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## Family of 6 Die in Crash Near Allegan

### Wreckage of Speeding Auto Found by Worker 3 Hours After Crash

ALLEGAN (Special) — What was to have been a weekend fishing trip ended tragically Friday for an entire Covert family of six, killed when their car smashed into a tree off Monroe Rd., about five miles west of Allegan.

The victims were identified as Ernest L. Cox, 34, a Covert grocery operator; his wife, Carrie Mae; his wife's mother, Mrs. Eliza Menter of Louisiana; his stepdaughter, Dorthene Larry, 8; his daughter, Ernestine, 4, and his son Ernest Jr., 3.

It was estimated that the car was going at a speed close to 100 miles per hour as it approached a slight curve in the road, state police said.

The victims had been dead for about three hours before the crash on the lonely road was discovered at 4:46 a.m., according to medical examiner Dr. Harry Schneider of Allegan. All apparently were killed instantly, he said.

State Police from South Haven said Cox failed to make the slight curve and skidded sideways before striking the tree, 200 feet east of the Swan Creek bridge. Troopers said the speeding auto hit the tree broadside.

The Allegan County Sheriff's department said two of the children and one woman were thrown from the car. Officers said the car had to be torn apart to extricate the "mangled" bodies. Parts of the car were thrown 94 feet from the point of impact, deputies said.

The wreckage was discovered at 4:46 a.m. by Harold Craven of route 4, Allegan, who was on his way home from work at the Fennville Canning Co. Craven called the Allegan County Sheriff's Department.

## Two Students Are Merit Semifinalists

Two local high school seniors have qualified as semifinalists in the 1960-61 National Merit Scholarship competition, it was announced today by John M. Stalaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corp. which conducts the annual program.

Campaan, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Campaan of 28 West 34th St., is a member of the school band, business manager of this year's card campaign, member of the debate club, Footprints staff, student council and has been a class officer. He attended Wolverine Boys State as a junior and was a Junior Rotarian and a member of the Science Seminar.

Myrick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert B. Myrick of 340 West 27th St., also is a member of the Science Seminar. He is a member of the Student Forum and served as an officer in the Latin Club. He has been active in forensics for two years, won the main prize in the 10th grade speech contest and honorable mention in the Woman's Literary Club Junior essay contest.

Other semifinalists in the Ottawa-Allegan area are Roger Henry Abel of Hudsonville High School and Barry D. Klettke of Plainwell High School.

These honor students are among the 10,000 high scoring students taking tests in more than 15,000 high schools throughout the nation last spring. They are scheduled to take another rigorous three-hour scholarship aptitude test of the College Entrance Examination Board in testing centers throughout the nation Dec. 3.

Each Merit Scholarship is a four-year award to cover undergraduate college years. The recipient's stipend is tailored to his need.

The Merit Scholarship Program is now in its sixth year. It was founded in 1955 with grants from the Ford Foundation and Carnegie Corporation of New York. The National Merit Scholarship Corp. and sponsors have thus far contributed direct financial assistance to nearly 4,000 students and their colleges.

## Rail Flasher Is Approved For 32nd St.

A railroad flasher at the 32nd St. crossing of the C and O tracks east of Lincoln Ave. will be installed soon.

This decision was made at a conference at the site this morning attended by representatives of the Michigan Public Service Commission, the railroad and local safety representatives.

It won't be long before Michigan's pageant of the colors comes to the fore for another year.

The first chords of the overture to Autumn have been sounded, and the first traces of color are being noted in Holland's trees. Autumn is one of Nature's shorter compositions but easily the most brilliant.

Color tours are becoming increasingly popular for Michigan folk. Changing of the colors usually starts with frigid winds from Lake Superior sweeping over the upper peninsula, an area which offers many planned tours through some of the most densely forested areas in the state.

The northern half of Michigan's lower peninsula is covered by more than 3,000,000 acres of public and private forests which turn color about a week after first colors are noted in the upper peninsula.

Zeeland Police Chief Lawrence Veldheer identified the driver of the car as Donald Howard Todd, 38, of 19 East 35th St.


Veldheer said the child darted into the path of Todd's car in front of 130 West Main St. as Todd drove east on Main St.

