Smallenburg **Will Retire April 1**

Several Reappointments To Various Boards Are Made by Mayor Visscher

City Council Wednesday night accepted the resignation of Dick Smallenburg as superintendent of parks and cemeteries effective April 1.

In other business Mayor Robert ahead for those members who remain on City Council in meeting Visscher reappointed several residents to various city boards.

Smallenburg is 66 and is eligible for pension on retirement.

His letter also stated that his position as director on the Tulip Time board also will be vacated and a replacement should be named by April 1. He told Council he expected to continue to be a resident of Holland and Council may feel free to call on him at any time.

Injunction Issued in School Case

Allegan County School **Board Can't Transfer** Maplewood Areas

Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith Tuesday authorized a temporary injunction restraining Allegan County Board of Education from taking any action on two new petitions for property transfers from the Hamilton Community School

Two petitions involving more than 800 acres of land in the Allegan board transferred to the Hamilton district last Nov. 5. The Maplewood school board immediately appealed this action to the State Board of Education.

The injunction enjoins the Allegan County Board of Education from making the two new transfers or from taking any action on transferring any area within the city of Holland to any other school dis-David Boyd, 40, lay missionary trict until further order of the sent from Maple Avenue Christian court. The Allegan County Board of Education had scheduled a meeting tonight to act on transferring the new areas.

The Maplewood School Board has retained Gordon Cunningham to represent it in boundary litigation. Henry Vander Plow, member of the Maplewood Board, signed the bill of complaint which was the basis for the injunction.

Today's injunction is just one more development in an annexation program which has been complicated by many developments. Last June 3, residents of Maplewood area voted to annex to the city of Holland. The southern border of the annexed area was not co-terminus with the school district, and the general school program called for disannexing some tag ends in the school district before the school district would be annexed to the Holland school dis-

Last fall John Schurman, who operates a slaughterhouse, headed a group of farmers seeking court action in having the annexation program declared unconstitutional This case is currently on appeal to Michigan Supreme Court.

Then in November, the Allegan Board of Education transferred 440 acres of the Maplewood District (400 acres inside Holland city), to the Hamilton Community School District. This phase has been appealed to the State Board of Edu-

The new move to transfer more than 800 acres to the Hamilton district is now delayed under terms of the injunction until further order of Circuit Court.







duction in traffic fatalities, compiled its best traffic safety record Calvin Alumni in the past ten years during 1958, in the past ten years during 1958, according to figures released Mon-Banquet to Be day by County Safety Director Director Avery D Baker

Baker said the toll of 14 deaths was eight less than the toll of 22 in 1957, and seven less than the previous record low of 21 recorded in 1956, 1951 and 1950.

Thirty persons were killed in 1954, while 29 died in 1955 and 25 fatalities were recorded in 1953. Baker said that these statistics cover just those accidents on public roads, and not those on private property, such as driveways and farms. He said this year's record is perhaps an all-time low if considered on the basi of auto registration and miles driven.

The approximate 40 per cent reduction in county traffic deaths compares most favorably with the statewide reduction of 10 per cent in traffic fatalities, Baker said.

"The reduction of traffic deaths is small comfort to the families of those who were killed." Baker said, "but it is a challenge to all citizens to further reduce fatalities and injuries on our high-


