Alexandri, Ioanna graduated from the Department of Theatre Studies, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, in 2005. She holds a Master's degree from the Theatre Studies Department of the National and Kapodestrian University of Athens, where she is currently a PhD candidate. Her research interests include contemporary Greek drama and performance theory.

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Birringer, Johannes is a choreographer/media artist and director of DAP-Lab at Brunel University where he is a Professor of Performance Technologies in the School of Arts. He has created numerous dance-theatre works, video installations, and digital projects in collaboration with artists in Europe, the Americas, China, and Japan. His digital oratorio *Corpo, Carne e Espírito*, premiered in Brasil at the FIT Theatre Festival in 2008; the interactive dancework *Suna no Onna* was featured at festivals in London, and the Lab's mixed-reality installation UKIYO went on European tour in 2010. DAP-Lab's new production is a dance opera, *for the time being*, created as an homage to the 1913 futurist Russian opera *Victory over the Sun*. His books include *Theatre, Theory, Post-modernism (1989), Media and Performance* (1998), *Performance on the Edge* (2000), *Performance, Technology and Science* (2008), and two edited volumes on Dance and Cognition (2005), and Dance and Choreomania (2011).

Delikonstantinidou, Katerina is a PhD candidate in the School of English, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. She received a scholarship by the Greek State Scholarship Foundation to pursue her MA (2012-2014) and she was awarded the 2014 Young Scholar Excellence Award by MESEA. Her research interests include Performing Arts, Ethnic Studies, Ancient Drama, as well as Mythology and Folklore.

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Hernando-Real, Noelia is Associate Professor of English and American Literature at the Universidad Autónoma de Madrid (Spain). Her publications include *Self and Space in the Theater of Susan Glaspell* (McFarland, 2011), *Performing Gender Violence. Plays by Contemporary American Women Dramatists*, co-edited with Barbara Ozieblo (Palgrave Macmillan, 2012), and several articles on contemporary women playwrights, such as Marsha Norman, Paula Vogel, Caryl Churchill, and Sarah Ruhl.

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Kondylaki, Dimitra is a director, dramaturge, translator, theatre editor and repertoire adviser. She has a PhD in Comparative Literature, specializing in contemporary European theatre (Sorbonne, Paris IV, 2003). She is also a teacher of theatrical translation at the French Institute of Greece (2009-...). 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Ozieblo, Barbara is Professor of American Literature at the University of Malaga, Spain. She specializes in women's writing and theater. She is the author of *Susan Glaspell: A Critical Biography* (2000) and co-author of *Susan Glaspell and Sophie Treadwell* (2008). Co-founder of the International Susan Glaspell Society, she was its President till 2009. Ozieblo is co-editor of *Performing Gender Violence* (Palgrave, 2012). She is currently working on the cognitive approach to theater audiences.

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Sidiropoulou, Avra is a director and Lecturer of Theatre Arts at the Open University of Cyprus. Her main areas of specialization include the theatre of the director-*auteur*, theory of theatre practice, and adaptation. She taught at the University of Peloponnese, the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, and Bosphorus University. Her monograph *Authoring Performance: the Director in Contemporary Theatre* was published by Palgrave Macmillan in 2011.

Siouzouli, Natascha studied theatre, philology, and literature at the University of Athens and was awarded a PhD from the Freie Universität Berlin in 2006.
