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## Zeeland Man Dies in Crash Early Sunday

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — A Zeeland father of four was killed when the car he was driving struck a tree on M-50 near 136th Ave. in Robinson Township early Sunday.

Orrin Elenbaas, 43, of route 3, Zeeland, died instantly when he was pinned under the wreckage of his car after striking the tree shortly after 1 a.m. Sunday.

Ottawa County Sheriff Bernard Grysen said Elenbaas, headed east on M-50, lost control of his car, crossed over the centerline and through a ditch, crashed through a fence, and struck the tree 82 feet from where he left the road.

The right side of Elenbaas' car was sheared off by the impact, Grysen said, and the car continued for another 80 feet before coming to rest in a field. Elenbaas was thrown out of the car and was pinned under the wreckage.

Elenbaas was riding alone in his car at the time of the mishap. Deputies had searched the area for a second possible victim when a shoe was found near the scattered wreckage, but Grysen said Elenbaas definitely was alone.

Parts of the car were scattered over a wide area. Grysen said the windshield and front seat were found about 60 feet away from the point where the car finally came to rest.

Medical examiner, Dr. Peter Mac Arthur of Grand Haven, said Elenbaas died of a crushed chest, neck fracture and a severed spinal cord.

Elenbaas was employed at the Evans and Retting Lumber Company in Grand Rapids. He was a member of the Second Reformed Church in Zeeland.

Surviving are his wife, Lozena; one son, Gregg; three daughters, Judy, Marianne and Kathleen, all at home, and a sister, Muriel Elenbaas of Chicago.

## Avery Baker Seeks Office

Avery D. Baker, Ottawa county safety director and local school teacher, announced Tuesday he would file a bond with the county clerk before deadline this afternoon declaring himself as a candidate for the Republican nomination for the post of state representative.

Baker, who also is Ottawa county Bagwell Booster chairman besides heading a constitutional convention petition drive in Holland area, said he was challenging the holder of the post since the resignation of Speaker George Van Peursem last year, because of his record and the evidence of strong support for himself from leading Republicans in the county.

"The incumbent has based his bid for renomination on a statement of a policy of responsible spending and we believe it is up to Ottawa county voters to decide if a vote to increase one's own salary by 50 per cent is responsible spending, especially during a year when the legislature has failed to restore faith in the state's fiscal policies," Baker said.

"Fortunately, the Senate stopped this Democratic inspired raid on the state treasury which was joined by a handful of Republicans, but still passed a 25 per cent raise during the past session," he added.

## Norlin Elected At Federal

Carroll Norlin was reelected member of the board of Federal School district at a meeting of district voters Monday night. Norlin received 75 votes. Other candidates were Bernard Ter Horst, 34 votes, and Carl De Pree, 11 votes.

Voters also approved a 1.16-mill increase on school operations, 90 to 28, and approved a transportation program for children within the district, 118 to 2. The latter was a vote in which the district assumes the cost from the general fund since such costs are not paid by the state.

Voters also established a building and site sinking fund, 104 to 9. After the election, the board organized for the coming year. Jack Nieboer was elected president, Elmer Atman treasurer and Norlin secretary. Trustees are John Baldwin and Charles Vande Water.

## Slightly Hurt as Car Strikes Utility Pole

Richard Gray Payne, 33, of 2077 Ottagon St., was treated at Holland Hospital for a cut hand suffered when the car he was driving struck a railroad crossing sign and utility pole at 12:40 a.m. today on East Eighth St. near Fairbanks Ave., according to Holland police.

Payne told police a second car turned from Fairbanks Ave. to Eighth St. and cut him off. Police are continuing their investigation of the mishap.

## Four Sentenced In Murder Case

### Elects Two to School Board

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Ivan Fosheim and Miller Sherwood were named to four year terms on the Grand Haven Board of Education in the school election held Monday. They received 410 and 398 votes, respectively. Also running was Albert Jordan who received 299 votes.

In the school election at Spring Lake Walter Applegate defeated John T. Beukema by a vote of 154 to 150. This is for a one year term. Winning places on the board for three year terms were Carl Briegel with 220 votes and Wallace C. Lyon with 192 votes. Also running was Edsel M. Dady who had 188 votes.

Spring Lake also favored two proposals. One on leasing Midway school property for gas and oil passed 232 to 20 and the other giving the Board of Education authority to sell the old junior high school property passed 235 to 19. The oil and gas lease provides rental of \$10 a year plus one-eighth of all oil and gas found on the property.

## Mrs. Wolters Dies at 98

Mrs. Benjamin E. Wolters, formerly of Graafschap, more recently of 485 Homestead Ave., died Monday at the age of 98.

