ing with the staff and players. Our goal will be to field an attacking, a g g r e s s i v e, physical defensive team that


will help Auburn be successful each and every week."

The Golden Knights' defense ranked 16th in the country last year in total defense, 15th in passing, and had been improving each year under Chizik. The year before Chizik arrived, UCF's defense ranked 81st.

In addition to being defensive coordinator, Chizik also coached the secondary for three years and the linebackers for one year. Prior to UCF, Chizik coached six seasons at Stephen F. Austin, a Division 1AA school.

"We're looking forward to having Gene join our staff," Tuberville said. "He has been extremely successful as a defensive coordinator and a secondary coach. I think he will be a great fit for our staff and program."

Campaigns begin for 2002-2003 SGA elections

A low number of student applications for Student Government 2002-2003 elections may leave students with a smaller voting selection.

Current student body President Marco Pena is running for another year, but with a different team: Brian Kirlew for student body vice president and Brian Battles for vice presidential candidate.

Last year, Pena ran his campaign with candidates Katie Campbell and Tommy Shavers, and received 56.4 percent of the votes in the run-off elections. Coincidentally, the Pena team ran against Battles, who received only 43.5 percent of the votes.

Kirlew, current senate president pro-tempore, said the PKB ticket will be mostly concerned with "continuing to fund as many clubs and organizations, as possible." College of Health and Public Affairs Sen. Anthony Tsonis and Resident Assistant Tyler Fisher are also running for student body president.

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





That's because Antunes, a management information systems major, co-owns and operates GrabABargain.com, Inc.

The site is an alternative to traditional auction sites such as ebay. It serves as a fixed-price, person-to-person, marketplace for books, music, movies and video games. Antunes plans to further expand into consumer electronics and computers.

Antunes said, "Fixed prices save people the hassle of bidding, waiting for the auction to close and possibly loosing the item."

For the most part, Antunes keeps his schoolwork and his business separate.

Colleen Holuk, a GrabABargain.com representative, said, "Jeff just uses the information he learns in class and applies it in GrabABargain.com. There really aren't any teachers that he talks with about his business."





Antunes said: "GrabABargain allows people to build relationships and a sense of community. Buyers can write sellers and get feedback on products before they buy."

GrabABargain only charges the seller a 15 percent commission on all things sold. Other similar sites charge each time an item changes hands.

Also, the site minimizes fraud by doing everything themselves. Antunes said: "We process our own transactions and handle our own customer service. The seller only has to package and ship the item, the buyer only has to buy it. We do the rest."

Valentine's Day

A tiny village in Quebec is named Saint-Valentin, reportedly because the first mass was held there on Valentine's Day in 1810. Today, the town named for the patron saint of lovers is a popular destination for letters sent by stamp collectors looking for unusual postmarks to add to their collection. Permission was granted by the Canada Post to let Saint-Valentin use a special heart-shaped postmark. In 1999, collectors throughout Quebec and other Canadian provinces sent more than 6,000 Valentine's Day cards to get the special stamp.

During the late 1800s, postage rates around the world dropped, and the obscene St. Valentine's Day card became popular, despite the Victorian era being otherwise very prudish. As the numbers of racy valentines grew, several countries banned the practice of exchanging Valentine's Days cards. During this period, Chicago's post office rejected more than 25,000 cards on the grounds that they were so indecent, they were not fit to be carried through the U.S. mail.

The Chocolate Manufacturers Association of America says that 36 million boxes of chocolate are sold for Valentine's Day. According to Hershey's Chocolate Company, Valentine's Day ranks fourth in sales behind Halloween, Christmas and Easter.

The first American publisher of valentines was printer and artist Esther Howland. During the 1870s, her elaborate lace cards were purchased by the wealthy, as they cost a minimum of \$5 - some sold for as much as \$35. Mass production eventually brought prices down, and the affordable "penny valentine" became popular with the lower classes.

In Japan, St. Valentine's Day is a day when women give the special men in their lives boxes of chocolate. To balance this practice, White Day was invented by the confectionery industry for men to reciprocate such gifts. While Valentine's Day is an imported event, White Day, celebrated one month later on March 14, is purely a Japanese creation.

