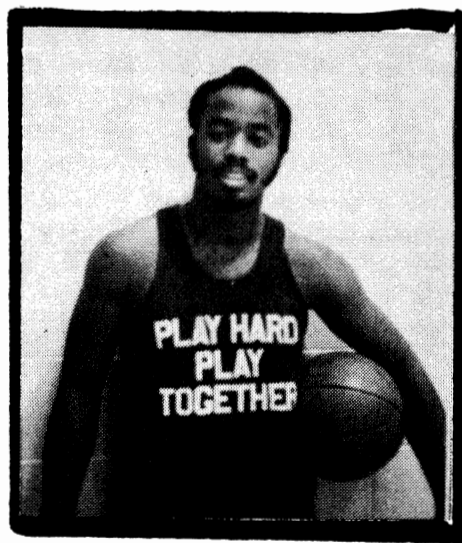
Graduate of South Hamilton High School in Jewell, Iowa, Barkema should give the Bear inside game help with his 6-6½ height...will surprise many people with is aggressiveness... averaged 11 points and 13 rebounds

LARRY FULLER

A 6-4½ sophomore transfer from Butler University, Fuller should more than fill the vacated shoes of Al Dantzler.. carried a 20-point, 8-rebound average at Turner High School in Atlanta, Ga... excellent jumping ability and 70% field goal shooter while in high school... named to several all-state and all tournament teams at Turner...excellent defensive player.

CHRIS JOHNSON

Joins Marvin White as other returning starter from 1978-79 team...Top playmaker on squad that went 14-13... led team in assists with 234 on the season breaking old record of 230 set by Robert Butler during 1977-78 season...averaged 8.7 assists per game, tops in Boone Campus record books... tied Butler's one-game record with 16 assists against Kirkwood on 12/9/78...Has excellent chance of breaking Butler's two-year record of 408 assists ...carried a 9.2 per game scoring average for 1978-79 season...was named to Western Conference honorable mention...excellent ball-handler... graduate of Calloway High School in Jackson, Mississippi...high school teammate of Marvin White.

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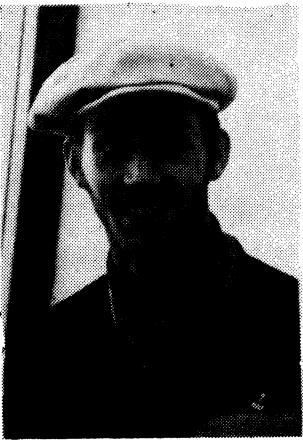


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Violence: For The Fun Of It?

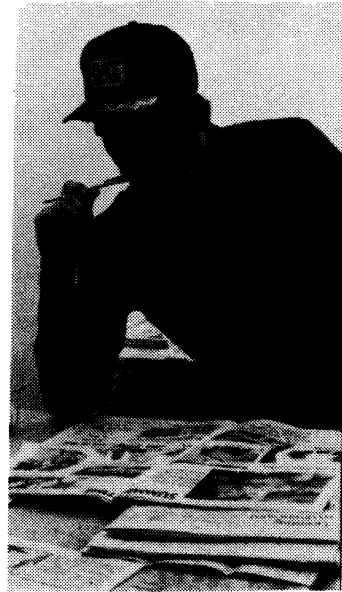

- 1983, October 4-The Cubs finally win the pennant. In the same game Scot Thompson is struck by a block of ice by a disgruntled Dodger backer.
- 1984, February 18-The Montreal Canadians win yet another Stanley Cup. Eight players thrown literally out of the rink.

Hopefully this will never come to pass. As did Dick Butkus and Woody Hayes retired from their vicious tactics, so must sports violence. 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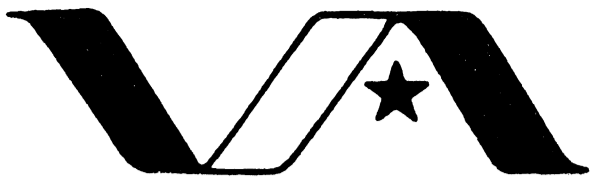

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QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q -- I have moved to a new address. I have informed the post office of the change and have assurance my mail will be forwarded. Is there any additional action I must take to make sure I receive my Veterans Administration checks at my new address?

