n behalf of the faculty and staff, I can't thank our wonderful alumni and friends enough for your extradordinary support. In 1995, when the New Curriculum was first envisioned, we believed a state-ofthe-art program together with an upgraded facility could attract the best faculty and students. Both judges said they were very pleased with the venue and the hospitality extended to them. I also want to thank State Supreme Court Justices Vincent E. Doyle Jr., who has located his Erie County chambers within the Law School, and Barbara Howe, who conducted Article 81 proceedings in the Letro Courtroom. Our students were able to observe the proceedings - the process by which guardians are appointed for allegedly incapacitated persons. These proceedings dovetailed nicely with a course taught by UB Law Professor Ken Joyce, who helped draft the original statute when he was executive director of the Law Revision Commission. This kind of educational experience is possible only because of our new courtroom.

We look forward to building on our success and continuing to benefit from the active engagement of our alumni in the life of the Law School.
