## BOR report ranks UCF, eight other state schools

The Florida Board of Regents annual report describes the arrival of higher education in the state as "big business."

Produced at private expense, the BOR's four-color, 28-page report has the look and feel of a corporation's annual report to its stockholders.

Each university is listed including background, fiscal and enrollment data of each of the state's nine universities and prestigious accomplishments of the schools.

For example, did you know that UCF was the first in the state to offer a Ph.D. program in computer science? Or that we operate the state's largest personal computer network available to students? Or that we own one of the three velocimeters in the nation?

A velocimeter is a velocity-measuring device that uses a laser.

By listing such facts the BOR to impress and attract the best students, faculty, and administrators to Florida universities.

"This is a high-quality product designed to attract high-quality personnel," said Terrell Sessums, Chairman of the Florida BOR.

Besides being used as a recruiting aid, the report has also been distributed to the Florida Chamber of Commerce to use in promoting the state as a site for new industry.

Other items of interest in the report are University of Florida's College of Dentistry and College of Veterinary Medicine, the only such programs in the state; Florida A & M University's School of Journalism, Media and Graphic Arts, the first accredited

## UCF's Student Affairs offers ways to grow

There is a department in the academic world of UCF which many students probably have never fully understood, but still use many times over.

Student Affairs does many things for the student — but unfortunately a lot of people don't know all the options this office offers.

The motto of the Student Affairs office, "the student is a person, not a number", makes this varied organization an asset to everyone. The 15 departments of the Student Affairs division provide many ways in which to grow at UCF.

The first contact many students have with Student Affairs is at orientation.

"I think that all new students and transfers should be required to go through this vital process to give them an overview of the college," said Ken Lawson, assistant Vice President of Student Affairs.

But the people in the Student Affairs office do more than just help orient students.

The Vice President is responsible for overseeing the whole department. He coordinates and implements university policies pertinent to the social, cultural and general welfare of the student body.

Contrary to popular belief, the Dean of Students is there to help students, not to ruin them. He handles numerous programs and services.

The Assistant Vice-President for Student Services is responsible for the supervision of the Creative School for Children, Recreational Services, Student Center, student organization and orientation, Women's Scholarship House, Fraternities/Sororities and Woman's

Programs.

Career Resource Center administers the co-op programs, provides counseling services to clarify career objectives and helps students apply for jobs after graduation. It also keeps students abreast of job opportunities for summer and part-time employment.

The Counseling and Testing Center helps students deal with a multitude of problems such as personal difficulties, marital or relationship problems, vocational and educational opportunities, and learning difficulties.

The Creative School for Children is an educational research center for child development and the first in the state to be established at a university. It provides education for children two through five years of age.

Housing and Residence Life is responsible for the resident halls and International Student Services develops international education at UCF, keeping the channels open between international students and Americans on campus.

Recreational Services provides a wide range of recreational and sports opportunities to the students, faculty, and staff. These activities include flag football, basketball, softball, volleyball, soccer, tennis, golf, raquetball, floor hockey, baseball and disc golf. In addition, Recreational Services can help with a personal physical fitness program.

The Student Center is the hub of activity on campus, featuring eating areas, an auditorium, conference and meeting rooms, a game room, lounge areas, student organization offices and a new Student Activities Center.

Student Government is designed to represent student opinion, advance the cause of students both socially

## Close cracks and save money

### FLORIDA SOLAR ENERGY CENTER

This latest release from the Florida Solar Energy Center series deals with "drafts" and how to prevent them.

"Stop the draft" may have been the rallying cry on college campuses decades ago, but today it's a slogan many Floridians follow to win the war against high energy costs and uncomfortable homes.

Winter is here, and many holes, cracks and openings in your house are letting in the winter chill.

How big a problem is air leakage into a house? Almost one-third of unwanted outside air gets into your home through openings around windows, electrical outlets and other parts of your house.

In fact, if you closed up all the avoidable openings in your home that cause air-leakage, you'd close a hole the size of a basketball.

If you saw a hole that big in one of your walls, you would fix it immediately. So now that you know these openings really do exist in your house, it's worth your while to find them and seal them now — before winter begins.

From a comfort standpoint, you'll be glad you took the time. All summer long, conditioned air

leaked out of your house, costing you money and raising your electric bill by as much as 25 percent.

