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
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


DMACC presents the play *Love*, *Sex, and the IRS* on November 17, 18, and 19 at 7:30 p.m. at the DMACC auditorium.

The truth in the Southwest **Hints for Resumes**

Hidden somewhere among the hype, the cover-up and the imaginations of the citizens of this planet are the facts concerning UFO's. Are we being visited by other intelligence?

Is the government telling all it really knows? Should it? If there really is some form of life out in those twinkling lights at night, are we ready to know about them?

Although years have passed since the planet's first encounter with UFOs in the War of the Worlds, and we laugh at those who were caught in the joke of early radio history. Would we be any more prepared to meet them now?

Many groups of people watch the night skies in an attempt to capture a craft, or better yet, one of those piloting the UFO on video. However, in this age of palm corders, no group reported has been successful. Or have they?

UFO encounter groups are getting more sophisticated with their equipment, and in recent years have filmed some incredibly mysterious lights in the sky. These seemingly organized lights darting off at all angles at tremendous speeds leave giant holes in the imaginations of many who see them and create leaks in the military branch of the government.

SO WHERE IS THE WRECKAGE?

Of all the alleged evidence collected in all the years of wondering, no evidence has been investigated as long and hard by private citizens as the site known as ROSWELL.

Roswell, a small town in New Mexico, on Friday, July 4, 1947, became forever changed by what some call the only truly documentable case of a UFO on American soil. The official possibilities began to filter through the community. They consisted of Japanese weather balloons made of rice paper, bombs, downed rockets, and experimental aircraft. Official reports that smacked of deception filled the community. At one point a military official drug out some "evidence" that looked like tin foil and passed it off as wreckage. Great pains were taken to assure the public that nothing had happened. THE LAST QUESTION

The local mortician was called by an officer at the base and asked about preserving bodies so that evidence would not be destroyed. He was also asked about handling bodies that had been out in the weather. The last question was about how many small caskets he had that could be sealed.





She has just done <u>Fiddler on</u> the Roof at the Des Moines Ingersoll Dinner Theatre. She told how she joined the Ingersoll Dinner Theatre. "Usually the theatre has public auditions as well as closed auditions every one or two months because there is constantly a show running."

She didn't let the time pass by without doing anything. When she has extra time, she uses it to improve her acting skills. A couple of months ago, she won the talent search that was in Des Moines. When asked how would she feel if a big star such as, Paul Newman came to see her performing on stage, and she replied, "I would be nervous, but I wouldn't let it get to me. I would be happy that he came."

Everyone has a dream, so does Brooke. In her field of work, being a star on Broadway is the highest point that the performer can reach. "Bette Midler or Barbara Streisand have reached that point in their career, by being the star in many Broadway hits as people all over the world know." 


Just when it looked like the Bears were about to cave in. freshman Malcolm Holman took over, scoring 14 of his team high 21 points in the second half.



Don't get too fancy with typeface and fonts, use nondecorative typefaces and a font size of 10 to 14 points. One page is enough

Most experts agree that for entry-level positions a one page resume is all that is needed. As stated earlier a recruiter's time is valuable, and one page is all the time they have to read.

Print your resume on white or a light colored paper; white space makes it easier to read. No colored inks are necessary, black will work just fine.

The set up of the resumes is not critical as long as the information is easy to find. Only include pertinent information, including anything that adds to the individual's personal and professional growth and would make him or her an interesting candidate for the job. Experts suggest that students list abilities and accomplishments on a piece of paper and then decide if

those relate to the job they want.

Current information is very important on the resume. A pet peeve of recruiters is calling relatives, or former roommates trying to find out where a candidate senior at Boone High School, and Steven, a sophomore at Boone High School. Cover letters follow the same rules as a resumes. Almost all should only be one page and consist of three The first paragraphs. paragraph tells why you are contacting the company, what type of job you are looking for and explain your objective. The second paragraph explains skills that the candidate has developed and how it relates to the job that they are seeking. The last paragraph tells where the candidate can be reached. It is very important that the student be able to write and communicate thoughts and ideas clearly and concisely.

Your resume should reflect who you are. It identifies important information about your capabilities. Always be 100% truthful in your resume. If you are ever caught in any misrepresentation of your background, even after you are hired, you could be fired from your job. Update your resume frequently so you will always be ready if an opportunity presents itself.

The experts agree that if a candidate does not bother to find out who they are, then why should they read the resume. All it takes is a copy of the companies annual report or a phone call to that person's secretary. It shows the employer a little effort on your part to know a person's proper title and salutation. Neat and organized

Resumes should be easy to read. Paragraph format is frowned upon, instead uses bulleted information and outline your experience. Recruiters read a lot and need to look at resumes quickly. Most agree that all it takes is thirty to forty-five seconds for the first look over. If they have to seek and search for the information they need, they won't; they will just go on to the next one.

List your jobs in chronological order in an outline form with a brief description of your responsibilities and duties. Always include exact dates of the periods worked. Do not leave any gaps; gaps look like you are attempting to
