• UCF's athletic program finished the 1988-89 fiscal year in the black, the first time since 1979-80. The program erased a negative fund balance of over \$375,000 by keeping expenditures some \$377,592 below revenues.

• The future of campus radio will be reviewed April 13 by a committee charged by President Steven Altman to address a series of policy questions. The campus meeting will be open to the public, and will include input from WUCF-FM personnel, other UCF faculty, staff, students and administrators, and the community. The committee is charged with looking at the station's relationship with UCF academic programs, management and staffing structures, appropriate budgeting and ways to achieve balanced programming. Members of the committee are Ted Clevenger, FSU College of Communication dean and committee chairman; Robert DuBord, U. of Miami; Jim Fletcher, U. of Ga. Grady School of Journalism; and Gary Shivers, general manager of KMUW, Wichita State. The meeting begins at 9 a.m. in the Education Complex.

• Robert Cook-Deegan, M.D., acting executive director of the biomedical advisory committee of Congress, will present two lectures April 11 at UCF's Board of Regents Room in the Administration Building. His talk on human gene therapy begins at 9:30 a.m. He will speak again at 8 p.m. on the human genome project. The symposium is sponsored by the Lippoldt Endowment Fund, of Winter Park, and will be held over a 2-day period at UCF, Rollins College and the University Club of Winter Park. □

BOR Oks Plan to Up PECO \$\$\$

At a meeting where the chairman of the Board of Regents (BOR) warned that the State University System (SUS) could be swamped with as many as 80,000 more students by the end of the decade, the BOR endorsed a \$500 million-a-year plan to broaden the revenue base for building facilities in the state's public school system, community colleges and universities. The plan, presented by Burke Kibler, Chairman of Education Commissioner Betty Castor's facilities task force, would enlarge the gross receipts tax base of the Public Education Capital Outlay (PECO) fund to include water, sewer, cable television, solid waste and cellular phone service. Expanding the base beyond a tax on the gross receipts of telephone, electricity and gas services to all utilities regulated by the Public Service Commission or competing utilities, such as hotel phone systems, would produce estimated PECO bond revenue of more than \$500 million annually above the amount now available. The plan envisions increasing the current 1 1/2 percent tax levy by 1/4 percent in the second year and each subsequent year until the rate reaches 2 1/2 percent.

PECO generated revenues are the sole source of funds for SUS educa-

tional facilities, the main source for community college construction and cover about a fifth of all public school system capital outlays.

Commenting on the plan at the regular March 23 BOR meeting held here, SUS Chancellor Charles Reed said that adequate university facilities constituted the system's largest single problem. "I will make the best case I can in the legislative arena," Reed promised. "Frankly, I am not overly optimistic, but miracles do happen," he said, alluding to the fact that the Legislature would be asked to broaden the tax base in an election year.

Board approval of the plan followed warnings by Chairman Charles Edwards that the SUS was becoming increasingly elitist because of facility constraints while growing significantly and facing even more explosive growth in the future.

"If our system grows at the same rate as the state population, and if we accommodate growing numbers of high school graduates beginning in 1995-96, and if we remain as popular as we are, we may expect to add nearly 80,000 new students by the year 2000," Edwards said. "Facilities to accommodate such growth will

require expenditure of \$1.9 billion."

Meanwhile, he said, enrollment restrictions caused by a facility shortfall have made it increasingly difficult for qualified students to enroll in the SUS. Since 1980, he noted, freshman applications have risen by 23,000, while first-time-in-college enrollments have risen by only 2500. Edwards observations were made in connection with his recommendation that a series of public hearings aimed at a variety of long range planning issues be organized. The issues proposed for examination were SUS enrollment and facilities pressures and the need for new campuses or universities; delivery of off-campus and continuing education; the impact of limited access programs on the educational opportunities of community college transfer students; the capability of serving released military populations with the thawing of the Cold War; and the needs for new professional schools in medical/health fields, law and engineering.

