with most affectionate love and I give you and your  
children for your good conversion you gave him of me

This may satisfy you that I Read your letter which was dated  
the 22<sup>nd</sup> of the mo 83 - & I have not seen my master Jims  
I Read yours but I have sent him a letter about it & I do not  
question but you will hear from him ere long & our old  
land Lord Peter Holburn is dead of - 3 - Days sickness  
but what of Distemper was we do not know it was in his  
throat & St Roger Bradsha of hay is dead & your old  
Land Lord Mr Hindley of hall of kinley and your  
son John Hurst & his wife are both dead and as for  
Septer it has been an extraordinary sharp winter to them  
so that I have gotten very little in as yet but I will do  
my endeavour to get it in as soon as I can but it froze  
a quarter of a year together & most of that time extreme  
hard so that most of our neighbours cold Rememb  
it froze so hard before & as for Samuel Mather  
he is at London and his wife if at home but  
she has writ to have her to come to London to him several  
times and says if she would come he would work for her  
right & say before she should want & her would have  
had felt if she would towards paying of debts but she will  
not go for fear he should sell her she if so good  
but stays stilling hours & goes behind hand as it  
thought & says she will stay but we were of that  
time will not permit but Thomas Tillloy is very quiet  
and all this present I have of much custom at this  
shop as we had when you were here this last year  
but I first year it was not so but Thomas shop it

Iore dyebogd for he has shewd som of his customers  
& now I fear from him & the says his wife matz  
him should yet & would faine have som body to get  
her a law — & his Daughter martha if married but not  
of Rogers son & old Amis hardman if dead and Roger hardman  
I married man is dead & of for I money which John  
mason owed it if pay to Nathaniel & Nathaniel sayd he  
would return it over to you but I never had I bond  
and pay Rememb my love to phineas and his wife  
& to Joseph mather & to James Herison and his wife and all  
his familie and old Richard walker & wife Rememb  
there vere love to you w<sup>th</sup> al I best of you & neighbours  
and Roger Filisly is gone to London and I cannot get  
a pony of him but he sayd he would send som money down  
for me & Jithold if gone I cannot tell whether & gerge  
Booth if turned informer and I wold like you write I  
would have you to write more sharply to them for I do  
not heed me and I say what I can to them and  
I desire you to lett us hear from you of oft if you can  
And once more ad maste my dear love to you
