## **CLASS OBJECTIVES:**

- The ability to understand, utilize, and follow: basic electricity; established maintenance practices; established light hang and focus procedures.
- Appreciation for the roles lighting plays in a theatrical or dance production.
- Practice of established safety procedures.

#### COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will explore basic lighting as applied to theatrical or dance productions. It will serve as an introduction into basic Stage electrical skills, while simultaneously creating intrigue and excitement in a relatively unfamiliar field of theatre, for most students. Class lectures will explore the individuals involved in a lighting production team, while exposing students to the skills necessary to mount a production.

#### ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Attendance is extremely important; it is assumed students will attend all classes. ONLY ONE UNEXCUSED ABSENCE IS ALLOWED. Students who miss a class should contact the instructor or another student for notes, each unexcused absence beyond what is allowed will result in the drop of 5 points.
