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REMARKS OF SENATOR MANSFIELD
CLOSING PLENARY SESSION, MAY 26, 1973

MR. CHAIRMAN, FIRST OF ALL, LET ME EXPRESS THE THANKS

OF ALL THE UNITED STATES DELEGATES TO THE ENTIRE MEXICAN

DELEGATION FOR THE SPLENDID ARRANGEMENTS WHICH HAVE BEEN

MADE FOR THIS CONFERENCE. FOR SEVERAL OF US, IT HAS BEEN

A PERSONAL PLEASURE TO RETURN TO THE LOVELY, HOSPITABLE

CITY OF GUANAJUATO AFTER TEN YEARS.

FOR THE DELEGATION, IT HAS BEEN AN EQUAL PLEASURE TO

PARTICIPATE IN THESE STIMULATING DISCUSSIONS. AS ALWAYS,

OUR TALKS HAVE BEEN HELD IN AN ATMOSPHERE OF CORDIALITY

AND MUTUAL RESPECT AND WITH SCRUPULOUS REGARD FOR THE

PRINCIPLES OF NONINTERVENTION AND SELF-DETERMINATION. WE

MEET TO LEARN, NOT TO PREVAIL OR TO MAKE NEWS. THIS IS AS

IT SHOULD BE, NOT ONLY BECAUSE IT IS RIGHT, BUT ALSO BECAUSE

IT IS THE ONLY WAY IN WHICH THIS CONFERENCE CAN FUNCTION

IF IT HOPES TO ACHIEVE ENDURING RESULTS.

I VENTURE TO SAY THAT, IN THIS THIRTEENTH MEXICOUNITED STATES INTERPARLIAMENTARY CONFERENCE, WE HAVE
ACHIEVED SUCH RESULTS. WE HAVE IMPROVED OUR MUTUAL
UNDERSTANDING AND THAT NEW LIGHT WILL BE CARRIED BACK TO
OUR RESPECTIVE LEGISLATIVE CHAMBERS. SOME WILL FILTER
FROM US TO OUR RESPECTIVE COLLEAGUES AND TO OUR
RESPECTIVE GOVERNMENTS AS A WHOLE.

WE MIGHT AS WELL ACCEPT THE FACT THAT, INEVITABLY,
THERE ARE GOING TO BE PROBLEMS OF ONE KIND OR ANOTHER IN
OUR RELATIONS. MEXICO AND THE UNITED STATES HAVE TOO MANY
POINTS OF CONTACT TO AVOID THIS. ALONG A COMMON BORDER AS
LONG AND AS HEAVILY TRAVELLED AS OURS, THERE ARE GOING TO
BE SOURCES OF FRICTION. BETWEEN TWO NATIONS WHOSE TRADE IS
AS LARGE AS OURS, THERE ARE GOING TO BE POINTS OF
DIFFERENCE. DIPLOMACY CAN DULL THE SHARPNESS OF THESE
POINTS, TO KEEP THE PROBLEMS SMALL ENOUGH SO THAT THEY ARE

MANAGEABLE IF NOT SOLUBLE. THE DIPLOMATS OF OUR COUNTRIES
HAVE PERFORMED THIS TASK WITH A GRATIFYING MEASURE OF
SUCCESS FOR MANY YEARS. IN THE END, HOWEVER, IT IS FROM
POLITICS IN BOTH COUNTRIES THAT DURABLE SOLUTIONS MUST
EMERGE. IT IS IN THAT SENSE THAT I WOULD SUGGEST THAT WE
LOOK FOR THE PRINCIPAL CONTRIBUTION OF THIS THIRTEENTH
INTERPARLIAMENTARY CONFERENCE AND ITS PREDECESSORS.

IN SPECIFICS, THIS CONFERENCE, I HOPE AND BELIEVE,

HAS CARRIED FORWARD ONE MORE STEP THE PROPOSAL WHICH

ORIGINATED IN THE FIFTH INTERPARLIAMENTARY CONFERENCE

IN LA PAZ IN 1965 TO USE THE TECHNIQUES OF MODERN SCIENCE

FOR THE NUCLEAR DESALINIZATION OF SEA WATER, SOMETHING

WHICH WOULD BE OF IMMENSE BENEFIT BOTH TO NORTHWESTERN

MEXICO AND THE SOUTHWESTERN UNITED STATES.

