### County Recognized For Role In Preserving Plateau

Riverside County is a shared recipient of a Presidential Environment and Conservation Challenge Citation for its role in preserving the Santa Rosa Plateau

The County joined with the Metropolitan Water District, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Nature Conservancy to preserve 3,825 acres of the environmentally sensitive Santa Rosa Plateau west of Murrieta. The County of Riverside contributed approximately \$15 million toward the purchase of this natural preserve.

# Malcolm X Banned From Canyon Crest

▲ Theatre employee claims that movie is too violent.

Despite unsubstantiated threats of racial violence, the critically acclaimed film Malcolm X will not be shown at Riverside's elite Canyon Crest Theatres.

An attendant at the theater told theatergoers it was because

it was a Black film and associated with violence.

The Newport Beach based Sanborn Theater group is instead showing the blockbuster film at its Canyon Springs Theater in Moreno Valley. Moreno Valley is a nearby middle to high income community with a large Black and Latino population.

Canyon Crest is instead battling on the non-controversial

box office winners Home Alone: Lost In New York, Dracula and Disney's Alladin.

The decision is the latest in a series of slaps against films depicting African American in historical controversial works. In 1990 the theater owners

refused to show the Oscar nominated film Glory at Canyon Crest. Recently Sarafina, starring Whoopi Goldberg, the film based on the critically acclaimed Broadway play of apartheid in South Africa was also shuttled off to Canyon Springs.

"The decision smacks of blatant racism. It's a slap in the face to Blacks and whites living in the community, says Dr. Ernest Levister, M.D. a local physician and community leader." Canyon Crest is a politically active community. CONTINUED ON B-2

## City Accepts The PEC Report

The Mayor and City Council voted 7-0 to accept for review the proposal for operation and management of the Public Enterprise building. I am writing this letter in hopes of reminding people out there in the business world that smiling faces still tell lies.

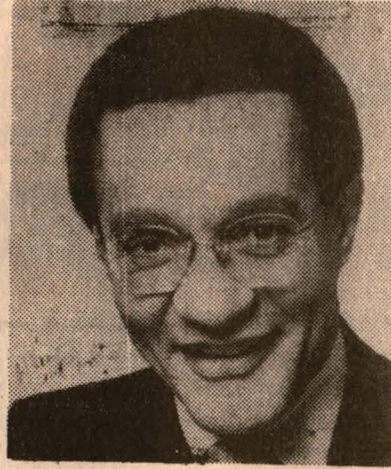

## Needed: New Republicans

On November 3, the American electorate sent a clear signal to the Republican Party that it has a serious problem. Although Blacks, gays and Jews were

already Democratic voting blocs, it was the defection of working women, suburbanites, young people, moderates, Reagan Democrats and independents that sent the message.

Ironically, the very same separatism that the party used to gain power is the very force that turned these voters off and now threatens to destroy it from within. In a sense, the Republican Party needs to be saved from itself.

"What went wrong?" Republicans are asking themselves. Three things come to mind. In the 1992 election, President Bush:

(1) did not create a platform defining the primary national interest as economic growth and fair taxation, rather he attempted to stay in power by using politi-

cal gimmicks;

(2) did not represent a party of inclusion, rather he attempted to retain power by

setting Americans against one another; and (3) abandoned the Republican Party's defining principle as the party of fiscal responsibility and instead tacitly proposed expanding the scope of government with even more deficits.

In the end, 62 % of the electorate rejected this combination of political opportunism, divisiveness and, most of all, the absence of economic vision and fairness.

Moreover, the Republican emphasis on divisive social policy is on the wrong side of history when you look at the facts. In fact, the management of our diverse human resources, our

cultural diversity, is the key to our economic growth.

By year 2000, the U. S. workforce will be over 50% female and non-White because of a low birthrate of White males. If we do not educate and train enough skilled workers in these groups and bring them into the workforce, the U. S. cannot be a competitive force among the industrial nations.

The policies generated by this emphasis on human capital will translate politically because they are based on equal opportunity, not equal outcome. Fighting poverty, educating the poor and a culturally diverse workforce are basically economic issues — the development of human capital and the management of human resources.

## Coping: Why Do Whites Hate Blacks?

I am always asked this question and it is a tough one to answer. But it is obvious that Whites obtain some kind of emotional fulfillment from putting Black people on a lower level than they. For instance, if a White person has an argument with his boss and is made to feel small, he can always say, "Well, I may not be as good as my boss, but I am better than every Black person!" This immediately lifts his spirits.

This "better than" syndrome is the apparent primary reason for Whites aggressively forcing Blacks into a secondary position in this society. No matter how inadequate the White person feels, he can always get an emotional uplift by comparing himself to the "inferior" Black person.

