SOPHE Awarded ATSDR Cooperative Agreement in Environmental Health Promotion

In September 2004, SOPHE was awarded a five-year cooperative agreement from the CDC's Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (ATSDR) to help build health educators' capacity to conduct environmental health education. The project will employ an ecological approach to bridging the gap between the environmental health and health promotion communities using multiple interventions. In addition to National and chapter SOPHE members, the Society will reach out to the Directors of Health Promotion and Education, American Public Health Association, National Association of Local Boards of Health, National Association of City and County Health Officials, National Environmental Health Association, and other groups. Avenues for expanding professional preparation curricula on environmental health promotion will be explored in latter years of the cooperative agreement. Ms. Blakely Pomietto, MPH, (bpomietto@sophe.org) will serve as Director of the Environmental Health Promotion project at SOPHE. Ms. Pomietto is assisted by a 12-member Environmental Health Advisory Committee composed of environmental health scientists, environmental justice advocates, and health education/promotion specialists.

Quitlines 101: A Primer for Health Educators

Despite recent decreases in smoking prevalence rates, annually, tobacco is still a factor in 440,000 deaths and costs Americans \$75 Billion in medical care. SOPHE staff person, Blakely Pomietto, MPH, wrote a 4-page special supplement to the July/August 2005 issue of SOPHE News & Views entitled “Quitlines 101: A Primer for Health Educators”. Tobacco quitlines are telephone-based tobacco counseling services for individuals interested in and/or attempting to quit smoking. Counselors specifically trained to help smokers quit answer callers' questions and help them to develop an individual and effective plan for quitting. The publication provides an orientation to tobacco quitlines, emphasizing their role in comprehensive tobacco prevention and control programs, and the role of health educators.
