Community Stands-Up For San Bernardino

'm mad as hell and I'm not going to take it anymore," says Sam Catalano, President of the San Downtown Bernardino Business Association and Manager of the Carousel Mall referring to malicious articles that inaccurately represent the city of San Bernardino as a terrible place to live. "So on Monday, November 6th, 12:00 p.m. on the steps of City Hall, businesses, politicians, and civic associations led by San Bernardino Mayor Tom Minor will 'Stand-Up for San Bernardino' in a major Press Conference and Rally to tell our side of the story," he added.

Mayor Minor will speak before a crowd expected to be the largest ever for this kind of event. He will talk about the good things that San Bernardino has to offer.



Safe Sex Post Heart Attack

Our Bodies

DEAR DR. LEVISTER: I experience a heart attack six weeks ago. Is it safe to have sex with my partner? H.A. DEAR H.A.: A recent survey

of 88 men with coronary heart disease who were enrolled in a long term cardiac program suggests that sexual intercourse poses little or no risk for people without ischemia (inadequate blood flow to the heart).

As part of the study, the men performed exercise tests during which they rode a stationary bicycle while hooked up to an electrocardiogram. This is a machine that records changes in the heart's electrical activity. For 24 hours the patients also wore portable monitors that monitored the electrical activity of their heart while performing

their usual daily activities. All the patients were asked to have intercourse with their partners while wearing this monitor. Medications such as beta blockers, calcium channel blockers and nitroglycerine were stopped during the period of evaluation.

The study showed most patient's heart rate was higher during the bicycle exercise test than during sexual intercourse. The average heart rate is limited, so the physical stress on the heart is high only for a brief period. The average heart tate was 138 beats per minute

during the stress test vs. only 118 during intercourse. Presumably because the greater cardiac demands are on the bicycle test, more than 60% of the patients have evidence of ischemia during the exercise stress test - only 31% of the patients had ischemia during sex. The study further suggests that the percentage of patients experiencing ischemia or decreased blood flow to the heart was high due to the elimination of medication during the evaluation.

Although the studies suggest that sexual intercourse is safe for people with coronary artery disease, common sense should prevail. Taking cardiac medications as prescribed is important in the protection of your heart. Regular medical check ups are highly recommended. You and your mate should discuss this with your personal physician.

weeks at one session per week. The program is free to anyone who will train to ensure its success. It is only available through a church.


Hollingsworth has BOSS programs internationally in Africa, Japan and Switzerland.

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
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


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BACKGROUND INFORMATION

What Is A Slave?

A slave is a person who is owned by another person. Slaves were considered the personal property of the owner, who was called a slaveholder or master. There was slavery in the United States for nearly 250 years. Blacks were captured and first brought by ship to America from Africa in 1619.

Slaves were sold to work as servants or field hands on many plantations. They received no pay for their labor. Owners merely gave them the minimum amount of food, shelter, and clothing. Slaves had no rights, they could be bought or sold whenever the master decided to. Members of slave families were often separated. And, slaves were often beaten to make them obedient and easy to manage.

Many laws were passed to ensure that slavery continued. It was illegal for slaves to learn to read or to write; to beat drums; to hold religious services without a White person present. It was also illegal to own guns; to hit or fight back against a White person; to own property; to gather in groups of more than five; to buy or sell goods; to vote; or to marry.

Abolitionists were a group of people, both Black and White, who fought against the evils of slavery. Some abolitionists wanted to do away with slavery peacefully and gradually. Others thought that there should be a big rebellion to end slavery all at once. Yet another group thought that all Blacks should return to Africa and form colonies. Regardless of their methods, they all believed that slavery had to end.


In the United States, a law was passed that no new slaves could be brought into this country after January 1, 1808. But slavery still continued. In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln signed Emancipation Proclamation, freeing the slaves. But, slavery did not really end until the 13th Amendment to the Constitution was passed in 1865.

The abolitionists then turned their efforts to helping the newly freed slaves. They worked to ensure that all Blacks had the same rights as Whites. Black Americans—and all Americans-owe a lot to the brave men and women who fought to end slavery. The people of a nation are only free when everyone is free and treated equally.

Retracing The Underground Railroad Experience

ust as Christians go to the Holy Land, as the Muslims return to Mecca, as Jews return to Israel. every African American and African from any nation should return to the past so we can better understand our future. I retraced one of the many routes on the Underground Railroad.

My past was connected as I retraced the steps my ancestors took when they refused to be a slave anymore. It was truly a religious experimiles to freedom in a land called Canada.

This re-creation is not to glorify or glamorize what they did. It was, for me, at least a time to be connected to my ancestors to know that they were brilliant people and to know we their ancestors are products of that brilliancy and their strength.

Beginning in 1619 for close to 250 years, some 100 million Africans were selected to be transported across the ocean they were the strong people. If they were weak

though they were all Black they were not the same. Their differences were as real as the English and the Irish or the Cherokee and the Sioux. But those differences were never taken into consideration. No one cared.

This ugly part of American history has been virtually hidden until now. Some of the hideouts are still visible, others have been destroyed, many locations and many stories died with the owners because it was death to anyone helping an escaping slave.

Almost every African American and all African Canadians are direct descendants of the survivors of the Underground Railroad.

The Underground Railroad, for whom Harriet Tubman is so famous is not a mode of transportation it was a system of safe houses, churches, barns and other places where the fugitive slaves could rest and eat during the day as they travelled by night the 900 plus

crammed together like a crop of tobacco.in slave ships where many died. Those who survived, what is referred to by historians as the 'Middle Passage' were even stronger. I am a descendant of these strong, brave ancestors.

The slave traders took the Africans to many different nations, (see map) including, China, Japan, Australia, Europe, Caribbean, South America and even Canada, virtually all over the world. They had to survive the different climate changes, the different nationalities of the people, even

more they researched, the more the project took on a life of its own and instead of the leisurely travel through the South to record their experiences in a journal the idea began to take shape as a 19th century experience of a fugitive slave of around 1850. The experiences of the seven is enough to fill a book as they walked in the cold, avoiding heavily populated areas, hiding in barns and being fed by friendly abolitionists. They began their trek in Greensburg, KY near the Tennessee boarder and ended at Oberlin University. They spent

the Underground Railroad. "We must look at slavery as a time when we were an enslaved people," said one of the participants on the trip.

Time and time again as we met the keepers of the culture, they'd say, our history is too important for any portion of it to be romanticized and lightly glazed over, rather than be SERIOUSLY investigated."

My trip to freedom began in Greene County Ohio, the home of Wilberforce University an AME church school. And because of the African Methodist Episcopal Church

bestowing the title of "Conductor" of the Underground Railroad on me. He said "do as my ancestors did go back and tell somebody and have our people show honor and respect to the ancestors many of whom travelled over 900 miles to change their lives, the lives of their family," and yes, even mine.

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


PASADENA - Will the buck stop here? Take that question mark away from this sentence.


"We wanted to make a statement early in qualifying," Force said, "and that's what we did. My crew is the best and they deserve credit for this, too."

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
