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## Grand Haven Man Heads Supervisors

GRAND HAVEN — George Wessel, Grand Haven city assessor since 1958 and prominent in American Legion circles in west Michigan, was elected chairman of the Ottawa county board of supervisors Tuesday at the opening meeting of the Board's April session. He has been vice chairman three years under Herman Windemuller, supervisor from Park township.

Gerald De Windt, supervisor from Georgetown township five years, was elected vice chairman, succeeding Wessel. According to custom, officers serve two years in each position and this year is the year for the board to select a vice chairman from rural representatives.

Two new members were seated Tuesday — Harold Ver Hage, automobile agency owner, succeeds State Sen. Gary Byker of Hudsonville city, and Mayor John Timmers of Coopersville is the other new member on the board. John Stephenson, a former member of the board, was seated to serve in the place of Zeeland's mayor, Frank Hoogland, at the April session.

Most of the first meeting was taken up by Richard Dell, senior auditor from the state treasurer's office, who explained plans to convert the county's bookkeeping system into a new code system. This may lead later to machine accounting in Ottawa, he said.

Ronald Bakker, engineer-manager for the county road commission, presented the annual report for 1967 and a tentative budget for 1968. He announced bids on a new \$580,000 bridge over Grand River at Eastmanville will be opened May 5 and work will start early this summer.

The clerk of Port Sheldon township submitted a letter from the township board, opposing the use of federal land in that area for a county wide dumping ground. City Manager R. V. Terrill, chairman of the buildings and grounds committee, reported an engineering firm has recommended that two sewage lagoons be installed at the infirmary at Eastmanville, as present sewage from the infirmary is polluting Grand River.

A special committee studying the need for a county medical facility in Ottawa reported new nursing homes are planned in the county and there is no longer need for a facility in the county.

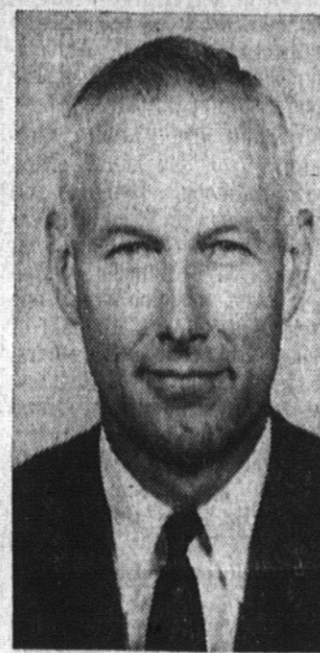
## Zumberge Resigns As GVSC President

ALLENDALE — The president of Grand Valley State College, Dr. James H. Zumberge, 44, announced his resignation today to the Board of Control at their regular April meeting on the campus at Allendale.

Dr. Zumberge told the board that his decision was a difficult one to make but that it was based on a desire to return to his professional field of geology. He expects to join the University of Arizona, Tucson, Ariz., as director of the school of earth sciences and professor of geology.

"The role of the modern college president leaves little time for interests that are unrelated to the immediate affairs of the presidency," Dr. Zumberge said. "Since my involvement with geological research is still very strong I had to make a choice between continuing to serve as full time president of the college which I helped to build or return to a field of inquiry that still holds great appeal to me."

Board chairman L. William Seidman, who was largely responsible for bringing Dr. Zumberge to Grand Valley as its first president in February, 1962, said that he spoke for the other members in wishing Dr. Zumberge success in his new position while at the same time expressing deep regret at his decision to leave the college.

## Phone Service To Be Expanded At Hamilton

HAMILTON — General Telephone Company is presently installing the necessary equipment and facilities to provide the expanded base rate area to the Hamilton exchange, Don W. Martin, Allegan district manager announced today.

Included in this project is over 46 miles of aerial and buried cable, to serve both the rural areas and the new base rate area.

The expansion of the base rate area will allow those customers within the area the availability of one, two or four party service, without additional charges. Maximum parties on any line, within the base rate area will be four. At the same time, all rural multiparty lines will be reduced to a maximum of five parties.

The expansion project will further allow General Telephone Company to reduce the charges of affected customers from \$5.60 per month for rural residential service, to \$5.10 per month for four party urban residential service. This reduction will be effective April 20, 1968, and will be reflected on that telephone bill.

Martin points out that customers in the Hamilton exchange, who will receive telephone number changes, will not be changed until the new directory is available, approximately May 21, 1968.

Total expenditure for this improvement of service is approximately \$172,000, Martin said.

## Snowfall Here Hits 77 Inches

With another 2.25 inches of snow falling in March, snowfall in Holland to date for the 1967-68 season has reached 77.35 inches — a light season for Holland which often has more than 100 inches.

