ways I would more desire to see thee no I think thou
wast never more near me than thou art yet thou art
very near me I very often think of thee with much
tenderness and great love, where with shall I express my
self time will tell, love it is all and in that I know
thou wilt regard it in which I rest giving to thee
and thyne a fresh salutation and kiss of unfeigned love
but shall I omit acknowledging thy fatherly care which
has been mine is so great and I still continued to us
for which I am not able nor can never be able to make
agufficient returne but looke upon my self a
while I have a King thereof my dear Phinias who has
been as a tender father and so I truly honour thee for
I pray thee to put upon me any thing that may be
for thy eye or benefite any way upon the account of
thy younger Children I will do to the utmost of my in-
dorse for them and looke upon my selfe obliged to
so Dear Phinias I have not