A -- You must also notify your VA regional office of your change of address as soon as possible.

Q -- I have a Veterans Administration disability rating of 30 per cent and receive \$121 a month. A friend has a 60 per cent rating and receives \$292. Why don't I receive half as much as he does?

A -- The amount to be paid a veteran for a particular disability rating is set by law. These rates do not relate in an exact pro rata way to the 100 per cent disability rate. The more disabled a veteran is, the heavier the impact on his employability; therefore, the law provides proportionately more compensation to those with the most severe impairments.

Q -- I bought a home with a GI loan after World War II and paid the loan off several years ago. I am now considering another loan and wonder if the old regulations limiting you to the purchase of conventional houses still apply.

A -- Today's GI home loan program is much more flexible. You may now buy mobile homes and condominiums with loans guaranteed by the Veterans Administration.

Q -- An acquaintance was notified by the Veterans Administration that he is eligible for service-disabled insurance. Can I get it too?

A -- Veterans separated from the service on or after April 25, 1951, who have been granted any service-connected disability, are eligible if they are otherwise in good health. Disabled veterans must file for this insurance within one year from the date the VA notifies them of their service-connected disability.

Q -- My father was an honorably-discharged war-time veteran. When he died a year ago, we were not aware of his eligibility for Veterans Administration burial benefits. Can we still apply for those benefits?

A -- A claim for burial benefits must be filed within two years following a veteran's permanent burial or cremation. Contact your nearest VA regional office for assistance.

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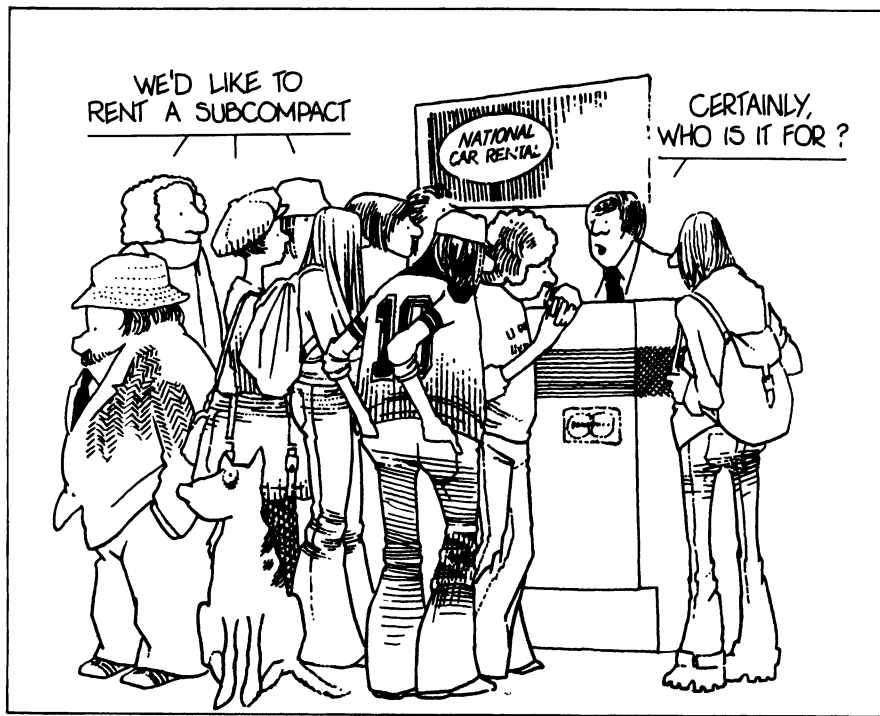
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"LO AND BEHOLD"

The play was full of excitement, hard hitting one liners and comical situations.



