Dr. Leona Williams Named Val Verde Interim Superintendent

After stormy session on July 26 at approximately 1 a.m. the Val Verde Unified School Board emerged from closed session and announced the appointment of Dr. Leona Williams as the interim Superintendent of the District.

The 81.6 percent growth in the Perris area in the last eight years has meant a big influx of families. These changes have made a significant change in area government, especially in the Val Verde Elementary School District.

Currently the Val Verde Elementary school district serves grades K through 8 and the Perris School District in Perris serves grades 9 through 12.

In June when 69.9 percent of the residents voted to form a Unified School District with Elementary Schools, Junior High Schools and High Schools, they also elected two new and three previous board members to run the new Val Verde Unified School District.

To insure a smooth transition the 1990 Unified Board was seated July 17, and hired outside consultant Dr. Edward Hawkins to make recommendations to unite the two districts. However, many in the community felt that Dr. Leona Williams, the existing Elementary School Board Superintendent was slighted. It was also felt by some members of community that this slight was racially motivated because she is an African-American. Dr. Hawkins was away on vacation and unavailable for comment.

Dr. Hawkins' appointment was much to the dismay of many community members including the 100 member Val Verde teachers union and some members of the existing Elementary School Board lead by Marwood Barkley - Sullivan, Val Verde Elementary School Board Member and unsuccessful candidate for the unified board.

"It was felt by many that the reason Dr. Williams was not chosen was a racial problem,"

said Sullivan who is also Black.

"That isn't true from my perspective," said Vernon Coleman, vice president, community member and the only Black member of the five member Unified Board.

Dr. Dale S. Holmes Riverside County Superintendent of Schools agreed with Coleman saying, "I was present at the meeting and though I can't discuss the closed session, I can say that I have not heard the current board speak anything negative about Dr. Williams."

"In response to the (original) action of the Unified Board (appointing a consultant) the community sought an answer as to why one of such caliber (as Dr. Williams) with a proven track record was not given the opportunity to carry the ball across the goal line," said Sullivan.

According to Sullivan it was "Dr. Leona Williams who tirelessly guided the district through the war of unification and simultaneously repaid the loan that had been obtained in 1985/86 to cover the mismanagement of previous administrations deficit spending two years early."

Sullivan added that Dr. Williams and the elementary board sought to adequately provide facilities for the unified district to facilitate the needs of children including, the construction of the first High School in the district 'Rancho Verde' which was scheduled to be opened July 1, 1990 and The new elementary school, "Mary Mc Cleod Bethune," named after the founder of the National Council of Negro Women, scheduled to open in the fall of 1990. "The elementary school is convertible to a Junior High and will be the first Junior High in the district," said Sullivan.

"In addition to building new schools, upgrading the academic curriculum, and making the Val Verde district more than just another name on the map, she has also increased the academic standing of the students," Sullivan added.

Murray Receives UCRiverside Distinguished Teaching Award

Carolyn Murray, an associate professor of psychology at UC Riverside, has been selected as the recipient of the UCR distinguished Teaching Award for 1989-90.

The award, announced at the recent annual meeting of the UCR Academic Senate, is the highest honor conferred by the faculty body for teaching. It is presented once each year.

In recommending Murray for the honor, the Academic Senate Committee on Distinguished Teaching cited her not only for extraordinarily high praise by students, but for an outstanding record of dedication to student needs and concerns, innovative teaching methods, and for freely giving of her time and effort in community service. As a social psychologist, Murray is heavily involved in research, particularly into factors that may predict underachievement among African-American students.

The research involves an examination of self-handicapping strategies, in

which persons subconsciously create impediments to performance in school. Such strategies ensure that if failure does occur, it is not attributed to the lack of intellectual ability.

They provide a convenient excuse in case of poor performance, and allow for enhanced attributions of competence in case of success.

Murray, an undergraduate advisor in the department of psychology, which challenges traditional techniques, assumptions, and interpretations based

on European-American value systems.

High ranking by students cut equally across the spectrum of lower and upper division, said the faculty panel. From beginning students came such comments as "fantastic," "superb," "I learned much that I am able to apply to my personal life," and "people did not want to leave when it was over."

Upper-division student assessment was equally superlative, as exemplified by such sentiments as "By far, one of the best instructors;" "One of the best courses;" and "She made difficult material easy to learn." Typically, students refer to Murray as "very dynamic," "great lecturer," and "It's like talking to her one-on-one."

