Course description:

The course introduces students to modern and significant developments in the foundations of Montana politics and state government, how Montana politics function from a practitioner's standpoint and opportunity for reform.

Course objectives:

- 1. To acquire an understanding of the Montana political landscape and the factors and trends that continue to influence public policy in 2007.
- 2. To introduce students to a wide array of public figures who shape electoral politics and public policy in Montana and to allow for an exchange of thoughts and ideas during each class.
- 3. To acquire a substantive knowledge of the structure and operation of state government and how Montana's political system functions and guides public policy.

Course requirements:

- A. Submit two plans: Each plan should be approximately 10-12 pages in length, double-spaced. They should be concise, tightly written and to the point.
 - 1. Campaign plan designed to defeat an incumbent Montana legislator running for re-election in 2008. <u>Deadline: March 14.</u>
 - 2. Strategic plan to secure the enactment of either of two proposals: a bill to enable Montana to coordinate our presidential primary with other western states, or a bill mandating all-day kindergarten in all public schools in Montana. Deadline: May 2.

B. Personal journal

- 1. Keep a personal journal of impressions of Montana politics for the duration of the course.
- 2. Prior to each class, record ideas and concepts you found most interesting from the required readings. After each class record impressions about the ideas and concepts presented in class.