But winter temperatures won't just squeeze the pocketbook, they will also be felt inside your house. Wind-blown air will make your house drafty and make you uncomfortable.

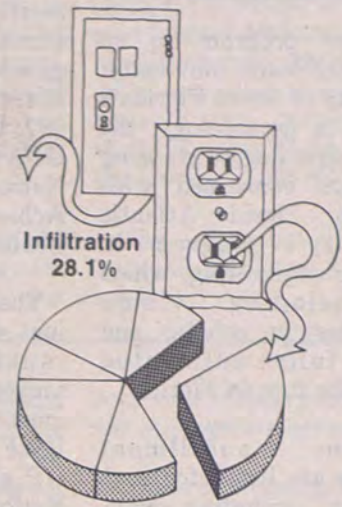
The bigger the difference between the inside and outside temperatures, the more you feel the effects of air leakage.

You may feel this most in central and north Florida, but it's just as much a factor in south Florida as well.

With just a few simple tools and products from a local hardware store, you can "tighten" up your house and keep it much more comfortable all year long. Begin by closely inspecting the house, looking for the seams, cracks and joints that should be filled first. Among the places most often needing repair are:

- Openings around window and door frames
- Joints between the foundation and the sole plate of the house
- Drain and piping penetrations under sinks
- Holes for telephone and electric lines
- Places where pipes pass through exterior walls
- Cracks around mail slots on walls or doors
- Small openings around medicine cabinets and bathtubs
- Seals around exhaust ducts and dampers

Note that many of these problem areas can be found in condominiums and apartments, as well as

in single family homes.

Don't think that just because your house is new, you don't have any unwanted openings to seal up.

## Wolf elected Pro Tem in close senate race

The student senate elected a new pro tempore Thursday and introduced bills giving over \$3,000 to campus organizations.

Ross Wolf beat August Field by a vote of 12 to 10 to become the senate's new pro tempore. Wolf is a math education junior who was elected to the senate last fall. He is chairman of student government's Services and Publicity Committee and a member of Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity.

"This senate's goal is to become more service oriented. That's what I'm going to strive for," said Wolf. "I feel I can compromise with people and get things done."

The senate's last pro tempore, Steve Phillips, resigned earlier this month because of job conflicts. The pro tempore acts as senate chairman if the student body vice president cannot serve, and sits on all student government committees.

The senate introduced three bills that would give over \$3,000 altogether to the UCF programming team, the Robotics Club and the Surf Club. So far, most of this senate's bills have been aimed at regulating the senate instead of providing services for students.

One bill provides \$1,630 for the UCF Programming Team to travel to the Association of Computing Machinery's international competition in

journalism program in an historically black university; University of South Florida's program in gerontology, the nation's first degree-granting curriculum concerned with the aging; Florida Atlantic University's program in computer engineering, which is developing vision capabilities in robots; and UCF's fully automated library, the first in Florida.

Student enrollment statistics are listed for each university, including male, female and minority percentages, residency percentages, and SAT/ACT scores of 1986 freshman classes. National Merit and National Achievement finalists and semifinalists accepted to each school in 1986 are also enumerated by university.

The report states that UCF's total enrollment for 1986 was 16,575, with 1,670 graduate students and an international student

enrollment of 1.7 percent. Although 9,945 high school seniors applied for admittance, only 1,106 were enrolled. Of these students, the average SAT score was 987, the average high school GPA was 3.0, and 12 were National Merit and National Achievement semifinalists or finalists.

These statistics put UCF just about dead center in the rankings of the nine universities. UF enrolled the most freshmen with 2,927, UWF the fewest with 266. UF also admitted the most National Merit and National Achievement finalists or semifinalists with 69, UNF the least with two.

All but UF had higher percentages of females, the women averaging 54.6 percent at the eight universities.

Just in case these type figures interest you, UNF in Jacksonville has the highest proportion of women at 60 percent, UF the highest of men at 55 percent.

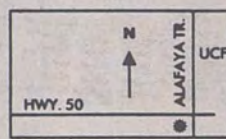

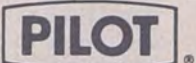

One bill provides \$1,630 for the UCF Programming Team to travel to the Association of Computing Machinery's international competition in St. Louis, Mo. in February. A team from UCF team placed fourth in the ACM international competition last year, and UCF won the

regional competition in Alabama in November.