Edwards also said that all low productivity degree programs would be reviewed at the July BOR meeting, as well as academic programs proposed for introduction by the nine state universities through 1993. □

Group Discusses Needs of Student-Athletes

Has the educational system allowed its student-athletes to be propelled through the system on brawn and no brain? Has the seduction of big-bucks athletics blinded universities to their major purpose of educating students? And if so how can this dangerous game be stopped? These and other difficult questions were posed by a nationally recognized group of individuals here March 22 on invitation of Provost Richard Astro.

Among the guest speakers were former Boston Celtics player and coach Thomas "Satch" Sanders; Peter Golenbock, author of the best-selling book *Personal Fouls*; Richard Lapchick, director of the National Center for the Study of Sport in Society at Northeastern University, Boston; Pat Williams,

general manager of the Orlando Magic and Charles B. Reed, chancellor of State University System.

Lapchick said that while student-athletes on a whole are more likely to graduate than other students, the number of graduates declines in the revenue-generating sports of football and basketball. "Most of those students will not graduate and will not get an education," says Lapchick of the football and basketball players. These athletes have been passed through the system, receiving grades they did not earn.

Golenbock blamed much of the problem on the greed of universities who exploit their athletes with no consideration for their educational welfare. These universities need to

decide, said Golenbock, whether they are in the education or entertainment business.

The positive side of athletics was not ignored. Chancellor Reed, told the group, "I wouldn't be here today if not for athletics." Reed, who received his undergraduate education with the help of an athletic grant-in-aid, said that while athletics is an important part of collegiate life it is not however the most important part.

Sports should continue to be used as a motivating force for students Lapchick said. He added that athletes have historically risen to the occasion when asked to do more. "The problem is we've rarely asked them to do it." □

Chairman at Northwestern Named New Dean of A & S

A veteran clinical psychologist now at Northwestern University has been appointed to head the College of Arts and Sciences here.

Edward P. Sheridan, chairman of psychology in Northwestern's Medical School, is expected to assume his dean's post in late summer.

He has been a member of the Northwestern faculty since 1973. Since that time he has served in a variety of assignments including chief of psychiatry outpatient services and director of the psychology resident program. He also serves as an adjunct

professor at Northwestern Law School.

"We are fortunate to have a scholar of Dr. Sheridan's caliber joining us," said President Steven Altman. "His experience and credentials are impressive. We are looking forward to his arrival and subsequent leadership in this important college."

The new dean received his undergraduate degree from the University of Windsor, Canada; a master's degree at the University of Detroit, and his Ph.D from Loyola University of Chicago. □

SUBJECT: USPS Sick Leave Pool Open Enrollment Period

The USPS Sick Leave Pool will have an open enrollment period during the entire month of April.

All full time USPS employees, employed continuously by the State for more than one year may voluntarily join and participate in the USPS Sick Leave Pool, provided the employee has a current sick leave balance of at least 64 hours of unused sick leave at the time of enrollment. An employee meeting these requirements and desiring to become a member of the sick leave pool must submit a request in writing to the Director of Personnel, who serves as the administrator of the sick leave pool. In accordance with the USPS sick leave pool procedure, the initial sick leave pool contribution is 16 hours.

Participating employees who require hospitalization or extended medical care as the result of any injury or illness which exhausts all of their accrued personal sick, annual, and compensatory leave credits and which results in serious or major medical or health problems, may request permission to utilize sick leave credits from the pool. All requests for sick leave pool credit utilization shall be accompanied by a completed physician's statement form (available in the Personnel office) which documents the illness or injury.

The number of hours a member may withdraw from the pool will be determined by the employee's highest personal sick leave balance during the twelve (12) month period immediately preceding his/her request. If an employee has not been a member for twelve (12) months, the highest accrual since joining the pool will determine potential usage. During a twelve month period, beginning with the date the pool is first used, an employee will be eligible to use one day from the pool for each day of personal sick leave accrual as outlined above, up to a maximum of 480 hours. However, an employee who has less than 120 hours accrued shall be eligible to use 120 hours from the pool.

If you are interested in joining the USPS Sick Leave Pool, an application will be available in the April issues of the UCF Report. You may also pick up an application in the Personnel Office, Administration Building, Room 230.

Faculty previously funded since July 1, 1990, will not be considered by the committee for additional funding.