Murray involves many undergraduates in her research to acquaint them further with academic regors. She also provides a remarkable 25 independent student courses.

She maintains a busy public speaking schedule, giving talks on education, personal growth and advancement to high school and community college teachers, church groups, child development workers, and many others. She is an active participant in planning meetings and statewide seminars on educational achievement, and

has served as an adviser on multi-cultural education to state legislators.

And, with other faculty, she has taken the lead in developing new and innovative courses and curricula at UC Riverside, said the panel.

If she were to point to any single reason for her success in teaching, it would be her efforts to instill in her students critical thinking and to allow them to express themselves, she said: "My purpose for teaching is for you to realize that there are alternative ways to look at every situation. I don't try to change anyone's attitude. I just want you to realize that everyone sees things differently based on their own perspective and experience."

Real learning, said Murray, is not regurgitating material presented by the instructor. Learning comes through a deep and personal examination of the facts to arrive at your own interpretation, "but only after you have investigated and asked a lot of questions," she said.

Her advice on how to be a successful teacher?

"I don't think style is the issue. Be prepared. Care about your students. Provide exercises to get students to think about issues. And don't be resistant to innovative, creative, or otherwise distastful ideas."

According to sources that wish to remain unnamed, it was the present board's desire to distance itself from Val Verdes unpopular Elementary School Board that prompted them to hire an interim consultant instead of "rubber stamping" Dr. Williams as superintendent.

"Some members on the board wanted to give the board more time to think about it (naming a superintendent) before making a permanent decision," said Coleman.

Coleman gives another reason for the consultant's appointment, that is that she is too overloaded with her current duties. "Due to the fact that she (Dr. Williams) had to run the elementary district and that the additional load might be too much for her," said Coleman. He added, "This was the concern to us. She has now been appointed interim superintendent until February 1, 1990. Then we will be appointing a full-time superintendent."

Dr. Williams said "I am not in a position to give quotes, at this time."

When asked if Dr. Williams would be permanently named to the position he said, "There is nothing to say that she will not be the permanent superintendent. On November 1st the board will decide as to whether or not we will post the position."

If the position is posted Dr. Williams will be able to apply. "We don't know if there is anyone out there who can do the job better, in fact I don't think that there is any one better," said Coleman.

Dr. Holmes said of the appointment that, "We will support her (Dr. Williams) in her current position to the utmost ability of our office. She is extremely enthusiastic and has been very supportive of the district throughout the unification process."

"It is my opinion that Dr. Williams', proven in house track record of professionalism in accomplishing the unification, improved test scores, and building new facilities at a time when money was a problem, will not go unnoticed by the unified board. That all of these considerations be given credence in the appointment of Dr. Leona Williams a permanent superintendent" said Sullivan.

When asked if the efforts of the community pressed the board into action Coleman said, "I didn't feel pressured, but the board as a whole did not realize the amount of support that Dr. Williams had with the teachers, previous board, students, and staff. There is a lot of support of her," said Coleman.

"The appointment was made because the community and the supporting organizations felt so strongly that we should retain her, so we did," Coleman said.

Concerning the consultant hired on July 17, 1990 when the

new board elected John McCandless president, John Coleman vice president, and Marla Kirkland clerk. Coleman said that "Dr. Hawkins was an interim consultant only, who could be fired at any time. As far as we are concerned, he is still the interim consultant."

Dr. Holmes said "Dr. Hawkins is still a consultant. He is on vacation, but when he returns he will be assisting Dr. Williams with leg work that she needs to have done."

The controversial Elementary School Board will sit until June 30, 1991. Then the new Unified District will serve children effective July 1, of 1991.

"The Unified Board will have this year to organize, formulate curriculum and facilities to serve the children effective July 1 of 1991. That process includes hiring a superintendent, administrative and classified staff and new teachers.

"The continuity of flow needs to be preserved after the preparation of the elementary district has been made for the students," said Sullivan.

"The implementation of both the plans and facilities started by the Elementary District are of great importance. As we seek to serve each student in the Val Verde Unified District allowing each the opportunity to become academically sound, morally responsible productive citizens of our community," said Sullivan.

The Riverside County Superintendent is the administrative staff to the new board because they are without funds, staff, resources or anything because they are new.

