## Graduation Day—May 23

**A Large Percentage of Graduates**

**Expected Not To Attend Ceremony**

The 52nd graduation ceremony for Boone Junior College graduates will be held in the campus auditorium at 10:00 a.m. on May 23, 1980.

123 students are expected to graduate. Whether the 123 graduates will attend the ceremony is another question. It has been estimated that anywhere from 25% to 50% of the graduates will not attend the ceremony.

There are many reasons why a large number of students will not show up to accept their diploma. Many out-of-state students head for home as soon as they finish their final exams, and foreign students may go back to their native country.

Apathy, however, may be the main reason for not attending. Some students just don't care or want to take the time to receive their diploma.

### STAGE SET

The invocation is to be given by the Reverend David Crow. Mr. Paul Lowery, President of DMACC will introduce the speaker, Dr. Louis E. Alley, Professor in the Department of Physical Education at the University of Iowa.

Dean Hamilton will present the graduates and Mr. Ray Clark, member of the Board of



Directors of DMACC will present the diplomas.

### SCHOLARSHIPS

Grace Slosson Scholarship Award--It is awarded to the Liberal Arts student who, having had his first two years of academic work at the DMACC, Boone Campus, ranks first scholastically in his graduating class.

Jan Pritchard Memorial Award--This award commemorates the student leadership provided by Jan Pritchard, a 1966 graduate of Boone Junior College. The award is granted to the graduating salutatorian.

E. Sherrill Brown Award--The award is granted in recognition of superior work to the student who ranks third highest in his graduating class at DMACC, Boone Campus.

J.R. Thorngren Social Science Award--The recipient is selected on the basis of academic achievement in the social sciences. The award goes to a graduating student planning to continue in social sciences.

My ideas for stories were somewhat below many person's standards. But, at least I supported the staff and school in being present in mind and body when work had to be done.

The staff went through many hard times digging for stories. Once one of us uncovered one, there was no further information available. Or, persons did not wish to comment. And, if written information was requested, it was often lost or forgotten. Many people failed to realize that the paper must meet a deadline.

Sure, our paper is understaffed. But, it's better to have a hard-working understaffed paper that puts out a good to average paper than one overstaffed that sends out poor, sloppy work. The paper is all that the reader sees. Only the staff knows the dedication and care found inside the workings of a small staff.

Dedication fits in when the editor spends an afternoon gluing the paper down, rushes to the bus stop to send it off, and finds that the station is closed and the driver won't accept it without orders. He is then forced to rise early the next morning, tear to the bus station, fill out the necessary papers, and send the paper down the road to the printer. Or, when stories have to be typed three times because the writer forgot how to spell someone's name.

Then, there's the lack of equipment. The newspaper (much to our amazement!) is supposed to have two IBM typewriters. We want our paper to all be in the same type, but it is very difficult when there's only one typewriter in the room and someone has borrowed the typewriter and forgot to return it. We also use the darkroom that is for photography classes that limits when our photographer can print pictures.

It was a good year working on the staff. Sometimes my shoulder got a wee bit tired or my eyes a bit sore from typing, but it was worth every twinge when the paper came back. The staff became more than friends, they were partners in an enterprise representing the school.

We have gone through a lot together during this year in this column.

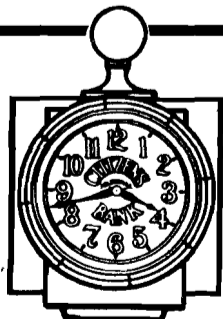
I stood up and defended the people who hated cockroaches, discovered the secret of life (almost), interviewed the President of the United States, and lastly was forced to eat my cat.

## Cuban Alert!

Is Castro After the United States? If so, how can we stop him? What has the U.S. done to make him feel so negatively about the U.S.?

In Castro's speech in September, 1979, he criticized Yankee imperialists and their allies. At one point he openly accused the United States of attempting to assassinate the leaders of Cuba. "It is all too well known--and has been admitted and officially published in the United States--that authorities of that country spent years organizing and methodically plotting to assassinate the leaders of the Cuban revolution, using the most sophisticated means of conspiracy and crime. Nevertheless the U.S. government has not yet deigned to give any kind of apology for those vituperative and uncivilized actions."