For this season, 3.1 inches fell in October, 10 inches in November, 20.3 inches in December, 17.2 inches in January, 24.5 inches in February and 2.25 inches in March, according to Weather Observer Lynn Wheaton.

Average temperature for March was 39.1 degrees or 3.7 degrees above normal. The maximum was 70 on March 27 and the minimum was 6 on March 1. On that day the snow was three inches deep on the ground, the greatest depth for the month.

Maximum of 70 compares with 76 in 1967, 73 in 1966, 48 in 1965 and 58 in 1964. Minimum of 6 compares with -9 in 1967, 11 in 1966, -5 in 1965 and 7 in 1964.

Average temperature of 39.1 compares with 34.2 in 1967, 37.1 in 1966, 27 in 1965 and 33.4 in 1964.

Average maximum was 48.7, compared with 43.5 in 1967, 46.2 in 1966, 33.9 in 1965 and 44.1 in 1964. Average minimum of 28.8 compares with 43.5 in 1967, 28 in 1966, 20.1 in 1965 and 22.6 in 1964.

Snowfall totaled 2.25 inches, compared with 8.9 inches in 1964. Greatest snowfall in a 24-hour period was 2.25 inches in 1968, 2.6 inches in 1967, 3 inches in 1966, 7 inches in 1965 and 3.5 inches in 1964. Greatest depth on the ground was 3 inches in 1968, 11.5 inches in 1967, 4 inches in 1966, 11 inches in 1965 and 1 inch in 1964.

Precipitation totaled .89 inch or 1.4 inches below normal for March. The greatest precipitation in a 24-hour period was .43 inch on March 19. Precipitation totaled 1.38 inches in 1967, 3.78 inches in 1966, 2.67 inches in 1965 and 3.52 inches in 1964.

Precipitation fell on 11 days in 1968, 17 days in 1967, 19 days in 1966, 17 days in 1965 and 19 days in 1964.

## Fennville Okays Plans

FENNVILLE — Fennville school district voters Monday approved continuation of a 6.5 mill operation tax for three more years, by a vote of 375 to 206. The original tax expires this year.

The voters also approved the raising of the 15-mill tax limitation by a vote of 367 to 215 and the authority to the board of education to divert 1.5 mills from the debt fund to the sinking fund for construction purposes.

## Solutions Sought In Alewife Plight

Possible solutions to meeting the alewife problem in the local area this year were outlined at a meeting of the Lake Macatawa Intermunicipality committee Friday at Point West.

The four-point report was submitted by Duke Reed who heads the alewife subcommittee. Proposals follow:

1. Gathering dead fish in large plastic or oiled bags for disposal by commercial refuse companies.

2. Enlisting local youth groups to assist adults in areas where major difficulties lie in the cleanup process.

3. Acquiring beach cleaning equipment, although studies indicate the cost is too great for a limited season. It was suggested an existing agency such as the city of Holland, county drain commission or county road commission could operate such a program.

4. Keeping alewives out of tributaries and small lakes by means of a sound barrier or a bubble curtain.

Reed explained that the "sound barrier" is in the theory stage but the "bubble curtain" has been tested in tanks at Sheed Aquarium in Chicago with positive results. Thus, he visualizes an electric air compressor feeding a perforated pipe about 175 feet long on the bottom of the local channel between the two harbor lights.

## Ferrysburg Soldier Dies In Vietnam

GRAND HAVEN — Spec/4 Roger E. Ward, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elgin Ward of 1825 Cecelia Lane, Ferrysburg, was killed by a sniper's bullet in Vietnam at 5 p.m. Friday, according to word received by the family Tuesday.

Ward, who was formerly employed at Harbor Industries in Grand Haven, entered the service in May, 1967, and was first stationed at Fort Knox, Ky. He arrived in Vietnam with the 9th infantry division last October.

Surviving are the parents; a sister, Beverly; a brother, Pvt. Dennis Ward stationed at Fort Knox, Ky.; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Cottrell of Grand Haven, and a great-grandmother, Mrs. Marshall Maile of Wyoming.

## Dock Permit Sought For Macatawa Inn

King Construction Co., 1662 Virginia Pl., acting as agent for Macatawa Inn Inc., has applied to the Detroit district Corps of Engineers for a federal permit to construct a dock extending 45 feet in Lake Macatawa off the blacktop paved area south of Point West.

Plans call for a wood pile and timber platform 160 by five feet, along the shoreline, plus four wood pile and timber piers and related mooring piles for boat wells.

In issuing permits, due consideration is given to the effect on navigation, fish and wildlife, pollution, conservation and other pertinent factors of general public interest.

