## Construction projects continue in race to keep pace with UCF's increase in students

When the long-awaited, long-delayed opening of the Student Union became a reality on March 18, the other pieces of the large complex began coming together quickly. According to Peter Newman, director for Facilities Planning, the installation of equipment and furnishings is currently under way and construction continues on other parts inside the complex.

About 100 students and staff from the Campus Activity Board, Student Government and student clubs and organizations are currently in their new offices. The Student Union also has meeting and conference rooms, a banquet room, a food court, fast-food vendors, a pub, TV rooms, reading and study rooms, a game room and a retail area.

Java Express has opened in the food court with Subway, Wendy's, Thomas Sweet and Sbarro currently under construction. Subway will

open in six weeks with the others scheduled to open by the end of the summer. Small retail shops for the Lighthouse Mall are currently under construction, also. The pub and game room will open at the end of summer.

Additional landscaping on the front entrance (facing the Library) will include the installation of bricks, benches and trees.

A grand opening with tours and giveaways is scheduled for Aug. 20.

Newman said that other construction projects are progressing in a expedient manner, also.

The 81,000-square-foot Communications Building is on target for completion in the summer, possibly making it available for the fall term. The original schedule called for its completion before the end of the year.

**Subject: Certification forward, travel and processing deadlines**

The following restrictions apply to E&G funds only, not to C&G, auxiliary or local funds.

In recent years, we have been permitted to "certify forward" certain purchases that have not been received or paid by June 30. It was permitted for those purchases to be paid from the prior year budget even though they were received in the subsequent fiscal year. We once again expect to be able to use this mechanism for purchases that are not received by June 30.

"The first parking garage, which will accommodate 1,300 cars, has not presented any problems and should be done by October," Newman said. But there is no scheduled date as to when the \$8.6 million facility will be operational. It is located on the northwest side of the Education Building and has a new road allowing traffic from the garage to exit to Gemini Boulevard.

Construction sites will remain part of the UCF scenery for some years. Ground breaking for a Health and Public Affairs Building is tentatively set for May. It will be located just east of the Student Union on Pegasus Circle across from the Engineering Building. The 91,458-square-foot (gross) facility will be two-stories and will offer space for offices, laboratories, classrooms, a computer lab, a cadaver lab and atrium space. The administrative offices for the College of Health and Public Affairs will also be housed there.

Last month, plans for a Classroom Building kicked off. Shenkel and Schultz have been selected as the architects for the 86,893-square-foot (gross) facility. It will be located across from the Student Union on the northwest side, next to the satellite utility plant.

Newman said that six to eight months will be spent on the design phase before construction begins. The facility will include some offices and an anatomy lab, but will contain mostly classrooms, including a high-tech electronic classroom.

Lescher and Mahoney, the architects for the new baseball stadium, have begun work on that project, which will be located just north of the Arena. Newman said that university officials hope to break ground before the fall term. It will include offices, locker rooms, dugouts, a press box and spectator stands that seat 1,800, which can be expanded.

Renovation of Computer Center II started in March. "Computer Center II will remain completely vacated while it is under construction, then the same procedure will be carried out for Computer Center I," Newman said.

Planning for a second parking garage is in progress. It will be located between the Engineering Building and CREOL where there is currently a dirt parking lot. Ground breaking will occur in October.

Newman said that the long strip of property between the Student Union and the Arena that is currently being used as a dirt parking lot will be eventually turned into a green belt called Memory Mall. The mall will feature a sculptural fountain in the center, where plaques can be placed commemorating deceased employees.

"There will be a pyramid with the Pegasus at the top of the fountain," Newman said.

However, there is always a risk that "certified forward" transactions will not be authorized by the state comptroller, and I encourage you to complete all transactions using current year funds well before June 30.

Please note the following critical dates as you plan for remaining expenditures this year:

1. Purchases that require bidding should be submitted to the Purchasing Department no later than May 1. Requisitions received after that date will be returned for processing in the 1997-98 fiscal year.
2. Purchases that do not require bidding must be processed to the Purchasing Department no later than June 2. Purchase requisitions received after that date or purchases requiring delivery dates after June 30 will be returned. There are already some state contract vendors who will be able to guarantee deliveries by June 30. Please check with the Purchasing Department to determine if a problem of slow delivery may occur and complete paperwork before June 30.
3. We will continue to process internal purchases (Computer Store, Bookstore, Office Supply) and Limited Purchase Orders (LPO's) until June 13. However, you must be sure that adequate funds exist in the account and that payment authorizations and transactions can be completed by June 30.

On a related matter, please be aware that travel must be completed by midnight June 30 for you to be paid from the current year's funds. Travel completed after June 30 will automatically be paid from the 1997-98 budgets.

Please review the accounts under your control and work toward meeting the above deadline. The Purchasing Department and Finance and Accounting will assist you in meeting these deadlines and processing your requests. Please call either office as needed. Your help in meeting these deadlines will be greatly appreciated.