Survivors include a son, Prof. Edward J. Wolters; a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Rena Wolters; a brother-in-law, John A. Wolters; six grandchildren; and 16 great grandchildren, all of Holland.

Mrs. Wolters, the former Anna Speet, was born in Laketown Township and lived in the area all of her lifetime. She was a member of the Graafschap Reformed Church until the building was moved to Central Park, and for more than 40 years now she has been affiliated with the Graafschap, Christian Reformed Church; she was its oldest living member.

Children will register for the ceramics classes June 20, and they will be expected to pay minimum fees for the materials used.

## Four Sentenced In Murder Case

ALLEGAN (Special) — Four persons were sentenced from 15 to 25 years in Jackson Prison today in Allegan Circuit Court for the bludgeoning death of Bryon Hassett, 72, of rural Pullman.

Harold Bell, 21; Pat Cochran, 18; Tony Huminsky, 19, and his brother Nick, 17, entered pleas of guilty to the second degree murder charges late last month after first seeking a trial.

Bell and Cochran are from rural South Haven area and the Huminsky brothers are from Chicago. All four had previous criminal records.

Judge Raymond L. Smith said following the sentencing that the youths were all equally guilty and called the murder more than a prank, but a well-planned crime.

He said the court was aware that the four were boys but also equally aware that the case dealt with murder.

Hassett was assaulted and robbed April 16, state police said, when the four youths went to his farm home and lured him outside.

## Saugatuck Has School Election

SAUGATUCK (Special) — Five trustees of the Board of Education were elected Monday in the annual school election. There were 119 ballots cast.

The two four-year terms, recently created by the State Legislature, were won by Henry B. Hopper, incumbent and president of the board and Robert Brackenridge. George Hungerford was the other candidate.

Elizabeth S. Martin, incumbent, and Julius Van Oss, who had no opposition, were the three-year term winners. James H. McCormick, incumbent, was the successful candidate for the two-year unexpired term of Dr. Donald De Witt.

Remaining members of the seven member board are Carl Walter and Dr. Edwin J. Nieuwsma.

Serving on the election board were Mrs. Winifred P. Webb, Harry Pfaff, Mrs. Henry Dorn and the Rev. Horace E. Maycroft.

## New Zoning Ordinance Up Again

The long-studied proposed zoning ordinance is coming up again before City Council.

The lengthy, detailed document which has been under study for years by the Planning Commission and which was tabled by Council about two months ago when it was submitted, was taken from the table by Council Wednesday night.

Study will continue and a public hearing is scheduled Aug. 17. According to summer vacation schedules, all or nearly all Councilmen are expected to be available on that date.

Also accepted for first reading Wednesday was a new ordinance on Civil Defense and Disaster Control which will be up for second hearing and passage at the July 6 meeting. The ordinance spells out powers and duties of the mayor, the city manager, the CD director, the control plan, suspension of conflicting ordinance and violations.

In other business, Council approved transfers of certain contingent funds to various accounts totaling \$8,525. The city manager explained all adjustments are in the nature of revised estimates and no change in program is involved. The city manager announced he will be absent from the city on vacation the week of June 20 and the city clerk will act as city manager.

The following oaths of office were filed: Albert Kleis, Jr., and Laverne Serne, Board of Appeals; John H. Van Dyke, Hospital Board; Dale Fris, Merle De Feyter, Sandy Meek and Bernard Shashaguy, Traffic and Safety Commission; Margaret W. Steffens, Library Board; Charles W. Madison, Donald Vink, Board of Public Works.

An invitation from Chris Craft Corp. to attend open house at the Chris-Craft factory and Roamer Steel Boat plant June 21 from 1 to 3 p.m. and 6 to 8 p.m. was accepted and filed.

A damage claim from Raymond Schurman, 175 East 26th St., for damage when the easement was flooded because of a blocked sewer was referred to the liability company and city attorney.

When the city manager's monthly activity report was presented, Councilman John Beltman commented that local merchants have not been particularly careful in keeping their doors locked. There were 110 such cases during May and 976 for the 11 months so far this fiscal year. Councilman Ernest Phillips commented on the large number of moving violations (149 charged and 226 warned) and said each moving violation is a potential accident. In view of proposals for a one-way street program for Holland, he wondered whether one-way streets were the answer when the number of moving violations is that high.

On suggestion of Councilman Nelson Bosman, the possibility of widening 13th St. west of River Ave. in the vicinity of Herrick Public Library was referred to the Traffic and Safety Commission for study.

