Course Description

This course is a continuation from GRMN 101 (Elementary German I). Students who have successfully completed GRMN 101 with a grade of C- or higher or who have placed into GRMN 102 by language placement exam may take the course. Otherwise you must receive consent of the instructor to register. GRMN 102 is a four-skills course that teaches listening, speaking, reading, and writing with a focus on communication and useful everyday situations and themes, including shopping, going out, leisure activities, and getting around. Through these themes and by targeted activities, you will learn about various topics as you explore the diversity of culture and life in German-speaking countries. The course meets four times a week and offers you as much of an immersion experience as possible to optimize your exposure to and use of German.

Learning Outcomes

The course is designed to guide you to:

1. Understand spoken and written German in the context of common situations and in a broadening range of grammatical structures and expressions, specifically, those emphasized in the textbook chapters 5 – 8.
2. Produce basic, comprehensible spoken and written German, including brief verbal expressions in conversation and short compositions of a few paragraphs covering everyday topics in writing.
3. Acquire increased knowledge of the geography, history, culture, and people of regions where German is spoken and to express that acquaintance through speaking and writing in German.

Assessment Activities

Below is a listing of the types and categories of activities, assignments, and tests on which your assessment will be based.

Participation

Participation is a crucial element in learning a language, and you can only participate if you attend class (see Attendance Policy below). Much of the in-class work is comprised of interactivities, language exercises you complete with other students that get you to communicate with each other. For this to work, you need to initiate conversation, take chances with the language, and be open to learning from your successes and mistakes. Your participation assessment will be based on the following:

1. Verbal responses to written and spoken prompts in class and engagement and interaction with others
2. Individual and group written work for in-class activities and exercises
3. Assessment of vocabulary knowledge and use in class-based activities and mini-quizzes

Homework

Homework will consist of exercises from the workbook and the textbook, reading and preparing assigned segments for each session, as well as written compositions assigned in each chapter. It is important to keep up with homework as it is assigned and it is expected to be handed in on time. If you miss class, please find out from your class partner what the assignment is and have it ready for the next class period.

Chapter Quizzes

Each chapter there will be at least one brief quiz on selected material from the chapter.

Chapter Tests

Tests are given at the end of each chapter. While they focus on material covered in a given chapter, they will also include previous material as language learning is cumulative in nature. Tests can only be made up with advance notice and only when a sufficient and documented excuse is provided.

Outside-Class Conversation Practice and Pronunciation Work

The UM German Club will hold conversation tables again this semester, and we encourage you to attend for extra practice. There will be outside-of-class conversation exercises expected three times during the semester for conversation credit. Your instructor will keep you informed of those conversation opportunities.

Final Conversation Activity

Toward the end of the semester you will meet with a group of others from class and engage in a conversation that will count as an assessment activity toward your final grade. The conversation will be set up to reflect an authentic verbal exchange where you will have the chance to discuss topics and use vocabulary and grammar patterns covered in the course. You will have the chance to review and practice for this activity before you do it.

Final Written Examination

The written final exam for all sections of GRMN 102 will take place on Monday, April 29th from 7:00pm to 9:00 pm in LA (Eck Hall) 11. The exam will be cumulative.
