

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

Daemen Today

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60th Anniversary Brings Out Heartfelt Comments of Pride

The year was 1947... and what a year it was!

Aviator Chuck Yeager broke the sound barrier. India and Pakistan won independence from Great Britain. The transistor was invented. And Jackie Robinson was the first African-American to play in modern major league baseball.

It was also the year Rosary Hill College was founded by the Sisters of St. Francis. The new educational institution would go on to produce – under its founding name, and later with the change to Daemen College – some of the best and brightest students and community leaders, and a legacy of selfless community service.

Six decades have seen huge changes, advances, victories and innovations – and has spawned indelible memories among the tight-knit Rosary Hill/Daemen community of alumni, supporters, and friends. Some of them reflected for *Daemen Today* on their individual connections to the school, and what it all means for today and tomorrow.

"One of our goals has been to get graduates reinvigorated about the College, and we have," says Daemen's president, Dr. Martin J. Anisman. Although alumni giving to their alma mater is just one criteria for judging affinity with it, Dr. Anisman reports that, during his tenure – which will be 12 years come March 1 – the rate of alumni giving has gone up 400 percent.

Dr. Anisman emphasizes his pride in the nuns and the days when the College was known as Rosary Hill, and recalls a number of tangible indications of the institution's growth – physically and academically. Examples are the addition of the second-floor office space to Wick Center; construction of the Campus Drive apartments; the Tom Reynolds Center for Special Education Studies; and, of course, the ongoing construction of the new Center for Information, Research and Community Programs (CIRCP).

"There was virtually no research and grant money when I came here," says Dr. Anisman. Now, he proudly notes, more than \$10 million has been acquired over the past 10-plus years.

Funding Surprise

A major effort – which yielded a pleasant surprise – was the crafting of a grant intended to procure funding from the prestigious Kresge Foundation in Michigan for the actual brick-and-mortar building of the CIRCP. "We asked for \$750 thousand and received \$900 thousand," Dr. Anisman notes. "That's almost unheard of. It's a feather in the cap of the College – and our capital campaign leadership."

He adds the College's sense of pride over the LEED Certification for the forthcoming Center for Information, Research and Community Programs – a designation requiring the successful meeting of a number of rigorous criteria, attesting to the environmentally conscious, "green" nature of the new facility.

President Anisman cites other successful grants, including those that helped make possible the Tom Reynolds Center, the Seneca-Babcock initiative, and the College's pioneering work in wound therapy, dealing specifically with the serious issue of bed sores, also known as pressure sores or – more technically – decubitus ulcers.

In addition, Daemen's president points to programming innovations, owing much to the work of Dr. Edwin G. Clausen, Vice President for Academic Affairs, as another reason for his pride in considering Daemen's 60th anniversary. One example is the Core Curriculum instituted some years ago, based on A World of Opportunity

outcomes – a student's ability to perform critical thinking and navigate through certain technologies, for example. "We were one of the leaders in this," says Anisman, reasoning that most people change careers several times in their lifetimes, and consequently having such core competencies can be extremely useful when one changes from one field to another.

Other program initiatives – service learning experiences; the requirement that students have some form of international experience; the Canadian Scholars program that brings 300 Canadian students to campus on weekends; and two programs in New York City, designed for orthodox Jewish women to earn a master's in special education – round out the educational growth and scope of the college.

Enrollment Is Up


Noting that overall enrollment is up at Daemen, Dr. Anisman adds that Daemen's well-known physical therapy program was expanded several years ago to include what at the time was one of only two or three doctorate programs in PT offered by independent colleges in the state.

Daemen English professor Dr. Robert A. Morace, who has been at Daemen for nearly 30 years, came to the College when a few of the Sisters of St. Francis were still part of the faculty. Dr. Morace cites the Honors Program brought to life by Dr. James A. Moran, professor of philosophy and religious studies, who, he notes, also did the same for the Monday movie series on campus.

"Until his retirement – and in a similarly self-effacing way – (music professor) Chet Mais directed a music series." Dr. Morace relates that two of his best memories of Daemen are student productions of the *Three Penny Opera* and *Marat/Sade*, both directed by Christopher F. Wilson, now director of academic computing



The Main Street entrance, 1970's.