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## Supervisors Shift Funds For County

GRAND HAVEN — Additional funds to carry on duties in several departments in the Ottawa county offices here were approved by the Board of Supervisors Wednesday. The board adjourned until next Monday to permit the committee on equalization to prepare its annual report.

Glen Timmer, county civil defense director, outlined additional work since Jan. 1 and was granted an additional \$5,000 for his 1968 budget. This will be used for additional wages for the director, training for CD workers and extra equipment. Timmer was reappointed for another two-year term as director.

The sheriff's staff was given permission to hire an additional sergeant, whose duties will be special services and training of personnel. William Haiker, 39, Holland, a retired USAF officer, who will be hired for this work, will be paid \$5,292 for the remainder of 1968.

The board also transferred \$2,925 from the contingent fund to the salaries budget for an additional court stenographer in the office of Probate Judge F. T. Miles. A request for \$2,975 for an additional stenographer in the office of the friend of the court was tabled until Monday.

Former Board Chairman Herman Windemuller reported \$1,732.50 was spent out of the drain commissioner's funds in February for the use of a Muskegon tug to break up a dangerous ice jam in Grand River at Grand Haven. The board approved a transfer of this sum from the contingent fund to the drain commissioner's budget.

The buildings and grounds committee was authorized to advertise for bids on a sewage lagoon at the county infirmary at Eastmanville, recommended by state officials. Architect Michael Koteles presented plans for a new building at the county branch office at Holland, which would cost \$90,000. No action was taken by the board.

Koteles recommended that a separate building be erected east of the present buildings on Manley St. to house the health department and the county dentist's office. These two offices would move out of the present building, leaving room for the sheriff's office and allowing the Bureau of Social Aid to expand. Windemuller, chairman until this session of the board, said the present system of quarterly sessions of the board makes it difficult for the chairman to transact business. He suggested that the board hold monthly meetings and this suggestion was tabled until the June session.

Prosecutor James W. Bussard was asked for his opinion on whether the county could recognize the Michigan Nurses association as bargaining agency for nurses in the county department. He was instructed to obtain proof that the nurses wish to designate the association as their bargaining agent.

County Social Welfare Director Larry Hilldore submitted the report of the Department of Social Welfare for 1967 and reported 3,500 residents of the county received \$2,350,000 in aid from tax funds in Ottawa county during the year. This is not a true picture, he said, of poverty in the county, as more than a million dollars was spent in federal funds in Medicaid during the year.

The boy received a compound fracture of the right leg, a fractured left arm and head injuries and was taken by ambulance to Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids.

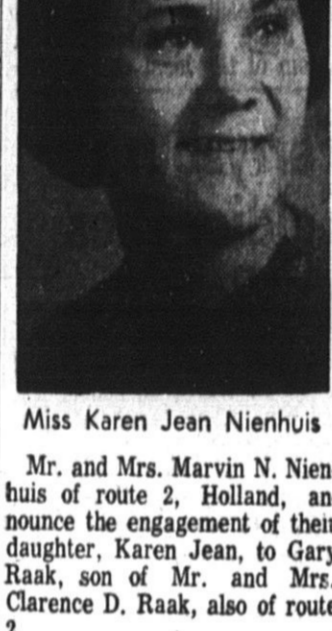

## New Flower Arranging Forms Told by Expert

A breath of spring filled the Woman's Literary Club on Thursday afternoon, when the members of the Holland Garden Club met to hear Mrs. Rhynold Schulke of Cleveland, Ohio, speak on "The Changing World of Flower Arranging."

With charm and ease, Mrs. Schulke showed, through her arrangements, her concepts of various types of arrangements in the traditional, modern, and free style forms. She displayed abstract designs, assemblages, sculpture effects and lighted arrangements.

She said, "Art in any form is not a set of rules. There are principles to follow, but one cannot have creative expression by following someone else's rules." In any creation, especially flower arranging, the unexpected should happen, with the designer putting his feelings and his ideas into the arrangement, thus conveying how he feels about the world he lives in, both through the design he has created and through the materials he has used.

Flower arranging falls into two categories, either it is decorative or it is a three-dimensional art form. Mrs. Schulke made clear the difference between traditional and modern arranging. Traditional is a literal picture, with fixed focal point, its qualities being natural, obvious and decorative. Modern is an expression of purest form, purest color, pure texture and pure design, it never reminds one of another arrangement. It is designed for total effect, and may have several focal points.

The avant-garde of flower arranging as an art form is assemblages. These being a collection of things, a fitting together of parts and pieces with plant material, using shapes, lines, color and textures. It is in this field one can explore and invent, for this type of arrangement does not have to be understood, just enjoyed.