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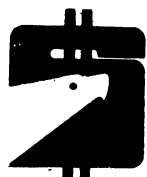


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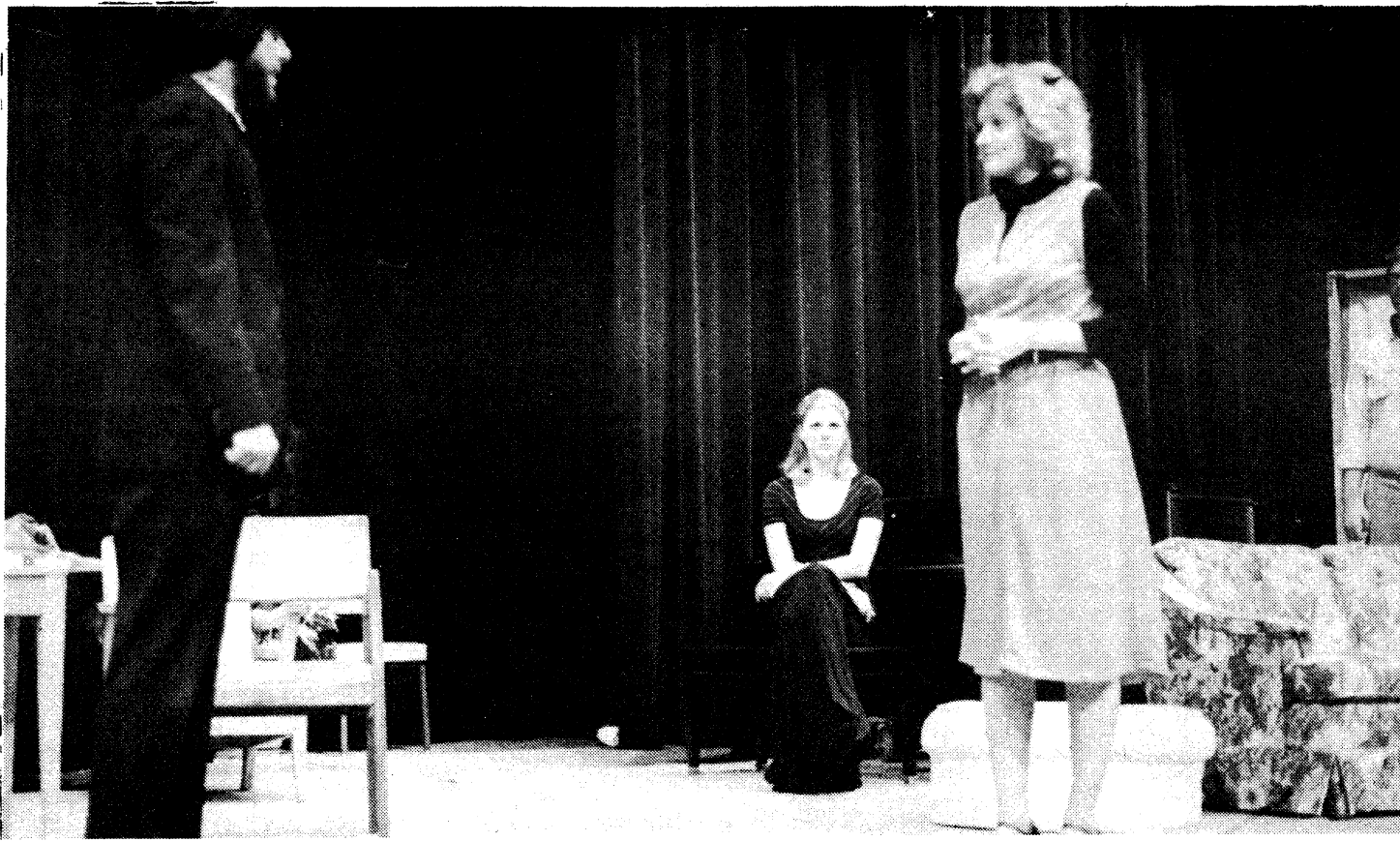
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