#### **Requirements and Grading System**

Students are required to complete all in-class assignments (5%), all homework assignments (20%), and three exams ( $3 \times 25\%$ ). In addition, graduate students must complete a small research project and provide a short presentation of that research to the class.

### Description

This class provides an overview of the history and structure of Modern English. Students will receive a brief introduction to the historical development of English by studying some of the processes responsible for significant changes in its structure. They will also examine specific grammar points of *Standard American English* and contrast the grammar of SAE to other dialects of English.

### Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will:

- 1. be familiar with certain diachronic aspects of English, including the main features of Old and Middle English, some of the processes responsible for the changes from Old to Middle to Modern English as well as changes resulting from the influences of other Indo-European languages;
- 2. have assessed the role of a standard dialect of American English and its similarities and differences with respect to regional, ethnic, and social varieties of American English;
- 3. better understand the structure of Modern English, specifically the grammar points which appear in the course outline; and,
- 4. be aware of their academic strengths and weaknesses especially with respect to their abilities to research, write, and orally express their ideas.
