Tough Legislative session; fair results

Despite what University of Central Florida officials consider a "miserable" budget overall, UCF came away from this year's Legislative session, to the surprise of many, with a promised pay hike for its employees.

Though Gov. Lawton Chiles is calling the budget passed last week by lawmakers "lean and mean," state employees will receive a 3 percent raise in January.

News of the pay increase, which seemed unlikely after this year's spending was sliced to avoid a deficit, was among a number of bills passed during the session that pleased University of Central Florida officials.

Legislators also passed a management reform plan to give the state's universities more flexibility when handling their own budgets, a move that President Steven Altman had been pushing.

And all UCF's requests for Public Educational Capital Outlay (PECO) funds were granted. The PECO funds, which have no relation to

To: All faculty From: Anne Marie Allison, library Subject: Assignment of library research studies

Requests for library research study rooms for summer 1991 semester should be submitted to the office of the library director.

Assignment of research studies in the library will be made by the circulation librarian, with the assistance of the faculty research study room committee. Keys will be issued to authorize faculty at the library circulation/reserve desk.

There are a total of 10 research study rooms in the library. At present, at least seven will be available for assignment on a semester basis. Others will be available at the discretion of the committee for short-term projects.

Preference for assignments will be given to faculty members actively involved in research and writing projects where use of library resources is important. No departments will be eligible for research study room assignments.

All rules and regulations of the library apply to the use of the research studies. The library is a smoke-free building and no smoking is permitted in any area of the library. Eating or drinking will be permitted only in the staff lounge. Faculty using research studies are expected to abide by these policies. They may request the library lounge code for access to that room for breaks. Disregarding these rules and regulations will result in revocation of study room privileges and reassignment of the room.

Library materials kept in a study room must first be checked out at the circulation desk. The library staff will retain the right to inspect any room at any time. Any library material not properly checked out will be returned to the shelves. Repeated offenses will result in termination of study room privileges and reassignment of the room.

A charge of \$5 will be assessed to any faculty member who loses the key to the research study room, or who fails to return the key.

For study room assigned on a semester basis, the last day of the final examination period for the semester normally will coincide with the last day for use of the room unless arrangements have been made in writing to the circulation librarian for use of the room between semesters.

Faculty must reapply each semester for use of a room. There is no guarantee that a research study room will be available to an individual who qualified the previous semester. The needs of those reapplying will be considered along with new applicants.

Depending upon demand, two people may be assigned to one room. If that is the case, the individuals involved will be expected to work out arrangements.

 PAYROLL — This is an open list, available to everyone who works with or is interested in payroll certification or time card information.

 GENERAL — This is an open list, available to everyone on PROFS. This list will be used for distributing general information to all PROFS users in lieu of the ALLUSERS

notes (eg. General topics of interest to the university community: campus activities, calendar of events, short course offerings, construction events and road closings).

To: Deans, directors and department heads From: Linda Bonta, controller Subject: Travel reimbursement vouchers

All travel must be paid on travel reimbursement vouchers with only two exceptions. These are outlined in Florida Statute 112.061, which states:

"Whenever an agency requires an employee to incur ... travel on emergency notice to the traveler, such traveler may request the agency to pay his expenses for meals and lodging directly to the vendor ... The comptroller may grant prior approval to a state agency to make direct payments of travel expenses in other situations that result in cost savings to the state."

 In an emergency situation, a memo explaining the emergency must be submitted with the purchase requisition or limited purchase order.

• When there is a savings to the state, a memo explaining the savings should be sent to Finance and Accounting with a copy of the purchase requisition attached. Advanced approval will be requested from the comptroller's office by F&A. Approval must be obtained prior to the travel start date.

The traveler's name, social security number and TAR number are required. Exceptions can only be used if the statute requirements are met and procedures are followed exactly.For information or assistance, contact Dan Moya in F&A, x3390. The lists will operate as an informal medium for encouraging open communication between departments or divisions. You may join or subscribe to a list much like you subscribe to a magazine, by requesting a subscription from the PROFS administrator. You will only receive mail sent to a list from which you have subscribed.

