### :: What's New? ::

The following is the abstract to a scientific article published by Dr. Greg Turner, Robin van Meter, and Dr. Gerry Hertel. The article includes data on tree population in the Gordon Natural Area.

A 2003 survey of canopy trees and woody saplings and seedlings at the Gordon Natural Area in

Chester County, Pennsylvania was used for comparison with a survey conducted there in 1970 to determine if changes in forest composition have occurred over this thirty-three year period. Plots were established in 2003 in the Gordon forest in the vicinity of those surveyed in 1970 and all trees (> 12.6 cm DBH), saplings (between 2.5-12.6 cm DBH), and seedlings (<2.5 cm DBH and taller than 30.5 cm) were identified and inventoried using size classes similar to those used in 1970. In 2003 the canopy was dominated by tulip poplar (*Liriodendron tulipifera*) and American beech (*Fagus grandifolia*). The understory was dominated by both beech saplings and seedlings, and by white

ash (*Fraxinus americana*) seedlings, all of whose relative densities were similar to those found in 1970. Flowering dogwood (*Cornus florida*) and Mockernut hickory (*Carya tomentosa*) sapling

density declined from 1970 to 2003 while dogwood, ironwood (*Carpinus caroliniana*), and red oak (*Quercus rubra*) seedlings, all present in 1970, were absent from plots in 2003. Two new exotic species, Tree-of-heaven (*Ailanthus altissima*) and Princess tree (*Paulownia tomentosa*), were found in the understory in 2003, though at low densities. While canopy dominance by tulip poplar and beech did not change from 1970 to 2003, declines in density by most native species, and establishment by new exotic species, into the understory suggest that forest composition is changing to include fewer native and more exotic species.