In his speech, he also declared the restrictions that the U.S. had placed on Cuba. He commented, "We are opposed to any type of colonial enclave in our hemisphere. Our country is suffering from a harsh and criminal economic blockade imposed by the U.S., which includes even medical supplies. And a piece of our national territory is still occupied by force (a reference to the U.S. naval base at Guantanamo Bay in Cuba)."

Almost nine months later, the U.S. southern coast is swamped with Cuban refugees. At the present, Castro is attempting to spread Cuban-style rule throughout Latin America. Thousands of unhappy Cubans were then caused to flee their country. Castro is using careful planning to make it look like the U.S. is causing the flight from Cuba. He is encouraging Cubans to leave the country and force the spotlight of fury onto the U.S. (If the U.S. took in Indo-Vietnamese refugees, why not Cubans?)

Castro is actually serving a double purpose in his strategic planning. The refugees coming to the U.S. must be accepted in the U.S. Otherwise, Jimmy Carter would look bad in the coming election year for turning away homeless, and countryless, humanbeings. Back in Cuba, Castro is clearing out the country by getting rid of misfits or violent opposers to his ideals.

Castro has been able to outscore the U.S. and her allies since 1959. Many people feel that he will continue to pose his ideals on underdeveloped countries and the U.S. Many times his successes were at the expense of Americans.

His accomplishments recently include being elected chairman of the 95-nation nonaligned movement. In the past, he broke through the international isolation imposed by the U.S. on the island. He also renewed diplomatic and trade relations with most countries.

Who actually benefits from Castro's escapades? Two of the countries are Moscow and Havana. Cuba offers military bases close to the U.S. for the Soviet Union. In return, Russia supplies Cuba with over 3 billion dollars a year in economic funds, and they provide Castro with the largest and best equipped army in Latin America.

Castro won't lose his fight if America keeps on playing ignorant of his schemes. Washington can not interfere with the political and internal happenings of a country. Do we sit and accept the Cubans coming in?

## Man With One Leg Plans To Run Across Canada

A man who lost his left leg to cancer three years ago says he hopes to run about 50 kilometres a day on his way across Canada.

Terry Fox, 21 of Port Coquitlam, B.C., says he expects to reach Vancouver in late September or early October.

"The most difficult part of the trip will be from here to Halifax because I'll have problems repairing or replacing my artificial leg." He said an artificial leg isn't made for running and he expects one to last about seven days.

The War Amputees Association of Canada has said it would repair his artificial leg and provide him with new ones throughout the marathon.