## Christian Board Okays New Budget

### Record Figure Shows Increase of \$50,000; Many Attend Meeting

Holland Christian's school society adopted a record budget of \$643,802.66 at its annual meeting Monday night in the Christian High School gym. A good crowd of society members turned out to adopt the budget, elect new board members and hear various financial reports.

The new budget represented an increase of \$50,000 over last year's \$594,554.64 figure. The largest item on the income side of the proposed budget was a tuition figure of \$448,000. Other anticipated sources of revenue included the sustaining membership plan, churches and church societies, along with school circles, ladies' aids and special gifts.

A total of \$441,565.10 comprised the instructional figure for the new budget. Other large disbursement figures included an administrative total of \$29,910 and maintenance of \$81,557. Included in the maintenance figure was \$15,000 for the replacement of the furnace in the old high school building. William De Mott, chairman of the finance committee who made the report, also said that \$65,000 was set aside for debt retirement.

The general fund report was made by treasurer Garrett Pot-hoven. The report showed that the income during the past school year was \$612,904.26, almost \$50,000 more than last year. Of the total income, \$423,355.82 came from tuition. Churches and church societies contributed \$62,170.05 to the general fund, while the sustaining membership plan was responsible for \$86,933.17.

Total disbursements for the school year amounted to \$591,601.60 with instructional expenses accounting for \$392,350.33 of the total. Also included in the disbursements was \$80,000 transferred to the building fund for debt retirement.

Russel Boeve, treasurer of the building fund, reported that building fund receipts totalled \$98,587.43 during the past year. The athletic fund report was also given, showing a cash balance of \$22,743.94.

Ben Altana, chairman of the planning committee, reported briefly for his committee and the construction committee, in the absence of Harold Vander Bie, the chairman. The board, in connection with long range planning proposed the purchase of the home at 21 West 21st St. The society adopted the proposal unanimously.

Six new board members were elected after two ballots. Elected for three year terms were Alvin Brouwer, Russel Fredricks, Theodore Hoeksma, John Keuning, and William Vogelzang, Jr. Elected for a two year term was Peter H. Yff.

Supt. Bert P. Bos then presented a short version of his annual report which he had given to the school board in August. In citing enrollment statistics the superintendent told the society that the enrollment in the Christian schools had jumped 32 per cent in the last five years; 82 per cent in the last 10 years and 232 per cent in the last 20 years. He said however that despite supposedly peak years as early as 1952 in the kindergarten, the enrollment is still rising. He reported on staff personnel and the additions made throughout the years and showed that the local school had a fine record of employing experienced teachers.

Other items mentioned were the various testing programs carried out in the system. He reported on the special attainments of students and faculty members during the past school year, mentioning that the entire science and math faculty were the recipients of summer scholarships and attended various colleges and universities throughout the country.

Gerald Van Wyke, retiring board president, was in charge of the meeting.

# Holland Defeated By Niles, 13-7

## Smith Scores For Dutch In 3rd Period

Scoring with 19 seconds to play, Niles' football team stopped Holland, 13-7 Friday night in a battle between two evenly matched clubs before 4,000 fans in Riverview Park to even Holland's mark at 1-1.

Following a little of the pattern of last week's opening game, win in reverse, the Vikings drove 59 yards in the last four minutes to break the tie.

Tom Miller (3), 152-pound quarterback, ran a bootleg for the final yard and scored standing up. Holland had scored its 19-13 win over Grand Rapids South last week on the last play.

Niles put its final drive into motion on the Niles 41 and used 13 plays to score. Miller and Steve Machalleck (26) did most of the running and the pair collaborated on a 15-yard pass in the drive. Dan Abair (37), who returned Holland's tying touchdown kickoff back from his own 15 to the Niles 41, missed the extra point.

The Vikings scored the first touchdown of the game on the final play of the third quarter when Miller climaxed a 10-play drive with a two-yard sneak over guard. Abair's kick was good.

The touchdown was set up on an intercepted pass and a brilliant 53-yard run by Abair. Bob Osborne (77) snagged a Holland pass on the Viking 13 with seven yards left in the third quarter to stop a Dutch drive which had moved 62 yards in 12 plays and started with the third period kickoff.