In the Middle Ages, one Valentine's Day custom was for young men and women to draw names from a bowl to see who their valentines would be. They would then wear these names on their sleeves for one week. "To wear your heart on your sleeve" now means that it is easy for other people to know how you are feeling.

In the United States, 64 percent of men do not make plans in advance for a romantic Valentine's Day with their sweet-

V-Day campaign organized to end violence against women

UCF will join more than 500 schools across the world in a movement known as the V-day College Campaign. 2002 Students and members of the UCF community will perform UCF's first off-Broadway production of Eve Ensler's, "The Vagina Monologues." The play, a compilation of 200 interviews with women from ages 6 to 80, is based on women's personal experiences with rape, incest, genital mutilation, oppression and abuse.

The V-day 2002 College Campaign is an organized response among colleges and universities across the world to end violence against women. The V-day College Campaign formed as an outgrowth of Ensler's original V-day movement that pushed to increase violence awareness and raise money to revitalize anti-violence organizations. Created in 1997, the V-day College Initiative began with just 65 schools. In its fourth year, the College Initiative has transformed into the V-day College Campaign with 550 schools participating worldwide.

day co-coordinator, said: "It started with the big V-day, but Ensler realized that the movement needed to trickle down. The College Initiative gives "The Vagina Monologues" to colleges to perform under set guidelines and asks schools to donate proceeds they collect to local shelters."

Ninety percent of the proceeds UCF collects through tick-

et sales and merchandise profits will benefit three non-profit organizations in Orlando. The Harbor House, a local domestic violence center, the Sexual Assault Treatment Center, a local organization that provides free rape exams, and The Healing Tree/Sexual Trauma Recovery Center, a counseling center for survivors of sexual assault will receive the majority of funds. Proceeds will also benefit UCF's Victim Services, free comprehensive and confidential services to UCF students who are victims of crime. A small percentage of proceeds will assist Afghan women through a fund that sponsors medical care and education. The Clothesline Project will also be at the performances displaying T-shirts decorated with personal expressions of women who have been victims of sexual violence and assault.

Sponsored by UCF's Victim Services and REACH Peer Education, "The Vagina Monologues" will run for three nights directed, produced and performed by students and members of the UCF community. More than 50 women auditioned for the-play within four days. The production will be performed by a cast of 18; Patria Alguila, Anna Ambrose, Lucy Ray Bancroft, Kayli Carter, Jamie Chiaccio, Karen Clay, LaShay Harvey, Tamisha King, Terri Langford, Tracy Makens, Dorothy Pecoraro, Linda Potkovic, Megan Reiplinger, Maureen Harmon-Schaefer, Rae Taylor, Erin Vertolli, Jenny Wadley and Kimberly Carter-Williams.

Chiaccio said: "We were amazed how many women turned out for it. Nobody is paid for any of this, it is all strictly voluntary. A lot of women who aren't on the cast are still promoting the show in other ways. We are so proud of our cast and crew because they've really taken the cause on as their own."

Megan Reiplinger, a junior and cast member said: "When I first saw 'The Vagina Monologues' performed in Detroit, it was an amazing experience. When I left, I felt proud to be a woman. As an actor, I jumped at the chance to be involved in this."

Chiaccio believes the enthusiasm and the motivation that the cast and crew have shown is a common attitude among most at UCF.

"I think UCF is a very vagi-

na-friendly community," she said. "We have a lot of teachers from UCF and Valencia offering students extra credit to see it."


Chiaccio added, "And, Orlando happens to be on the map of vagina-friendly cities."

What Chiaccio is referring to is Orlando's efforts in preventing violence and providing victim services and the university's initiative to develop programs in victim assistance and domestic violence.

Chiaccio said: "I see people everyday who really care about these issues. Orlando has a very active lethality review team. At UCF, the sociology graduate program offers students a domestic violence certificate program, one of the only schools in the nation to have it. Members of the sociology department constantly work to get grants for services that provide help to victims of violence."

She said: "A lot of the resistance that other communities have faced have been quelled by letting people know that these are real women's stories. I think if 'The Vagina Monologues' is offensive, then so is life, because

everything on stage is a true story."

