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Hours For Landfill Are Altered

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa county board of commissioners struggled with the landfill problem again Monday at its June meeting and voted, after a heated discussion, to again change the hours of operation of the Olive township county sanitary landfill.

Commissioner Marvin De Witt of the Olive area moved to close the landfill, after county road commission Engineer - Manager Ronald Bakker reported that the operation lost \$3,342 since it was opened Feb. 29. Receipts amounted to \$1,684, he said, and operation costs totaled \$5,026.

A substitute motion was made by Commissioner Donald Williams of Holland to continue operation of the dump Tuesday afternoons and open the landfill Saturdays from 8 to 11 a.m. This motion passed by a vote of 11.9 to 7.6. Mr. Bakker was asked to return in 60 days to report on the times of the day the dump was used most and the type of refuse deposited.

William Kieft, Grand Haven, a member of the county health board, told the board Monday morning that an expansion of hours for the operation is needed as the state health department plans to close township landfill sites in Port Sheldon, Blendon, Robinson and Jamestown on June 30. Grand Haven township's dump was closed recently also. Grand Haven city council asked the road commission to expand the hours two weeks ago but the commission voted against the plan last week.

Welfare Director Larry Hill-dore reviewed the county's emergency employment program and reported that the federal government has approved continuation of the program in 1973. The board voted to petition the U. S. Department of Labor for appointment of a director of veteran affairs in connection with the employment program. If approved, he will be paid \$7,600 annually and will have an office in the new county branch office at Allendale.

Transfer of \$13,247.76 from the county's contingent fund to the sheriff's fund for purchase of 13 new cruisers was approved and an application for federal assistance in purchasing a new two-way communications system for the sheriff's department was approved. The system would cost \$127,945, a bid proposed by Motorola Corp.

Sleepy Man Finds Station Hit by Thief

Holland police Wednesday pieced together their investigation of a sleepy service station attendant, an anonymous telephone call and a larceny on money, soft drinks and cigarettes.

Police said they received an anonymous call at 2:30 today reporting the attendant at a Clark Service Station at 671 Michigan Ave., was asleep. Police checked and found the attendant awake.

At 4:45 a.m. South Haven state police messaged they had stopped a car on a traffic violation and found inside the car cases of soft drinks and cartons of cigarettes and asked police agencies if they had knowledge of any breaks.

Police contacted the Clark station and the attendant told officers there was no larceny but called back later to report \$20 in cash missing from a cabinet in a rear room along with four cases of soft drinks and four cartons of cigarettes.

Police said the attendant told them he had fallen asleep in his car some time after 3:15 a.m. and awoke shortly before police called to check on a possible larceny.

Police said the anonymous caller complaining about a sleepy attendant was not believed involved in the missing money, soft drinks and cigarettes from the station.

State Police said the subjects stopped in the car for a traffic violation were not detained.

Heavy Rains Leave City Streets Awash

Flooding, power and telephone interruptions and wet campers resulted from the storms that dumped 4.7 inches of rain on the Holland area Wednesday.

Several streets remained flooded this morning as street department crews manned pumps to clear the water.

Worst flooding reportedly was along Pine Ave. between Third and Seventh Streets where the level at times was said up to the door handles of cars.

Traffic on southbound Pine Ave. was diverted to Third St. and east to Central Ave. and for a time southbound traffic was sent onto River Ave., which normally is one-way north.

Firemen were called to pump flooding waters from the intersection at 29th St. and Michigan Ave. which threatened to spill into basements of stores and homes. Firemen were called at 7:45 p.m. and remained at the intersection with pumps until 10:47 p.m. Water was pumped down Michigan Ave. to the Hospital Hill, about five blocks away.

Michigan Bell Telephone reported about 400 telephone services were knocked out by rain and lightning but all service was expected to be restored by 9 p.m.

In Zeeland, lightning knocked out a power substation and interrupted electrical power to customers in the west sections of the city for about 30 minutes. Minor power interruptions were reported elsewhere in the city. Several basements in Zeeland were reported flooded with up to five inches of water. City pumps were used to remove the water.

Holland State Park reported several tents were downed by winds and weight of water and a number of campers packed up during the storm and left the park. No injuries were reported.

Loss Put At Millions For Berries

Temperatures reaching to 21 degrees early Sunday morning resulted in extensive damage and loss to Holland area blueberry farms.