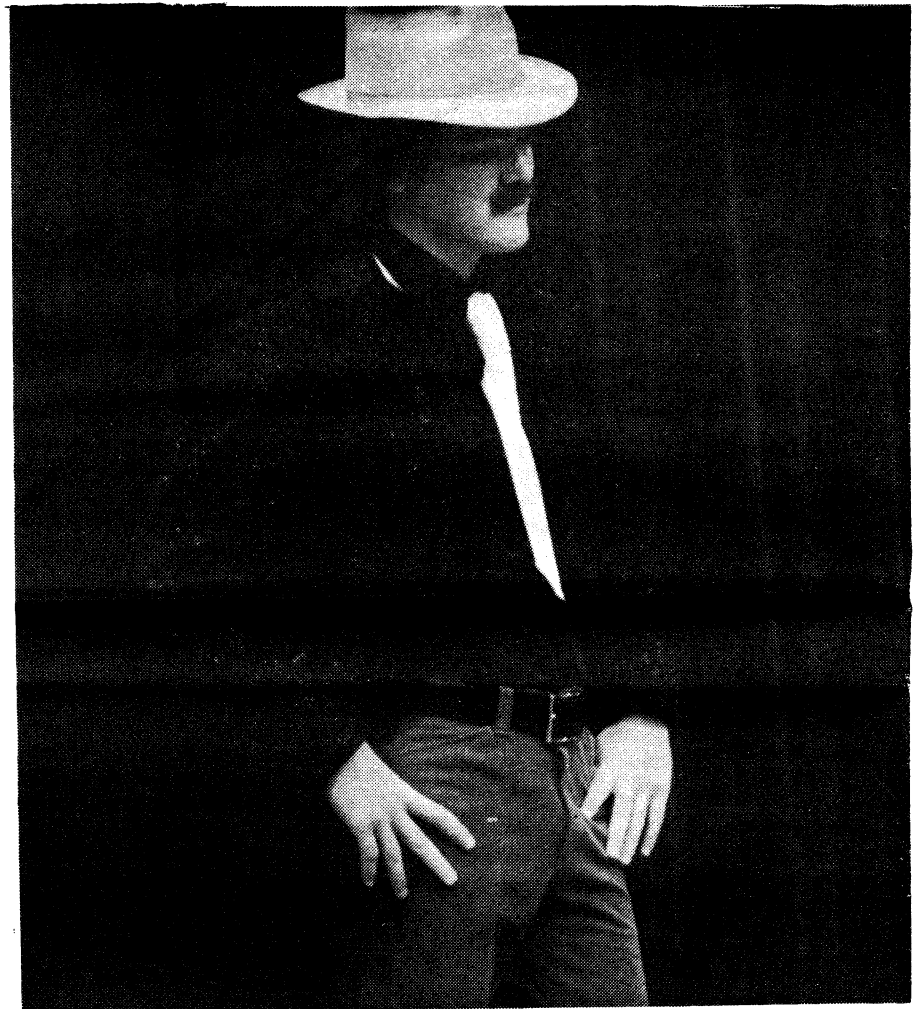
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