The 90-minute production will include several monologues like "Reclaiming the Cunt," a monologue that reinforces the word "vagina" as a positive term, "My Angry Vagina," which describes the modern-day woman's frustration with tampons, thong underwear and gynecology visits, and "Hair," a woman's struggle to make her husband happy by shaving her pubic hair.

Chiaccio explains that while the performances are immensely entertaining, the underlying purpose of the monologues is to teach respect and awareness.

She said: "It's important to teach people that the word vagi-


na is not a dirty word, it's a body part. For some reason we make up really weird names for the vagina and this play really takes the stigma off the word.

"It is very empowering for young women to see this, because as women, we are always trying to hide or change our bodies. As women, we modify what we wear and where we go. Can you imagine what it would be like if women never had to worry about being victimized?"

Rae Taylor, a graduate student and cast member said: "The most profound reason for this performance is you rediscover how blessed it is to be a woman and it makes all things that are womanly less taboo."

Anna Ambrose, a senior and cast member said: "This has

nothing to do with bashing men. We encourage men to come see this because there are some immature attitudes out there, especially among men. I've heard comments like, do we get to see vaginas if we go, or men referring to the production as 'The Pussy Chronicles.' It's for a good cause and it educates people about the experiences that women go through."

New graduate programs planned for 2003

New under graduate programs may include nutrition, space science and technology and sports and fitness

A proposed package of new degree programs will be implemented during 2003 and 2008. UCF will offer several new bachelor's, master's and doctorate degrees.

Dr. Patricia Bishop, Vice Provost and Dean of Graduate Studies, said the plan includes degrees in four areas

where the university needs further research development.

Bishop said, "The deans decided we wanted to emphasize programs in environmental sciences, biological and health services, social sciences and space science and technology.

Some of the highly ranked proposed degree programs include master's degrees in urban regional planning, nonprofit management, exercise physiology, K-8 math and science, marriage and family counseling, forensic science and creative writing. Doctorate programs such as criminal justice, economics and aerospace engineering may be possible.

New bachelor's programs

may include nutrition, space science and technology and sport and fitness.

The growth of the UCF graduate studies program will require additional faculty members. Bishop explained: "To keep up with the growth, we have to keep hiring new faculty. For most of these programs existing faculty will be used when possible."

Future programs such as forensic science already have faculty in place. Students in this field currently receive a degree in chemistry. A proposed master's program in creative writing will be taught entirely online, not requiring any additional faculty.

Bishop said UCF would

hire the faculty over several years for programs such as biomedical engineering and film.

She said, "We are anticipating starting five or six new programs per year; bachelor's, master's and doctoral."

UCF currently has 20 doctorate programs. Bishop says if the plan is followed, UCF will eventually have between 25 and 30 doctoral programs.

Bishop said the new programs offer UCF a tremendous opportunity for working with and serving the Central Florida community. The new programs would encourage professionals in various fields to return to school to seek higher degrees.



Economists Raise Outlook for 2002

Economists are becoming more optimistic about the outlook for 2002.

According to Blue Chip Economic Indicators, a monthly newsletter that tracks the consensus of 52 business economists, forecasters now expect the economy to grow 1.5% in 2002. Last month, these economists predicted 1% growth. It was the first time in 11 months that they increased their forecast.

If these economists are right, the growth rate would still be well below the robust 4% rates that marked the late 1990s. But the recent upward shift in expectations is still meaningful, not only for Wall Street but for Washington. For example, it means policy makers in Washington are substantially more pessimistic than the private sector is about the economic outlook. In its budget released last week, the Office of Management and Budget predicted 0.7% growth in 2002. The Congressional Budget Office predicts 0.8% growth.

If the economy performs better than these estimates, it could mean that the White House projection of a \$106 billion budget deficit for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30 is overstated. Stronger-than-expected growth implies stronger-than-expected tax revenue. Of course, unpredictable government spending will also play a large hand in determining the deficit outlook.

Nokia, Samsung Lead Ailing Sector

In the worst year in the history of the mobile-phone industry, Nokia Corp. and Samsung Electronics Co. were the only top-ranking mobilephone makers to both gain market share and make money during 2001, according to new research.