An inquiry from the principal of Montello Park school for an improved playground at the school was referred to the Recreation department.

## Dissatisfied With Truck

ALLEGAN (Special) — Payment for the new \$14,000 fire truck was postponed by the Allegan city council Monday night, pending a meeting between Allegan firemen and the truck manufacturer.

The decision to postpone payment for the truck followed a report from R. G. Blanz, leader of a delegation of firemen who indicated dissatisfaction with the truck and felt that it was "not the one that was ordered."

Members of the Allegan volunteers are about "80 per cent dissatisfied" with the \$14,322 American-La France truck, said Blanz, "and most of the firemen feel that the chassis is not the same as shown on a photograph from which the truck was ordered."

Specifications on the purchase order requested that the apparatus be delivered "on a suitable chassis." Firemen think that the chassis received was a 1960 model of a series one size larger than the one shown in the photograph which they approved.

On a motion by city councilman Richard Hacking, the council voted to put off payment until the matter could be discussed by representatives of the fire department and the American-La France company at the June 27 meeting.

## Roger Visser Gets Dentistry Degree

Roger L. Visser, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Visser of 307 West 20th St., received a D. D. S. degree from the University of Michigan School of Dentistry on June 11.

Dr. Visser was graduated first in his class for each of four years for the best overall undergraduate record in orthodontics. He was elected to Omicron Kappa Upsilon, a National Dental Honorary Society and to Phi Kappa Phi, a National General Honorary Society.

He also received the George R. Moore Memorial Award in Orthodontics and the Mosby Publishing Company Award.

Upon graduation, Dr. and Mrs. Visser, the former Genevieve Gore of Traverse City, and their son, Scott William, moved to Virginia Beach, Va., where Dr. Visser will practice dentistry until fall when he will return to the University to specialize in Orthodontics.

## New Member Appointed To City Library Board

Appointment of Kenneth Weller of the Hope College faculty to the Holland Library Board was approved by City Council at its regular meeting Wednesday. Weller will fill the unexpired term of the late Milton L. Hinga, longtime member of the board who died two weeks ago.

Weller, who has been with the college faculty since 1949, is a graduate of Holland High School and Hope College. He attended the University of Michigan engineering school under an alumni scholarship before serving in the Navy as an electronics technician from 1944 to 1946. He received a master's degree in business administration from the University of Michigan. He is associated with the economics and business administration department at Hope.

His appointment to the Library Board was made by Mayor Robert Visscher and approved by Council. Other members of the board are Mrs. Henry Steffens, Hero Bratt, Mrs. Preston Luideis and Donald J. Thomas.

Council awarded the sale of \$55,000 in special assessment bonds for parking lot improvement on West Seventh St. to Goodbody and Co. of Detroit, lowest of five bidders with an average interest rate of 3.34627 per cent.

Following a fair amount of discussion, Council approved a recommendation of the Traffic and Safety Commission to modify the east and west corners of the traffic island on Central Ave. at 30th St. for a 90-day trial basis, after which the program will be re-evaluated with a view to altering other corners of the two traffic islands.

## City Voters Pass Sewer Bond Issue

Holland city voters Monday by narrow margins approved a \$1,600,000 sewer bond program and defeated detachment of 3 1/2 square miles of Maplewood area from the city.

The sewer vote was 2,412 yes to 1,563 no, or 29 votes more than the required 60 per cent for passage. A revision in votes this morning reduced the reported margin Monday night of 64 votes. Percentage of yes votes today stood at 50.068 per cent.

Voters within the three precincts of Maplewood area seeking detachment decisively favored disannexation, 132 to 25, but the some of votes cast in the remainder of Holland city and in Fillmore township was 2,174 yes to 2,370 no, or a plurality of 196 votes. Therefore the measure did not pass.

In another election for naming a member to the Board of Education for a four-year term, incumbent Bernard Arendssthorst polled an unofficial 2,346 votes. He was unopposed.

Total vote cast in Holland city was 4,165 and total vote cast in Fillmore township was 585.

The vote on detachment outside the annexing area in Holland city was 1,605 yes and 2,354 no. Fillmore township voted 569 yes and 16 no.

Monday's disannexation election was believed to be the first such election in the history of the state of Michigan. The proposal was backed up by a group of South Side Farmers.

Randall C. Bosch, president of the Board of Public Works, said today he was very pleased with the outcome of the sewer election. He said the board would proceed immediately with the sale of bonds and work with engineers on final drawings for the program which calls for a new sewage treatment plant and new interceptor lines which would relieve existing lines and serve some of the new areas.