Most White people, however, are psychologically tormented by the obvious contradiction in their existence. They "need" to feel superior to Black people.

but it is obvious to them that Blacks are as capable as they. They exist side-by-side with Black people and they surely know that Black people have the ability to do anything that they can do—and Blacks can do some things better. How can an intelligent, well-educated White person not know that Blacks can do more than sing, dance and play basketball. White people eat as much chicken and watermelon as Blacks.

White people see Black lawyers, Black doctors, Black businessmen and good non professional Black people everyday, so they are aware of Black's capabilities. They know that much of their characterization of Black people is merely stereotyping and unfairly degrading to Blacks.

White people know that White people are prejudiced and that prejudice is ugly.

Yet, racism persists, thereby exposing another excuse for its existence—competition.

Every Saturday afternoon, the television showcases Black sports superstars like Michael Jordan, Charles Barkley, Warren Moon, Darryl Strawberry, Mike Tyson. The list is endless. How many people have watched these stars and thought: "Wow, Michael Jordan is fantastic. I love him. I wish I could do what he can do. But, I can't. He makes me feel inferior. Look at him show-off. I hate him! I would punch him in the mouth, if I could. But, since I can't punch him in the mouth, and since he makes me feel so damn bad, I'm going to degrade the first Black

person I see."

This kind of thinking represents the thinking of most racists, even though those people who use subtle racism. It is obvious that Black people are a superb race, capable of achieving great things when given the opportunity to do so. The multitudinous accomplishments of Blacks in the history of this country (but were left out of school textbooks) prove beyond a shadow of a doubt that Blacks are a glorious people in search of a chance to prove themselves. Perhaps the worst effect of racism is that even Blacks have been brainwashed into believing that they are inferior.

## Chief Buthelezi Demonstrates Against President De Klerk

The recent march and demonstration through the streets of Johannesburg, South Africa's largest city by over 10,000 members of Chief Mangosuthu G. Buthelezi's predominantly Zulu INKATHA FREEDOM PARTY was an eye-opener to many people inside and outside South Africa. To everybody's surprise, the INKATHA demonstration was staged by Chief Buthelezi against President Frederik W. de Klerk who had made an agreement with Nelson Mandela in which De Klerk "discipline" Zulu hostel inmates by stripping them of their traditional weapons and fencing them in their hostels. Mandela and de Klerk also agreed to free political prisoners who had also committed serious crimes.

Angered by this agreement, made without his participation, Chief Buthelezi led the INKATHA demonstrators to Johannesburg, South Africa's largest city, where they marched along mid-town streets, displaying and flaunting their traditional battle weapons of shields, spears and other apparatus. As they marched, the demonstrators also sang full-throatedly and danced. Throngs of observers of all races beheld the impressive demonstration

from building roof-tops, balconies and sidewalks. Demonstrations of that nature can lead to dangerous situations, but nothing unusual happened during the march. The marchers were dignified and well-behaved.

The Zulu people are a proud nation who cling to their traditional folkways and military prowess. They are equally proud of their past history, especially the era of the great warrior-king Shaka Zulu. They remember when their army, under the leadership of Cetywayo, defeated the British at the Battle of Isandhlwana in 1879.

During this massive demonstration, the people of Johannesburg were reminded of the grand days of yore when people were ruled by great warrior-kings.

South Africa remembered the greatness of that erstwhile warrior nation. But, the Afrikaner leaders of de Klerk's National Party hate the Zulus and do not respect their culture or military genius. This shows that de Klerk knows is to set efforts to incorporate the human resources of South Africa to the fullest capacity. It also appears, that all de Klerk knows is to set Zulus against Xhosas or INKATHA against the African National Congress.

But, sooner or later, the

black people of South Africa will refuse to be set against one another, and will unite to fight for their freedom. Black anger throughout the country will lead to the unity of black people.

Zulu anger, provoked by de Klerk's attempt to disarm them and cause friction between them and their cousins, the Xhosa people, will lead de Klerk to great danger. Two weeks ago, after de Klerk lured Mandela to an accord to "discipline" the Zulu-dominated INKATHA FREEDOM PARTY, Buthelezi, Oupa Gqozo and Lucas Mangope—three leading Bantustan heads—pulled out of the negotiations with the government. An accord would have moved the country closer towards a new national constitution, and a democratic, non-racial South Africa. These people were known to be de Klerk's allies. But, now, they are his thorniest threat!

Whatever may be thought of the Buthelezi-led Zulu demonstration in downtown Johannesburg, one stark fact remains clear: apartheid is the fundamental cause of all the turbulence and violence that is plaguing South Africa today. Unless apartheid is totally rooted out, no peace or stability can prevail in that country. The evil of racial animosity can only end when apartheid ends. No sooner!

Although vitiligo poses no physical harm, it can result in significant psychological trauma to Blacks who find themselves in the awkward position of fully or partially "turning White."