Market leader Nokia lifted its share of global shipments to 36% from 31% in 2000, while still maintaining an operating margin of 20%, according to figures collated by Strategy Analytics. (Nokia puts its 2001 market share at 37%.) The Boston research firm estimated that Samsung achieved an operating margin of 15%, while boosting its market share to 7% from 5%, ng it the third-larg in 2001, behind second-place Motorola Inc. Most other leading handset makers lost money during 2001, according to Strategy Analytics.

Oil Spill: Wal Mart Overtakes Exxon

Bentonville, Ark., has become home of the world's largest company: Wal Mart Stores Inc. has overtaken Exxon Mobil Corp. as the biggest company, based on sales. The discount retailer posted sales of \$218 billion for the fiscal year ended Jan. 31, compared with \$212.9 billion for the oil giant. Wal Mart's coronation is partly the result of its own growth, partly the result of lower oil prices last year for Exxon Mobil.

Tech Ideas Thrive Despite Market

Digital Camera Shakeup, Balloon for Cellphones Make Debut at Show



ome people think the sour stock market and dot-com collapse slowed technological innovation.

But despite a significant plunge in venture-capital funding, and spending cuts by big corporations, scientists and entrepreneurs are still improving hardware, software and technologybased services at a frantic rate. New evidence was expected to emerge this week in Phoenix, at an annual conference called Demo that helped launch many Internetbased companies in the 1990s. Though some exhibitors from past shows are no longer in existence, there is no shortage of business ideas this year.

Among them:

• Foveon Inc. says it has achieved a breakthrough in digital photography, one that could dramatically improve picture quality while changing the industry's economics. Foveon's chip technology, which captures images more efficiently than existing digital cameras, is expected to make possible multipurpose devices that take both high-quality still and video images. Eventually, some mass-market cameras with chips made by Foveon, Santa Clara, Calif., could cost less than conventional film Foveon's Camera Breakthrough



How Foveon's technology works: Light goes through the lens and hits a Foveon X3 image sensor chip. Pixels on the chip have light detectors located at different depths in the silicon, able to detect red, green and blue. Because each pixel can detect all three colors, the image is more accurate, and there's no

• ArrayComm Inc., a San Jose, Calif., company founded by cellphone pioneer Marty Cooper, is touting a future wireless network that exploits special antennas to send data at one million bits a second-20 times faster than the nextgeneration cellular system known as 3G.

• Linden Lab, a San Francisco start-up backed by software pioneer Mitch Kapor, has an idea for a kind of animated online world that consumers help create. Paid subscribers will design their own three-dimensional appearances, living spaces, and social and economic rules to play by.

• PrivaSys Inc., also of San

Francisco, has created a credit card with a tiny display and buttons that can consolidate multiple credit and debit cards into one while using existing card-reading devices in stores and restaurants.

• Space Data Corp., of Chandler, Ariz., is exploring the possibility of floating specially equipped weather balloons to bring wireless communications to remote areas.

• Evolution Robotics is working on a special-purpose operating system for robots, solving problems such as machine vision and navigation.

Private Eyes Bid to Track Students

oreign students, already facing scrutiny on campus from the FBI, could soon find themselves under the watchful eyes of private gumshoes.

Background-check companies and bounty hunters are among the businesses vying for contracts from the Immigration and Naturalization Service to help track foreign students who come to the U.S. on student visas. Such surveillance is a top priority in Washington since the discovery that some of the Sept. 11 hijackers came here on student visas and didn't pursue their study plans.

Central to the INS's plans is a new database that would monitor all 547,000 foreign students in the U.S. So far, a pilot-project data base covering 32 schools in five states tracks when foreign students arrive in the U.S. and enroll at their schools, but it doesn't check class attendance. (The rest of the nation's colleges and universities submit enrollment records to the INS on paper.)

One company competing for data base contract, ChoicePoint Inc., a big collector of information about credit-card holders, also proposes establishing phone banks that would call schools to verify that students have enrolled and are attending classes. "If the student is not regularly attending class, we're going to locate the student at his last, best known address," a company spokesman says.