One of the first items on the list will be solving sewage problems for the new women's dormitory nearing completion on Hope College campus.

Tuesday's sewer election was the third election scheduled by the Board of Public Works. A proposal calling for a \$2.9 million bond issue seemingly carried last October but was withdrawn when bond attorneys determined that a 60 per cent majority was necessary. The same issue lost almost 3-1 in a special election Jan. 19. After that, the Board of Public Works tailored the program to \$1.6 million and it carried by a narrow margin Monday.

Although the program calls for \$1,600,000 in general obligation bonds, it is estimated that two-thirds of the amount will be financed through sewer services charges which have been in effect since last fall.

In Grand Haven today, the Ottawa County Canvassing board consisting of Peter Damstra of Holland, H. C. Dickman of Zeeland and Marinus De Young of Allendale, started work and canvassing the detachment vote. Since Holland city lies in two counties, the clerk of the county having the larger share was appointed to oversee the election by Lansing election officials.

## G. Schout Succumbs In His Home in Zeeland

He was a Zeeland city employe for the past 26 years in the water department. He was a member of the First Reformed Church.

## New Member Appointed To City Library Board

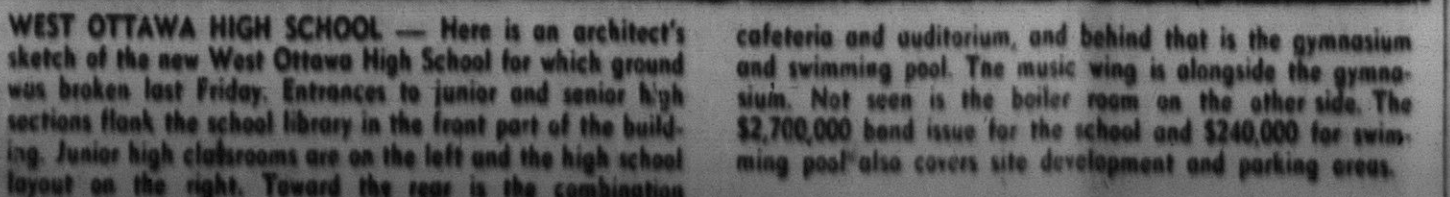

## Picnic at Van Oss Home Closes Season for WCTU

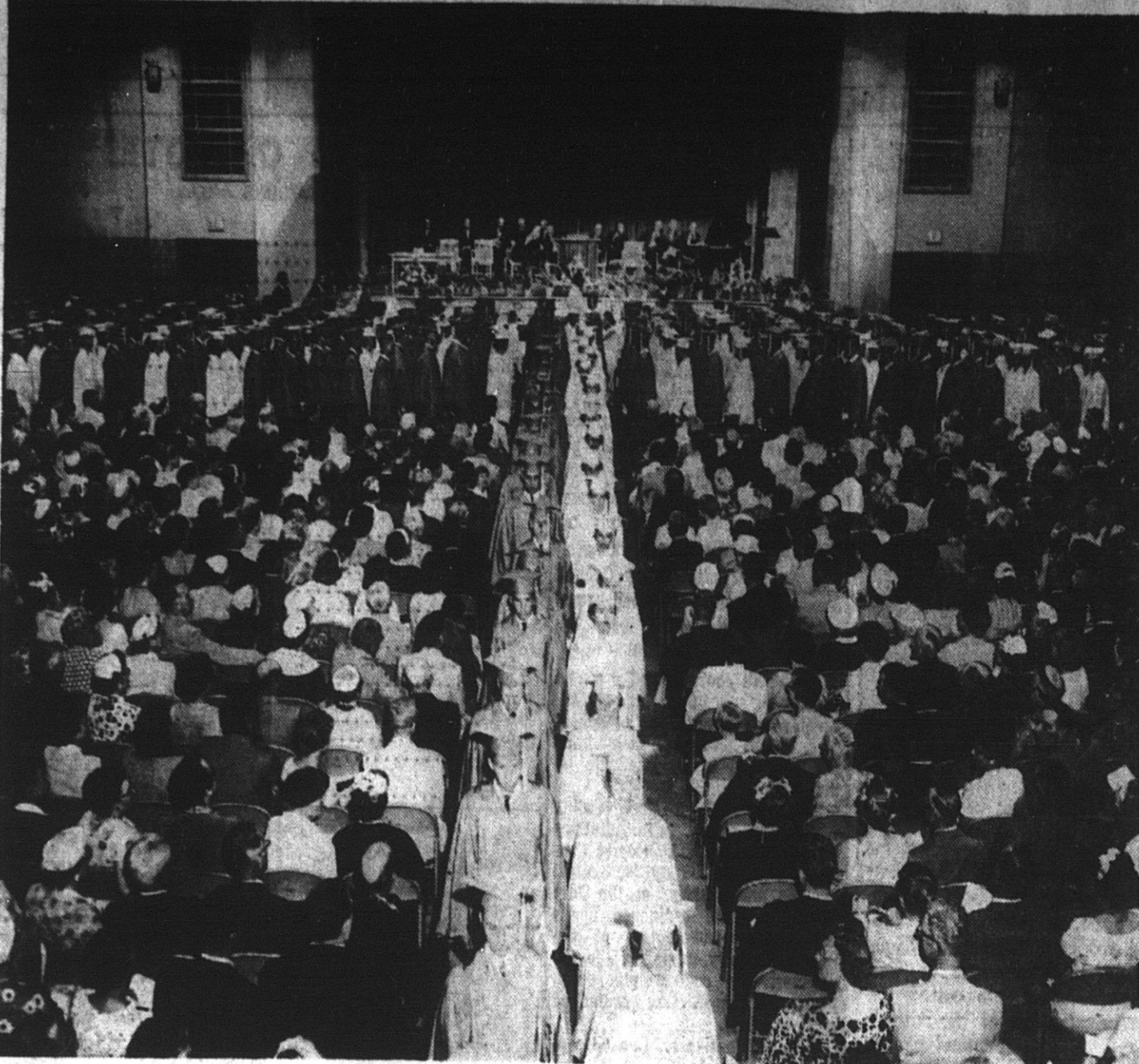

## Judge Addresses Holland Seniors

"Profit by Our Mistakes" was the subject of an address by Municipal Judge Cornelius van der Meulen to the graduating class of Holland High School Thursday night in Civic Center.

"When I was 18 years old I knew all the answers. Today I can't recall what those answers were and besides they wouldn't fit today's problems. So I'm not going to give you a lot of advice; I'm just going to tell you some of our mistakes and hope you can profit from them," the judge said.