There are those in the community that feel that the County Superintendents office was opposed to the unification of the district prompting law suits, and court action. This is untrue according to Dr. Holmes.

"The plan for the county is for all the school districts to be unified. Three school districts have unified in the last two years and this is the third, said Holmes.

He added that, "The School District Reorganization Commission is currently working with remaining districts; Perris Elementary, Menifee Elementary, Romoland Elementary and Nuevo's Nuvew Union School District, on their plans for unification in the near and distant future. These districts currently are feeders into Perris High School," said Dr. Holmes. He added that "There is a tremendous cooperative in the Perris Valley to unify."

Dr. Leona Williams is currently serving as the Interim Superintendent of Schools for the Val Verde Unified School district. She is the odds-on favorite to receive the permanent appointment the position.

God's Plan: From The Gospel Of Self-Determination

As the keynote speaker at the economic forum of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference's (SCLC) annual convention in Richmond, Virginia on August 8, I will have the opportunity to preach to the nation's leading Black preachers.

I'm going to begin by telling them how much money Blacks have (\$350 billion this year, which is equivalent to the GNP of the ninth richest nation in the world) and how much of our purchasing power we do not spend (about 95 percent) with another Black person.

But speaking before some of the country's best speakers and thinkers, I'll need more than statistics. So I'll ask them to make a choice between the God of Scarcity and the God of Love: "Choose this day whom ye shall serve."

The belief in scarcity gets its power from fear, which, in turn, becomes the essence of our lives and guarantees us unhappiness. Love, on the other hand, is the holiness within ourselves rejoicing over and sharing itself with the holiness in another. Happiness and love are synonymous. Fear and love are complete opposites.

Since God (love) is our only reality, the world of fear and scarcity (the opposite of love) is only an illusion. Therefore, if the material condition of a people is to change, a spiritual

change, arrived at through love and understanding, must occur.

You end a nightmare by simply waking up, don't you? You can also end an illusion by waking up - changing spiritually and simply realizing who you are, not becoming anyone else.

Our last big breakthrough (change) in consciousness came with Rosa Parks and the idea of "civil rights" on December 1, 1955. We knew we were no longer going to sit in the back of buses or be called "boy." But this movement (new consciousness) is bogged down in 1990 in the ego world of politics - man's (and woman's) futile illusion of not needing God.

Ironically, the reason the Black community has not defined economic development as its primary problem is because the Black Church is the backbone

of the civil rights movement and, although there are exceptions, it has not focused on the relationship between spiritual well being and economic determination the way it did on segregation as a form of evil.

"Most people consider life a battle, but it is not a battle, it is a game.

"It is a game, however, which cannot be played successfully without the knowledge of spiritual law, and the old and the New Testaments give the rules of the game with wonderful clearness. Jesus Christ taught that it was a great game of Giving and Receiving.

"Whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap." This means that whatever man sends out in word or deed, will return to him; what he gives, he will receive," writes Florence Scovel Schinn in *The Game Of Life And How To Play It*.

However, instead of "playing the game" and prospering, many of us are singing "You Can Have All The World, But Give Me Jesus." If it were God's plan that Black people constitute one-third of all Americans living below the poverty level, why then did He give us \$350 billion this year? And why does He plan to give us \$900 billion by the year 2000, 10 years from now?

God has done His part; He clearly loves us. But in our quest for freedom from poverty are we relating to this God (reality) of plenty?

Every apple, every Mercedes car, every fur coat, every dollar bill or new home was put on this earth by God - not by White people. God (love/reality) is our source of supply.

But if you believe in the high god of poverty, he will lavish it on you. If you want nothing, you will get plenty of it. That's not God. That's our ego (the devil in us) creating another illusion.

It is certainly not God's Will. Jesus the Christ set forth a blend of economic and spiritual

laws (Luke 4:16-31), which He learned from His Father, God the Creator, at the start of His ministry.

"Physician, heal thyself," exclaims Jesus in Luke 4:23, instructing us to help ourselves. He then placed the responsibility for preaching this gospel in the hands of His followers in Acts 1:7,8.

Today, the fate of Black America is in the hands of Black Christian pastors and muslim Imams. Every Sunday morning at 11 a.m., 21 million (two-thirds of all Blacks) attended 65,000 Black Churches. The Kingdom of God is literally and figuratively right in front of us.