On Niles' first play from scrimmage Abair broke loose off tackle and raced to the Holland 36 before Chuck Klomprens (13), Holland halfback, caught him from behind.

Holland matched the Niles touchdown the next time the Dutch got the ball. Holland marched 70 yards in 15 plays, all on the ground, with Gary Smith (25), running a crossback for the final yard.

The Dutch ran the tackles hard in the drive, using the crossback most effectively and the longest gain of the drive was a 23-yard dash by fullback Bob Manglitz (36), to the Niles 20.

Smith's touchdown came on fourth down and one yard to go with 4:29 left. Chuck Klomprens ran off tackle for the extra point. Then Niles began its winning drive.

The Dutch had one other opportunity to score and that came in the first quarter. A fourth down pass from quarterback Rog Burma (46) to Smith, fell through Smith's arms in the end zone.

End Ben Farabee (85) had recovered Machalleck's fumble on the Niles 45 and the Dutch marched to the 20 where the pass was tried.

The statistics showed the closeness of the contest. Holland rushed for 144 yards while the Vikings had 171, including the 53-yard scamper. The Dutch had four of 10 in the air for 54 yards and Niles two of five for 35 yards.

Coach Bill Hinga pointed to "costly mistakes and missed opportunities" in the game. The first quarter drive and the third period move were the big opportunities while the mistakes occurred when backs moved the wrong way on play patterns or the defense slipped.



## Detachment Petitions Are Circulated

Members of the Southside Farmers Group are circulating petitions requesting an election for detachment of farm lands in the southern part of the city, according to John Schurman and Richard Streur who were active in similar action last June 13 when the measure was defeated by 196 votes.

To qualify for the election, the petitions must bear signatures of 35 per cent of property owners in the area proposed for detachment as well as 236 signatures in Holland city and Fillmore Township.

Petitions must be approved by the Secretary of State's office in Lansing in view of the fact that two counties are involved in this proposal. An election date will be set after approval in Lansing.

The Maplewood area consisting of 4 1/2 square miles was annexed to Holland in an election June 3, 1958.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Oct. 2  
The Greatness of God  
Psalm 8, Psalm 104:1-4  
By C. P. Dame

This lesson is the first of the last quarter of this year. During the next two months we shall be studying the Psalms. We should remember that Psalms are poetry which means that we can look for symbols and pictures. The subject of this lesson is fitting for our times. We who talk and read much about what man is discovering ought to consider what God is doing all the time.

I. God is great and He reveals His greatness. The psalmists were God-conscious. Modern man is not. In Psalm 8 the words "Thy" and "Thou" are used a number of times and they all apply to God and in Psalm 104 the word "Who" referring to God is also found several times. Both Psalms tell about the works of God. Note the phrases, "Thou hast made him," "Thou doest crown him," "Thou hast given him," "Thou hast put all things under his feet." Man was created by God, made him in His own image and therefore man is so far superior to the rest of His creation. God gave man dominion over all creation. In our day man is discovering the greatness of God's creation.

The Psalmist belonged to God's people. He could write about "our Lord." Today many people do not have the sense of belonging to God. As the Psalmist looked about in this world he was conscious of the fact that his God was constantly revealing Himself in nature—the earth and the sky revealed the wonderful glory of God. We often speak of nature doing this or that but the Psalmist saw God at work in nature.

As we are learning more and more about the marvels of creation let us speak more of the greatness of the Creator. The Psalmist was also amazed how often children proclaim the greatness of God. "Out of the mouth of babes and sucklings Thou hast ordained strength." The testimony of a child has silenced scoffers.

II. God gave man dominion over nature. The Psalmist asked, "What is man that Thou art mindful of him, and the son of man that Thou dost care for him?" God is interested in man and in many ways shows that He cares. The Psalmist states two facts about man—one is that he is made in God's image and the other that God gave him dominion, and both of these facts are much overlooked today. God made man a little lower than angels,—the new version says, "little less than God." Some one has said that the "gulf between man and matter is greater than that between man and God."