Holding that truth is dynamic, not static, and its application to human endeavor is a constantly changing matter, Judge van der Meulen pointed to two mistakes in the past, those of archaism and futurism. He defined the former coming from those people who revel in the past, the "good old days" and said the concept of the little red school house is not an adequate answer today, that there is a need for better education in this complex civilization and complicated economy.

Judge van der Meulen defined futurism as the antithesis of archaism, but with no better answers. Futurism and Utopia are beliefs that come from frustrations of those who scorn the past and can't face the present, the judge said. And he had some choice words on the Beatnik philosophy which to him holds no answers.

The speaker questioned whether America had lost sight of its goals as to national purposes and for answers he referred to the preamble of the Constitution and the pledge of allegiance. He emphasized

that freedom is not an accomplished fact but is a process involving constant vigilance. "My generation seems unable to find a creative answer to today's question of life's purpose," the judge said. Pointing to the great potential in atomic power alone, he said, "Our government has spent billions on atomic destruction and only millions on its peaceful forces. You may be part of the creative force to find the answer to restore a sense of justice and freedom in the hearts of men," he said.

The 1960 graduating class presented a fine picture in their blue and white robes with all members arranged as to height, marching to the traditional "Pomp and Circumstance" as played by the high school orchestra.

The speaker was introduced by Thomas Dykstra and the pledge of allegiance was led by Mayor Paul Rowgo. Brian Dykstra, pianist, played a Brahms number, and Ronald Maat, president of the senior class, announced the class memorial which includes a new outdoor announcement board for the new high school, a tape recorder for the senior play, a portable amplifier, \$100 for new scenery for the senior play, and power tools for custodians.

Wendell A. Miles, member of the Board of Education, presented Judge van der Meulen with a scroll listing a tribute to his contribution to the community. Supt. Walter W. Scott presented diplomas to 419 seniors as Principal Jay Formosa called the long roll.