Jack Johnston, president of the Michigan Blueberry Growers Association in Grand Junction, today estimated the damage to Michigan blueberry crops at 75 to 90 per cent.

The frigid temperatures spread from Muskegon County down to the Indiana State line, including Ottawa, Allegan, Van Buren and Berrien counties. Some 761 farm families are affected.

Growers in Western Michigan have lost \$5 to \$6 million, Johnston said. It was the first such loss in 35 years.

Clean Water Projects Under Study

A survey on the extent of water pollution control efforts by government and industry was submitted to the Black River Basin Advisory Council at its meeting Tuesday in City Hall.

The survey conducted by the committee was an effort to emphasize the amount of money being committed in the local area to combat water pollution. It revealed that industry was proposing \$2.6 million for water quality controls while \$2,217,000 had been spent in the past five years.

In addition \$48,000 is proposed by two industries for research and the Department of Natural Resources has proposed \$30,000.

John Wyma of the Ottawa County Health Department submitted results of a sanitary survey conducted by his department in the unincorporated areas of Zeeland, Holland and Park townships.

Of the 142 private sewage disposal systems surveyed in Zeeland township, 72 per cent were found in on-compliance of standards established for the survey. Of the 64 surveyed in Holland township, 25 per cent were in non compliance while 18 per cent of the 28 systems inspected in Park township were in non compliance.

Represented at the meeting were the townships of Holland, Park, Zeeland and Fillmore; the cities of Holland and Zeeland; the counties of Ottawa and Allegan, and Hope College, the Holland Garden Club, League of Women Voters, Water Resources Commission, Waukazo Woods Association, the West Ottawa Soil Conservation District and local industry.

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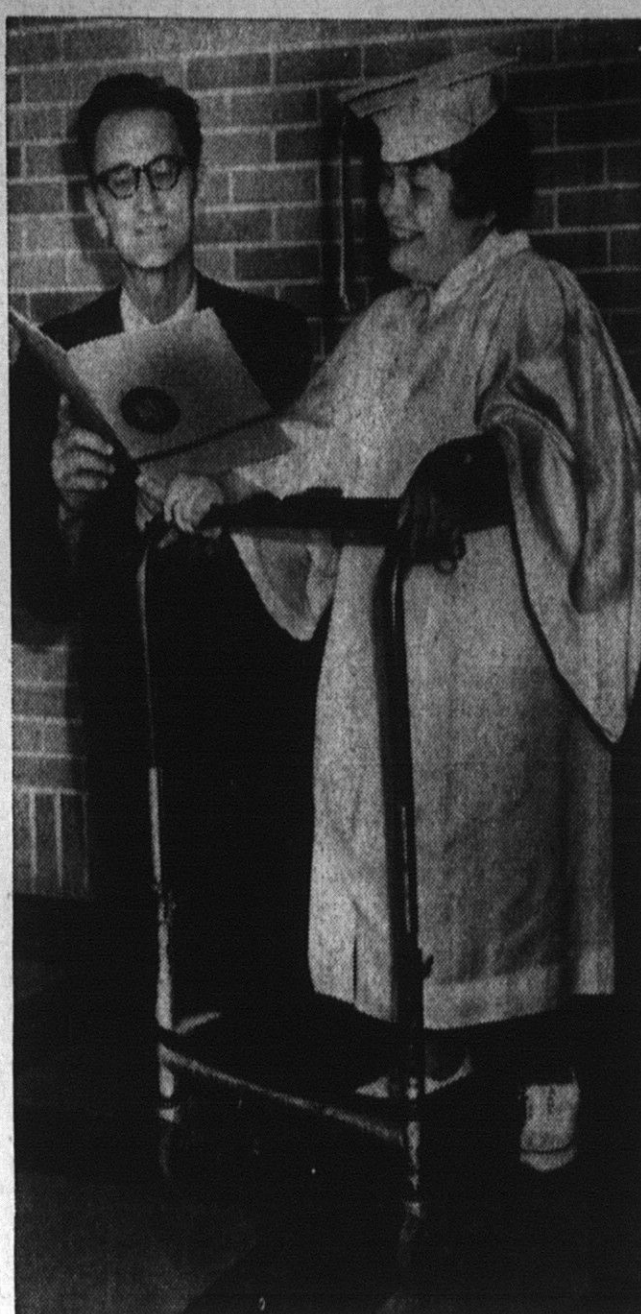

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Holland Also Gets 1/2 Mill For Pool

West Ottawa, Zeeland Pick 2 Board Members; Holland Re-elects One

Holland school district voters Monday approved the 4.65 mills for school operations for one year and to renew 1/2 mill for the swimming pool for three years.