The capability to create an ALLUSERS distribution list in PROFS will be removed; in its place will be the GENERAL distribution list, which will enable those who want to receive mail from the general list to do so, and those who do not to be excluded.

University pays tribute to local black women

Thirteen black Central Florida women were recognized as pioneers and leaders during a "A Tribute to African-American Women," a program held at the University of Central Florida, April 28.

The event, sponsored by UCF's African-American Student Union, honored: Orlando councilwoman Mable Butler; businesswoman Mercedes Clark; educator Thelma Dudley; social worker Kitty Ellison; Valada Flewellyn, representing the humanities field; medical doctor Ann Ashley-Gilbert; Judge Evelyn Golden; Gloria Grant, representing civics; Edna Hargrett, representing music; Annetta Kemper, representing media; educator Margaret Miller; Rev. Julia Whitehurst; and artist Katie Wright.

The event was one of an on-going number of activities sponsored by the African-American student union.

salaries or other expenses, will permit the university to continue plans for construction growth.

Lawmakers also agreed to increase tuition for Florida students by 15 percent, and limit future increases to 10 percent. The Board of Regents hopes to someday reach a level where Florida students pay for 25 percent of their education. Even with next year's increase, they would be paying less than students in most states.

Another measure that could benefit the university is the restructuring of the Board of Regents. One additional regent will be appointed in July, and it is expected that that person will be from Central Florida — currently the only region without a regent.

While the 3 percent raise for state employees is far less than was hoped, it is somewhat remarkable that lawmakers were able to carve it out of the budget.

"Under the circumstances, we're delighted to have anything," said Dan Holsenbeck, senior counsel to the president and director of government relations.

"But at the same time, 3 percent doesn't come anywhere near what our people deserve relating to merit or cost of living ... We appreciate what our delegation and other legislators did to find any salary dollars, but 3 percent still falls far short. None of us can say that we're truly happy with the budget," he said.

If not for the efforts of Altman and the state's other university presidents, it is possible that there would be no increase. Originally, there were no plans in the budget for salary increases. Early last week, Altman hopped a plane to Tallahassee and spent several hours lobbying lawmakers for the raise. He and the other presidents were able to collect enough support for the proposal to pass.

"I think their visit had an impact," Holsenbeck said of the lobbying effort. "They were able to dig up a dead issue and bring life to it again."

Holsenbeck said Altman would continue asking Tallahassee for better salaries for faculty and staff.

The passing of the management reform bill was one of the most significant, Holsenbeck said, because it will allow universities, among other things, to shift funds internally without first getting permission from Tallahassee. In times of budget crises — as this year — that would give officials more flexibility in determining where to make cut-backs.

Engineering department receives award

For its support of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, the mechanical and aerospace engineering department was awarded the ASME Industry Certificate by the society's national president on April 17. UCF is the first university to win the Industry Certificate, which is usually awarded to a business in the industry.


Arthur Bergles, president of ASME and dean of engineering at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, traveled to Orlando to make the presentation. The UCF department was cited for "outstanding support to mechanical engineering and the ASME. This support is a vital importance for the continued development of mechanical engineers and the advancement of engineering." College of Engineering dean Gary Whitehouse accepted the award, along with mechanical engineering department chair David Nicholson. The engineering department was recognized for its support of the Florida section of ASME through its faculty and student participation, its provision of space and manpower for ASME functions, and its efforts to keep members and prospective members updated on activities.

Judaic Studies gets \$10,000 boost

The Lucius N. Littauer Foundation has granted a \$10,000 endowment to the University of Central Florida library to establish a fund.

The Lucius N. Littauer Foundation Judaica Book Fund will be used to purchase books each year that will enrich and support the teaching and research activities in UCF's Judaic Studies Program. In addition to a minor in Judaic Studies, UCF sponsors a Judaic Studies Lecture Series for community, faculty and student participation.

According to Anne Marie Allison, director of libraries, and Moshe Pelli, director of the Judaic Studies program at UCF, the collection will also add a Judaic perspective for students conducting research in history, sociology, political science, anthropology and other disciplines.