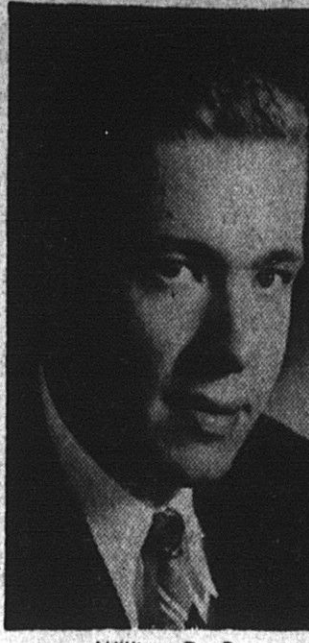

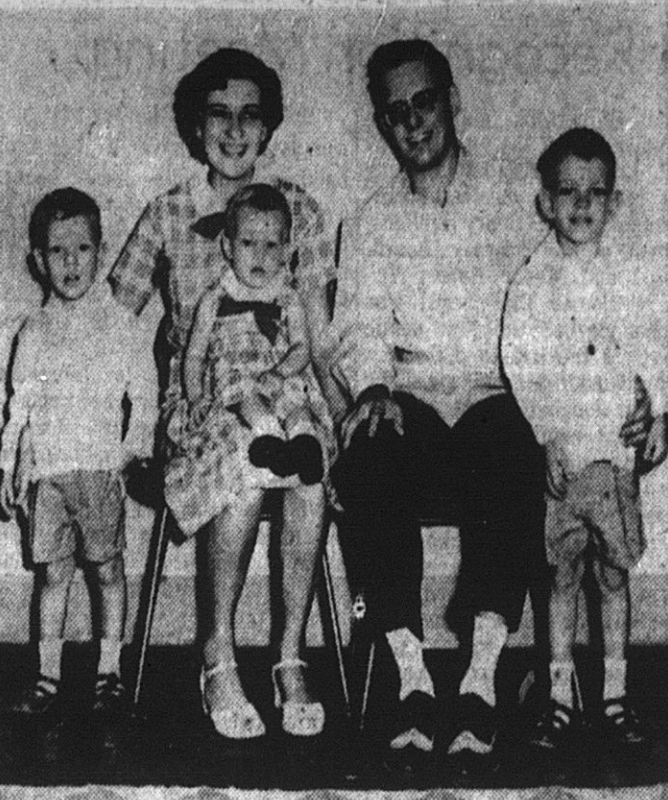

## Council Considers Gas Development

ALLEGAN (Special) — Allegan's city council agreed informally Monday night on continuing investigation of the possibility of developing a city-owned gas utility.