A big issuer of bail-bonds, Capital Bonding Corp., plans to suggest that students entering the U.S. be required to purchase a \$10,000 immigration bond and to check in periodically. If the students fail to show up in its system, the company would send one of its 700 bail agents or 500 bounty hunters to find them. The group already monitors more than 10,000 foreign nationals who were required to buy immigration bonds because of visa violations.

Plans to increase surveillance of students are drawing critics. Some international education groups argue that tracking students—but not tourists and other visa-holders—is intrusive and inefficient.

"Having a bunch of gumshoes running around making sure they get up at seven and go to class is silly," says a spokesman for the Association of International Educators.

Vaccine Shortages

Are at Crisis Level

Severe shortages of vaccines for eight of the 11 vaccine-preventable diseases have led to the worst crisis in the 29-year history of the government's National Immunization Program.

Children across the country are being turned away by pediatricians who have run out of shots largely because of manufacturing snafus at Merck & Co., American Home Products Corp. and Aventis SA.

"If this continues much longer or worsens, we will have a major health crisis," said Adm. Walter Orenstein, chief of immunizations at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. "We've got to hope we come out of this as soon as possible." Some shortages are worsening. A rising tide of whooping cough in the U.S. has made the scarcity of pertussis vaccine particularly problematic. Twenty years ago, there were just 2,000 cases a year in the U.S. of whooping cough. In 2000, there were 8,000 cases, according to the CDC. No one knows whether the increased number of cases is related to the vaccine shortage, but top health officials are worried.

The CDC has begun rationing. Supplies of tetanus and diphtheria vaccines have been limited to hospitals, emergency rooms and public health departments, with hospitals limited to just 300 doses a month. Booster shots—once common when kids cut themselves with rusty nails—have been eliminated.

"There are lots of ways for innovation to see the light of day," says Carver Mead, the chip pioneer who is Foveon's chairman. His company is a kind of joint spinoff from National Semiconductor Corp. and Synaptics Inc., another company founded by Dr. Mead, with additional money from a venture capital firm.

Foveon started by selling highend digital cameras, but attracted more attention for using standard chip manufacturing to make the But Foveon hid some bigger news. Up to now, image sensors have been composed of tiny cells—

sensors that capture images in dig-

ital cameras.

called pixels, or picture elements – that each contain a single light detector. To capture color, red, green or blue filters must be laid across each pixel in the grid, meaning each pixel could detect just one primary color. That requires extra processing by the camera to extrapolate real-world color combinations. Consequently, prints from mass-market digital cameras often are slightly blurry or marred by color oddities.

Foveon's engineers, exploiting the fact that silicon chips absorb different colors at different depths, designed image sensors that manage to capture all three basic colors at each pixel. Besides bringing greater clarity, its sensors can eliminate the need for extra processing chips that boost the cost.

The first to use Foveon's chips is Sigma Corp. of Japan. Its initial camera is expected to cost more than \$3,000, but Foveon believes models for under \$1,000 will appear by year's end. That will require Foveon to sell its technology to big camera makers such as Eastman Kodak Co. Madahv Mehra, director of digital capture systems in Kodak's professional products group, said it is in the early stages of evaluating the technology. But if it works as advertised, he said it could have broad industry impact.



have come from a slave owner given to our ancestors upon arrival to this country.



· Following a hearing in Pasadena, Calif., a federal appeals court ruled in January that convicted marijuana smuggler Gary H. Marolf (who is now serving 10 years in prison) was entitled to \$400,000 compensation because drug agents had not given him a required document when they legally confiscated the boat he used for smuggling. Agents were required to give the boat owner formal legal "notice" of the confiscation but gave it to Marolf's co-defendant instead, and when it was revealed that Marolf was the sole owner, the agents failed to follow up. (The boat brought only \$100,000 when it was subsequently sold at auction.)

· Researchers at Kinki University (Nara, Japan) announced in January that they had successfully bred spinach genes into pigs (the first mammal-plant combination) and claimed that the resulting meat would be "more healthy" than normal pork. "But," added Professor Akira Iritani, "the significance of this success is more academic than practical."

Scamming in America's darkest hour

In December, the Days Inn hotel in Hicksville, N.Y. (near JFK airport), agreed to a fine and refunds to settle charges that, in the days after Sept. 11, it billed people stranded by the air-travel shutdown up to \$399 a day for its \$139 rooms.