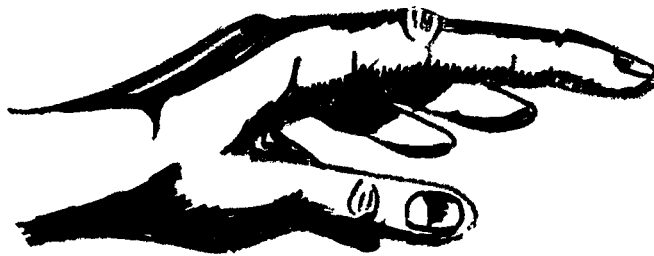

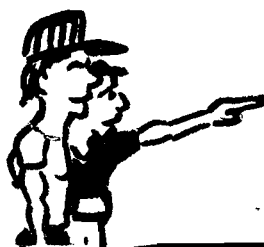

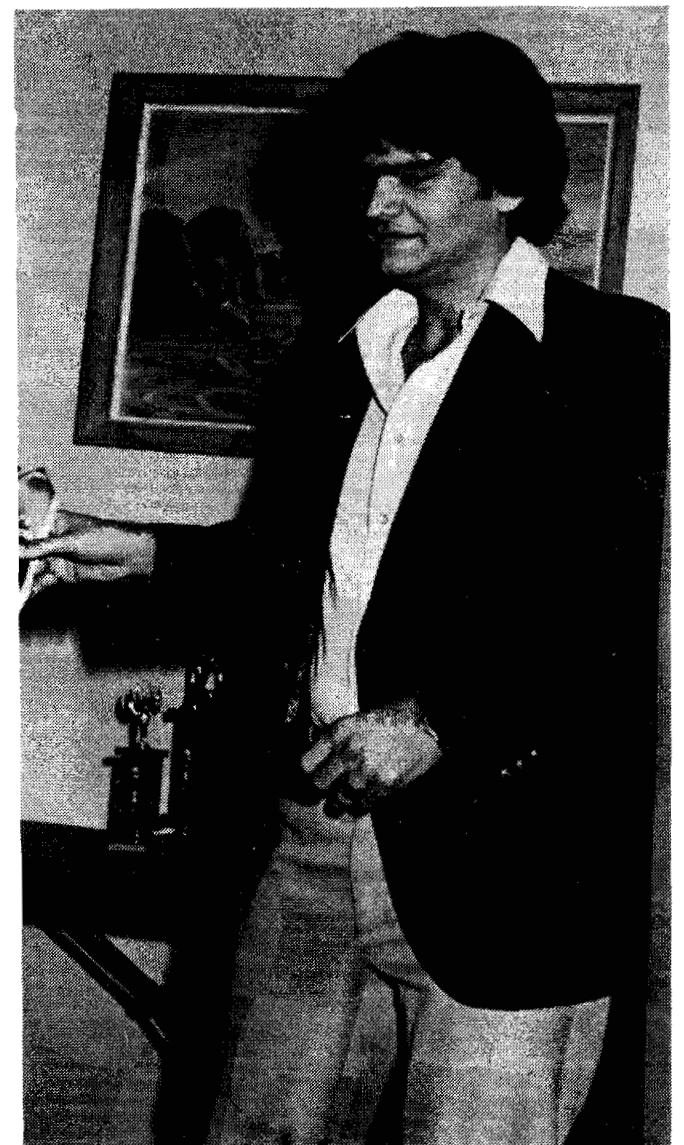

## Move to Freedom

Daniel Gheresus escaped from Ethiopia and sought refuge in the United States. He comes from the little country of Eritrea, a country on Ethiopia's northern border, which is going through a revolution, trying to separate from Ethiopia.

Q: What was your motive for coming to the United States?

A: I came to pursue my education and because of the political unrest at home.

Q: I recently heard that the war between your country and Ethiopia is a civil war. Is that true?

A: No, it isn't. The Ethiopian government wants to avoid any involvement of foreign forces, so they call it a civil war, but it is a war of revolution by Eritrea to be separated from Ethiopia.

Q: Has Eritrea been recognized by western governments?

A: No. The western powers want to cover their previous mistake of helping Ethiopia annex Eritrea.

Q: How do the people of Eritrea react to the guerilla organizations, such as the PLF?

A: At first they didn't support them, but now they are willing to support them because they believe the guerillas are serving their country.

Q: How could Eritrea survive economically if they separated from Ethiopia?

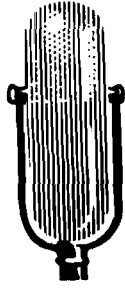
A: Well, we have adequate minerals and we can grow our own food supply. We also have two international ports on the Red Sea, which makes Eritrea accessible to and by foreign countries.

Q: Would Eritrea's independence affect Ethiopia economically?

A: Yes, mainly because of the Red Sea advantage of Eritrea. Ethiopia would be left with no seaports without those of Eritrea.

Q: Do the other African countries support the Eritrean struggle for freedom?

A: No, because most African countries have similar problems to those in Eritrea, so most African leaders don't believe our struggle is right. The AOU (African Organization for Unity) made an agreement that no country will separate from another country. It was aimed specifically at Eritrea, but could apply to many other African countries.



Q: Are the guerillas well-organized and trained to fight Ethiopia?

A: Yes, they are well-equipped and strong enough to prevent the enemy's control of Eritrea.

Q: What kind of political administration would be successful for the future of Eritrea?

A: That would depend on what the people there want.

Q: What kind of administration would you personally expect Eritrea to have?

A: I think they would probably be a Democratic Republic.

Q: Do you believe Eritrea will succeed in its struggle against Ethiopia?

A: Yes, I have strong feelings in that belief, because of the people's determination, firmness to the struggle.

### Jose Rivera Interviews Mrs. Louise Payton, Who Works In The Library.

Q: When is the library open?

A: It's open during the day from 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. every week night. On Sunday it's open from 6 to 10 p.m.

Q: Why isn't the library open on Saturday or Sunday mornings?