Another bill gives \$1,000 to the UCF Robotics Club to help them build a walking robot to enter in competition in April. The club was formed last fall and consists mainly of mechanical and electrical engineering majors.

A third bill gives \$800 to the UCF Surf Club to pay for registration expenses for

competitions coming up in the spring.

"They (the surf club) placed third in the nation last year," said senator Melissa Pellerin, who sponsored the bill. "If we've got that much talent, there's no reason we shouldn't give them some of the money, if not all."

The senate is expected to vote on all three bills this week.

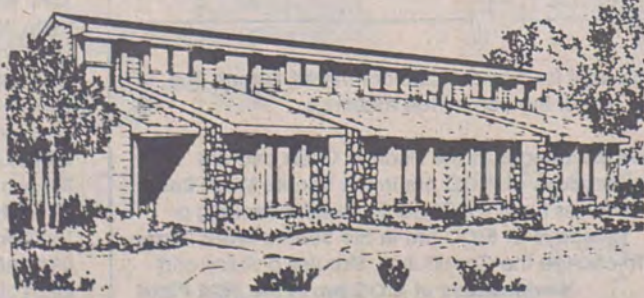

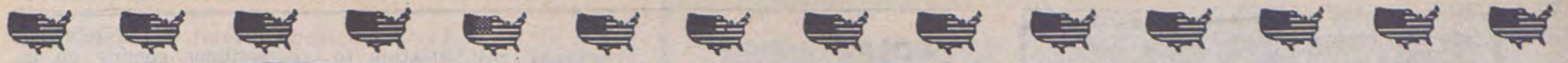

- EA Elections and Appointments:** This committee reviews all Student Government Appointments, and makes recommendations for changes to the Election Statutes. **Tuesdays at 6:00 pm in the Senate Work Room**

Normal home settling in new homes will open many of these holes. Even many of the state's best builders leave unsealed areas where cable TV wires, plumbing fixtures and other home fixtures are installed.

Once you've finished your inspection of the inside and the outside of the house, make a list of openings that need to be sealed and the supplies you'll need.

You'll find all types of caulks and foam sealants at your local "home store," so ask the clerk for assistance if your not sure which type you'll need. All have different advantages and uses.

For example, oil-based caulk is inexpensive but it will shrink over time; silicone caulk will last a long time but cannot be painted over. Most of these products are very easy to use — the newer caulks don't even need a special gun to be applied, and the foam sealants come ready to be sprayed right from the can.

Without too much effort, you can plug most of the holes around your house that let in outside air and create those drafty areas and rooms that just don't seem to ever get comfortable.

One suggestion: make sure you pick up some packages of electrical outlet sealers.

They're inexpensive insulated gaskets that fit behind sockets and switches.

Some researchers estimate that you can cut air losses by as much as 20 percent just by stopping up holes behind wall outlets and switches — especially those on exteriors walls. But before you unscrew the covers over electrical outlets, turn off the circuit breaker for extra safety.

In addition to filling holes in your walls, you need to properly seal widows and doors to do the job right.

Again you'll find a number of easy-to-use products for weatherstripping around doors and moveable parts of windows. Most just stick into place and will stop drafts that come in through the areas that don't seal tightly.

By sealing it tight, your home will feel more comfortable right away. Your heating bills will probably be lower, and when you turn the air-conditioner back on next summer, the savings will increase tremendously.

Your air-conditioning will stay in the house where you want it, and the humidity will stay outside.

One added benefit of this small effort: sealing the openings will also cut down on other unwanted things getting in to your house including dirt, dust, allergens, pollutants, noise and insects. Not that we have any of these things in Florida, of course but...

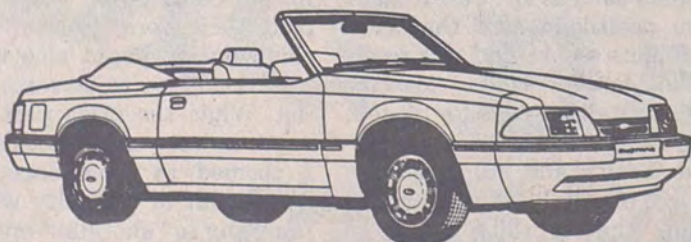

In a year or two, barring similar incidents, the whole thing will be forgotten.

