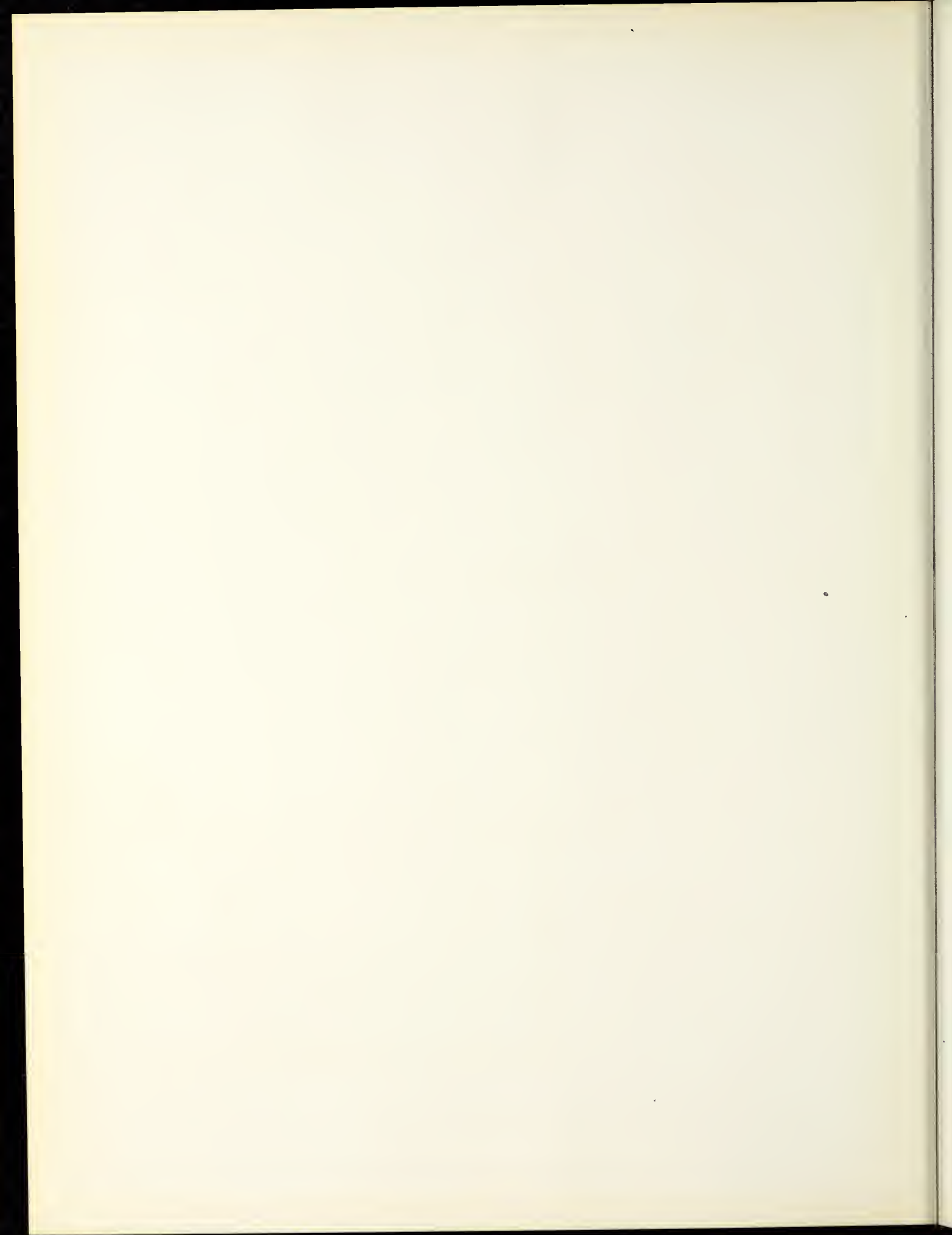

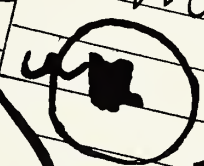

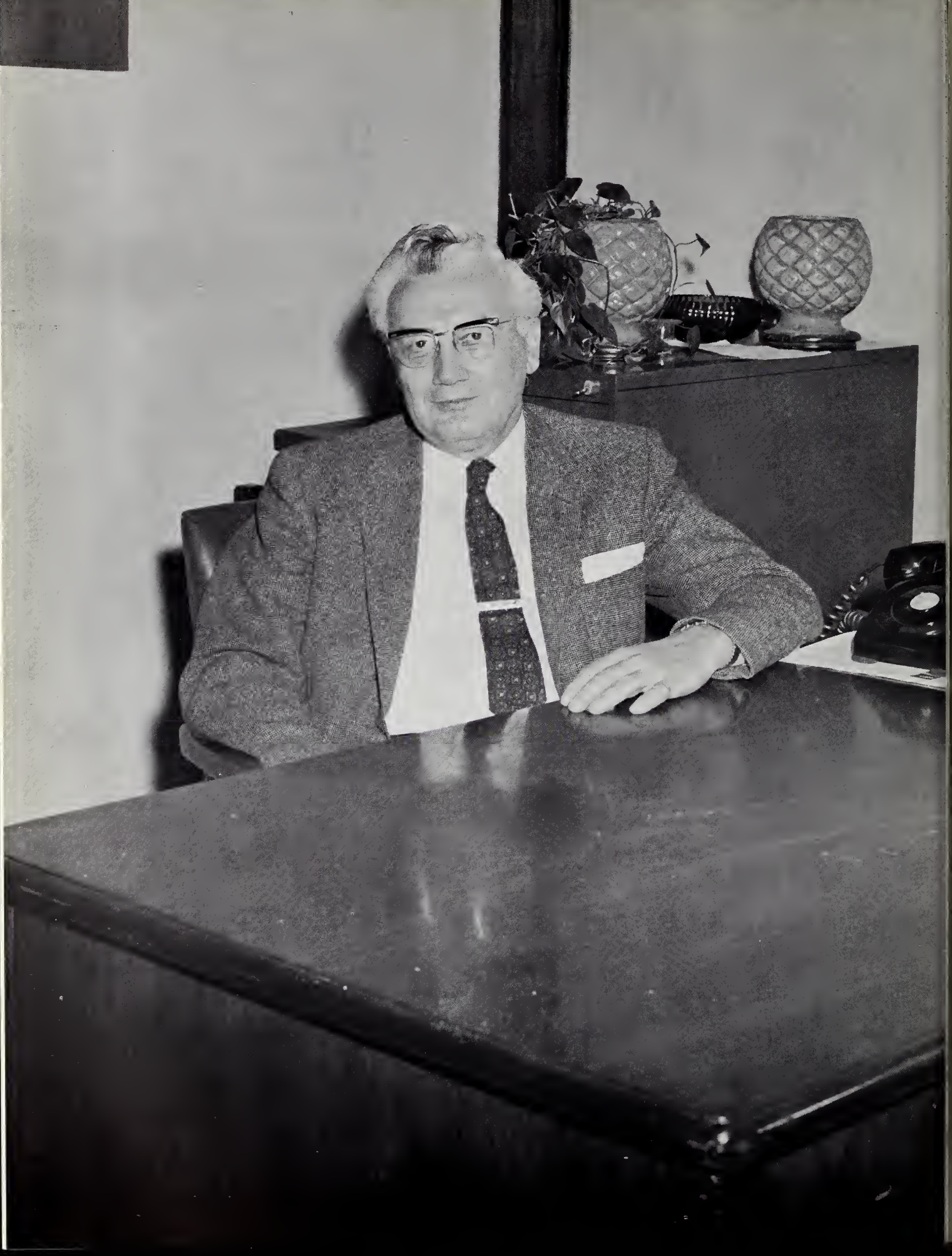

As he treats each person as an individual from whom he can learn, he teaches human understanding by example.