Since 1985, I've been explaining to church leaders that they (and the Black community) are losing 95 percent of the consumer spending of their congregations each week. "God's Buy Freedom Plan" - the redistribution of each church congregation's consumer purchasing power - is my solution.

Under this plan of reality, each church member will be asked to spend as much as he or she can (up to 50 percent) out of their regular weekly budget with a pre-screened group of businesses (Buy Freedom Businesses - BFBs).

"God's Plan" will not only stop our financial hemorrhaging, but will create (and recirculate) new income for the church from a 10 percent tithe on the increase in the net profit of each participating business. In turn, these BFBs will be obligated to offer jobs to members of the congregation when, and if, these businesses expand.

Congressman Brown Calls On Hammock To Reveal Ties

Congressman George E. Brown, Jr. (D-San Bernardino/Ontario/Riverside) said that there exist "deeply troublesome ties" between Robert Hammock and the Blue Jay Village Corporation, which reportedly has defaulted on a \$3.093 million second trust deed. As a result of that default, a Los Angeles real estate lender is foreclosing on the village, putting the property up for public auction. Brown said, "There appears to be an extensive and complex web of connections between Hammock, the Blue Jay Village Corporation, the Corporation's owner, H.R. Kaufman, and two other of Kaufman's companies, the chronically-troubled Pioneer Take Out (chicken franchiser), and Arrowhead Pacific Savings and Loan, which was closed by federal regulators in May. For all I know, this financial disaster warrants an investigation by the Office of Thrift Supervision."

Stating that "the voters need to know more about Hammock's close ties with these failed institutions," Brown repeated his call from Hammock to publicly disclose all information about the business operations of his wholly-owned corporation, Ankarapa, which, according to Brown, "was involved in hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of real estate development activity during the period that Hammock was pushing for the Blue Jay development on the Board of Supervisors."

Brown charged that Robert Hammock championed this failed development project, and that he had received substantial campaign contributions from the Blue Jay Village Corporation, and two other H.R. Kaufman firms involved in the Blue Jay development:

Pioneer Take Out and Arrowhead Savings and Loan in Blue Jay. Specifically, Brown noted that Hammock received the following campaign contributions:

According to Brown, Blue Jay was one of the most controversial developments in San Bernardino County during the past decade. Located in Hammock's supervisorial district, the Blue Jay development on Lake Arrowhead in the San Bernardino Mountains was an issue of considerable debate by the San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors. "Hammock pushed the project forward every step of the way, in spite of strong concerns about its environmental impact and economic viability of the project," said Brown.

The Blue Jay Village Corporation's development plans were discussed during more than 10 meetings of the San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors in the 1983-84 time frame. According to Brown, "The record of those deliberations shows that Bob Hammock was the Blue Jay Corporation's best friend on the Board. Had Hammock not been pushing for this project, we might never have seen today's news stories about the foreclosure of Blue Jay."

Brown's FEC Report Outside Interests

Supervisor Bob Hammock, a candidate for Congress in Riverside and San Bernardino's 36th Congressional District, said that incumbent Rep. George Brown's Federal Election Commission Report of Receipts and Disbursements shows that Brown has been bought and paid for by special interests based far outside the 36th Congressional District.

"George Brown's FEC report shows that he's received nearly 75 percent of his campaign money from outside the 36th Congressional District," said Supervisor Hammock. "George Brown is clearly bought and paid for by special interests and political action committees. The people of San Bernardino and Riverside counties have every right to wonder exactly who George Brown represents, particularly when they look at where he gets his money and how he votes on the issues."

In his most recent FEC report, covering the period of May 17 - June 30, Rep. Brown reported that he raised \$55,695 (72.2) from PACs, and \$20,527 (26.6 percent) from individuals. Among the PACs to contribute

to Rep. Brown were the Human Rights Campaign Fund, a homosexual rights organization; the National Abortion Rights Action League; the Peanut Butter & Nut Processors PAC; the American Sugar Beet Growers; and the American Horse Council PAC.

"By accepting outside PAC money, speaking fees, honoraria, and voting himself a huge pay-raise, George Brown shows us who he really represents in Congress: special interests, political action committees, and himself," continued Hammock. "George Brown is clearly dependent on this special interest PAC money, and they clearly expect him to vote their way because of their big contributions. After looking at his FEC report, it's safe to say that the people of Riverside and San Bernardino counties do not have a representative in Congress because George Brown really represents Washington special interests."