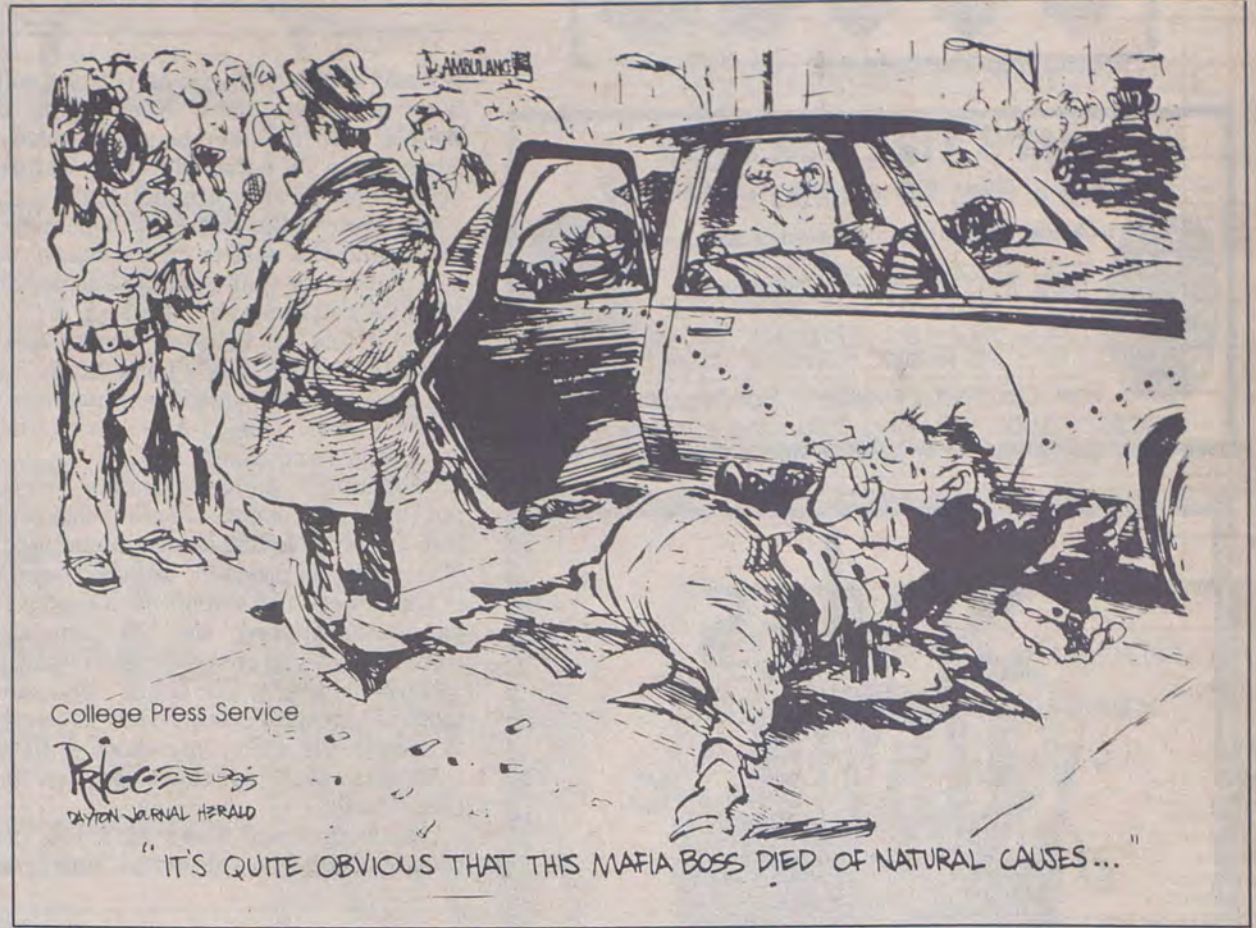
But at the moment it is not. To those of you who did the act, add one more to your list of victories because the rest of what is said here is just for you.