If you have been told that, except for makeup nothing can be done to alleviate your problem, get a second opinion from another physical preferably a dermatologist.

A process known as photo therapy, whereby the skin is repeatedly treated with light rays, has proved effective in many cases in restoring some pigmentation to the skin. Doctors stress that the earlier therapy is initiated, the more likely it will succeed. They also warn that success cannot be guaranteed, and that it may require long-term therapy of more than a year to achieve results.

Those individuals so afflicted should initially discuss this problem with an internist, preferably an endocrinologist, to determine if they have any associated disease process. In addition, they should discuss treatment with a dermatologist.

"Project Success," Dr. Hoffman points out, is committed to, putting 32 graduates of Samuel H. Archer High School through college. 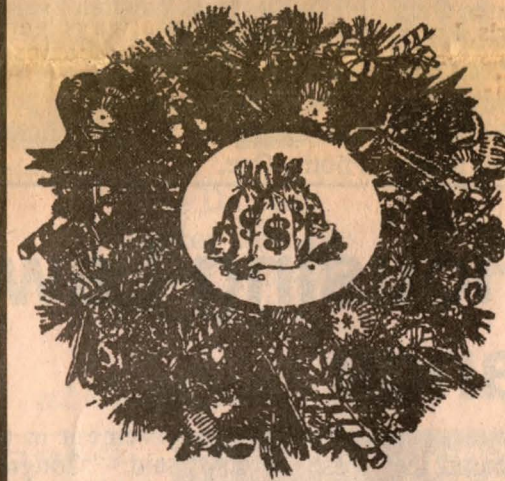

### Sales Tax On Candy, Snack Will Be Replaced

With the passage of Proposition 163, the sales tax exemption will be reinstated for certain food products -- candy, snack foods, and bottled water -- beginning December 1, 1992, announced Ernest J. Dronenburg, Jr., Vice-Chairman, State Board of Equalization.

On July 15, 1991, the sales tax exemption on those food products was lifted as part of a statewide tax increase package passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor.

Dronenburg said businesses should plan to reprogram their cash registers on December 1 to reflect the sales tax change. Under California Sales and Use Tax Law, if the overcharge to their customers or turn the money over to the state.

## Court Says Fair Housing Law Applies To Insurance

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit recently agreed on Tuesday, October 2nd, with the NAACP's position that redlining is a form of racial discrimination which in the insuring the homes violates the Fair Housing Act of 1968, and ordered a lower court to reconsider a case the Association had brought against an insurance company in Madison, Wisconsin.

The lower court had said earlier that the property and insurance casualty business was not covered by the Fair Housing Act. It must now rehear the case.

"This is an extremely important decision since it plainly states it is illegal for insurance firms to deny African-Americans insurance on their homes, or to charge them higher premiums, or to practice any type of discrimination," Dr. Benjamin L. Hooks, Executive Director / CEO of the NAACP said.

Specifically, the NAACP had charged that by discouraging African-Americans from obtaining home insurance from the American Family Mutual Insurance Co., the firm had in effect discriminated against them by making it more difficult to obtain mortgages which require the homeowner be

God. Terms and Concepts There are 5 million Muslims in America and some 1 billion worldwide. They represent a diversity of opinion on politics, family, life, social and any other issues encountered in modern life. However, there are certain terms and concepts shared by the vast majority of Muslims around the world.

Islam The word "Islam" mean "submission" to the will of

God. It is also the faith revealed to the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) between 610 and 632 A.D. Demographer say Islam is currently the world's fastest growing religion. Every county in the world has at least a small Muslim community.

Muslim A "Muslim" is a member of the Islamic faith.

Muhammad The Prophet Muhammad is revered but not worshipped by Muslims. He is not the "Founder" of the Islamic faith. His role was that of "transmitter" for the words of God as revealed to him and compiled in the Quran.

The Quran The Quran or 'recitation' was revealed to the Prophet Muhammad over a period of 22

years. It is regarded by Muslims as the direct word of God speaking in the first person. The Quran is not the Muslim "Bible" because the Bible is seen as a secondary text while the Quran is a primary source of revelation.

Allah "Allah" is the name of "the one God." It is the same name Arabic-speaking Christians use when referring to God. Allah is not "the Muslim God," but the same God worshipped by Christians and Jews.

Shi'ism or Shi'a Shi'ism is a branch of Islam comprising about 10 percent of the total Muslim population. The word "Shi'a" derives from the "Shi'at Ali" the "part of Ali."