And The New York Times reported in October that Providence Inc., a Cincinnati firm that lends money to victims in anticipation of litigation, sent at least 76 relatives of Sept. 11 victims portfolios containing gifts of up to \$200, along with a

• "Fat Finger" Syndrome: A Nov. 30 typing error exposed the financial services firm UBS Warburg to losses of up to \$100 million. In one of 2001's largest initial public offerings, for the Japanese company Dentsu, a UBS Warburg trader typed a sell order of 610,000 shares at only 16 yen each, instead of 16 shares at 610,000 yen. Since UBS Warburg was running the IPO, it had to make up the difference by buying back the sold shares on the open market. The order was canceled minutes later, but so many shares had traded during the interim that UBS Warburg bought at a heavy loss.

Smooth reactions

· A judge in Hull, Quebec, ordered a stripper-defendant to sit in the very back of the courtroom in her November theft trial, in that a witness was having trouble testifying because the dancer flirted with him constantly from the defense table. The witness, professional gambler Terry Leblanc, 34, had said the woman was his first real girlfriend and the taker of his virginity and that he remained so smitten with her that in an earlier court appearance, he literally swooned on the stand as she continually winked and air-kissed him.

• Pro boxer Waxxem Fikes, 35, who spent five days in jail in Akron, Ohio, in October after being arrested for aggressively complaining to an employee of Swenson's restaurant that his cheeseburger was not properly prepared, was acquitted of assault in his December trial. The employee had charged that the 6-foot-2, 240-pound Fikes was belligerent, but Fikes testified that he merely "told (the employee) I expect the onions to be crisp, tender and succulent, and bursting with flavor, (and) they were not. (T)he (employee) had no compassion for what I was talking about." · In October, Kew Gardens, N.Y., rape defendant William Scott sucker-punched his lawyer Harold Ehrentrew in the face because, as he explained to the judge, "(T)his man is not doing his job. That's why I had to smack the ("s-," according to a New York Post report) out of him in front of these jurors." Observers believe that Scott was perturbed that damning DNA evidence had just been admitted against him.

in Odessa for 16 years, stood on a chair at a pre-Thanksgiving event last year and screamed at the food recipients that they should all be showing more gratitude for the charity they were receiving. (She resigned a few days later.)

And in December, according to residents at an Edmonton, Alberta, homeless shelter, Alberta's Premier Ralph Klein, in an unscheduled latenight visit, swore at some residents, told them to get jobs, and derisively tossed money on the floor as he left. (A few days later, Klein said the inci-. dent was the result of his drinking problem.)

Least competent criminals

Nine months ago, the Virginia Supreme Court ordered a new trial for death-row murderer Paul Warner Powell, 23, because the prosecutor had improperly described his crime to the jury in order to legally qualify Powell for the death penalty. Powell (already serving three life terms for rape) then wrote a victory letter to the prosecutor, taunting him for his failure to make the death penalty stick. However, in the course of that

letter. Powell allegedly inadvertently confessed to precisely the one detail of the case that the prosecutors needed to legitimately file death-penalty charges, namely that he did in fact attempt to sexually molest the victim before killing her. Thus, in December, prosecutors announced Powell's retrial would again be a capital case.

Recurring themes

• News of the Weird reported in 1999 on a pervert who menaced a McDonald's in Milwaukee by calling up the female manager, pretending to be a police officer, and guiding her by telephone through a strip search of a male employee, who he said should be checked out for theft. The caller was never caught, and a man using a similar modus operandi struck twice in September 2000 at fast-food restaurants in Bismarck, N.D.

In December 2001, yet another incident occurred at the Arby's in Noblesville, Ind., when a "police cracy established a requirement that officer" called the female manager and asked her to strip search a certain female employee while he was

on the phone, while asking the employee impertinent questions, and then later that month, the same thing happened in Billings, Mont., at a business the Billings Gazette did not identify. (The Gazette later reported that it had received a follow-up inquiry from authorities in Charleston, W.Va., as a caller had struck a restaurant there, too.)

• A 43-year-old man was found guilty of bullying his daughter (now 18) by roughhousing her throughout her childhood (Cardiff, Wales, November).