A: Because there are very few students who come in at those times.

Q: How many people can study in the library at one time?

A: About 75 or 80 spaces are available around the tables and in the carrells.

Q: How many people use the library every week?

A: About 250 use the library during the week, but final week about 300 come in.

Q: When will we have a new librarian?

A: We don't know yet.

Q: Do you have problems with students using the library for a meeting place instead of a studying place?

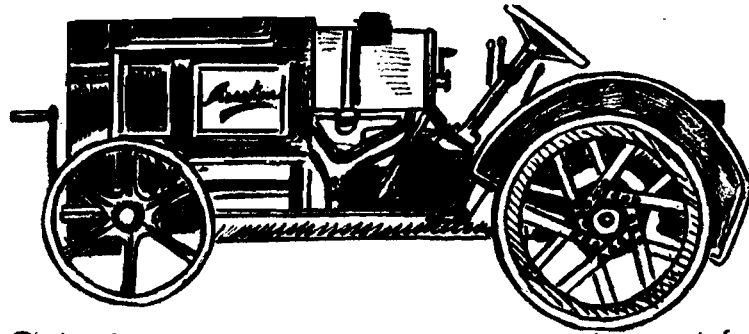
A: Not really. Sometimes during final week it gets crowded and maybe a little noisy, but not a great deal.

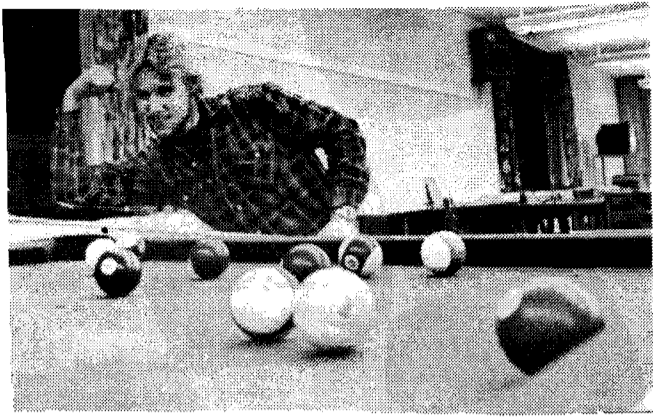


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## Pool Tourney Still Going Strong