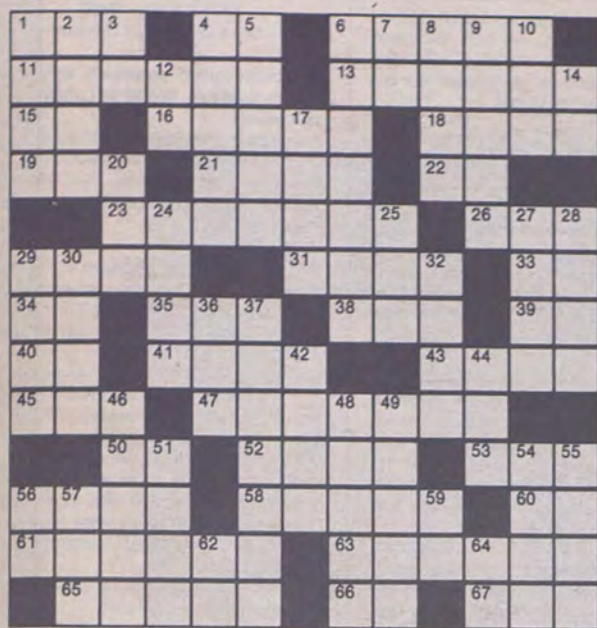

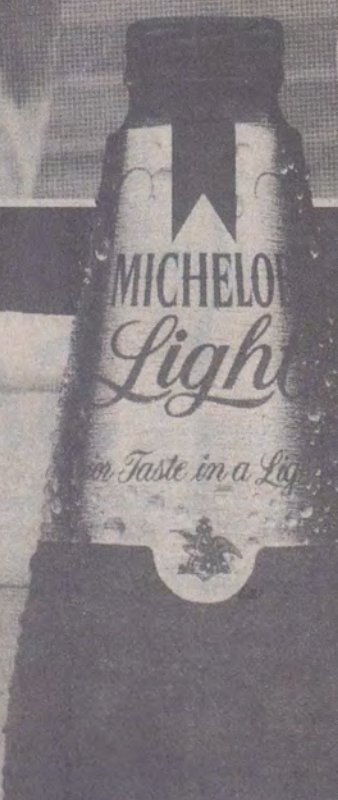

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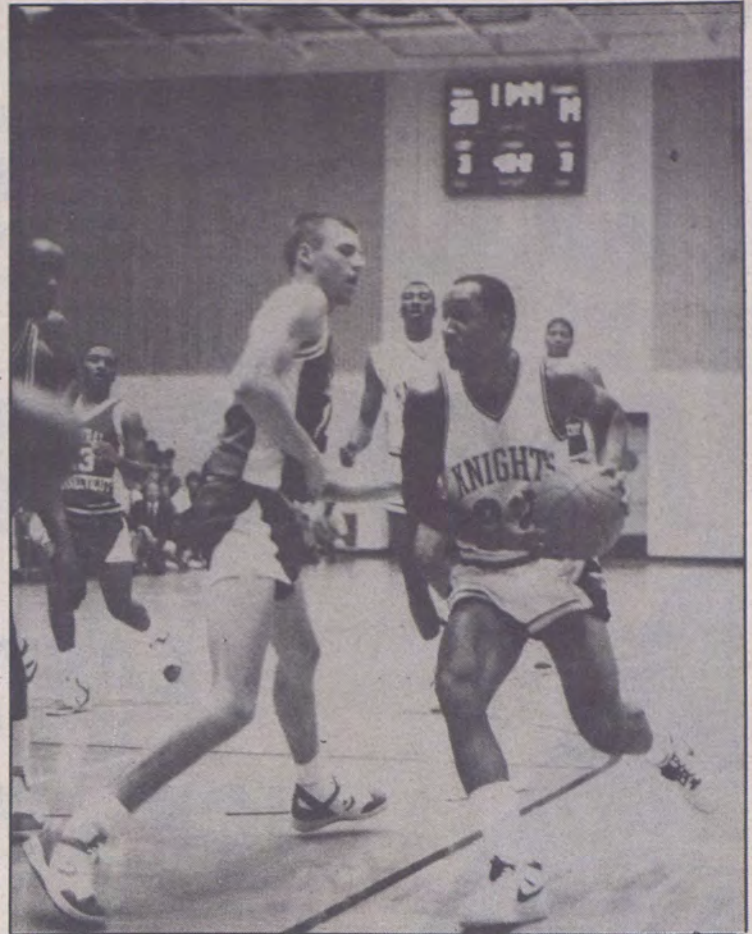

The University of Central Florida baseball team will once again prove to be a powerhouse team. UCF is packed with returning players and talented newcomers.