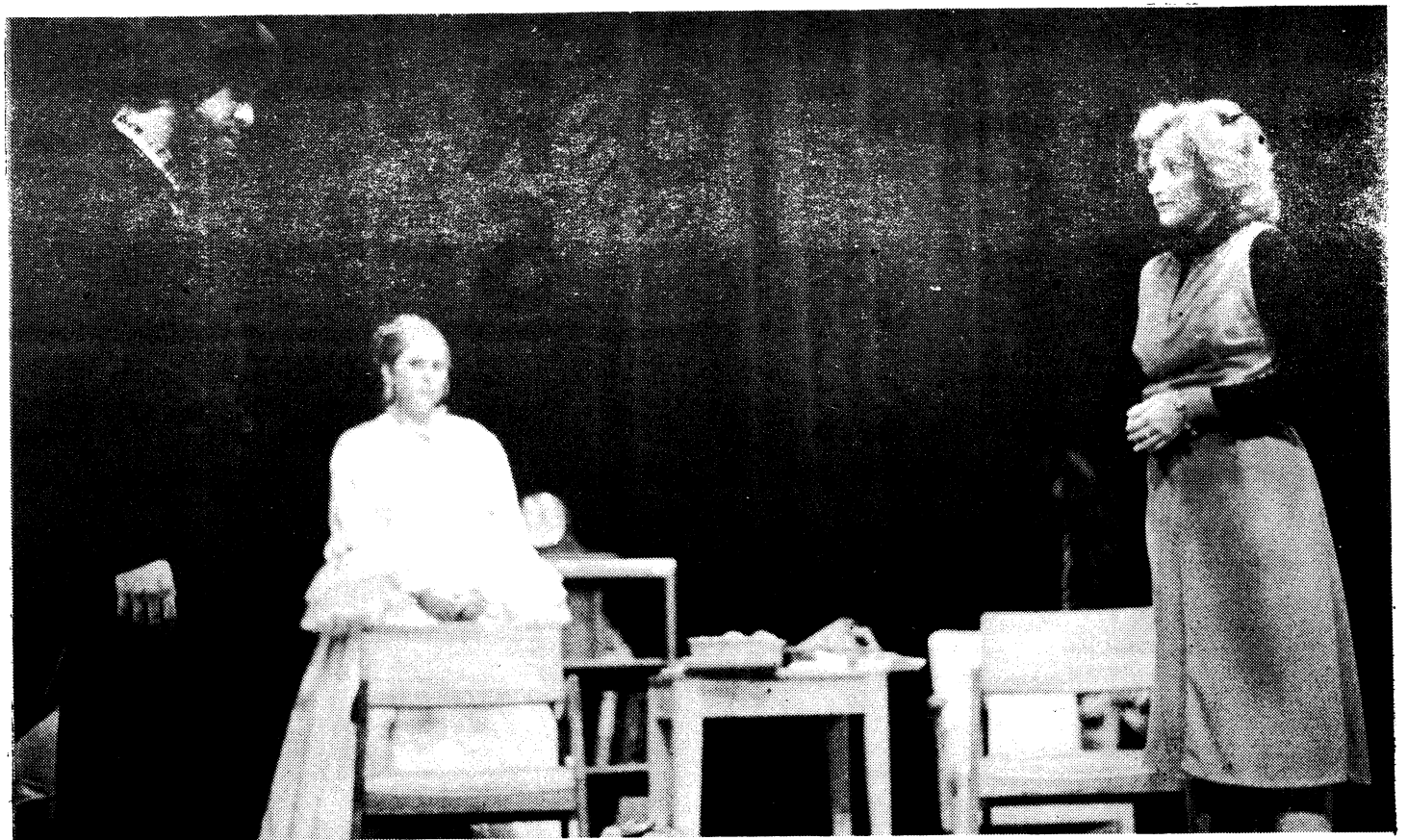
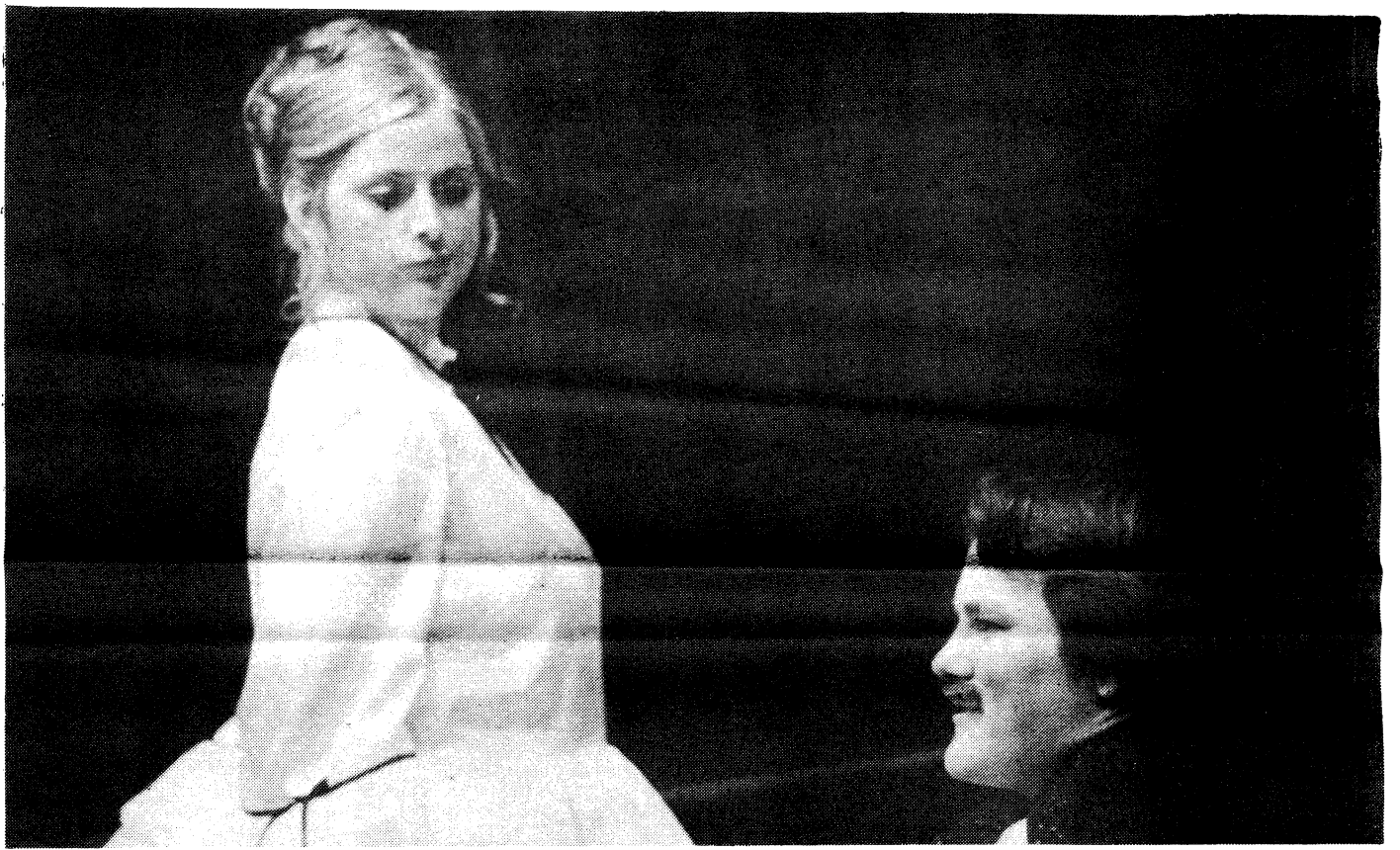
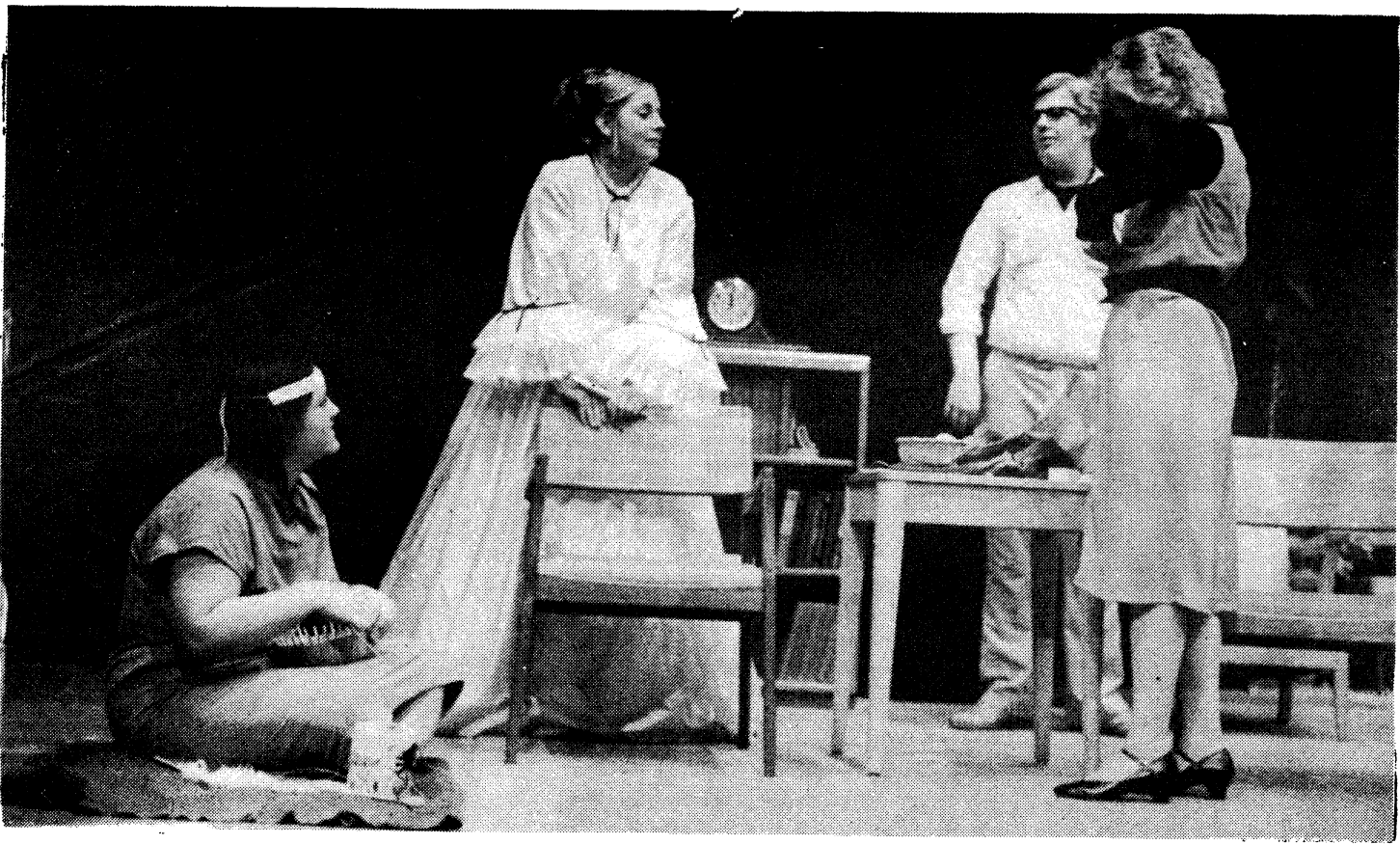