Mrs. Schulke had on display 12 arrangements in a variety of design. The traditional was of pink and orange roses with white snapdragons against a hot pink collage backdrop. Also a modern design of birds of paradise entwined with weathered wood in a tall cylinder vase done with dramatic flair. A holiday arrangement for the Easter season used a Byzantine wooden cross on a purple collage background set with calla lilies and crissam thorns in a ruby container.

She also displayed a free style arrangement using tulips

and cherry blossoms with wisteria vine, and a welded sculpture assemblage in modern design as well as a geometric collage using fluorescent colors.

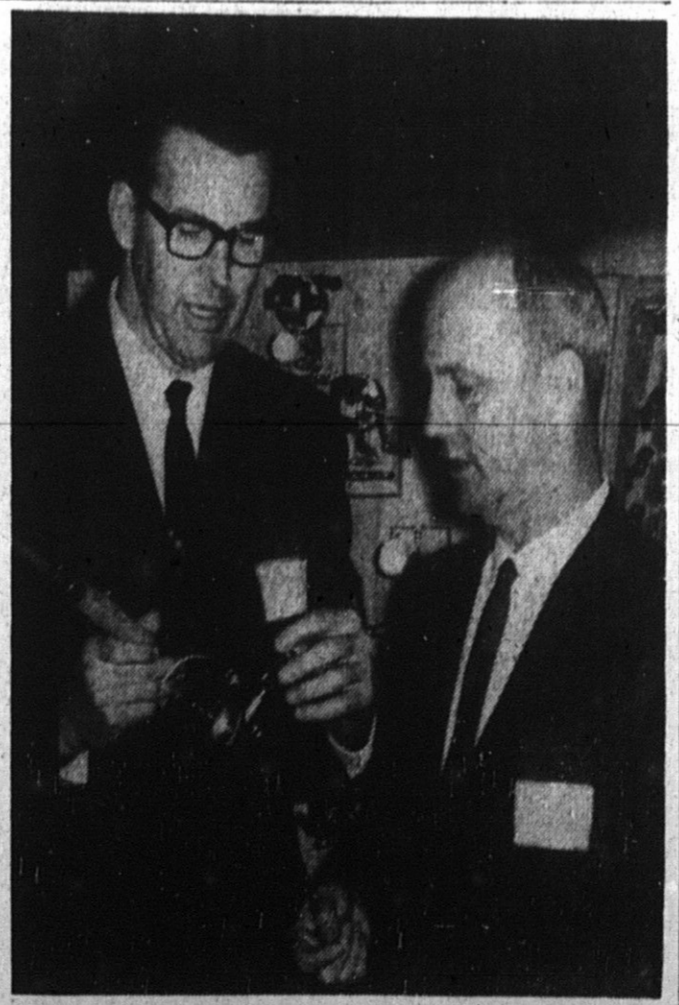

## Sunday School Lesson

Easter Sunday, April 14  
Our Response to the Risen Lord  
John 20:19-21; 21:15-19  
By C. P. Dame

On Easter Sunday, in the Sunday Schools and in the churches where the Bible is accepted as God's Word the people will hear about the risen Christ. And they should be reminded of their responsibility that has come in view of the commission Jesus gave to His disciples.

I. The risen Lord gives responsibility. He first made Himself known. On the evening of the day of resurrection the ten apostles were meeting together. Thomas was absent, Judas had committed suicide. During the day Jesus had talked with Mary Magdalene, and with several women, and with Peter and with the two men on the way to Emmaus. The fifth appearance on that day was to the apostles, who were meeting behind closed doors for fear of the Jews. Unexpectedly Jesus stood in their midst and said, "Peace be unto you." And then He showed them His hands and His side. "Then were the disciples glad, when they saw the Lord." Jesus still makes people glad.

After Jesus had revealed Himself He commissioned them to go and witness. He breathed on them and then said, "Receive ye the Holy Spirit." Jesus wanted these men to be firmly convinced that He had risen from the dead. People who do not believe in a resurrected Lord have no gospel. The church today needs leaders as well as members who are convinced that Jesus lives. II. The risen Lord covets our love. The first part of the lesson tells about an event that took place in Jerusalem, the second part of an event that took place in Galilee. At the suggestion of Peter seven apostles went fishing. All night they fished and caught nothing. Jesus, standing on the shore, told them where to fish and they caught a great haul. The Lord also prepared a breakfast for the group and waited on them.

Publicly Peter had denied Jesus, and hence publicly Jesus restored him again. Note the four steps in the restoration. The first was the look Jesus gave him after he denied Him, the next was the angel's message to the women, "Go tell His disciples and Peter"; and then the private meeting Jesus had with Peter—see Luke 24:34, and the last step recorded in the lesson text.