"William Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet" (1997)

Golden Knights 4-1 in Triple Crown Classic

The UCF softball team (6-3) won four straight after dropping the first game of the tournament to Mississippi. The Golden Knights exacted revenge on the Rebels in the Gold Medal game, which pitted the No. 3 and No. 4 seeds against each other.

UCF battled back Sunday with a two-out rally in the bottom of the sixth inning after falling behind Ole Miss, 2-1, in the top of the inning. Sarah Miller hit a single to center field that scored Dottie Cupp and Tepora Hess and put the Golden Knights up 3-2. Stephanie Best added an insurance run on an RBI single to center that scored Nikki

Green.

The win gave UCF third place in the tournament behind Georgia and Purdue.

The Ole Miss win was the second game in which UCF had to come from behind late in the game to win. Against Tennessee on Saturday, UCF was down, 2-1, in the bottom of the seventh inning when Hess hit a sacrifice fly that scored Lindsey Manz, sending the game into extra innings.

In the bottom of the eighth Lindsay Bush reached on a walk before Jania Shinhoster hit a walkoff two-run homerun, her second of the tournament. UCF won 4-2. Cupp picked up the win in both of those games.

"I thought if we were at least 2-2 through this part of the tournament that'd be great," UCF Coach Renee Gillispie said. "We're outdoing what are expectations were. It's good to see the kids have the focus to go after someone like Tennessee."

In the early game on Saturday, UCF beat Bethune-Cookman, 4-2. Hess went 3-for-3 with 4 RBIs in the win. Pysha Simmons picked up her first win of the season with a complete game. She only gave up four hits.

Friday UCF split two games, losing to Ole Miss in the early game, and then mercy killing Marshall in the nightcap. Lindy Oakley picked up the win against Marshall, throwing a complete game, giving up only one hit and no earned runs. UCF had 12 hits in the game. Hess went 3for-3, while Bush and Stephanie Best both went 2-for-3 in the 9-1 win.

"I think the Marshall game finally gave our hitters confidence," Gillispie said. "We needed for them to open up on somebody and finally get a chance to see they can swing and they can get hard hits. That was a good game for us to get in before we played Tennessee."

Shinhoster's first homerun of the season came in the, 3-2, Ole Miss loss. The only other run the Golden Knights scored in that game was on a bases-loaded walk.

Mascoe heads linebacker signees

The positions where UCF will be most inexperienced next year are linebacker and defensive back. All three starting linebackers are gone and so are three starting defensive backs. The Golden Knights got immediate help at linebacker, but signed only one defensive back.

UCF's leading tackler each of the past two years, Tito Rodriguez, is one of the linebackers who graduated. Junior college transfer Chad Mascoe, from Southwest Mississippi Community College, will replace him. Masco is 6 feet 2 inches tall and 250 pounds, and will be one of the most decorated athletes ever to wear the black and gold.

"UCF has struck gold in signing Masco," recruiting expert Bill Buchalter said, "what a steal for the Knights."

Mascoe graduated from Osceola high school, where he played quarterback, linebacker, wide receiver, running back and safety. The Journal-Atlanta Constitution, Orlando Sentinel, Florida Times-Union and other publications listed Mascoe as one of their top prospects.

"He could play anywhere," UCF Coach Mike Kruczek said. "He runs inside out on anybody. We didn't place him in Southwest Mississippi, Florida State did. Florida State wanted him back. We got him. He's going to be a great big piece of the puzzle on that side of the football."

The Golden Knights also signed two other linebackers, both of the smaller, faster variety.

breaks people down. So that gives us the three linebackers that we wanted."

Chris Pilinko, Rodriguez's backup last year, will move to the strong side and will compete for the starting job with numerous other players.

"It's kind of wide open between Gerren Brey, Lemec Bernard, Pilinko, and Stanford Rhule," Fountain said. "We'll find a match. That's where the competition is going to be going on."

The weak side linebacker spot will likely belong to junior Antoine Poe.

At defensive back, UCF's only signee was Chad Breeden, who is 6-foot-1, 180 pounds and from Mayfield, Ohio. Breeden is a hard hitter who will probably redshirt next year. Breeden's signing was one of the most important for UCF. He is the first player from Ohio to sign with the Golden Knights.

