Liechty, ASUM Senator: 7 8 Whereas, In past years Associated Students of the University of Montana (ASUM) has had 9 discretion in deciding whether or not a primary election should be held; 10 11 Whereas, This has caused confusion for candidates in planning their campaigns, issues with 12 ASUM advertising the election to the students, and trouble in determining how reimbursements 13 shall be made if candidates have already made campaign materials only advertising the date of 14 the general election before the ASUM Senate decides there should be a primary: 15 16 Whereas, Restricting the number of Senate candidates is not as pertinent to the outcome of the 17 election as it is for Executive races: 18 19 Whereas, Current ASUM bylaws under Article V Section 4 reads: 20 3. A primary election shall be held for each Executive position having more than two (2) 21 candidates. If a primary election is held, the two (2) candidates for each position with the 22 highest number of primary votes will enter the general election. If only one Executive 23 position has enough candidates running to warrant a primary election, the primary 24 election may be omitted if approved by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the ASUM 25 Senate. 26 4. The ballots for a primary election will consist of the names of the candidates for the 27 two (2) officer races consisting of more than two (2) candidates or teams of candidates. 5. A primary election shall be held for Senate candidates if there are over fifty-two (52) 28 29 individuals seeking office. 6. The ballots for the general elections shall consist of no more than two (2) Executives 30 31 or Executive teams for each executive position and no more than fifty-two (52) Senate candidates with positions for write-in candidates (with the exception of a tie vote in the 32 primary as per section 5.E of Elections Bylaws). In the event that the primary is waived, 33 34 the ballots for the general elections shall allow for more than two (2) Executives or 35 Executive teams for each executive position and/or fifty-two (52) Senate candidates to 36 appear on the ballot.; 37 38 Therefore, Let It Be Resolved, That Article V Section 4 be amended to read as follows: 39 3. A primary election shall **only** be held for each Executive position having more than 40 three (3) candidates. If a primary election is held, the two (2) candidates for each position with the highest number of primary votes will enter the general election. 41 42 4. The ballots for the primary election shall consist of the names of the candidates for the 43 Executive races consisting of more than three (3) candidates or teams of candidates. 44 5. The ballots for the general elections shall consist of no more than three (3) Executives 45 or Executive teams for each executive position and all of the Senate candidates with

49	Therefore, Let It Be Further Resolved, That subsequent numbering in Article V Section 4 reflects
50	these changes.