Bob Hammock's report from the same reporting period showed that Hammock received \$100,309 (86.7 percent) from individual contributors, and \$10,500 (9 percent) from PACs.

PTSD Counseling Offered By Riverside Vet Center & Kaiser

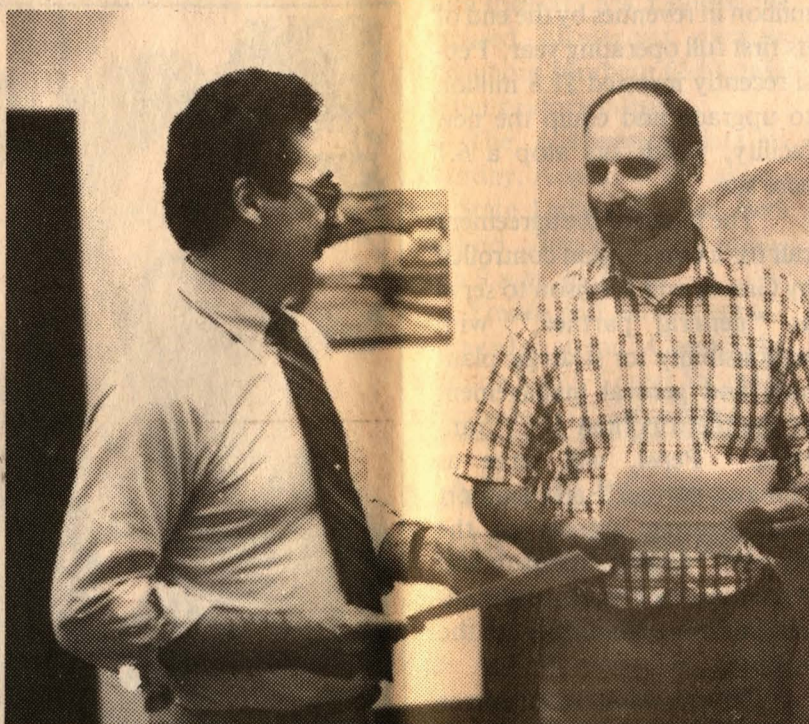
Kaiser Permanente and the Riverside Vet Center will offer Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) counseling beginning in mid-September at the Kaiser Permanente Riverside Medical Center, located at 10800 Magnolia Avenue, Riverside.

The counseling, offered free of charge to Kaiser Permanente Health Plan members and employees, will be conducted by Riverside Vet Center counselors at weekly sessions conducted Thursday evenings starting September 13.

Researchers estimate that as many as 1.5 million Vietnam combat veterans suffer from PTSD, a stress disorder. PTSD symptoms may include mental flashbacks of the war, intense memories and/or recurrent dreams of a traumatic event, and a lack of trust in authority figures.

The joint counseling effort came about from a suggestion by Kaiser Permanente employee and Vietnam veteran Gary Price. Price, who served with the Third Marine Division in Northern I Corps as a tank mechanic (August 1968-July 1969), saw a need for PTSD counseling. "I had read recent newspaper articles which stated that as many as 30 percent of Vietnam combat veterans may suffer varying degrees of PTSD. I approached Kaiser Permanente to assist in the effort because I know that our organization is dedicated to prevent medicine. They were very receptive to the ideas as was the Riverside Vet Center," Price said.

Riverside Vet Center Team Leader Larry Homan is both enthusiastic and optimistic about the joint venture. "To my

It is encouraging to know that even 20 years later, veterans have not been forgotten and they can seek professional help through more than one source," said Homan.

The Medical Directive

Dear Dr. Levister: How can I decide now what type of treatment should occur if I become comatose or unable to make a sound decision concerning my health?

Concerned

Dear Concerned: Each adult has as a part of their rights to self-determination to accept or refuse any recommended medical treatment.

When severely ill, we are often unconscious or otherwise unable to communicate our wishes.

You can organize a medical directive that states your wishes regarding various types of medical treatment in several representative scenarios.

Examples would be in a coma or persistent vegetative state which in the opinion of your physician and several consultants, you have no hope of regaining awareness or higher mental functions, no matter what is done.

If you are in a coma and the opinion of your physician and several consultants you have a small likelihood of recovering brain function fully with a slightly larger likelihood of surviving with permanent brain damage.