"We're starting to branch into the Midwest," Kruczek said. "We play in that area in the MAC Conference so I think it's critical that we get up there. There's great football and great tradition up in Ohio and Illinois and Indiana. You'll see more kids from up in that area."

Filling in for the departed defensive backs should not be a problem this season. Asante Samuel has started at cornerback the last two years. Carlos Thompson played the nickel cornerback spot last year and should replace Travis Fisher next year. The coaches also like Omar Laurence and Rovel Hamilton.

"Hamilton is going to be a sophomore, and we feel ne's as good a talent as Asante Samuel," Fountain said.

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Tywin Kalandyke and Ronnell Sandy both way about 210 pounds, but can run. With plenty of depth a linebacker, both will have time to mature.

"They should definitely coach Scott redshirt," Fountain said.

Kruczek said: "Ty Kalandyke's a stereotypical linebacker that the Miami's and the Florida's are looking for; the guys that can run and make plays. He's not very large but he gets there to make a play.

"Ronnell Sandy's another guy that plays the game very aggressively. He's a guy that runs and makes plays. He's not overly big, but when he gets there he

The Golden Knights' most prized offensive line recruit is David Ashkinaz, 6-foot-4, 307 pounds, out of De Anza Community College in California. Ashkinaz is already enrolled in school and will practice during spring.

"(Ashkinaz) benches 500 pounds, has speed like a gazelle, knocks people off the football and plays the game the way you want to," Kruczek said. "He will step in immediately and be a starter for this program."

Ashkinaz will compete with redshirt sophomore Travis Muse, 6-foot-6, 320 pounds, at left guard. He used to play left tackle, but is not worried about switching positions.

"I played left tackle the last four years," Ashkinaz said, "but I'm not 6'6", so I've got to play guard."

Junior college transfers Alex Mendez and Kyle Watkins will compete at both tackle positions. Steve Edwards, last year's starting strong side tackle, graduated.

Mendez, 6-foot-6, 320 pounds, signed with UCF last year but did not qualify academically.

"He's big, and he plays the game the way you like to see it played up inside," Kruczek said. "We're real fortunate to have him coming into this program."

Watkins is one of the tallest players to ever sign with UCF at 6-foot-8. The 340-pounder chose UCF after committing to Iowa State.

"Watkins has tremendous feet," Kruczek said. "He was being recruited by a number of Division 1A programs."

Two other guards also signed; Dan Veenstra from Largo and Seth Ulsh from Ocala. Both are about 6-foot-5, 290 pounds and will likely redshirt.

"Veenstra's exactly what we need," Kruczek said. "He's a very aggressive kid that football means something to, and he's also a great student. He'll be around for five years."

Also likely to redshirt is tackle Larry Peoples from Jacksonville. Rivals.com had him rated No. 88 on its top 100. Peoples is 6-foot-6, but weighs only 290 pounds.

Only one recruit will play center, Cedric Gagne-Marcoux. The 6-foot-3inch, 280-pounder from Canada was recruited as a guard but will move to center.

"We expect Mike Mabry to play center," recruiting coordinator Scott Fountain said. "Cedrick Marcoux we're probably going to move to center because he's a smaller guy."

UCF also signed a tight end, Brennis "Big Country" Smith. With Mario Jackson, Michael Gains and former quarterback Brian Miller already at that position, it is unlikely Smith will see time his first year.

"He doesn't say a whole lot, but he says a whole lot out on the field," Kruczek said. "Can play defensive end but we recruited him to play tight end, a critical area for us."


"I don't think you should go around tooting your own horn," Kragt said. "If you're good, people will know."

Washington's 31 points was a career high and a season high for the entire team. The previous was 27 by Cook in early January.


Big-time win streak



The Fighting Camels scored a season-high 54 points in the second half, shooting 62 percent from the floor and 75 percent from three. The Golden Knights made a run in the final two minutes, but Campbell made most of its free throw attempts late.

Ray Abellard led UCF with 20 points and eight assists, driving past his defender at will. Joey Graham had 18 points, five rebounds, four assists and a block. 




