Course Description: Psychology is the science of human and animal behavior and mental processes. As a survey course, Introduction to Psychology provides an overview of the methods, terms, theories, and findings in the field. By understanding principles of psychology, you will learn more about yourself, others, non-human animals, and relationships. This course primarily employs a lecture format, although your comments, questions, and discussions are strongly encouraged.

Learning Outcomes:

- 1) Understand Psychology as a multifaceted discipline
- 2) Understand how historical events shaped the field of Psychology
- 3) Understand human behavior through multiple perspectives (e.g. behavioral, physiological, social, cognitive)

Required Text: Weiten's Psychology: Themes and Variations, 9th edition.

Optional Material: PsykTrek CD-ROM and/or Themes and Variations Study Guide

Please note, as part of your grade, there are seven in-class participation activities. There will be **no** opportunity to make-up these activities if you are not in class when they take place.

Classroom Behavior: All students will be expected to be in class on time, and to be attentive to the lecture and activities during class time. It will also be expected that students maintain a respectful, collegiate environment. All students should feel free to ask content-relevant questions in class.

Electronic Devices: The use of wireless communications devices during class is prohibited. This specifically includes such activities as 1) placing or receiving phone calls, 2) sending or receiving text messages, and 3) internet searching, game playing, etc.

If you are an emergency professional (physician/nurse, counselor/therapist, EMT, etc) or you are expecting an EMERGENCY communication please set your wireless device to its silent alarm mode and quietly exit the classroom to respond.

Exams:

You are <u>required</u> to take 4 exams, including the final. Exams will consist of multiple choice and short answer questions. The first 3 exams will be administered during class time in your regular classroom. Please note, no student will be allowed to start any exam once another student has completed the exam and left the room.

Course Grade:

There will be four exams. Each exam, including the final, is worth 50 points. There will also be 7 randomly assigned in-class assignments, each worth 3 points. These comprise "participation points" and will be assigned randomly throughout the semester.

What can I expect on the exams?

Lectures will follow the chapters in the book but may contain extra material. All chapters in the book will be covered (except chapters 9 and 14) as well as some additional topics. Exam questions will include material from the text and material covered in lecture, whether it was in the text or not. Therefore, it is important for you to both read the text and attend lectures regularly.

The beginning of each chapter in your textbook includes an outline. This outline can help you focus on the critical material in each chapter. At the end of each chapter is a Recap section. Concentrate your text book study efforts on knowing the Key Ideas, Terms, and People listed in the Recap section. Completing the Practice Test at the end of each chapter is a good way to prepare for exams.

What should I bring to the exams?

For each of the exams, you will need to bring a #2 pencil and an NCS Test Sheet 50/50, form No. 95142. When purchasing your scantron, you may be able to simply ask for the "psychology scantron." You can purchase this Scantron form in the UC and the Think Tank for 25 cents. Please note that no student will be allowed to start an exam once another student has completed the exam and left the room.

NOTE: Study guides are typically not provided for tests; you are expected to know all the material from the textbook, lecture and supplementary materials (such as videos).

Make Up Policy:

There will be no make-ups for missed in-class assignments.

To make up an exam you must:

- Notify me **before** the exam and bring proper documentation.
 - Examples of documented circumstances that may merit approval include the following:
 - Illness or accident
 - Death or family emergency
 - University-sanctioned activity

Research Experience: Psychology is a science built on systematic research of both human and non-human animals. A critical aspect of this course is becoming familiar with how that information is obtained. There are two ways to meet this course requirement and they may be combined in any manner to meet the 8-credit research experience requirement.

The research experience portion of this class is not graded but it is required for a grade in the course. You may choose either or both of these options (e.g., 4 credits of research participation with 4 credits for reading about research for 8 total credits) but this requirement must be met by the end of the semester.

1) Participation in original research. In this option, you will sign up to participate in actual psychology experiments. Individual experiments may range from 1 to 8 credits. Typically, each credit takes about 30 minutes. You can sign-up for research studies using the SONA system. For more information about SONA go to the following webpage: http://cas.umt.edu/psychology/Undergraduate/default.php

Click on the "Sona Research Participation" link on the left pane. You will need to create a SONA account. You can do this through the following webpage: <u>umontana.sona-systems.com</u>

Make sure that you identify this course when you create an account so that your credits will be allocated appropriately.

You can only participate and receive credit for a study once. If you participate in a study more than once, you will only receive credit for the first experiment. Some psychological research projects require participants who possess special characteristics. You may have the opportunity to participate in an in-class screening/testing day to be eligible for those experiments. The results of the assessments are confidential, and participation in the screening/testing day is optional.

You can also keep track of your hours on an experiment tracking sheet (see below). Fill out the appropriate information about the study on this sheet, and bring it with you to the studies. The researcher may stamp/sign your sheet. Do not lose your tracking sheet. This is your paper record of your participation.

2) Reading about original research. In this option, you will identify, read, and summarize an original research article in 1-2 pages. Each summary is worth 2 research credits. A separate handout is available on moodle and outside Skaggs 053 with the details.

What happens if I don't finish the research experience requirement?

Students who do not complete their research experience credits will receive an Incomplete for the class. Students with Incompletes will be allowed to finish their research experience requirement only through the reading about research option. Consistent with university policy if you do not resolve your Incomplete within one year, your grade will revert to one letter grade lower than what you would have received otherwise. **Be aware** that if you earn an "Incomplete" in any course at UM, an "I" remains on your record permanently, even if you eventually complete the work.

Screening Day: Screening day is February 12th. This day is designated to provide you an opportunity to earn research credit (2 units) and to provide researchers an opportunity to screen Psychology 100 students for other studies later in the semester. Screening day is in the first hour of lecture for that day only and is not in your normal lecture room therefore you will need to attend class prior for the room announcement. Screening Day location will be announced ASAP, to be immediately followed by a shortened lecture in our classroom.
