Additionally, readings from the 152 fac-pac will be assigned.

#### Attendance

Three cut classes are permitted; for each subsequent absence a grade will be deducted from a paper. Use your cuts wisely.

#### Assignments

Once a week each student is to hand three questions on the reading at hand. (Monday, A-H; Wednesday, I-P; Friday, Q-Z). No late submissions accepted. Questions will be graded either CR (credit) or NC (no credit); in order to receive credit, they will have to be well worded, meaningful, grammatical, and properly spelled. Ten or more CR's will equal an A; 8-10=B; 6-8=C; 4-6=D; 0-3=F. This cumulative grade will count equally with the grades on two papers and the final exam.

Paper #1: Discuss the issue of loyalty and disloyalty in  $\underbrace{\text{Hamlet}}$ , tying in (if you wish) other readings from Dante forward. Due March 24.

Paper #2: What constitutes living well? Discuss this issue with regard to Tolstoy's <u>Death of Ivan Ilych</u>, tying in (if you wish) other readings from the 18th century forward. Due May 5.

Papers are to be a minimum of 1500 words. In all cases be sure to have a thesis, state it clearly, quote accurately and with care, and follow the principles of composition. Hacker's <a href="Pocket Style Manual">Pocket Style Manual</a> is reliable. The Writing Center is recommended.