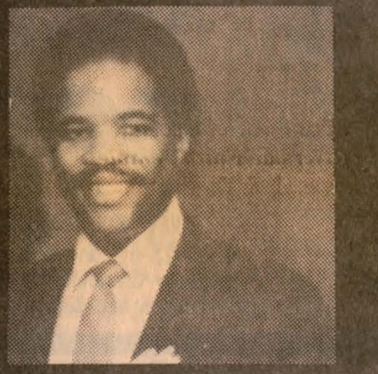

IS GOSSIP A SIN? Question: Dear Dr. Woods, Recently I've noticed how much people gossip around me. They try to lure me in to join them. I feel that this is inappropriate as a Christian believer. Can you

share some scriptures that address the subject of gossip? C.M., Rialto,

Answer: When a person becomes a Christian they become a new person and their nature changes (2nd Corinthians 5:17). The Holy Spirit enters their life and deposits within them the "fruit of the Spirit" which is described in Galatians 5:22,23. One of the fruit mentioned is "temperance". Temperance means self control. A person that gossips lacks self control. Gossip is a work of the flesh. It must be rebuked and resisted. Gossip does not manifest the love of God.

Let's examine Proverbs 17:9. "Be that covers a transgression seeks love; but he that repeats a matter separates very friends." Even if the information that

comes your way is true you need to cover it with Agape love and not spread it by repeating it to someone else (gossip). Gossip is a temptation that we must resist just as any other sin. There are negative consequences to gossip. Not only does it harm the person who is gossiped about but it also harms the person who is gossiping. Speaking negative and trashy conversation pollutes your mind and spirit. It will hinder your spiritual growth.

Finally, Ephesians 4:29 tells us to not allow "corrupt communication" to come out of our mouths but rather words that minister grace and build up the hearer. Gossip certainly does not accomplish this goal. Gossip is ungodly and should be avoided.

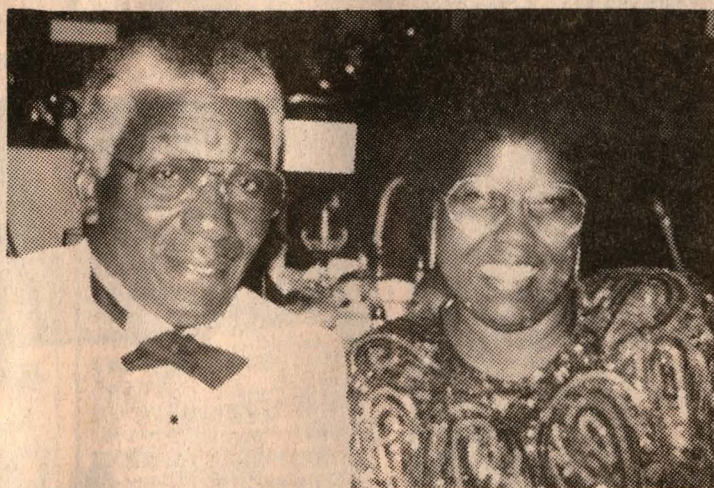

### Team Building Vital At SBVC

SAN BERNARDINO — Pats on the back for students and shared governance for his staff are two keys to success for Dr. John C. Molina, San Bernardino Valley College's interim dean of student services.

Molina is serving through the academic year in a position opened by the resignation in June of Dr. Wendy Beserra. A search is on for someone to fill the spot on a permanent basis.

Service has always been paramount for Molina. His career has taken him from the dusty classrooms of Coachella Valley into the halls of government in Washington and Sacramento as well as to the State Bar as a practicing attorney.

Even though he had taught at nearly every grade level, including university, Molina, at the age of 40 he had fulfilled a childhood. He became a criminal law and worker's compensation attorney. However, he soon found he missed teaching, and he gave up the courtroom for the classroom.

At Valley, his one-year mission is as a team builder. One year will be time enough to get people working together," he said.

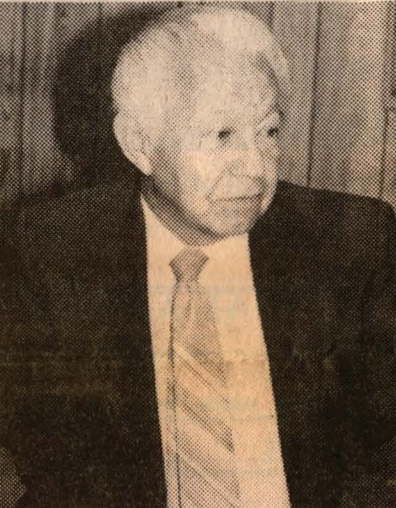
"I think we should work as a team and coordinate all student activities together. I sense that we now have individual programs working in insolation — with the counseling office here and the records office over there. My goal is to improve lines of communication," said Molina, who earned his Ph.D. in leadership and human behavior.

Cuts to the college budget will mean new ways of finding money to operate his department, which includes admissions and records, financial aid, the Adult Re-Entry Center, health services, disabled student services, matriculation, counseling, the Transfer Center, student activities office and EOPS (Extended Opportunity Program and Services).

We have weekly meetings for all the managers, and I ask for each one to share a report. Then I share reports at the president's meeting, so that everyone is informed," he said. "My Ph.D. was concentrated on organizational behavior. It's doing what comes naturally. It is sharing of power for better production."