### 'Island' Installed

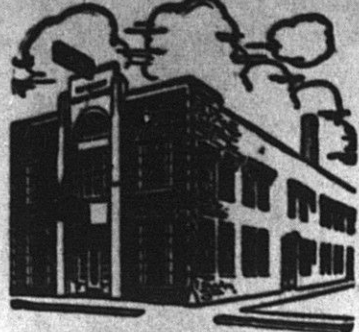

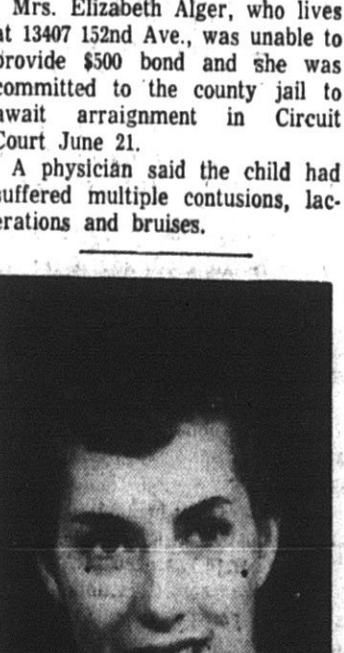

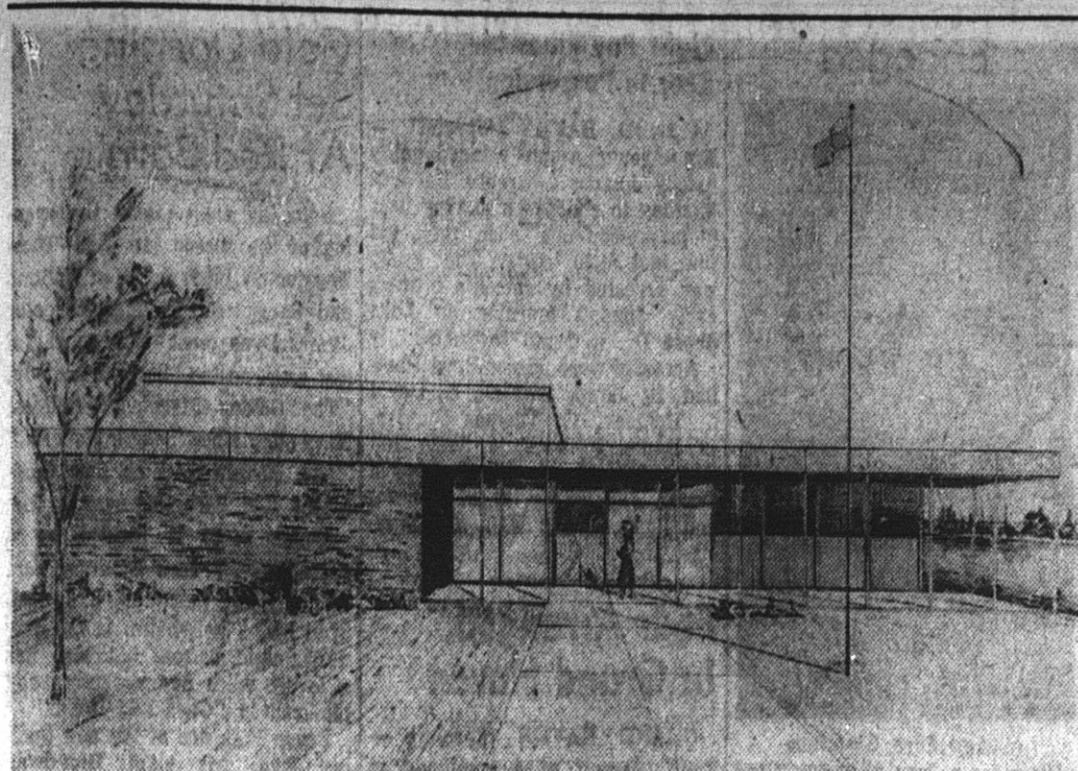

# VFW All Set To Build New Clubhouse

## Water Level Rise Cuts Down Swimming Area at Beach

Ottawa Beach has less safe-swimming area in Lake Michigan this summer because the level of the lake has risen a foot and a half.

Pilings are being used to mark the swimming limit this year instead of buoys, Holland State Park manager Lou Haney said today. The pilings are placed in an average of three and a half feet of water and are strung in a line about 175 feet from shore.

A new rule this year concerns dogs. They must never be brought onto the beach. Haney cautioned, and during the summer until Sept. 30 dogs must be under immediate control on a leash not exceeding six feet.

Beginning Wednesday and continuing through Labor Day, campers will be limited to 15 day camping permits. Peak use of the park will probably run from June 30 through August, Haney said.

Campers must register at the park office, located at the east end of the park at the entrance to the parking area. Fees are one dollar per day with 25 cents extra for electricity. Electrical outlets are found in only half of the 377 sites.

There are 193 spots for trailers and 184 areas for tents. Registration must be made from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. except Sunday and holidays when the hours are from 10 a.m. until noon. Camps must be disbanded by 3 p.m. and extensions are granted between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Vacationers bringing trailers into the park must use their own vehicles instead of commercial haulers. Trailer licenses must also remain on the trailers while parked on the camping sites.

The park officials may be forced this summer to remove picnic baskets from tables which are left by bathers or fishermen to semi-reserve picnic spots. It isn't fair, Haney said, to reserve a table or area for several hours before it will be used.

Food or beverages may never be brought onto the beach itself, he reminded.

The Michigan Department of Conservation set up a list of rules

and regulations specifically applying to users of the state park and recreation areas this year.

Violations of these rules are punishable by fines of not more than \$100 plus court costs or jail sentences not to exceed 90 days. Both the fine and imprisonment may be imposed.

The conservation officers at the park, Haney said, usually hand out summons to persons breaking the regulations under rule one. It states that it is unlawful to enter use or occupy state-owned lands for any purpose when the lands are posted against such entry, use or occupancy.

State park regulations are designed to ensure that everyone can enjoy the water, beach, picnic and camping areas, he said, and it is the responsibility of the park employees to maintain and operate them.

## Board Hires 2 Teachers, Assistant

Hiring of two new teachers and a shift in responsibilities to provide an assistant to the superintendent of schools featured the monthly meeting of the Board of Education Monday night in the library of the E. E. Fell Junior High School.

Robert L. Slocum, director of vocational education, will become assistant to Supt. Walter W. Scott, yet retaining his vocational education position. He has been with the Holland school system since 1952 except for two years he spent on Okinawa establishing a vocational education training program under the direction of Michigan State University from 1957 to 1959.

Board Member Wendell A Miles explained that appointment of an assistant superintendent will provide some released time for Supt. Scott who has been working on a Ph. D. degree. Miles also outlined changing responsibilities in an enlarged school system which has had considerable expansion in curriculum, as well as new summer programs, adult programs

Teachers hired for the coming year were Mrs. Marjory Egger of Holland and Miss Cecelia K. Has of Grand Haven, both of whom will teach early elementary. Mrs. Egger, who is married and has three children, attended Hope College one year and received a bachelor of science degree from Butler University. She has had three years' experience. Miss Has, formerly of Allegan, received an A. B. Degree from Western Michigan University and an M.A. degree from the University of Michigan. She has had 23 years of experience.