Stars are not conscious, they can't smile, laugh; weep, think, but man can. God gave man dominion over all creation, the animals in field and forest and the birds of the air, and all the powers in this material world are meant to be under his control. III. Man ought to praise God. In Psalm 104, verse one, we read, "Bless the Lord, O my soul." God deserves man's praise because He is "exceedingly great." We know more about God's greatness as revealed in nature and therefore we ought to praise God more than the ancients. The more the Psalmist looked at the sky and round about in the earth and observed purpose and design in the natural world—grass growing for the cattle, and the moon marking the seasons and other evidence—the more he praised God.

Everything the Psalmist saw reminded him of God's greatness and inclined him to give Him praise. We are all here to praise and glorify God—are we answering to our high calling in these critical days? Let us express our gratitude to God for His greatness and goodness.

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SPECIAL SESSIONS

The special session of the legislature, called by Governor G. Mennen Williams to try and find ways and dollars to finance the state's part of the medicare for the aged, ended Friday.

Like all of these plans today there are a lot of legal problems that must be ironed out before it is possible to take definite action. With the state finances in a rather precarious position the Legislature Friday passed a bill to tie in with the new federal-state system of medical care for the aged. The first thing that our legislators must now do, and they do not doubt are well aware of it, is come up with some way to furnish the dollars for the state's share. When we receive money from the federal government, we must always remember that this is money coming back from people here at home. While there are more and more people reaching the age when they can apply for government help we must remember that if we are going to pay out the money we must find some way to first collect these same dollars.

Washington cannot furnish the money if we do not pay the money into the federal government. Some kind of a plan to collect more taxes on the state level will have to be approved by the taxpayers through our elected officials. It is very simple arithmetic. We will need to live within our present tax structure by reducing some of the services and reducing the number of employees. The only other way is to continue to pass legislation that will enable more tax dollars to be collected from us, the same taxpayers.

We must look at the laws that allocate the federal tax money. We, here in Michigan, pay into the federal treasury but do not collect on this basis. Many of the other states that pay in as little as fifteen per cent collect a much higher percentage when the tax dollars are moving back to their states.

It seems to be the same story all around. People are living longer by reason of our scientific know-how. The population is increasing, not only in our country, but many places around the world. We have plenty of work for everyone to try and work out our problems. We can do it if more and more people will try to help themselves. We will hear more and more about the problems as the campaign gets hotter and hotter. Just remember that you people, who are legal voters, have work to do too. You can give some of your spare time trying to get out the vote.

In view of the fact that league

officials must hold some official capacity with a city, Mayor Visser said he expects to seek reelection for mayor in the spring election. Visser succeeds Mayor Don J. Gohro of Grayling in the one-year term post.

Visser said the new position will involve lots of work. Next spring he will attend each of the regional meetings throughout the state. Now in his sixth year as mayor of Holland, Visser has had considerable association with the Municipal League. For the last two years he has served on the board of trustees. Previously he was vice president for two years. He also served on the legislative committee for two years, one year as chairman.

He explained that the league represents 419 cities and villages in Michigan or 82 to 83 per cent of the people. It is organized to promote legislation favorable for cities and villages and to render service to cities and villages in developing ordinances, conduct personnel studies and help keep city and village government running smoothly. The league has a permanent staff in Ann Arbor and trustees' meetings usually are held there, although occasionally in Lansing. John Huss who has been with the League staff for 20 years currently is director and secretary.

Townsend, who has served as city attorney for Holland since 1952, is associated with the law firm of Ten Cate, Townsend and Cunningham. The attorneys' group is one of 14 professional organi-

## Visser Scores Lone Tally For Dutch

LIMA, Ohio (Special) — Hope College's football team ran into a vastly improved Ohio Northern University football team here Saturday night and dropped a 15-7 decision before 3,500 fans in the Lima Stadium.

The Flying Dutchmen scored first in the contest and held a 7-6 halftime lead but the Polar Bears accounted for all of the second half scoring.

Ken Visser, Hudsonville freshman, scored the Hope touchdown late in the first quarter on a three-yard smash off right tackle on a cross-buck. Quarterback Paul Mack converted.

Hope had one touchdown called back in the second half because of a clipping penalty. Visser had scored the touchdown.

Late in the fourth quarter, the Dutch drove to the Northern one-yard line. Visser fumbled and the Polar Bears recovered.

Ohio Northern's first touchdown came in the first quarter on a six-yard quarterback option by freshman Chumsey Bauman following a sustained drive. Senior tackle, Joel Spiker missed the extra point try.

