Course Description:

This course examines selected great works from four major Asian cultural spheres: the Middle East and Persia (Iran), South Asia ("India"), China, and Japan. While these texts, of course, cannot be regarded as fully representative of these cultures, they all could be considered "classics" which have exerted profound influence on these cultures and are both reflective of and productive of their cultures' social mores, moral norms, philosophies, and ways of life at various key points in their histories. Thus, while reading, reflecting on, and writing about these works will not lead to full introductions to these cultures, through them we will learn much about what has been most valued in them.
