

WHY WIKIPEDIA

Wikipedia is the world's most-used reference tools, and one of the most visited websites (Rainie & Tancer, 2007). Nearly **90%** of Wikipedia editors are cisgender men, with **only 9%** of editors identifying as women, and **1%** identifying as trans or non-binary. Studies have found that there is **high reader demand** for Wikipedia articles about **LGBTQIA+ topics**, but not enough high-quality articles to meet that demand (Klein, M., et al, 2016; Warncke-Wang, M, et. al, 2015).

Staff from the WNYC Studios' acclaimed podcast *Nancy* noticed these representational gaps on Wikipedia, and decided to host an edit-a-thon during the SXSW tech and music festival. A producer reached out to the UT Libraries, UT's School of Information and Austin Public Library to get help with research and resources for the edit-a-thon.



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Tommy Pico

Tommy Pico is an indigenous (Kumeyaay Nation) writer, poet, and podcast host.

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Early life

Pico grew up on the *Viejas Reservation* of the Kumeyaay nation, near *San Diego*. His father was a reservation chairman.^{[1][2]} Pico started writing comics at age 5, and as a teenager created zines and wrote poetry.^[3]

He attended *Sarah Lawrence College*, where he studied pre-med with the intention of returning to the reservation as a doctor. He decided not to pursue medicine and moved to *New York City*, where he worked as a barista in *Williamsburg* and started writing poetry.^[1]


As of 2018, Pico lives in *Bushwick, Brooklyn*.^[3]

Work

In 2016, Pico's first book *IRL* was published by the small press *Birds, LLC*.^[4] *IRL* is written as one long text message, drawing on the *epic tradition*.^[5] *IRL* received critical acclaim and was included on best-of-the-year lists for 2016.^{[5][6]} In 2017, it received the *Brooklyn Public Library Literary Prize*.^[7]

Pico's second book, *Nature Poem* was published in 2017 by *Tin House*. Pico again used the epic format, in this case to explore and challenge stereotypes of Native Americans as "noble savages" who are one with nature.^[8] *Nature Poem* also received critical acclaim.^{[9][10][11]}

Pico co-curates the live reading series *Poets With Attitude* with *Morgan Parker*,^[12] and he is the co-host of the podcast *Food 4 That*, a podcast about queer identity, race, sex, relationships, literature, and pop culture.^[13]

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LGBT rights in Syria

Lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) people in **Syrian Arab Republic** may face legal challenges not experienced by non-LGBT residents. Article 520 of the penal code of 1949, prohibits "carnal relations against the order of nature", and provides for up to three-years imprisonment.^[1]

In Islamic State-held areas, women and the LGBT community in particular are targeted for attacks. As part of its imposition of Sharia law, ISIS punishes those who have "committed the acts of the people of [Prophet] Lot,"^[2] which they also refer to as "sodomy." This terminology is based on the story of the prophet Lot in the Quran, whose people were destroyed for sexual transgressions.

In territories in Syria controlled by Jabhat Fateh al-Sham, LGBT Syrians are arrested, beaten, and executed.^{[3][4]}

Mahmoud Hassino, gay Syrian opposition activist, journalist and started the online magazine *Mawalih*, notes that regardless of the outcome of the civil war, work needs to be done in the civil right area on behalf of all Syrians, not just the LGBT community. Miral Bioredda, a secular leader of the **Local Coordination Committees of Syria**, said "Personally I see homosexuality as a private matter. But Syrian society would say "no way" if gays rose to claim their rights. Developing a civil society will take time." Nasradeen Ahme, a leader of the **Free Syrian Army** which works to bring down the government of Bashar al-Assad, said "If I was in charge I would enforce tougher laws against homosexuals. If someone said homosexuals should be stoned to death as in Iran and Saudi Arabia, I would not object."^[5]

