COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a capstone project course for Seniors in the Bachelor of Fine Arts in Filmmaking track. Class members will work in various capacities to define projects that meet the criteria for Senior Projects and take on assigned roles that meet with their educational goals developed for the semester.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Defining a Personal Trajectory, Goals and Research

Technology Application and Creative Work

- Students must pick one or more areas that will be their main focus in terms of applying hard and software expertise that will allow them to display these talents on a professional "reel" during the second semester personal marketing portion of their year.
- Students must define their creative work in one or more of the following areas: Writing, Directing, Production Design, Lighting and Camera, Sound, Acting, Producing or Assistant Direction.

Written Proposal of Project Parameters and Goals

- Students must submit a comprehensive research document containing a proposal for the above areas, a definition of research areas and projected materials and experiences through which research will be conducted, a journal of processes involved over the course of the project, and a final personal assessment of the project work based on its original goals.

Criteria for the class

You will be graded in this class by my analysis of your ability to:

- be able to articulate in writing and with your collaborators the relationship between your work and the narrative arc of the project in which you are involved.
- demonstrate technological competence in all areas to which you are assigned.
- demonstrate Aesthetic excellence in the areas to which you are assigned.
- participate in collaborative meetings, production and support work for the project with which you are involved
- be punctual and dependable in making meetings and work dates
