Jerome Frank, Judge, United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit since 1941. Ph.B., 1910; J.D., 1912, University of Chicago. Visiting Lecturer in Law at Yale Law School since 1946. Formerly General Counsel, Agricultural Adjustment Administration, 1933-35; Special Counsel to R.F.C., 1935; Commissioner (and later Chairman) of S.E.C., 1937-41. Author of Law and the Modern Mind (1930); Save America First (1938); If Men Were Angels (1942); Fate and Freedom (1945); Courts on Trial (1949). Contributor to various legal and other periodicals.