Jesus asked Peter three questions. The first one was, "Simon, son of Jonas, lovest thou Me more than these?"—either the fishing apparatus or the other apostles. Jesus wants supreme loyalty. The Lord used a stronger term in the first two questions, in the third one He used the weaker word which Peter was using. The last question grieved Peter much.

Jesus gave Peter three tasks—"Feed My lambs"; "Tend (rule or shepherd) My sheep"; and "Feed My sheep"—note the three classes of ministry. The lambs—the children come first. Today many children fail to get the biblical instruction they need. The Sunday School literature that is used in some churches reveals that plainly. The sheep needs nurturing—some get it, some do not. Pastoral calling is according to reports outmoded. Leaders in the church have a weighty responsibility.

Jesus told Peter about His future and violent death. Peter died a martyr. In the meantime he was called upon to follow Jesus. The Lord's words, "Follow Me" are a challenge to us all even in this day and they will be for the people who will live later.

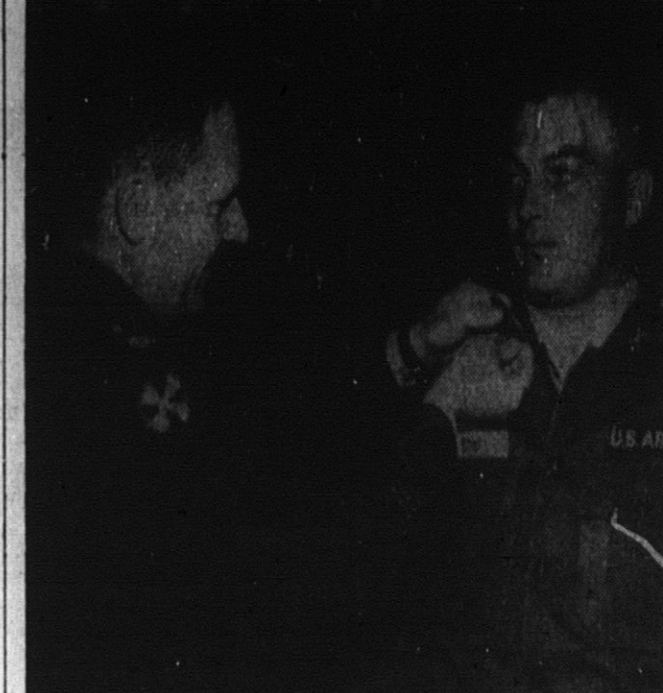

After seven months, the ungraded experiment for grades one through three in Washington and Lincoln Schools is working out well, the Board of Education was informed at its monthly meeting Thursday in the administration building. Most teachers were pleased with the flexibility of the program, particularly in the matter of newcomers not easily placed in graded rooms because of lack of basic reading skills, and the like.

Compagner also outlined plans for a third summer in a Head Start program, again to be conducted in Lincoln School on much the same lines as the previous two seasons.

Kenneth Bauman of the athletic department outlined programs and budget needs for the coming year.

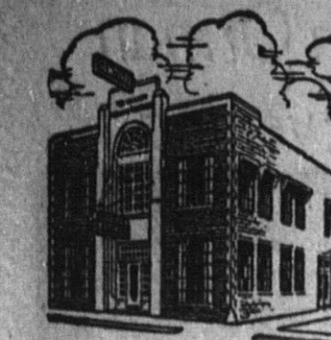
## Kiwanis Queens Meeting Hears Kathy Essenburg

## West Ottawa Group Studies Future Needs

The West Ottawa building advisory steering committee has begun work on enrollment projects and future building needs under the chairmanship of Raymond Lamb, Beechwood resident who served as Beechwood school principal until 1941. Mrs. Lupita Reyes, active in Spanish-American circles, is serving as secretary.

Preliminary reports reveal that all elementary schools are operating over their designed capacity, and that by next year the elementary system should have 83 rooms for kindergarten through sixth grade, whereas 76 are now available.

In the secondary schools, there currently are 62½ teaching stations whereas 84 to 88 are needed in the five to 10-year projection. The preliminary report also points to a possible regrouping of the middle school concept in a 5-3-4 program instead of the 6-3-3 present program, which might result in an easier reshuffling of facilities.

The preliminary report reveals that there are 170 tuition students presently, and a gradual phasing out of these students over a five-year period will have but little effect on projected enrollments. With tuition students included, grades 7-12 have 1,763 students at present. With all tuition students phased out by 1973-74, total enrollment in the six grades would be 2,043.

Bonds outstanding as of March 27, 1968, carry a total of \$3,502,000. This includes \$202,000 in pool bonds, \$990,000 in elementary bonds and \$2,310,000 in high school bonds.