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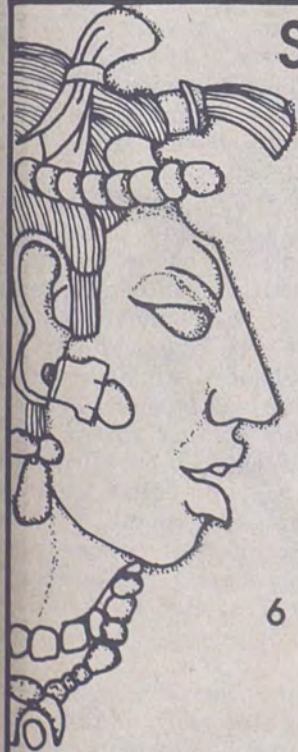
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# Rollins rivalry to rock UCF's gym Wed. night

Time for the annual rivalry between the Tars of Rollins College and the Knights of UCF.

The Knights will try to make it 12 wins in a row against the Tars Wednesday night at the UCF gym (7:30 p.m.) Although Rollins is a Division II school (UCF is Division I), the rivalry is still as intense as when both were members of the Division II Sunshine State Conference.

The season series stands at 20-9 in favor of the Knights. But last year's contest, played before 2,173 rowdy fans, saw UCF escape the Tars by only two points, 70-68.

In that contest, Knights forward Pat Crocklin poured in 18 points. The Knights also survived a second half rally by Rollins that cut their lead to only one point.

One year later, there are only subtle differences between the two teams.

Before last year's UCF - Rollins matchup, Rollins was sporting a 10-6 record. They would finish the season 15-13, and post a 4-9 record in the Sunshine State conference.

UCF, meanwhile, had won only twice in 15 outings and were on their way to a 6-22 mark.

This year, Rollins again has a winning record (12-4). However, this Tars team is much better. They are coming off an upset win of the Tampa Spartans. The Spartans were the top rated team in the nation in Division II before losing to conference-rival Rollins. Rollins now has a 2-1 record in the Sunshine State Conference.

Rollins has also defeated some big-name Division I opponents this season, knocking off both the Sycamores of Indiana State and perennial Big Ten pushover Northwestern.

The Tars are led by guard Jeff Wolf and forward-center Curt Fiser, who are among the top 10 scorers in the Sunshine State Conference. Wolf is averaging around 20 points a game. Fiser, meanwhile showed his defensive skills Saturday by shutting down Todd Linder, Tampa's All-American candidate. Linder was limited to 15 points and took only six shots against Rollins.

In the two games prior to the UCF matchup, Jeff Wolf, Dan Wolf and Fiser have combined for almost 60 percent of Rollins scoring output.

The Knights (6-9) have been on a roll themselves, having won their last four games. They have played some of their best ball of the season in the last two weeks.

The Knights are led by Crocklin. The 6-foot-4 forward is averaging 12.3 points per game. He's also pulling down 4.9 rebounds per game.

The front court play of the Knights has been it's strong point. Center John Friday is averaging 9.6 ppg, 7.1 rpg and 2.8 blocked shots per game. Hot-shooting forward Stan Haithcock has nailed down 55 percent of his shots from the field while averaging 8.3 ppg. Haithcock has also hit on 36 percent of his attempts from the three point circle.

The Knights backcourt has been solid. Senior guard Faronte Roberson is the Knights second leading scorer, averaging 10.9 ppg. Point guard Bryant Woodford leads the teams in assists with 49 after 15 games.

After several UCF turnovers, the Lady Panthers could not be denied. With five minutes remaining, the Lady Knight lead was down to five, 74-69.

Then GSU guard Brownie Vaughn made two key baskets that handed the game to the Lady Panthers. After a missed UCF shot, Vaughn drove the lane and put up right-handed scoop shot that cut the lead to three, 74-71.

After another missed UCF shot, Vaughn brought the ball down the court. After working it around, Vaughn found herself open, and calmly buried a three-point shot. That tied the score at 74.

From then on, the Lady Knights were outscored 18-10, and eventually lost by eight points.