In his dealings with students, he believes in generous amounts of positive strokes.

"Teachers are the key to

keeping students in school. They should be patted on the back. Let them know, 'You'll make it. It's hard. But life is hard. Your reward will come later.' The worst thing you can do is discourage a student," he said.

As a teacher, he said, "I always assumed (the students) are all capable of success. The key is caring for those students. Students learn more from teachers who care — whether they are in 4th grade or in college."

His definition of personal success has changed over the years.

"Happiness in all stations of life," is his current definition. "We are all looking for happiness," he said. "No one can give it to us. We have to get it ourselves. I learned that from personal experience. Once I thought that happiness was power, prestige, money. I have had all three and found they are not what make me happy."

Born in Redlands, where his Mexico-born parents settled with the railroad, Molina studied at San Diego State University, earning his bachelor's and master's degrees in the 1950s.

He received his Ph.D. from California Western (USIU) in 1968, and his juris doctorate from Southwestern University School of Law in 1980. While he was working on his doctoral degree, he was recruited to join the State Department of Education, and worked as assistant bureau chief in the division of intergroup relations during the student rebellions between 1967 and 1970.

"(The state department) was very right wing and opposed to the longhairs of that time," he recalled. "I served on the Conflict Resolution Team, serving as an ombudsman between the administration and the students."

The rodeo is held in cities all over the United States and is in Los Angeles, the third weekend in July.