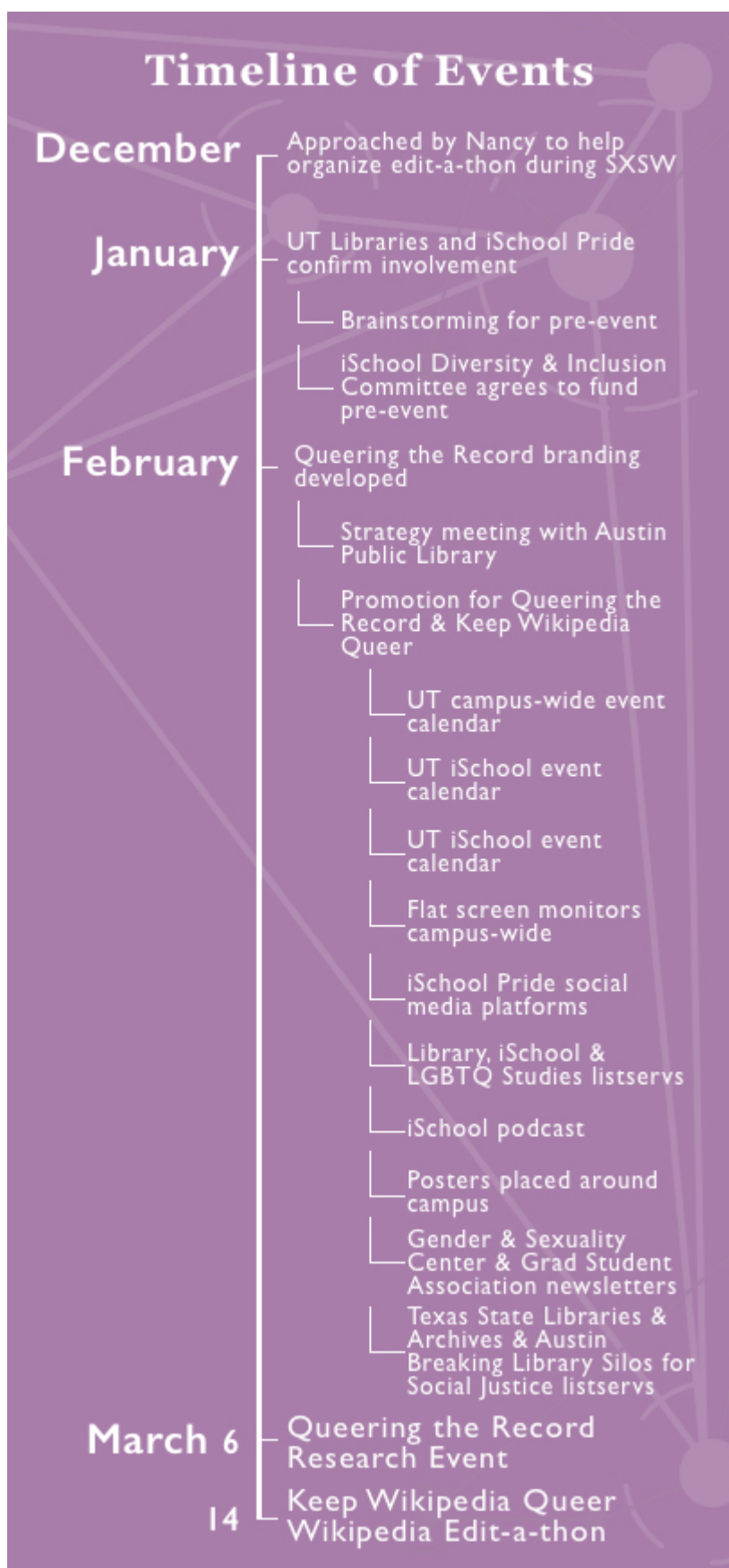

STEPS TO COMPLETION



INTRODUCTION

Knowledge developed in digital spaces skews to a white, cis-male, heteronormative default, creating significant representational gaps online.

Academic librarians and MLS students at UT Austin took digital activism to a new level, partnering with WNYC Radio staff and Austin Public Library to organize two events that addressed gaps in Wikipedia's LGBTQIA+ representation during the SXSW festival in March 2018.

Events:

1. **Queering the Record:** At the initial research event, UT Austin faculty, staff and students identified missing or inadequate Wikipedia entries and located sources.
2. **Keep Wikipedia Queer:** The second event put those sources to work in a large-scale Wikipedia edit-a-thon, sponsored by the WNYC podcast Nancy.

QUEERING THE RECORD

Librarians and MLS students quickly realized the potential of UT Austin students, faculty, and staff to gather reputable sources for the edit-a-thon and decided to crowdsource the research process by organizing a campus-wide research event.

- Half-day event with pizza, snacks, and coffee
- 40 students, faculty, and staff participants
- Identified topics without Wikipedia pages or topics with pages that needed expanding
- Found links and citations to reliable, vetted sources
- Contributed to a 28-page Google Doc!

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ABSTRACT

Much of the knowledge developed in digital spaces skews to a white, cis-male, heteronormative default, creating significant representational gaps online. To tackle these representational inequities, UT librarians and MLS students took digital activism to a new level, partnering with Austin Public Library and WNYC public radio staff to organize two events to address gaps in Wikipedia's LGBTQIA+ representation.

Wikipedia is the world's most-used reference tool, and one of the most visited websites (Rainie & Tancer, 2007). Studies have found that there is high reader demand for Wikipedia articles about LGBTQIA+ topics, but not enough high-quality articles to meet that demand (Klein, M., et al 2016; Warncke-Wang, M, et. al., 2015).

In an initial research event at the library, faculty, staff and students from across campus were invited to help identify missing or inadequate Wikipedia entries and locate sources to fill those gaps. More than 35 people participated over the course of the 4-hour research event. The end product was a 23-page Google documents that identified nearly 100 LGBTQIA+ related topics that needed Wikipedia pages created or updated. Participants located hundreds of sources to be used in the development of those articles.

The second event put those sources to work in a large-scale Wikipedia edit-a-thon, part of SXSW tech and music festival. It brought librarians and students together with community members and festival goers in a 4-hour marathon event to edit as many Wikipedia pages as possible. Participants edited or created more than 70 pages on topics as wide-ranging as LGBTQIA+ rights in Syria, comedy writer/blogger Samantha Irby, and the children's book series Frog & Toad. The event has opened the door for further collaboration between the university library and the public library, and more Wikipedia edit-a-thons are scheduled for 2019.

The success of these events model how academic libraries can develop strategic partnerships to address large-scale problems; engage campus audiences to improve representation in online spaces; and teach research principles to facilitate digital activism.