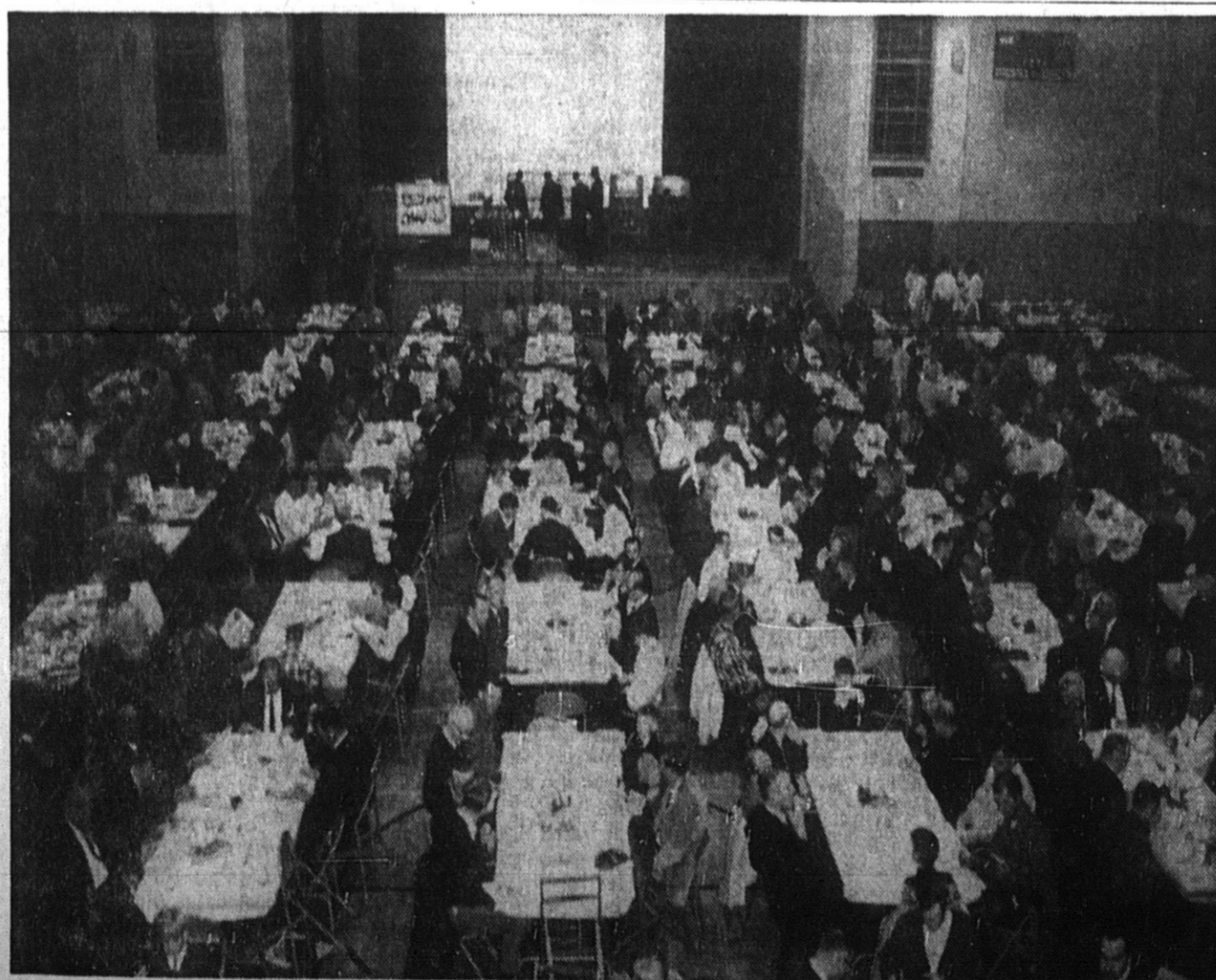

## Hodge Shows Slides on Westport

The Fish and Game Club held a Coho Sports Banquet Thursday night in the Civic Center at 6:30 p.m. with a capacity crowd attending.

The banquet opened with an invocation by the Rev. Gordon Klouw with Marv Wabeke acting as the master of ceremonies.

A club status report was given by Art De Waard, club president. Holland Sen. Gary Byyker attended the banquet along with guests from other clubs around the area.

Stan Lievese, foremost Coho expert in the Midwest, presented a new film recently created by the Michigan Conservation Department entitled "Coho."

The film was in living color and showed the story of the Michigan Coho in action.