SPEAKING OUT ...

Letter To The Editor

As psychology instructor here at DMACC, I am used to being asked a variety of questions concerning the content of my courses. However, during this fall quarter, I have become extremely agitated at the numerous rumors and accusations levelled at a particular course by many indignant staff members and some students.

The course in question is Psychology 111, Human Sexuality. This course is designed to educate adults about the sexual functioning of their own bodies, various alternate sexual lifestyles, sexual dysfunctions, and personal and social attitudes about sexuality. A complete course description is, and always has been, available to anyone requesting it.

Despite the availability of such a course description, a number of DMACC students and staff members have chosen to amuse themselves by spreading and blindly accepting a variety of falsehoods and half-truths about the course. Many of these rumors are distortions of facts about the course ("She actually required her students to attend a pornographic movie!"); the remainder are pure, unadulterated nonsense ("They had to learn all the different sexual positions," "She made them practice all that stuff as homework.").

In addition, and I view this as an even more grievous offense, my students have repeatedly been cornered, questioned and even harassed by DMACC staff members because of their enrollment in the class, or because of the books assigned as texts. The rumors are perhaps tolerable, because they are merely products of ignorant minds; this harassment, on the other hand, is totally unjustifiable and unethical.

One common factor underscores all of the intolerance, gossip and unabashed disgust displayed by such students and staff. They have chosen to remain appallingly ignorant of the extent of sexuality within their own species. They deny the educational (indeed, humanitarian!) value of discussing sexual lifestyles and attitudes different from their own. They prefer to maintain narrow, puritanical views which permit sex to be an appropriate topic only for bathroom humor (if even that) and an occasional bedroom.

For those of whom I speak and additional unaddressed persons of similar persuasion, may I offer the following sound advice:

First, please keep in mind that I and my students are adults, physically, emotionally and legally. No other person has the right to pass judgment on the morals or motives of those of us who wish to expand our understanding of a controversial topic.

Second, the terms "sex" and "sexuality" are not synonymous. Sexuality is more than mere copulation; it is the sum total of physical, psychological and social influences upon our sexual behaviors and attitudes. As such, the course does not seek to instruct "how to do it," but rather proposes to promote understanding of the various sexual viewpoints, lifestyles and behaviors inherent in human nature.

Finally, it is well-documented by research that it is not sex education which is to blame for teenage pregnancies, promiscuity, infidelity, rape and divorce, contrary to popular belief. If anything it is lack of information about sexuality which causes such problems. It is usually the ignorant girl who gets pregnant; it is the uninformed adolescent or adult that is looking for the ultimate sexual partner, which probably does not exist; it is the closed-minded, puritanical person whose spouse often "fools around" because they are unable to have or discuss sex; it is the normally powerless male who feels he must rape a woman or girl because society has taught him that it will prove his manhood and power; it is the naive female who fails to report a rape because she thinks she is dirty and will be humiliated by an intolerant society.