"The art department has adapted to the times and is thriving once again...I look at James Kuo's work, on exhibit right now, and realize – because we're all often in danger of forgetting – just how good Daemen has been and is. What a revelation – a bit like reading *Cardinal Numbers*, a collection by Hob Broun (Hayward Hale Broun's son) and seeing Daemen featured in one of the stories – disguised as 'Rose Hill College for Women,' but recognizable nonetheless."

Finally, Dr. Morace nods to the late John Masterson, former member of the English Department, who came to Rosary Hill in 1947. Says Morace: "He used to pepper his talk with literary quotations and Latin. He was more a wickedly funny curmudgeon than outright cynic; hard to think of Daemen/Rosary Hill and not think of John."

Witness to Major Growth

Sister DeSales Hattenberger, selected as a Distinguished Alumna in 2006, recalls how she had the opportunity to watch the College grow. "When I came, there was one building, the library, during the presidency of Sister Canavan," she remembers. "I watched these people, the Sisters and lay people together, build Duns Scotus Hall, Wick, the dormitory, so I was here during the growth of the College. It came from nothing much to a fairly well-situated campus."

Sister DeSales served as the first admissions director in 1957, and recalls setting up the financial aid office. She had the opportunity to deal with foreign students, physically challenged students, and "all categories of student needs," she says. "I was responsible for meeting these new kinds of people, welcoming them, and working with other administrators. Those were very challenging – and enjoyable – days."

The College's tradition of service learning continues to expand with initiatives around the globe, including the Dominican Republic, Africa, and, soon, Laos. What's more, she adds, meeting people during her degree studies at Rosary Hill (English, '59) "was a broadening experience for me," as people from various walks of life shared their background with her.

Well Prepared for Career

Daemen was a life-changing experience for Karen Cuddy-Miller ('87), too, now principal of Ohio Street School in North Tonawanda. "I enjoyed the close-knit opportunity to build relationships through my education," she states. "The teachers knew you and you knew them. They were incredibly well qualified and did a fabulous job preparing me for the world of education."

Cuddy-Miller taught 18 years in special education and says she felt from the start that she received "a solid grounding – ethically, professionally, personally, academically" at Daemen. "I was fully prepared to hit the ground running. I credit my Daemen professors for some very high expectations and understanding of the pedagogy of education and their ability to convey that. They were top notch in that area."

She adds that, when she accepts student teachers at her school, Daemen student teachers are among the best. When Cuddy-Miller was associated with the Williamsville Central School District, she wore many hats as a special education teacher and had the opportunity to participate in various leadership roles. "That led me to the track I'm on now," she explains, "and Daemen contributed to that. Daemen enabled me to be successful."

It wasn't all hitting the books for Cuddy-Miller, however. There was the social and emotional dimension to her years on campus. "College creates a well-roundedness of a person," she notes. "I have fond memories of the



campus itself, the opportunity for social interaction. It all helps you understand how the world works, that transition between high school and the real world."

"A Passion for Things"

Another terrific Daemen alumnus with whom *Daemen Today* caught up on the occasion of the college's 60th anniversary is Mary Bauer, class of '72. Readers may recall the story on Mary and her group of six Rosary Hill alumni, who have stayed in touch over 25-plus years – "25 Years and Going Strong" – in our fall, 2005 issue.

Having just returned from her first trip to Ireland, Bauer was especially jubilant in discussing a "yesterday and today" look at her alma mater. "It was a great learning and academic atmosphere, during the Vietnam era and Kent State, plus a wonderful environment for great women in particular to become lifelong friends," she says.

A sociology major who went on to become director of human resources for the Roman Catholic Diocese of Rochester, Bauer recalls how Daemen fostered plenty of opportunity for students "to come forward in non-traditional ways, particularly women. It was an era where women weren't treated the same as men. This was the late '60s and early '70s, a changing time in our society and the same on campus.





"Rosary Hill allowed me to develop a passion for things," she declares. "If I had to do it all over again, I would still study sociology and would still go to Daemen. Those four years were wonderful."