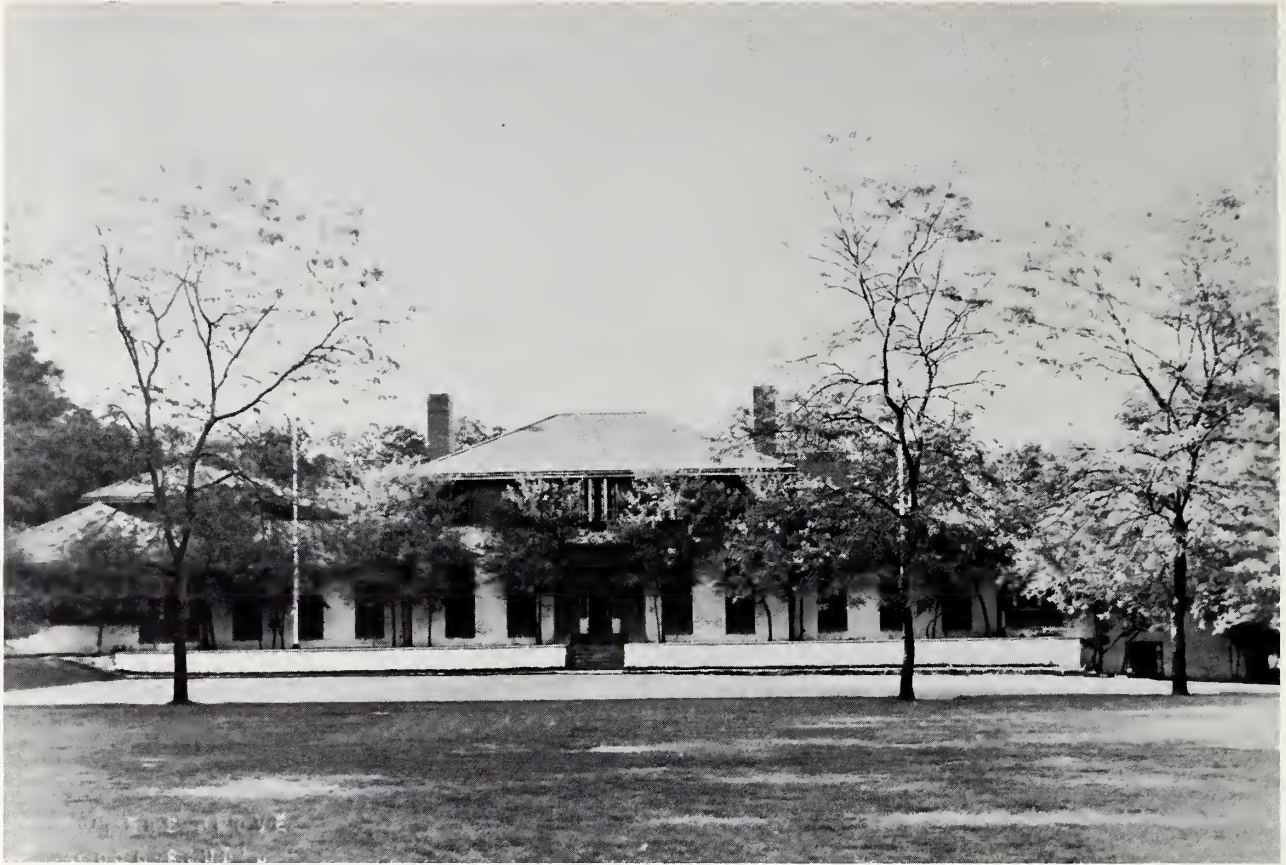

--- IN MEMORIAM ---

Mrs. Avery Coonley, after whom the Avery Coonley School in Downers Grove is named, died early in the summer of 1958. She established the school in 1912 as a private kindergarten and it was expanded in 1927 to include eight grades and moved to its present location. In 1949 Mrs. Coonley gave the school and its property to National College with the understanding that its high educational standards would be maintained. Since then a warm relationship has developed between National and the Avery Coonley School.

National College has recently lost two good and great friends. Dr. N. Dwight Harris, who died on September 4, 1958, and Henry J. Brandt, who died on July 29, 1958, were known and loved by all for their deep belief and faith in this College.

o Dr. Harris, a noted author, poet, educator, and philanthropist, was a member of the Board of Trustees for many years. During this time his munificent gifts to the College included the President's home, the Graduate House, and timely contributions to the scholarship, building, and current operations funds of the College.

Mr. Brandt, a leading attorney, had been President of the Board of Trustees since 1949. He stimulated a vigorous spirit of enthusiasm and cooperation among his associates, and by his leadership, counsel, and example made many significant and lasting contributions to the College.

Thank you, Kenneth, for the wonderful job you have done at National--we are proud of you and hope that you will always be our helper and friend.

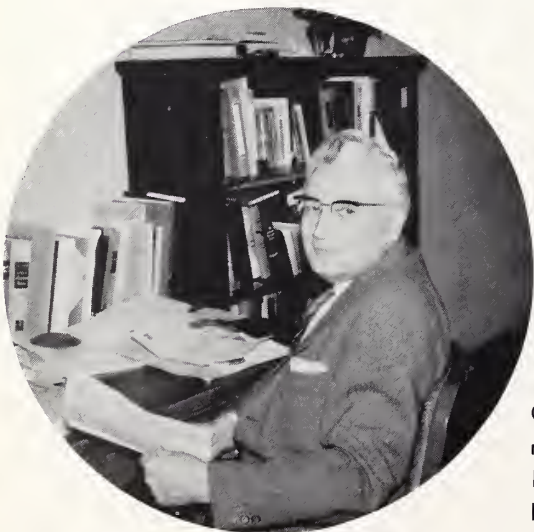

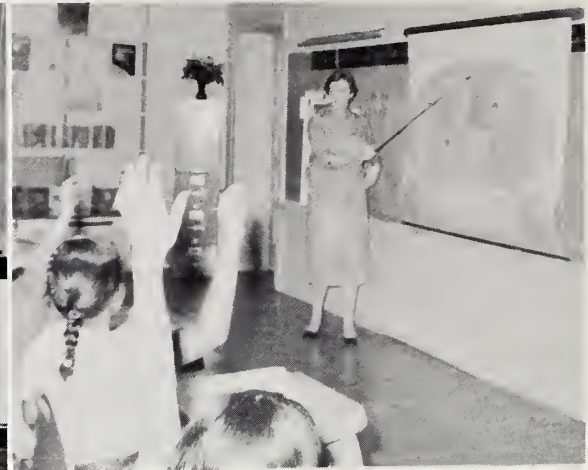




## SOPHOMORE YEAR

## JUNIOR YEAR

A September student teaching experience usually falls in the junior year. This provides the student with an opportunity to participate in orientation programs and gain a better understanding of the school's policies. Special emphasis on music, speech, and arithmetic methods prepare the student to effectively carry out his objectives in the classroom.



## SENIOR YEAR

In the senior year a student may elect the full-time student teaching program and reside off campus for a nine-week period. Professional courses taken during the remainder of the semester supplement practical experience, making possible real insight into the life of a teacher. Senior students may also elect a student-teaching experience in the Guidance Center and thus gain a better understanding of how to deal with special problems.