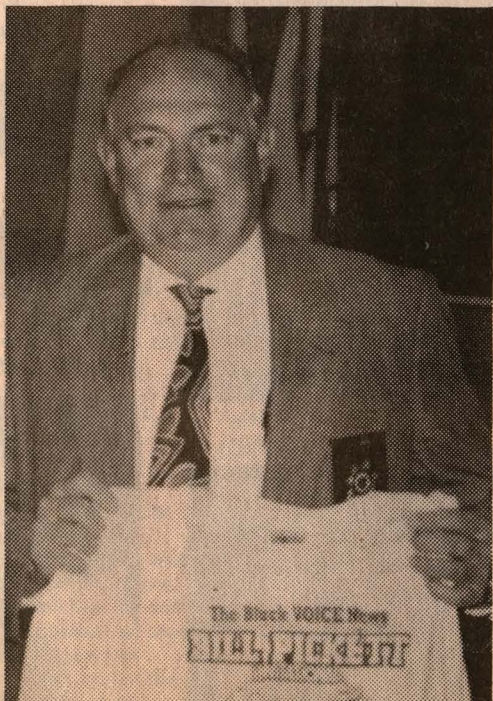

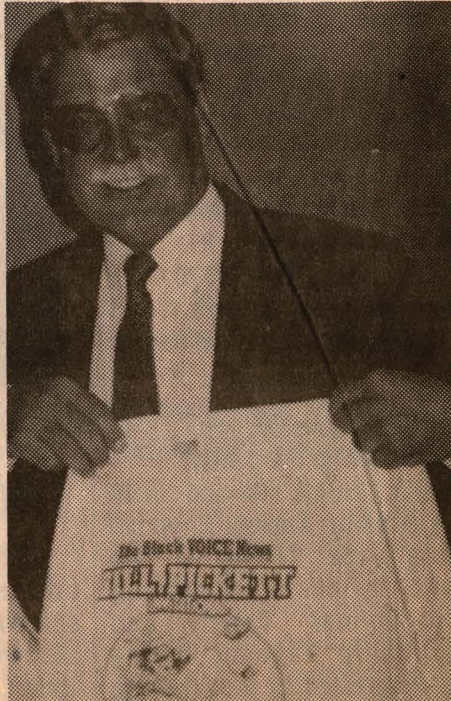

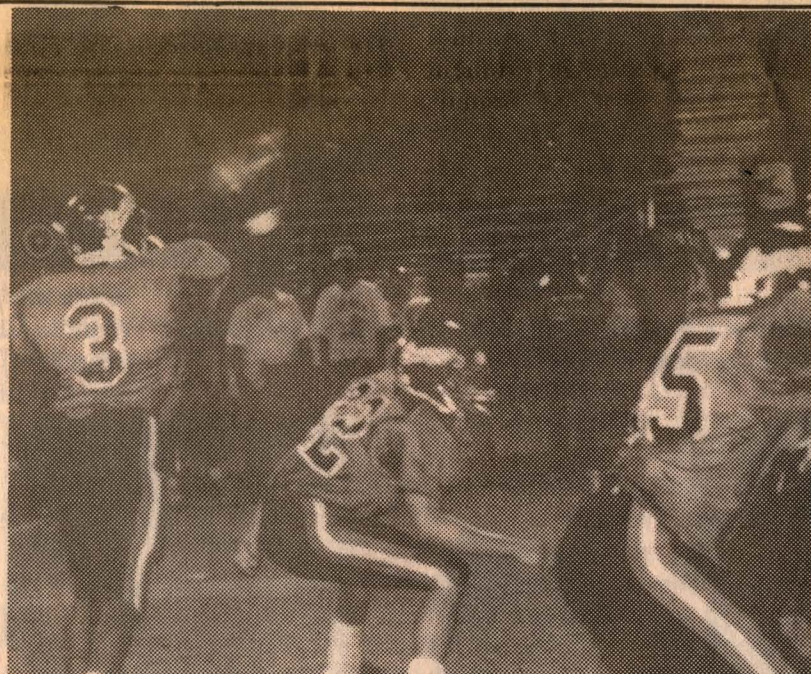

The Cleveland Browns drafted Davis No. 1 and envisioned having the two greatest college running backs in history in the same backfield. He was to join the legendary Jim Brown in the Cleveland offensive attack.

Davis signed the largest rookie

contract in National football history—a three-year, \$65,000, no-cut contact with a then whopping \$15,000 signing bonus. He never got the chance to earn the money on the field, because soon after he was found to have leukemia, which took his life on May 3, 1963.....

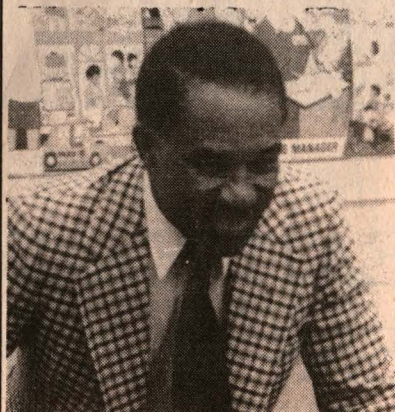

"Los Angeles has come to

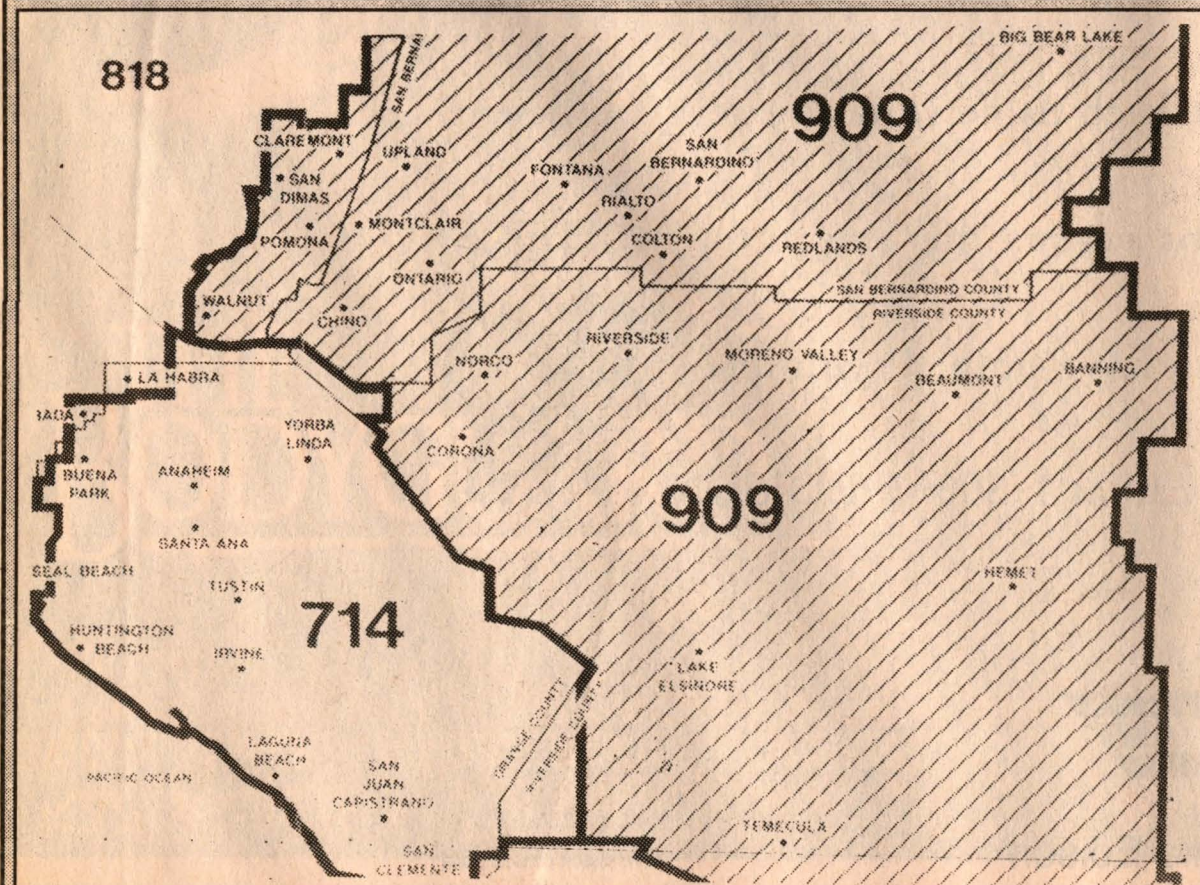
symbolize how far we have to go to achieve a society which can respond positively to Rodney King's entreaty, 'why can't we all get along'," Bowden said.