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Administration

Linda Koller has been appointed to the position of Director of Marketing. Koller came to Daemen in the Summer of 2006 as a marketing consultant in the Admissions Department. A Florida

Famed Prosecutor Vincent Bugliosi Speaks At Daemen


Bestseller, "Reclaiming History" Reinforces Conclusions of Warren Commission Report on JFK Assassination

"One point regarding the Kennedy assassination that both sides agree on – those who believe there was a conspiracy and those who do not – is that Lee Harvey Oswald did, in fact, shoot President Kennedy. Those who think there was a conspiracy believe someone put him up to it. But in my book, I knock down every one of their arguments. There simply was no conspiracy."


That was the central point made by famed prosecutor and best-selling author Vincent Bugliosi on November 6, 2007, on the Daemen campus. Bugliosi discussed the John F. Kennedy assassination at length, and his new 1600-page best-seller, *Reclaiming History*, supporting the conclusions of the Warren Commission investigation.

Requiring twenty years to research and write, *Reclaiming History* began when Bugliosi participated in a 1986 London television production, in which he prosecuted Lee Harvey Oswald in a make believe trial presided over by a real federal judge and jury members taken from the rolls in Dallas⁻ District Court.

"What I learned, in preparing for that trial, was that those who believe there was a conspiracy behind the

Kennedy assassination have been accusing the Warren Commission of distortions in its report, suppressing evidence. It absolutely captivated me, and I found that there was – and is – a great story to be told there. In fact, there is no other story like it in our country's history. Nothing comes close."

Bugliosi entertained a lengthy question-and-answer session following his talk, and remained afterwards to sign copies of his many books—especially his most famous trial, the Charles Manson case, which became the basis of his classic, *Helter Skelter*, the biggest selling true-crime book in publishing history. Two of Bugliosi's other true crime books – *And the Sea Will Tell*, and *Outrage -* also reached #1 on the New York Times hardcover bestseller list.

Former Rosary Hill Professor and Wife Establish Endowed Scholarship at Daemen for Study Abroad



While we live on an ever-shrinking planet, which makes an international education much more important to the success of today's and tomorrow's students, international education turned out to be quite significant to the lives of a former Rosary Hill history professor and his wife, many years ago. So significant, in fact, that they have established an endowed scholarship at Daemen: *Dr. Charles A. and Marjorie A. Gliozzo Endowed Scholarship for Study Abroad*.

From 1958-1966, Charles was an Assistant Professor of European History at Rosary Hill College, now Daemen College. Charles and Marjorie first met on a student ship in the summer of 1960, as group leaders of college and high school students going to Italy and Spain for the Experiment in International Living. The impact of this experience led them in the summer of 1961 to lead other groups to Costa Rica and Switzerland.

Since 1960, Charles and Marjorie continued their involvement in inter-

national activities. Marjorie was a high school Spanish teacher at Kenmore West High School in Kenmore, New York. Subsequently, she was an English Language teacher for twelve years for the Haslett School District in East Lansing/Haslett teaching adult spouses of Michigan State University graduate students.

Charles went on to Michigan State University, where he was a Professor, Humanities and History, and Director of the Office of Overseas Study from 1973-1993. He served as a Fulbrighter to France (1962) and Germany (1982), and was a national leader in NAFSA: Association of International Educators; author of articles and monographs in international education; as well as a recipient of international education grants, and assistant to the Dean of International Studies and Programs.

From these experiences, both Charles and Marjorie, now residents of East Lansing, Michigan, realized the importance of study abroad as intrinsic to a student's education. They hope that this endowment will be a formidable step in enhancing student excellence in learning other cultures and languages at Daemen. Another prime motivation for Charles was his years teaching as Assistant Professor of European History at Rosary Hill.

"The recollection of those years was memorable and enjoyable in spite of the burden of teaching three courses a semester and studying for a Ph.D. degree at the State University of Buffalo," he recalls. "And one semester, I gained administrative experience, with an appointment as interim Chair of the History Department when Sister Urban was on leave.