Sexuality is not instinctual, but learned. What other important learned endeavor would we expect people to attempt and continue for most of their adult lives, when they are prepared with (at best) misinformation or (at worst) no information at all?

Let me finish by assuring all of you that I am not totally embittered by the reception my course has had this quarter. I am mostly surprised and saddened by the extreme naivete evident among adults in this area, at least as far as sexuality is concerned. It is for this very reason that this course is necessary. It has been the ideal opportunity to teach some new things to the 17 who were enrolled, and, happily, to learn several new things myself. This very simple consequence has made Psych. 111 completely worthwhile.

If any of you care to know more about the course or anything that was covered in it, please stop by to discuss it with me. If any of you think you know it all already, stop by anyway; I think you'll be surprised at all the information that has accumulated in the area of sexuality since the Dark Ages.

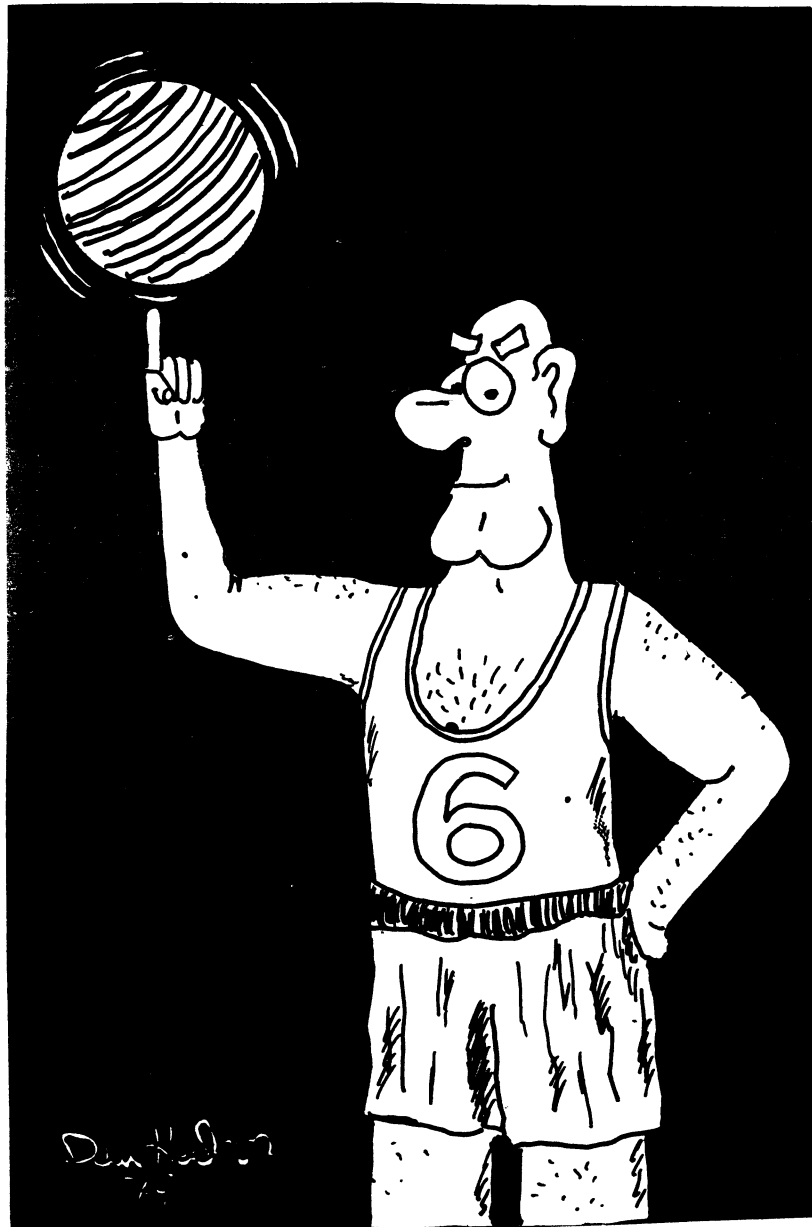