The film alleviated the doubts of many a fisherman as to the validity of the potential in sports fishing and tourist attraction the Coho and Chinook salmon are creating in Michigan. The film described the story of the Coho from its existence in Michigan waters down to its already vibrant presence.

Lievese said "the Coho catch so far this year has been great." He further stated that Michigan fishermen have already learned the technique for catching Coho. Anglers have learned that lure depth is important and that weather conditions — temperature, time of day and water conditions — play a unique place in salmon fishing in the Michigan waters.

"Lampicide cut back has hurt lake trout, especially in Lake Huron, since the lamprey eel has a little more playing room. But in the long run the cutback on DDT's will aid in the reproduction of all fish in Michigan Lakes and waters. The Conservation Department has already discovered that the DDT is causing a non-reproduction problem in many of the young fish," Lievese said.

When asked if the lamprey will hurt the Coho, Lievese said "through research Michigan fish biologists have already learned that the Coho is not only feeding on the Alewife but also on the lamprey."

Lievese said that the reason Lake Macatawa is not abounding with Coho could be because of the still prevailing ice conditions and the concentration of the Coho yet further down in the southern portion of the state. "Time will tell. Later on this season there should be no reason why the Lake can not spawn salmon. Its to early to tell as of yet," Lievese added.

"Last year the Conservation Department planted two million Coho along with some Chinook. This year we plan to plant another two million Coho with a lot more Chinook. I predict that before this year is out anglers will be catching some 30 pound salmon," Lievese said.

"At the end of ten yeas there should be over 60 million salmon abounding in the lakes and streams of Michigan," Lievese announced.

Michigan has already seen a salmon run last year. Some of the Michigan streams were jammed with the spawning fish. But the Conservation Department announces that many more streams will experience the same effect as the Manistee and streams surrounding the Pelston area did, Lievese said.

Lievese was asked if the salmon spawning creates a danger to the present stream fish. Lievese replied that neither the Coho nor Chinook present a danger to our stream and brook game because when Coho come into the stream for spawning they are finished feeding for the most part.

"Once the Coho enters its spawning stage it discontinues eating. Its digestive system is already on the decay at that stage. Of course there will be a little reduction of stream fish — trout and others — from the factor of food competition.

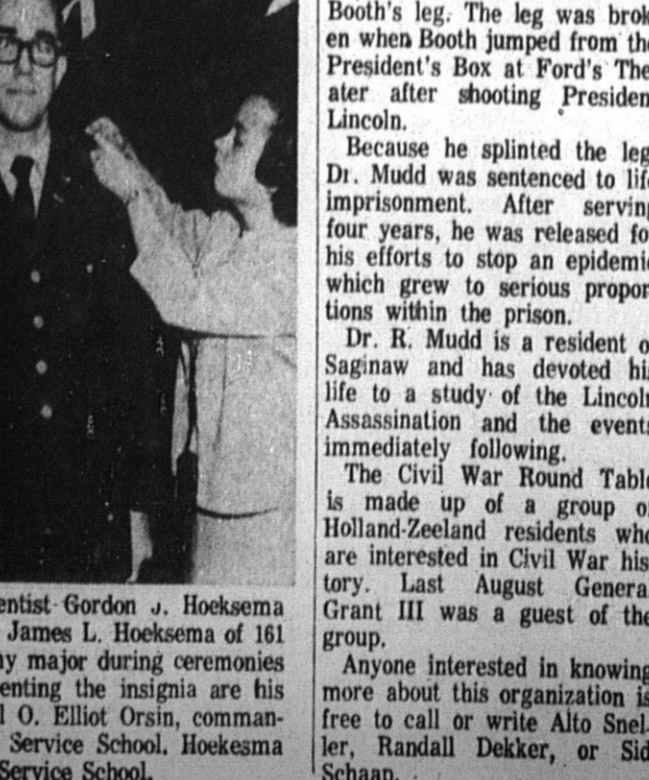
Dr. R. Mudd is a resident of Saginaw and has devoted his life to a study of the Lincoln Assassination and the events immediately following.