"The Rosary Hill central administration, the Franciscan nuns and my colleagues were very helpful in allowing me some flexibility in selecting a variety of courses and encouraged me to complete my Ph.D. requirements by giving me a leave of absence." One of those courses was "Geopolitics" that was a highlight for me and my students. Similarly, the Rosary Hill students cannot be underestimated. They were quick to learn, were attentive, and had good communication and writing skills. Rosary Hill College was my first teaching job on a college level and I very definitely learned a great deal from this initial experience."

Daemen Team Travels to Laos, PDR, with Interdisciplinary Consortium for Global Health, to Begin






Puring the fall 2007 semester, a team of Daemen representatives, together with members of The Interdisciplinary Consortium for Global Health (ICGH), met with the Laotian Minister of Health, Dr. Ponmek Dalaloy, in Laos, PDR. The Daemen team consisted of Deam of Academic Affairs Dr. Ed Clausen; Dean of Health and Human Services Dr. Michael Brogan; and Daemen Director of Health Care Studies Justine Tutuska.


The ICGH, which includes Daemen College as a member institution, is working in partnership with the Western Pacific Regional Office of the World Health Organization (WHO) on the \$19 million dollar "Silk Homes Project" in Laos, PDR. The project will bring an integrated approach to muchneeded improvements in the health and economic lives of local residents in that region. The "Silk Homes" project will focus on creating a maternity waiting home initiative – a place for safe delivery to women coming from remote locations in Laos, where medical services are not available. The project will also provide health education and skill-based training (i.e. silk, handmade paper, bamboo production). In addition, women will be taught skills in areas such as silk weaving and papermaking, with the hope that they will be better able to support their families and transfer the skills to their communities.

Members of the ICGH who traveled to Laos included Quinn Owen (University of Wisconsin); Giovanni Deodato (Director of the Silk Homes Project); Lars Hallstrom (St. Francis University) and Laurie Chan (University of Northern British Columbia).

For Large-Scale Collaboration to Promote Student Engagement in the Community

The Western New York Service-Learning Coalition (WNYSLC) has been awarded a three-year grant of \$485,654 from The John R. Oishei Foundation. Established in 2001, at the initiative of Daemen College in collaboration with Niagara University, the WNYSLC is a highly active collaboration of colleges, universities and non-profit and community-based organizations committed to sharing resources and practices related to engaging students in the community.

With this grant, they will hire staff, develop a region-wide database, and support collaborative events and projects to coordinate the placement of undergraduate students in servicelearning positions in the Western New York community. Housed at Daemen College, the WNYSLC is comprised of representatives from higher education institutions representing a combined undergraduate enrollment of 52,000+ students.

"Daemen College is extremely grateful for the generosity and support of The John R. Oishei Foundation," stated Daemen President Dr. Martin J. Anisman. "Many non-profit organizations are already strapped for time and resources. Through our participation in the Western New York Service

Learning Coalition, we will be able to continue to provide much-needed assistance to community organizations that need it most. This generous funding will enable the Coalition to strengthen the foundation and infrastructure of the organization, allowing us to develop effective, lasting projects and take this collaboration to the next level."

Dr. Edwin Clausen, Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Daemen College, founded the Coalition in 2001 with representatives from Niagara University. He serves as a steering committee member of the Western New York Service Learning Coalition. "The WNYSLC is a collaboration that is significant in scope and has already demonstrated itself as a model nationally for collaboration between and among private and public institutions and non-profit and community-based organizations. This investment will significantly enhance the Coalition's capacity to streamline practices, reduce duplication, and to engage multiple constituents strategically and thoughtfully in efforts to improve our region.

"Service learning is an educational experience that goes beyond volunteering - it connects students to the community by integrating academic curriculum with active participation in service. These placements are mutually beneficial to students, the organizations, and the community as a whole."

The John R. Oishei Foundation's mission is to enhance the quality of life for Buffalo area residents by supporting education, healthcare, scientific research and the cultural, social, civic and other charitable needs of the community. The Foundation was established in 1940 by John R. Oishei, founder of Trico Products Corporation.

"It's the biggest unknown I've dealt with as coach since the 1993/94 season," declares Dave Skolen, coach of the Daemen women's basketball team, now in his 16th year of coaching the Wildcats.