WE HAVE ALSO, I HOPE AND BELIEVE, BROUGHT MUCH
CLOSER THE DAY WHEN THERE WILL BE A PERMANENT, DEFINITIVE,

AND JUST SOLUTION OF THE PROBLEM OF THE SALINITY OF THE COLORADO RIVER -- A SOLUTION WHICH IS INSEPARABLE FROM POLITICS. THIS IS A PROBLEM WHICH HAS VEXED OUR RELATIONS FOR MUCH TOO LONG. IT IS ONE WHICH WE HAVE THOUGHT WAS ON THE VERGE OF SETTLEMENT MANY TIMES ONLY TO SEE OUR HOPES DISAPPOINTED. NEVERTHELESS, I DARE TO THINK THAT WE ARE NOW ON A MORE SOLID FOUNDATION. MUCH OF THE CREDIT GOES TO PRESIDENTS NIXON AND ECHEVERRIA, AND TO A FORMER ATTORNEY GENERAL OF THE UNITED STATES, MR. HERBERT BROWNELL. IF THIS TIME A SETTLEMENT IS INDEED ACHIEVED, THE IMPLEMENTATION WILL REQUIRE CONGRESSIONAL ACTION AND THAT ACTION WILL BE MORE READILY FORTHCOMING BECAUSE OF THE DISCUSSIONS WE HAVE HAD AT THIS INTERPARLIAMENTARY CONFERENCE, AND AT PRECEDING CONFERENCES.

THAT IS THE PATTERN OF THE CHAMIZAL SETTLEMENT. A LONG-STANDING IRRITANT BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES WAS REMOVED BY PRESIDENTS KENNEDY AND LOPEZ MATEOS, BUT ONLY AFTER
THE INTERPARLIAMENTARY MEETINGS HAD TAKEN THE EMOTIONAL
HEAT FROM THE ISSUE AND REPLACED IT WITH A SOBER
APPRECIATION OF THE FACTS. THEREAFTER, WHEN THE TREATY
OF SETTLEMENT ON THE CHAMIZAL WAS NEGOTIATED, LEGISLATIVE
ACCEPTANCE -- POLITICAL ACCEPTANCE -- WAS ALREADY
ASSURED.

WE HAVE SPENT A GOOD DEAL OF TIME AT THIS CONFERENCE,

AND AT ITS PREDECESSORS, IN DISCUSSING WAYS AND MEANS TO

IMPROVE COOPERATION BETWEEN MEXICO AND THE UNITED STATES

WITH RESPECT TO OUR BILATERAL PROBLEMS. BESIDES THE TWO

SPECIFIC MATTERS I HAVE MENTIONED, THESE HAVE INCLUDED

SUCH THINGS AS BILATERAL TRADE POLICIES, CONTROL OF THE

TRAFFIC IN DRUGS, INCREASED CULTURAL, TECHNICAL AND SCIENTIFIC

EXCHANGE, AND THE PROMOTION OF TOURISM BOTH WAYS.

MORE THAN ANY OF ITS PREDECESSORS, HOWEVER, THIS

CONFERENCE HAS ALSO DEVOTED ATTENTION TO LARGER ISSUES,

TO ISSUES WHICH CONCERN BOTH MEXICO AND THE UNITED STATES, TO BE SURE, BUT WHOSE MANIFESTATIONS AND IMPLICATIONS ARE WORLDWIDE. WE HAVE, FOR EXAMPLE, TALKED ABOUT THE LAW OF THE SEA, ABOUT THE CONTROL OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS, AND ABOUT PRESIDENT ECHEVERRIA'S PROPOSED CHARTER OF ECONOMIC RIGHTS AND DUTIES. THIS TREND REFLECTS, IN LARGE DEGREE, THE CHANGING INTERNATIONAL POSITION OF THE NATION IN WHICH THIS THIRTEENTH INTERPARLIAMENTARY CONFERENCE HAS BEEN HELD. MEXICO IS LOOKING BEYOND THE HORIZONS OF THIS HEMISPHERE, AS, INDEED, THIS NATION MUST IF THE NEEDS OF ITS PEOPLES ARE TO BE MET. CONVERSELY, THE WORLD OF "IN-BETWEEN COUNTRIES," IF I MAY USE THAT PHRASE, LOOKS IN THIS DIRECTION FOR A CONTINUING AND GROWING CONTRIBUTION OF LEADERSHIP, A CONTRIBUTION WHICH MEXICO IS EMINENTLY QUALIFIED TO MAKE ON THE BASIS OF ITS PROFOUND AND NOTABLE ACHIEVEMENTS, ESPECIALLY IN THE LAST HALF CENTURY.

SO, MR. CHAIRMAN, THESE ARE SOME OF THE OLD

UNDERSTANDINGS RENEWED AS WELL AS NEW PERCEPTIONS WITH

WHICH THE UNITED STATES DELEGATION WILL RETURN HOME.

MOST OF ALL WE WILL TAKE WITH US A DEEPER SENSE OF WHAT

WE SHARE AND WHAT WE MUST YET LEARN TO SHARE IN THE

COMMON INTERESTS OF THE PEOPLE OF BOTH MEXICO AND THE

UNITED STATES AND, IN A LARGER SENSE, IN OUR COMMON

INTERESTS WITH OTHER NATIONS IN THIS HEMISPHERE AND IN

THE REST OF THE WORLD.

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