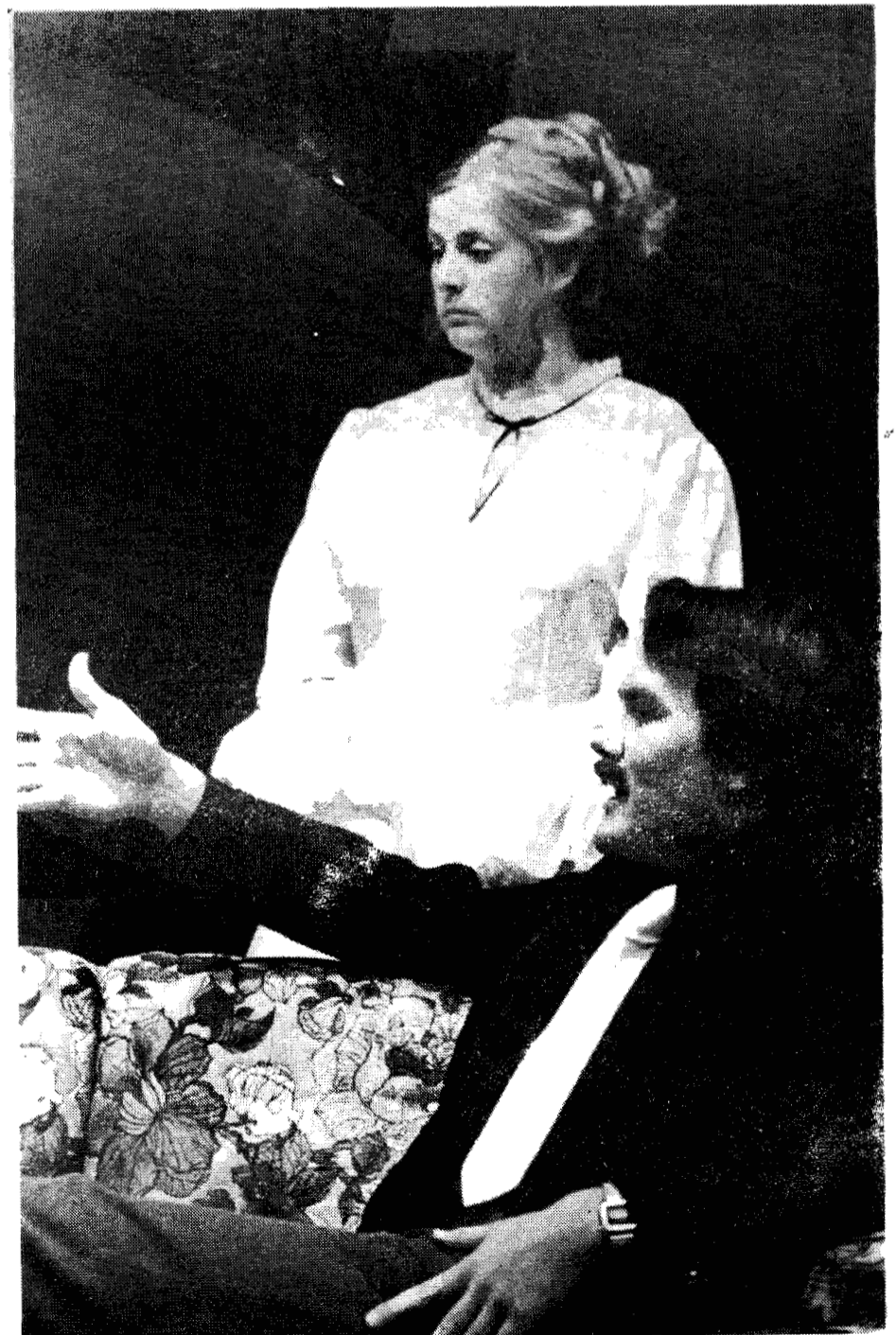
Daisy was caught up in her own web as she has fallen in love with Dr. Dorsey but she could not get rid of Jack McDougal who would not leave until he got some money.