Skolen was referring to the big change-over – the fact that, this year, the team is playing in the wake of having lost five seniors after last year's exceptional season. In fact, there's not a single senior on this year's team.

What's more, the team has lost "a ton of talent," in Skolen's words, "that is impossible to replace." He's referring to last year's season, which just happened to go down in the record books as the most successful in the team's history. Undaunted and optimistic, Skolen describes the new 28-game season as promising to be "an interesting year." Returning are Mary Kate Wilson, a junior from East Aurora and Third-Team All-Conference last year. The forward "should be one of the best in the conference," coach Skolen predicts.

Also coming back is Sarah Bogardus, a junior forward, who won Honorable <u>Mention All-Conference</u> last year.

Back this season as well is Daemen junior Haleigh Van Fleet, starting point guard, who Skolen noted was looking especially good in pre-season play. "She's quick," he says.

There are also five solid freshmen on this year's team.

"No seniors on our team. It's a very young team and it might be a rough start," Skolen acknowledges. "But we're expecting to win the American Mid-East Conference."

That kind of confidence is what you'd expect from a great coach like Dave Skolen. We'll all be watching for great things from the Lady Wildcats, too.

Without Injury, Men's Basketball Team Forecast to Soar

"Barring any serious injuries or unforeseen setbacks," says coach Don Silveri of the Daemen men's basketball team, "we should be one of the top teams in our division."

No one had a crystal ball as this story was being prepared in late October, but Silveri says some returning players, and several transfers, should help guide the Wildcats to some serious competitive athletics.

Returning player Dewan Stroud was Third-Team All-American last year, and First-Team All-Conference. He was a newcomer last year and is a senior this year – having transferred here last season from Erie Community College. The standout 6 ft. 2 in. guard and small forward "has a chance of being the best player in the conference," Silveri predicts.

Another returning powerhouse is Jonathan Smith, senior point guard who started with the team last year – he's from City Honors High School – and was the team's defensive player of the year last season. Freshman Steve Kozaczka, a center from Lackawanna, towers at 6 ft. 9 in. He was injured last year, tearing his shoulder in the third game of the season, and didn't play after that. He doesn't lose eligibility, though – and is expected to help the team win big this season, which spans a Nov. 9 to Feb. 21 window of play.

Four transfers help paint the picture of what this year's team is all about. One is Devon Dawson from St. Joseph's Collegiate Institute in Buffalo, where he was First-Team All-Western New York. The freshman is 6 ft. 3 in. tall.

Ryan Henry from Rochester has transferred here from Finger Lakes Community College. He was First-Team All-Region at Finger Lakes, averaging 21 points per game. The junior can dunk the basketball, despite his height of 5 ft., 8 in.

Pete Loney is a bit taller – at 6 ft. 5 in. – and has transferred in from Erie Community College, originally from Byron Bergen High School in Rochester. He's a junior at Daemen.

And standing 6 ft. 6 in. and weighing 260 pounds is big, bad Rob Jacobs, who transferred here from Loeb Institute in Manhattan and is now in his sophomore year. Jacobs has averaged 12 points and 9 rebounds per game, and is expected to join his teammates in presenting a formidable basketball team that others are going to want to beat, but which coach Silveri vows will be difficult if not impossible to conquer.

"A highlight of our season," Silveri adds, "is that we've been invited to play in the Disney Challenge in Orlando, Florida, beginning December 20. We'll be down there for four days, playing two games. There will be teams from all over. It's sponsored by the NAIA, our governing body, and we could get national recognition out of it."

Big time recognition, or just the admiration of the local cheering section, Daemen's men's basketball team is taking to the court in a big way, looking for another hot season of top-flight collegiate basketball.

reat learning institutions such as Daemen College don't get to be great, and continue to grow and help make a difference in the world, without the financial support of alumni and friends.

Why people give to their alma mater is at once tied to a shared bond with the college experience that made them what they are today – and yet highly individualistic at the same time.

Dea McKenna McAuliffe, Class of 1958 – who wrote a 50th anniversary history book on Daemen College – says, "Like many who graduated in the early Rosary Hill years, I feel tremendous pride in Daemen today.