There are other scenarios that can be acted out.

The medical directive states your wishes regarding various types of medical treatment in several representative situations and respects your desires. It comes into effect only if you are unable to make decisions or express your wishes.

You can change the directive at any time you wish.

The directive allows you to appoint others to make a medical decision for you if you become unable to make your own - proxy or durable power of attorney.

Your wishes or desires will reflect personal, philosophical and religious views. You should discuss it openly with your physician, your family, friends and/or your religious mentor before completing the forms.

You will need to sign and date it in the presence of two non-related witnesses who also sign and date it. You must ensure that it conforms to the laws of the state in which you live. To obtain legal advice call the State Attorney Generals' office or your personal lawyer.

QUESTION: Can you give me an overview of frozen yogurt?

ANSWER: Frozen yogurt consumption has tripled over the last ten years. You can find this dairy product in the supermarket frozen section or in popular frozen yogurt shops. Consumers seek out yogurt because of the variety of flavors, taste, and the fact that it can be consumed in a number of ways. You can purchase frozen yogurt as low-fat, non-fat, low cholesterol, or reduced calorie.

In addition to these factors, yogurt has some nutritional advantages. Low-fat frozen yogurt contains sixty to eighty percent less fat, no fat if it is non-fat yogurt, calcium, protein, niacin, and B-12. In that yogurt is made from cultured milk, which is lower in lactose, frozen yogurt may be an alternative for individuals experiencing lactose intolerance. It is important to read the nutrition and ingredient labels carefully because some brands may add extra milk or cream to enhance the smoothness. By adding nuts, fudge toppings, cookie pieces or other items, you increase the total calories.

Cloth Vs. Disposable Diapers

How do you choose between cloth and disposable diapers for your baby?

Whichever type of diaper is used, Dr. Alfred T. Lane, associate professor of dermatology at Stanford University Medical Center, advises frequent changes. He says studies have shown that rash frequency and severity were significantly lower when the number of reported diaper changes per day averaged eight or more - regardless of the type of diaper used.

During the last quarter center or so, for the majority of busy parents, a choice between disposable and cloth diapers hasn't really existed at all. Approximately 93 percent of all infants have their bottoms covered with disposable diapers at least part of the time, says Lane.

But in recent years, cloth diapers have been making a comeback of environmental concerns that the disposables contribute needlessly to our nation's pile of solid waste.

"I can't say that solid waste is not an issue, because in fact the 16 billion disposable diapers used every year make up about 3.2 million tons of solid waste, about 2 percent of this country's annual accumulation," says Lane, who specializes in pediatric dermatology. But cloth diapers also contribute to sewage and utilize a significant amount of water to wash them so that they can be reusable," he added.

Nevertheless, disposable diapers are a necessary convenience for most people and have

been shown to help reduce the incidence of diaper rash. "This is particularly true of a new type of diaper which contains an absorbent gelling material," Lane says. Diapers containing this protective material are being sold with labels advertising super absorbent diapers.

Frequency of diaper rash is highest among infants between nine and 12 months. Thirty-eight percent of the kids had a rash reported during that period.