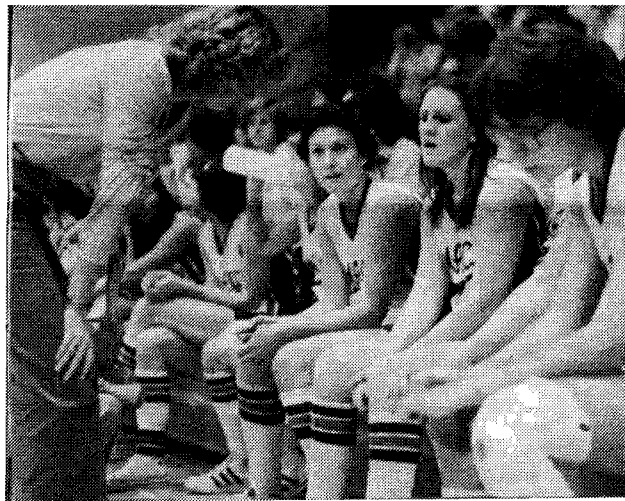

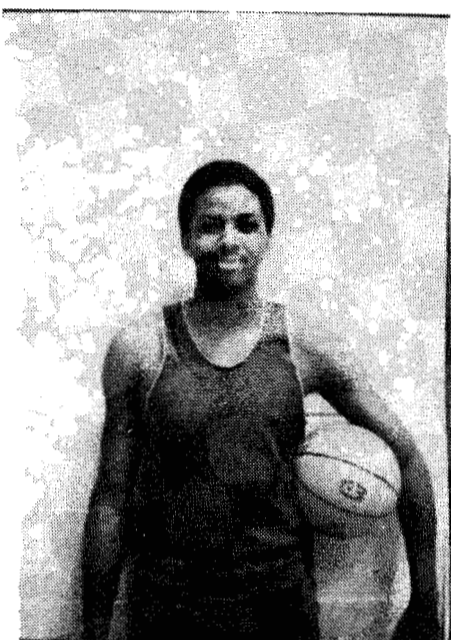

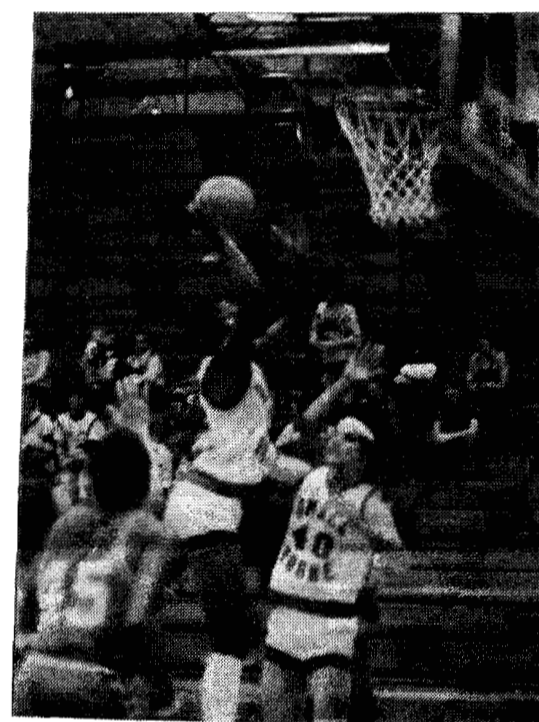

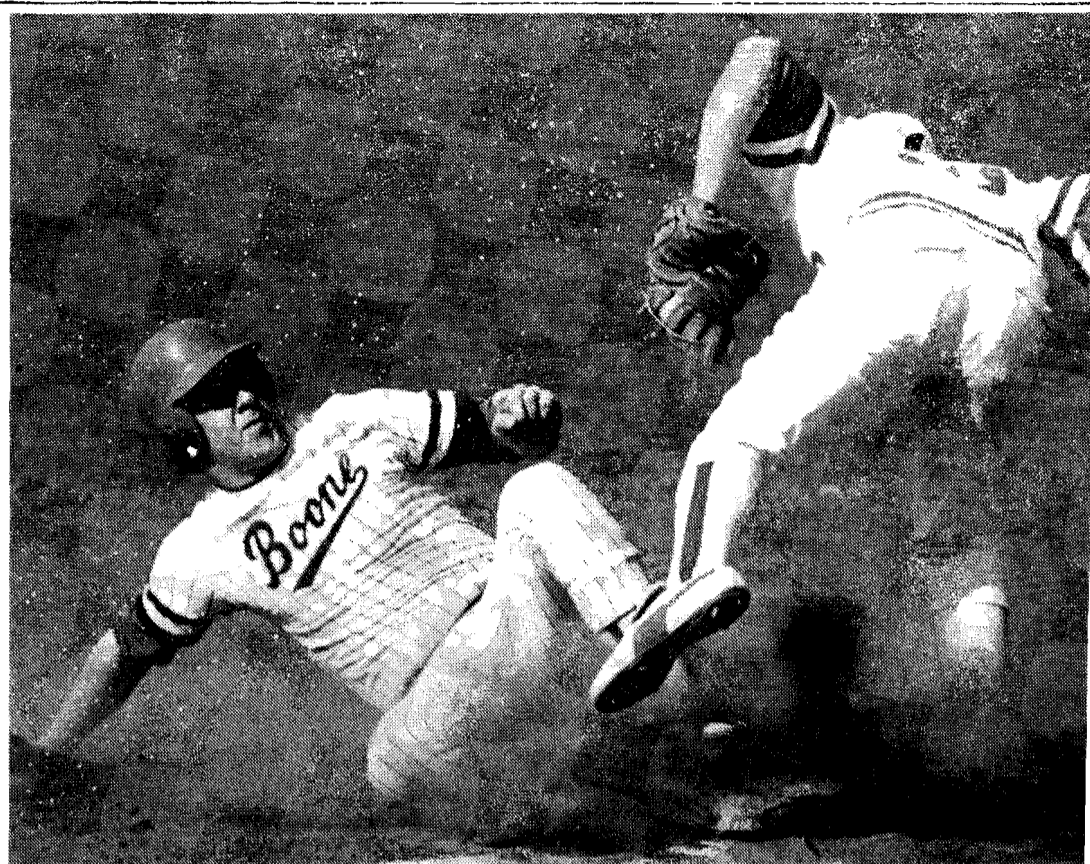