"Our College's cup truly overflows with excellence," she comments. "It's apparent in so many outstanding programs and departments, and in Daemen's respected place in the Western New York community and beyond. I have to smile when I recall that same push for excellence from the start. Those of us who did quite well academically in high school, quickly learned that much more was demanded of us in order to capture an 'A' or a 'B' at Rosary Hill. It's heartening to see this has continued to be the norm through the years."

"How Could We Not Say 'Thank You'?"

McAuliffe says giving back is a once-a-year gesture that simply isn't an option to overlook. She explains how grateful she is for the preparation she had at Daemen for her teaching career – "a career I loved. How could we not turn around and say 'thank you', once a year, to the College that made our lifelong careers possible? I hope that all alums include Daemen's annual fundraising efforts on their contribution list each year."

A more recent graduate, Mike Patane, class of 2005, works as a physician's assistant in Fulton, New York, near Syracuse. He acknowledges the scholarship he was offered to attend Daemen made a big difference in his life, and now, through his medical services, in the lives of his patients - people from his community. "Daemen was giving something to me, and it was a wonderful experience, living on campus, going to classes. I can't say enough about how much I got from the College and being involved with the teachers, the administrators - everybody."

Patane, who works as a PA in a surgical department, notes that his first year at Daemen was his first year living alone – a key element in his personal growth. "It literally is your family at Daemen."

Leadership Possibilities

"The potential for leadership development was great. The sky was the limit. You could do anything you wanted, if you wanted to create clubs or be involved at any level you desired. It was an opportunity to find yourself. The leadership possibilities were there to help hone yourself as a person. Daemen helped create who I am, and I'll continue to give back to Daemen College the rest of my life."

David A. Cristantello, Ph.D., Daemen's Vice President for External Relations and Institutional Advancement, shares an interestingly pragmatic perspective on the important and greatly appreciated area of donating to Daemen.

Often, Cristantello explains, colleges are actually judged in certain arenas on the level of donations alumni make to their alma mater, including when colleges apply for grants. "Private foundations often ask that question, as well as high-end individuals, concerned about how a college's own alumni are supporting it,"

also be a factor. "They're looking for how the people closest to you are supporting the institution," says Cristantello, "and we've built that."

He came to Daemen College in 2000, when alumni participation was at about 5%. Now it's at 12%, with the national average at 19% or 20% – a level Cristantello says seems reasonable to achieve by the year 2012, and "we're moving in the right direction."

"Truly Exciting Things Happening"

Former President Bill Clinton's book, *Giving*, is giving direction to Judy Weidemann, class of '58, an English major, now a retired school principal. "He says it's the obligation for us who live in abundance," Weidemann notes. "Besides, it makes us feel very good."

Weidemann reflects on why she feels it's important for her to give to causes she considers important. "Of course, it goes back to my family. My great aunt was a very charitable woman. Framed on her wall was a 1919 letter from Father Baker, and his signed check, thanking my Aunt Julie for her \$100 contribution to buy four baby cribs for the orphans at Father Baker's."

Weidemann notes that over the years – and especially now, since she became president of the Board of Governors at Daemen – she has seen "truly exciting things that are happening. I've been learning from Dr. Ed Clausen about the study abroad programs. It makes me know that the college is moving ahead in the 21st century. 

and government professor, so she in effect grew up on the college campus when it was Rosary Hill.

"We'd go to mass there on Sunday at Duns Scotus," says Cuddy-Mierzwa. "It was a strong part of our family foundation. Cristantello explains that 90 percent of Daemen College students receive some form of financial aid, consistent with a long history of the Sisters always endeavoring to find funds for talented and deserving students if they couldn't afford to attend.

A substantial use of donated funds to the college is the use of unrestricted funds that get applied to scholarship support, Cristantello notes. Much of the financial aid is in the form of institutional grants.

"We use alumni support in particular to help with that initiative....We try to encourage our alumni to participate in the annual fund, specifically," explains Cristantello. "It doesn't matter what size the gift. What matters is that they've chosen to include the College in their philanthropy."