Miles said the committee on teachers also has been working on selecting a successor to Bernice Bishop as principal of E. E. Fell Junior High School. He said the committee had received a communication signed by 44 teachers of the junior high school recommending Earl Borlace for the position.

The board approved another three-year contract for Supt. Scott, the first year to be at no increase in salary which is \$16,000 a year. There also will be no change in Slocum's salary which is set at \$9,000.

The board also okayed pay schedules for clerical and custodial employees. Of the 13 employed as cooks, clerical and secretary workers, the new budget has a total increase of \$766. Salaries for custodians amount to an average increase of \$100 for regulars. Miles pointed out that the Holland school system pays 13 per cent more on teacher's salaries than other systems its size. He said the 3.9 per cent for administrative positions is low.

The board approved preliminary plans for the new high school as presented by Building Consultant Arthur Read who has been in contact with the architect, Suren Filafian, of Detroit. These included new drafts of academic units, art building and library, auditorium and music building, shops and a circular gym of 180 feet in diameter.

The board will meet again next week to adopt the 1960-61 budget which has been under study for several weeks.

Secretary James Hallan announced \$94,870.52 was forthcoming from the county treasurer in primary interest fund and read reports from the county allocations commission listing 11.09 mills for Holland schools in Ottawa and 10.05 mills for Allegan counties.

President Carl C. Andreasen presided and Vern Schipper gave the invocation. All members were present with the exception of Bernard Arendshorst. The board had planned to canvass Monday's school vote in which Arendshorst was elected to another four-year term but because of delays, the canvass was held this morning.

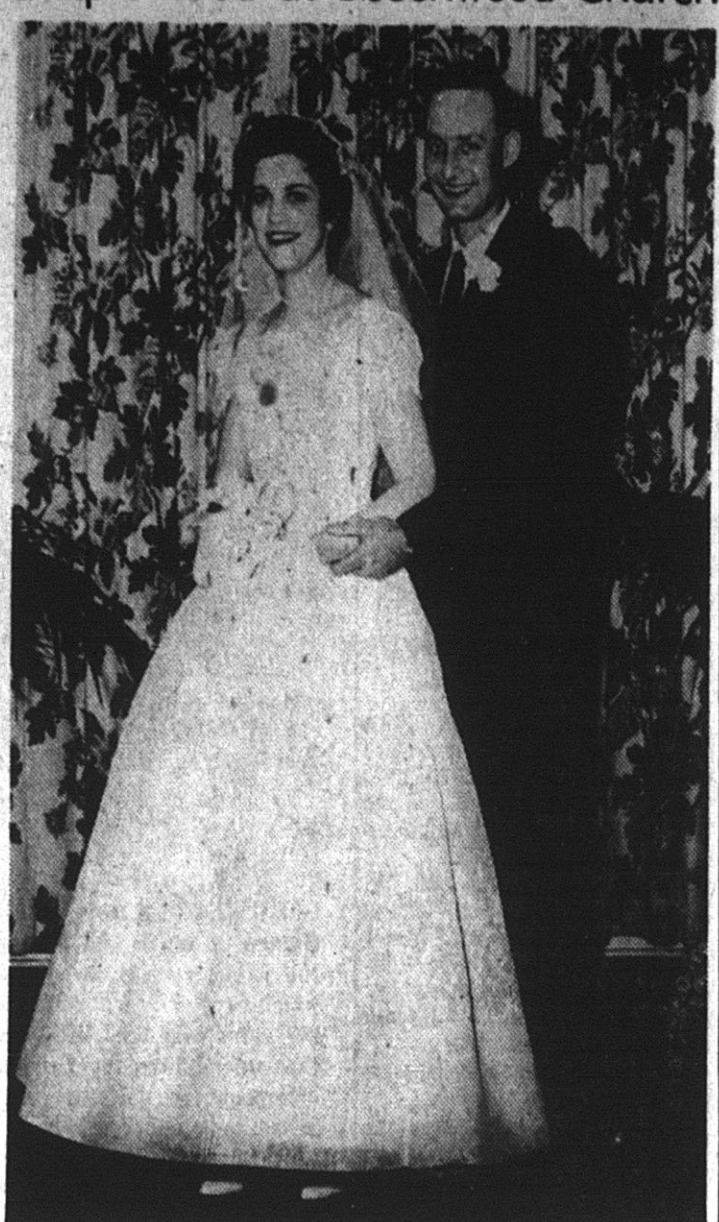
