I especially want to compliment the extraordinary effort of our editor, Alexis Kielb, who coupled technical writing expertise with a tight focus on our goal to share the work of McNair scholars in a timely way within the academic community.

To develop this program involved leadership vision and team work. With the leadership of Dr. James Knapp, a small group of faculty worked together for over eighteen months to obtain the Department of Education grant which enabled EMU to implement the McNair Scholars

Program. Housed in the Honors College, the Program's goals include college completion, successful application to and graduation from a doctoral program. To facilitate the achievement of the goals, sophomores, juniors and seniors receive intensive training on research methods, funding to conduct research plus in-depth and personalized advising. The selection criteria include U.S. citizenship, a minimum grade point average of 3.0, first-generation college student or membership in an under-represented group (African-American, Native American/Alaskan Native or Hispanic).

This program is named for Dr. Ronald McNair, a first-generation college graduate who became a physicist, received his doctoral degree at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and later he trained as an astronaut. Sadly, Dr. McNair was killed on the Challenger space ship. However, Dr. McNair's words are appropriate to commemorate this inaugural McNair Chronicles: "Whether or not you reach your goals in life depends entirely on how well you prepare for them and how badly you want them. You are eagles! Stretch your wings and fly to the sky."