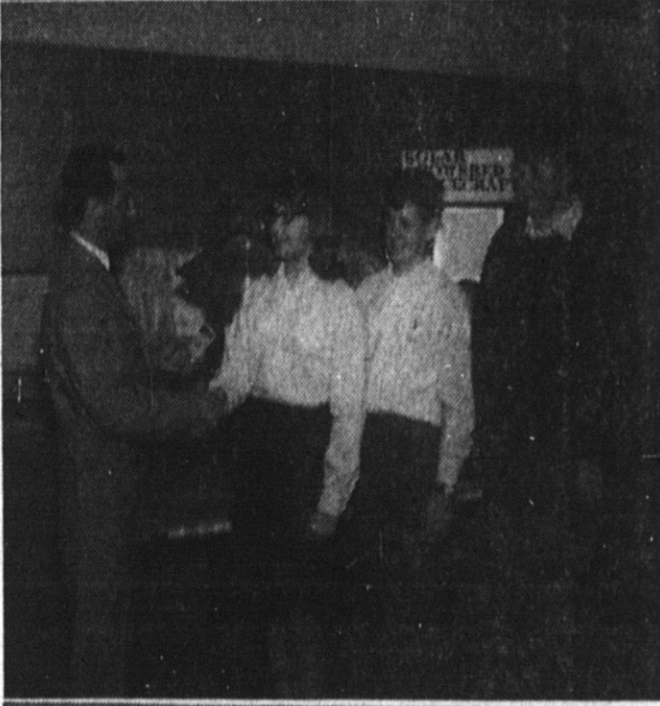

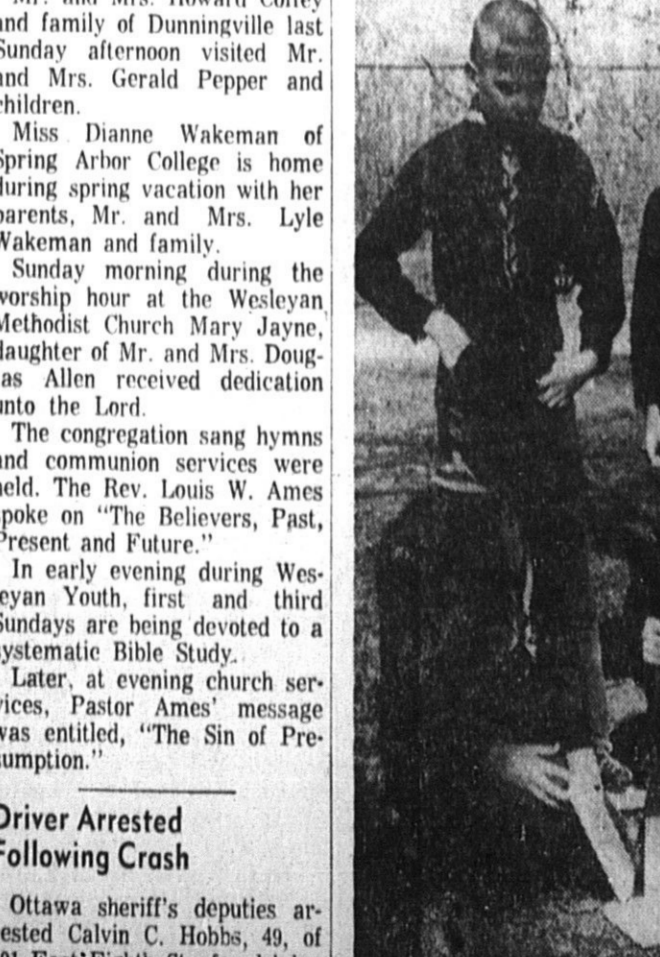

### Hamilton Girl's Research Paper Read at Meeting

ROCHESTER, Mich. — A research paper written by an Oakland University senior from Hamilton was delivered Thursday at a national meeting of the American Chemical Society Division of Organic Chemistry at San Francisco.

The author is Kay Stehower of Box 93, Hamilton, who is a National Science Foundation undergraduate research participant at Oakland. Prof. Paul Tomboulain, chairman of the OU chemistry department, said the Thursday presentation may be the first paper given at a professional meeting on work done by an Oakland undergraduate student.

## Two Driver Education Sessions Set

Driver education classes will be held at West Ottawa High School in two sessions this summer.

Session I, with three classes of 60 students each, will be held June 10 to July 26.

Session II, with two classes of 60 students will be held from July 8 to August 23.

Each student is required to be in class for two hours daily for the first three weeks of the session and each student is required to receive an average of 6 hours of behind-the-wheel instruction, to be scheduled by the instructors sometime during the session. Also each student will be required to spend one extra hour, in addition to class time, for laboratory testing.

Session I classes will be held from 8 to 10 a.m., 10 to 12, and 1 to 3 p.m. The laboratory testing will be from 8 to 12 and 3 to 4 as scheduled by the instructor. Session II classes will be held from 8 to 10 a.m. and 10 a.m. to 12 with the laboratory testing from 7 to 8 and 12 to 1 p.m.

A boy or girl is eligible to enroll if he attends West Ottawa High School or his parents are taxpayers in the West Ottawa School district. He must be 15 by June 10, 1968. Classes will be filled on a first come-first served basis. If more students enroll than can be accommodated, the older students will be given priority.

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