In the third quarter, Ohio Northern blocked a Mack punt and started another drive. The drive bogged on the Hope eight and Spiker kicked an 18-yard field goal to put the Bears in front, 9-7.

Later in the same period, Ohio Northern moved down into Hope territory and Spiker tried another field goal. Sharky Vander Woude, Hope middle linebacker, drove through and blocked the try.

Freshman John Gray, Northern halfback, got off the longest run of the game in the waning minutes. He galloped 78 yards down the sidelines for the second Polar Bear touchdown. Spiker failed to convert.

Coached by Arden (Stretch) Roberson, the Ohio Northern team was much improved over last year when the Polar Bears dropped a 32-6 decision to Hope in Holland. Roberson has several strong freshmen in the lineup. It was Northern's second straight victory. Roberson is in his first year at Northern.

It was the home opener for the Bears after they opened with a 41-6 decision over Taylor University in Upland, Ind., last week and Roberson had instilled plenty of spirit into his club. Several of the Ohio Northern players are from the Lima area and were making their first appearance as collegiate gridgers.

Only one yard separated the clubs in statistics. Hope gained a total of 272 yards and the Polar Bears, 271. Northern picked up 45 more yards rushing than the Dutch while Hope took the passing honors by 46 yards. Hope made 19 first downs while the winners had 12.

Visser again led the Hope ball carriers. He carried 22 times for 97 yards. He has toted the ball for 304 yards in 35 tries in the two games for better than eight yards a carry. He leads the Dutch backs in scoring with two touchdowns.

John Vandenburg gained 66 yards in 14 tries while Vander Woude had 26 yards in eight carries. Steve Slagh made 22 yards in five tries and Mack gained five yards in five carries. Jim Fox carried one time and lost nine yards.

Hope completed six of 15 passes with Mack throwing the completions. The Bears hit on two of five aerials.

Ohio Northern had one five-yard penalty called against them and that came with 15 seconds remaining in the game. Hope was assessed 40 yards in penalties.

The Hope team stayed in Lima Saturday night and returned to Holland Sunday. The contest was sponsored by the Lima Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Hope opens MIAA play Saturday against Albion College at 1:30 p.m. at Alumni Field in Albion. Albion has a 1-0 record, having defeated Eastern Michigan, 21-7 in its opener. The Dutch are now 1-1.

An innovation next Tulip Time will be special plantings on city-owned property west of the City Hall 12th St. parking lot. De Graaf expects to plant 20,000 to 30,000 bulbs, representing many varieties. Today's shipments were imported from the Netherlands.

The scenes that we publish here speak eloquently of what has been accomplished in these forty years, and we refrain from adding words upon these monuments. Our streets, parks, public buildings, homes and industries speak for themselves."

"Each year we see about us newer indications of continued progress and it is with pleasure that we place before the citizens of Holland this silent testimony of our present advancement. Future years can bring to us only still greater blessings—the fruits of an eventual past."

Perhaps the most recently completed public building in Holland back in 1911 was the handsome new city hall. Voorhees Hall in the cluster of Hope College buildings also stood out.

An entire page was devoted to resort life with prominent pictures of Waukazoo Inn, Ottawa Beach Hotel and Macatawa Hotel, now all gone. Jenison Park was an amusement park par excellence. But beach scenes were a far cry from today's Bikinis.

## Zeeland

The Zeeland Community Hospital announced last week that a new training program for Sunshine Girls (Nurses Aids) started on Monday. The first meeting was held in the hospital dining room at 4:15 p.m. The course is open to 11th and 12th grade high school girls, and classes will be conducted a minimum of two nights per week. The complete training schedule was given at the first meeting, according to hospital administrator, Robert Loetz.

The track will be open at 10 a.m. and the races will start at 1 p.m. Every race will be a trophy race and a total of 20 trophies will be awarded.

Drivers from throughout Western Michigan will be competing on the new quarter-mile asphalt track, described as the newest, most popular and sportiest road racing course in the area.

Advance entries have already been received from Grand Rapids, Holland, Allegan, Wayland, South Haven, Niles, Three Rivers, Benton Harbor, Lansing and Milburg.