## President Hitt responds to controversy on the Marilyn Manson concert at the UCF Arena

In response to the public outcry demanding that UCF cancel the Marilyn Manson performance in the UCF Arena earlier this week, President John Hitt issued the following statement prior to the Tuesday night concert:

"Tonight's controversial Marilyn Manson performance at the University of Central Florida, an event that UCF neither sought nor sponsors, has outraged the community, as evidenced by the thousands of people who have written or phoned us in opposition to what the group represents. The rock group's dehumanizing message, which affirms death over life, blatantly offends both my religious convictions as a Christian and my secular values of treating all people with dignity and respect.

"Under our system of laws, however, my beliefs and values rightly should not and

cannot translate into actions that violate provisions of the U.S. Constitution. Indeed, the constitutions of our nation and of our state protect even expressions and views that are repugnant to the majority. As one who has sworn to uphold the fundamental laws of the nation and state, I must observe the law's requirements and resist the temptation to silence constitutionally protected views with which I vehemently disagree.

"Just as UCF intends to protect the Manson group's right to perform in a university facility that also has been rented as a public forum for the expression of Christian views, UCF is prepared to enforce the law in the event that the protected right to express despicable views leads to unlawful behavior or conduct. Should the Marilyn Manson group engage in any conduct that violates local or state laws, it will be subject to arrest and prosecution."

Outstanding academic achievement of faculty and students was recognized during the annual Founders Day Honors Convocation on April 2.

The UCF Brass Knights, directed by music professor Roy Pickering, kicked off the event with the National Anthem, followed by a welcoming address from President John Hitt.

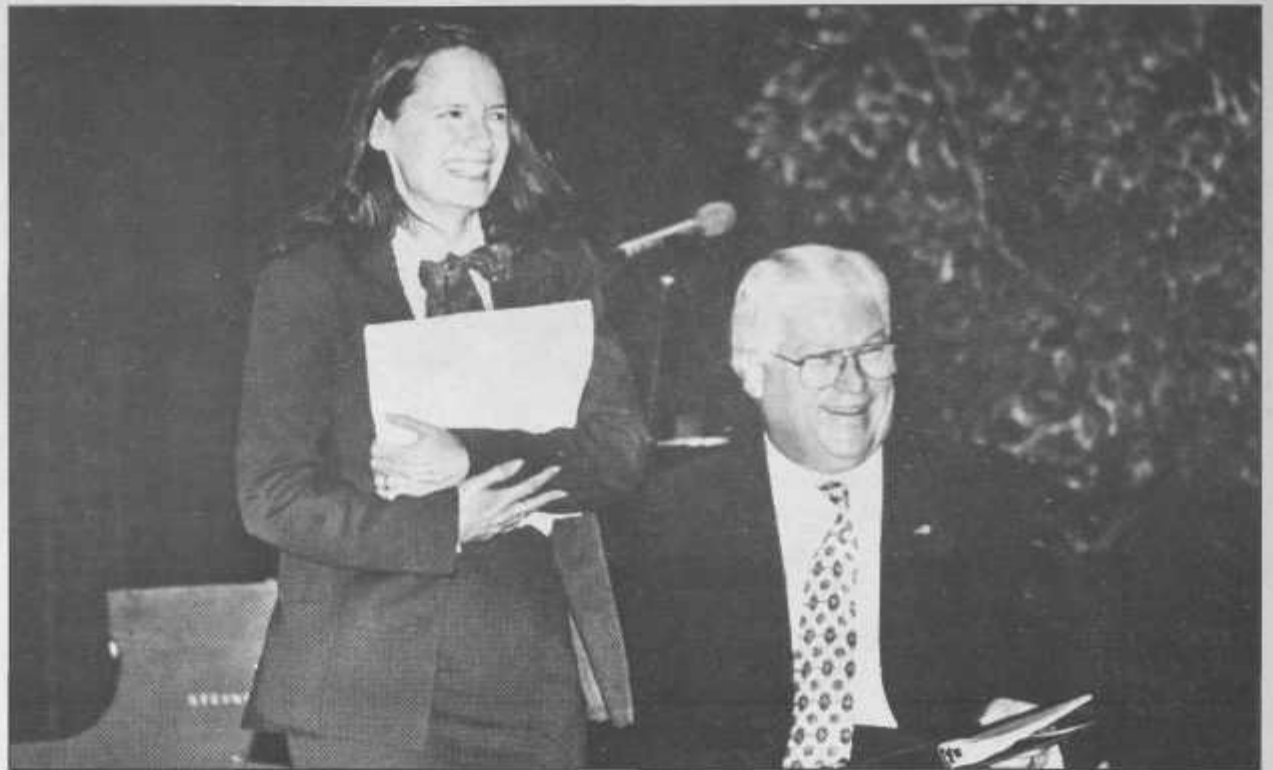
Phil Taylor, professor for the School of Communication, served as the master of ceremonies.