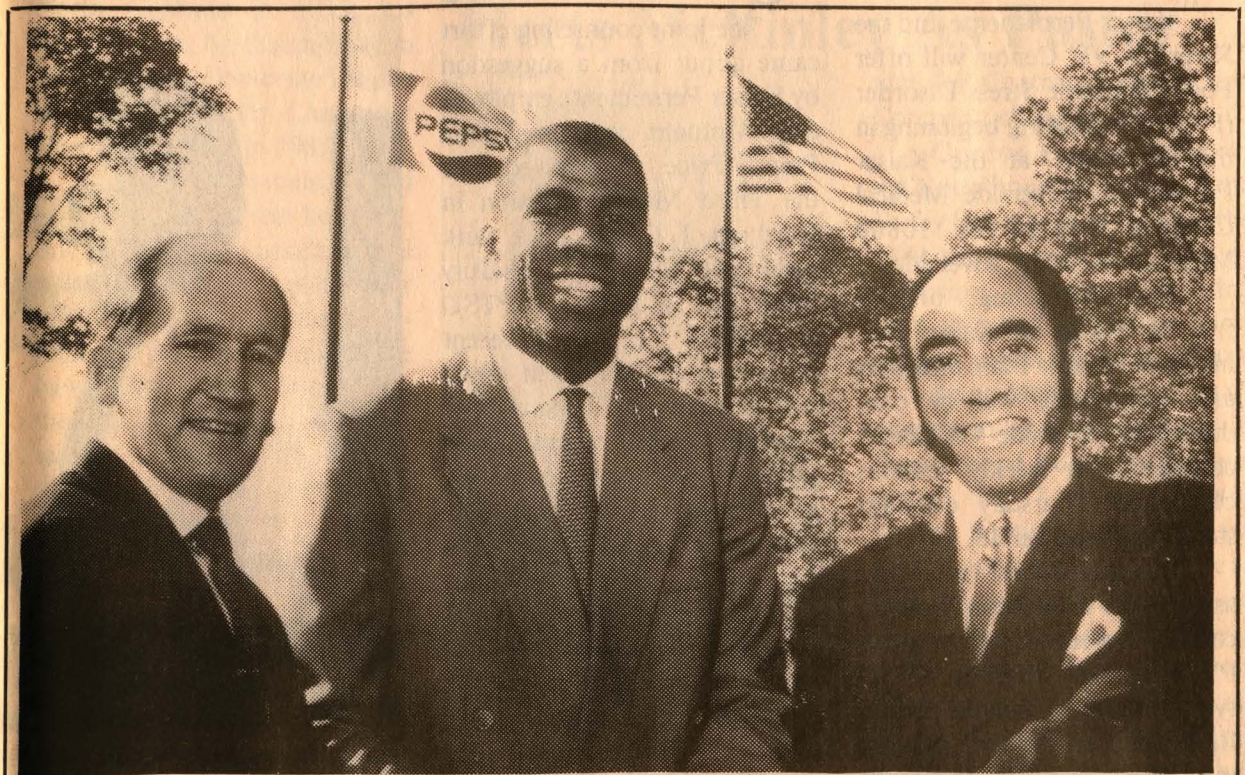
Pepsi-Cola of Washington, D.C. is a sales distribution company which will employ approximately 160 people, and is expected to generate nearly \$30

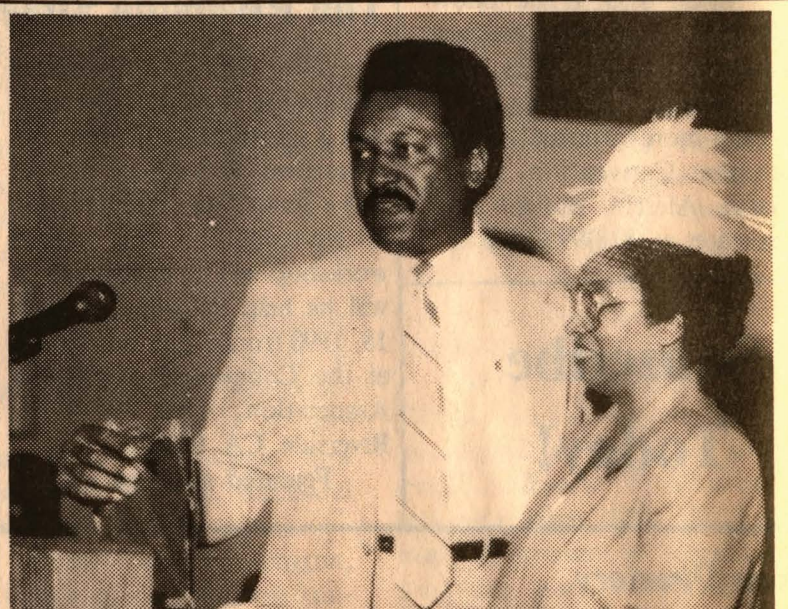

ANSWER: I Corinthians 12:18, 28 and Ephesians 4:11 declare that it is God who calls and places people in various positions within the church. Some, He calls to the Music Ministry, others, to the Children's Ministry, some, to the Ushers Ministry, and so on and so forth. Everyone has a place in the body of Christ.

God also places or "calls" some Christian to serve in the Five Fold Ministry gifts (Apostle, Prophet, Evangelist, Pastor, and Teacher - Ephesians 4:11). These are leadership gifts that God uses to guide, protect, and instruct His church.

How does God "call" a person into the ministry? The same way He does in every part of our life - He speaks to our hearts.
