## One-Way Street Plan **Scheduled**

Freeway Will Link Up With Present Highway South of the City

Construction of the proposed I-196 from Holland to Grandville is included in highway construction projects for a five-year period beginning July 1, 1967, State Highway Department Director Howard E. Hill announced today in Lansing.

The new segment of I-196 would include 6.8 miles of freeway in Allegan County and 12 miles of freeway in Ottawa County. New construction would start several miles southwest of Holland and would roughly parallel the US-31 by-pass and M-21 to the south, leading to the Kent' County line to connect with that section of I-196 which was opened less than a year ago.

The proposed I-196 in Ottawa and Allegan counties calls for interchanges on M-40 just south of the Holland city limits, on 16th St. (Adams) near 96th Ave. about two miles south of Zeeland, on Byron Rd. about a mile southeast of Zeeland, on 32nd Ave. just south of Hudsonville, and on 144th St, in Grandville. The 6.8 miles of freeway in Allegan County includes four

railroad tracks. Also included in the five-year program, which will cost an estimated \$238,422,000 in 28 Michigan counties, are improvements to M-40 in Allegan County and improvements to US-31 business route in Holland city.

A record payment of \$293,932-.48 was transferred today from Windmill funds of the city-owned electric utility to the general fund of the city of Holland.

The payment represents 50 per cent of the net earnings of the electric department of the Board of Public Works for the year ending last June 30. BPW Supt Cuy E. Bell said the payment represents an increase of nearly 11 per cent over

last year. The electric department lists a net profit of \$587,864.97 after ailowing for depreciation, bond interest and debt service payments. Electric sales for the year totaled \$2,387,160.07. Interest on investments, pole rentals and other income added \$141.178.12 to receipts.

On the expenditure side, operating expenses were \$1,208,-746.93; allowance for depreciation, \$507,563.79; interest on bonds, \$149,162.50; principal payment on revenue bonds, \$75,000.

The 1965-66 city budget had earmarked \$175,000 of BPW earning for the general fund and \$75,000 for the capital improvement fund. The utility payment is \$43,932.48 more than anticipated and determination of its use will be made by Coundays from 1 to 5 p.m., Saturday





Few changes will be necessary on farms. A bacteria count of less than 100. 000 per ML. is required for milk under the new standard. as under the old. More state inspectors will be

required due to more frequent inspection. However, there will probably be less duplication of inspection. One portion of the U3PH recommendations which Michigan did not adopt is the percentage of butterfat. Michigan still requires a 3.5 per cent test, while the USPHS will allow 3.25 per cent.



The Netherlands Museum in Holland has obtained several items of historical value from the old court house in Grand Haven where demolition started

Monday. The Museum was invited to select materials along with historical societies, municipalities

and township boards. The Michigan Historical Commission has first rights to all old records which can be disposed of under law, and has obtained early tax rolls dating from 1837 to 1880, plus other tax records at 20-year intervals. All records from 1940 must be retained and have been moved to the new county building.

The Netherlands Museum has retained tax rolls of 1885, 1890, 1895, 1905, 1915, 1925, 1930 and 1935, covering Holland city, Zeeland city, Holland township, Zeeland township and Park township, plus some other tax records from certain townships which may be included in the bound records. These tax books vary in size, the smaller one measures 12 by 14 inches and 3 to 5 inches thick. Others are much larger.

All tax records were taken to Netherlands Museum to be used in research and for archival material. All old records are hand written.

Other items obtained were four chairs from the jury box, the swinging gate inside the courtroom, a leather covered door leading to the judge's chambers, an old fire hose and several bookcases.