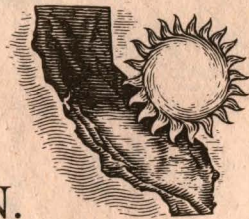

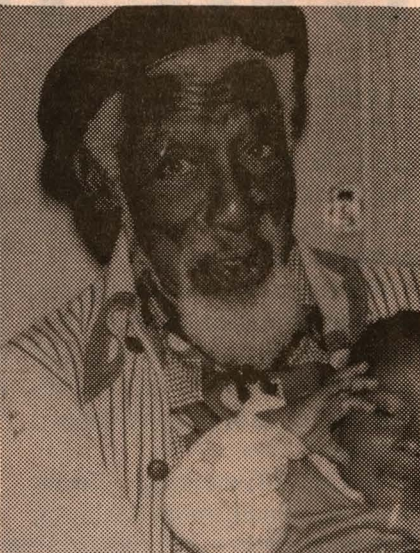

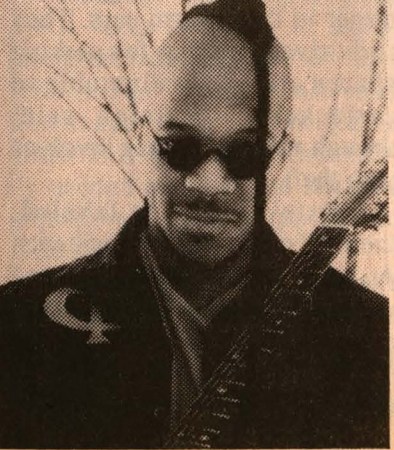

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## Can You Feel Safe In Your Car

**M**otorists' Woes: Can You Feel Safe in Your Car Anymore? It used to be you felt safe in your car.

Now, outbreaks of carjackings, sniper attacks and assaults on motorists around the nation have shattered that sense of security.

"People are accosted at traffic lights, when they're pumping gas, when they're bumped and pulled over," said Richard Hebert, a spokesman for the American Automobile Association.

"Some of these incidents have occurred in broad daylight, during the normal rush hour. Maybe now, there'll be a market for

second-hand Brinks trucks. I hope we haven't come to that," he said Monday.

The AAA is compiling reports of road violence. The federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms is setting up a hot line for victims of armed carjackings: 1-800-ATF-GUNS.

And the violence is moving out to the suburbs.

A New Jersey woman was killed after she was abducted from a supermarket parking lot with her 3-year-old daughter in her van. Motorists are being warned away from a Florida highway rife with bullets and hurled rocks. A Minnesota

motorist was hit by stray fire from hunters.

Two men forced a Maryland woman out of her BMW at an intersection as she took her daughter to preschool. She was dragged to her death after her arm got caught in a seatbelt and the men drove off. Her daughter was thrown out the window but survived.

"It's no longer kids stealing cars for a Saturday night joyride; it's men with guns," said Rep. Charles E. Schumer, D-N.Y. He sponsored a bill, signed into law on Oct. 25, that requires convicted carjackers spend at least 15 years in prison and life if the victim is killed.

"For a long time, people felt relatively safe in their cars: It was almost an extension of their homes, like a cocoon," Hebert said. "As we've learned with carjackings and snipers, that's not always the case."

Hebert stressed such incidents are rare. Andrew Karmen, a sociology professor at John Jay College of Criminal Justice, blamed a "thriving black market" for stolen vehicles.

In cold weather, people often linger in their warm cars. They and drivers waiting for parking spaces are "very vulnerable to carjackers," Karmen said, though not every case involves auto theft.

Whatever they're labeled, there's been a rash of incidents: A New Jersey man pleaded innocent to murder and kidnaping charges Monday in the death of Gail Shollar, who was abducted with her 3-year-old.

The National Guard is patrolling Interstate 295 in

Florida, where one person was killed and several injured in some 36 sniper and rock-throwing incidents since February. Three motorists reported gunshots over the weekend.

On Saturday in Los Angeles, two reputed gang members stole a van at knifepoint and led authorities on a 30-minute car chase, causing two minor wrecks.

On Oct. 28, a carjack victim was kidnapped, robbed, shot at

and thrown off a 20-story roof in New York City. He grabbed a

rope and was rescued.

