COURSE DESCRIPTION

Social psychology is the scientific study of the way people think, feel, desire, and behave in social situations. A social psychologist may investigate how such factors as prejudice, group polarization, victimization, compliance, obedience, perceived power or authority, and self-concept affect how individuals behave toward and with other people. Social psychologists are interested in how people influence others and are influenced by their social environment. The primary goal of this course is to introduce you to theory, research methods, empirical findings, and the perspectives in the field of social psychology. A secondary goal of this course is to facilitate your understanding of how the social and political environment can influence our thinking, behavior and current zeitgeist (social and political climate). By the end of the course, you should walk away with a more critical and integrative way of thinking about theory, research and everyday behavior of individuals in a social context.

COURSE FORMAT AND REQUIREMENTS

Consistent with all 300-level courses, this class will move fast and falling behind on attendance or the reading is ill-advised. You can expect to read roughly 30 pages each week for success in the completion of this course.