Incumbent Charles L. Bradford, Jr. ran unopposed for reelection to a four year term on the Board of Education.

The millage request was approved by 133 votes with 3,026 yes and 2,893 no. The 1/2 mill for the swimming pool was approved by 884 votes with 3,280 yes and 2,396 no. Bradford received 3,851 votes.

The millage request was turned down in an election April 12 by 379 votes. Approval of the millage means approximately an additional \$675,000 of operating revenue for the coming school year.

A total of 6,114 voted in Monday's election or about 45 per cent of the registered voters in Holland district which includes most of Holland city plus Harrington and Federal districts.

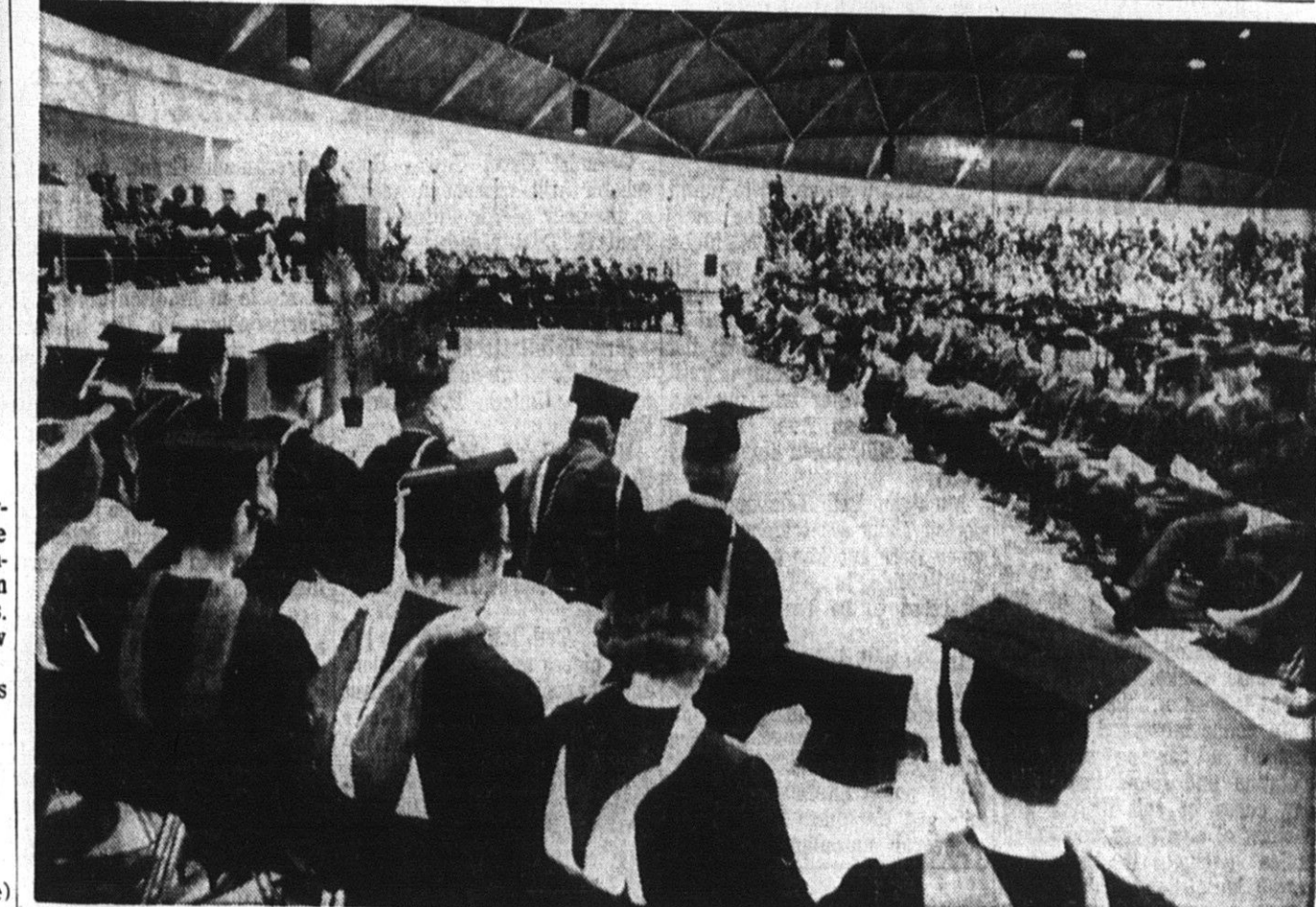

ALLENDALE — Grand Valley State College President, Arend D. Lubbers, speaking at GVSC's sixth spring commencement Saturday, urged graduates to look to themselves and their own communities for solutions to existing problems, and to create their place in society.

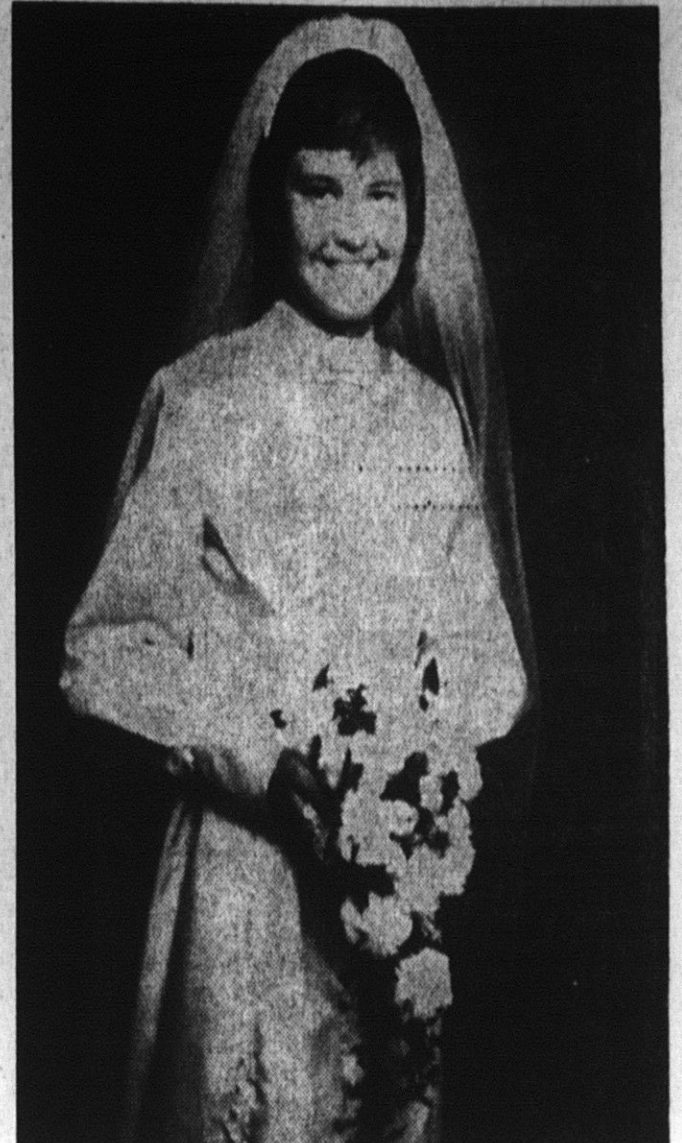

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 18
Meeting God Through Prayer
Matthew 6:5-15
By C. P. Dame

This lesson is about an old and yet timely topic—prayer. In this lesson Jesus, who was an expert in praying, teaches us how to pray. Most people at some time or another pray.

I. Prayer is universal. Jesus knew that His disciples prayed and that is why He said, "And when thou prayest"—not "if you pray." Jesus mentions two kinds of people. He said His disciples should not imitate the hypocrites who pretended to be pious and prayed publicly so that they could be seen and win praise. They got what they wanted but no more. Is there something of the hypocritical in us when we pray purposely that we may win praise for the beauty of our prayers?

Jesus could be negative, but usually ended with a positive note and hence He told His disciples to go in a closet and shut the door and pray in secret to the Father. Jesus did not condemn public prayers, for they can be most beneficial, but He objected to public prayers offered for the sake of getting praise.