On Oct. 17, a suspected Philadelphia carjacker was

charged with throwing a woman out of her car and dragging her 100 feet. She survived, unlike the Maryland woman in a similar case.

On Oct. 14, 13 people were indicted in nine separate carjacking cases in Washington, D.C. One victim, a 78-year-old man, was pistol whipped.

"There is reason to be fearful; unfortunately, there isn't all that much a person can do," Karmen said.

**Sunni**  
The word "Sunni" is taken from sunnah, "the practice of the Prophet Muhammad."

**Black Muslims**  
The term "Black Muslim," first used to describe the followers of the late Elijah Muhammad, is no longer accurate when used to describe African American Muslims. Since the death of Elijah Muhammad, the vast majority of his followers discarded non-Islamic teaching and entered mainstream Islam.

**Muslim/ Arab**  
Not all Muslims are Arab, just as not all Arabs are Muslim. In fact, Arabs are a minority within the Islamic world. There are Christian Arabs and Jewish Arabs.

**Women's Rights**  
Under Islamic law, women have always had the right to own property, receive an education, and otherwise take part in community life. The restrictions placed on women concerning dress and social mixing apply equally to men.

If a particular society oppresses women, it is in spite of Islam, not because of it. (The first person to accept the Prophet's message was his wife. The first martyr in Islam was a woman).

**The "Five Pillars" of Islam**

1. **The Declaration of Faith** - A person becomes a Muslim by saying and believing the shahada: There is no god but God and Muhammad is the Messenger of God.

2. **Prayer** - A Muslim prays five times a day: at dawn, midday, afternoon, sunset and during the night. The prayers take about 5-10 minutes and can be performed on any clean surface, and the prayers are oriented in the direction of Mecca as a symbol of unity.

3. **Zakat** - A tax on assets which is gathered by the community and distributed according to need.

4. **Fasting** - Muslims abstain from food, drink and sexual activity from dawn to sunset during the lunar month of Ramadan. Eid prayers mark the end of the month.

5. **Hajj** - A Muslim must make the hajj, or pilgrimage to Mecca, at least once in his or her lifetime if physically and financially able. It symbolizes unity and equality.

munity of university scholars, students and families who should not be denied access to this film in their own back yard. Malcolm X is not just a Black film it is an educational and historical work for all people. Like J.F.K. it is one of the most important films of the decade." Levister's sentiment was echoed by Associate Professor, in the Ethnic Studies and Psychology Departments at UCR, Dr. Carolyn Murry, "Malcolm X is important for all people, it is a classic piece of history. We cannot understand what's going on now if we don't understand history."

Sanborn's refusal to show films depicting Black and other minorities in positive roles Canyon Crest fosters continuing ignorance and cultural mistrust between the races." They show exploitation movies, but not movies that reflect in a positive way the African American experience," said Murry.

James White, President of the African American Chamber of Commerce said, it is ridiculous, and I am disappointed they have taken such a position based on their fear of violence. There has been no violence in any other area. There is no reason to think there is violence."

Rev. Johnny Harris said, "this is typical of our society and anything associated with the truth. They (Whites) believe if we learn what Malcolm X is talking about we will get angry and have a violent reaction. Malcolm was a man that exposed us to self sufficiency."

"I would like to see the movie," said DeVonne Armstrong, local realtor. "I had occasion to hear him three times, I read the book and I don't know of anything violent he was saying."

First Lady Liz Clark said, "I'd like to know why Canyon Crest would make that decision. Aren't they being premature to expect violence? I remember they didn't show Sarafina."

Rev. T. Ellsworth Gant, said it's a sad indictment against African Americans." Gant who says he is not an avid movie goer does plan to see this film. "Malcolm didn't preach division, in later years he preached unity. That shows what they think of us. There are always restrictions on us. The problem is the movies was produced and directed by a Black man and 99% of the actors were Black. If I were people in the area I'd find some place else to go. It would not be Canyon Crest."

"I see a lot of movies up there that are violent, I'm outraged they would selectively based on controversy not show Malcolm X." said Bob Hammond, a local author. "We shouldn't get politics involved in censorship. Violence is reality, art reflect life," he said.

The film has received positive reviews and thumbs up from most theater owners including the Los Angeles prestigious Westwood Merchants Association. After viewing a special screening of the film, business owners' concerns about a recurrence of violence that followed the debut of New Jack City were eased. "It's a healing film, a must see and we are proud to have it shown in Westwood", said Hillary Gibson, president of the Westwood/UCLA merchants group.

Al Bamum, owner of Chauffeur Connection agreed, he was with Spike Lee Tuesday night and saw part of it then, however he returned to Park Sierra yesterday to view the entire movie. "It was educational and informative, it has a PG rating for the purpose of education. All races will leave there with history of African Americans."