"But when ye pray use not vain repetitions" piling up words hoping they will win attention. Simplicity, brevity and sincerity count. God knows what we need, but being Father He longs to hear the requests of His children. Some prayers are too long anyhow—tell God plainly and directly and He hears.

II. Jesus gave a model prayer. Luke in 11:1 says that Jesus gave His model prayer in response to a request from the disciples but Matthew inserted it in the Sermon on the Mount. The first three petitions of this prayer deal with our obligations to God and the other three with our obligations to our fellow men. The word "our" and the word "us" suggest concern for others. We belong to a needy race and we have common needs.

The word "temptation" is usually linked with evil and hence the word "trial" or "testing" is better. Evil is real and hence we need help in our battle against the foe. The last part of the prayer—"for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever"—most likely was added and that is why some do not use it. It is, however, a suitable ending of the model prayer which Jesus taught us.

This lesson will do us all much good if we resolve to pray more, doing so like Jesus did. Our world needs a lot of praying people, people who will pray in season and out of season.

EQUAL PROTECTION

Gov. William Milliken and Attorney General Frank Kelley have filed a suit in the Michigan Supreme Court contending that property taxes are an unconstitutional way of providing funds for public education.

The argument is that some communities can raise much more tax money for education than can others, and that this results in unequal education for Michigan school children. Education, they contend, should be equal.

This description of conditions in state education certainly is true. Whether or not this is all bad is another matter. The question that must be settled is not that of absolutely equal education for everybody, but of giving each child an opportunity for a good basic education. This can be done with property taxes as well as with any other kind of money. All children are not necessarily entitled to the most expensive and luxurious education that the richest communities can provide. All are entitled to a sound, useful education. What this may be is hardly a matter for courts to decide. This is a matter for experts.

We agree that property taxes are somewhat unjust because they cause hardships on some people. It would be more equitable to tax for education on the basis of income. But this doesn't touch the heart of the matter. Any community, we hold, may raise money in any way it agrees to do for the purpose of education, and in as large amounts as it is willing to afford. If some communities wish to spend more money for education than others, that's their business and their choice.

What we must insure is that every child gets a basically sound education. If, beyond that, communities want to spend themselves into a luxurious educational program, they should be allowed to do it. There is no reason why some students should be deprived to meet a general lowest standard so that there will be equality.

This is likely a matter that will not be satisfactorily settled by the courts because it is a professional question that is involved. When we get a professional disposition of the matter we will find that all education doesn't have to be similar or done on the same cost basis.

We will find that everybody is entitled to a basic education and that some will get more than others because they can afford it. And that's the way it is with most things in this world.

Public Service School At GVSC Is Approved

ALLENDALE — The establishment of a School of Public Service within the College of Arts and Sciences of Grand Valley State College was approved by GVSC's Board of Control, meeting Friday, on campus.

The school, which combines college and community programs of study and internship within public administration, municipal government, police administration, criminal justice, and urban affairs, has developed rapidly from status as a CAS "program" in 1970 to its expanded form, under the guidance of director, Samir T. IsHak, assistant professor of political science. Academic work within the school leads to the bachelor of science degree in public service.

The GVSC Board of Control also approved construction contracts for Grand Valley's new student center, scheduled for completion west of the James H. Zumberge Library in fall 1973. Contract for general building with low bid of \$1,469,553 was approved for Omega Construction Co. of Grandville; mechanical contract, at \$379,100, Holwerda - Huizenga Co., Grand Rapids; and electrical, at \$159,400, Nieboer Electric Co., Fremont. Documents preceding bid opening at the college June 1, stipulated that the general building trades contractor "is to assume the bids of mechanical trades and electrical trades."

Contract approval was also given for food service equipment in the amount of \$76,686 to Foremost - McKesson Company of Birmingham.

Contract approval will be sought from the Department of Housing and Urban Development, which earlier in 1972 granted an interest subsidy toward financing the structure. Following completion of the building, a public issue will be offered. Construction on the new student center will begin immediately.

In other action, the Board of Control approved new concepts for changes in minimum and maximum ranges of salaries for GVSC clerical, office and technical staff, which replace earlier fixed-step salary increases. A new commuter parking lot "use fee of \$15 per year or 10c per exit; a resident parking lot use fee of \$5 per term, and an additional reserved parking fee of \$10 per year effective fall

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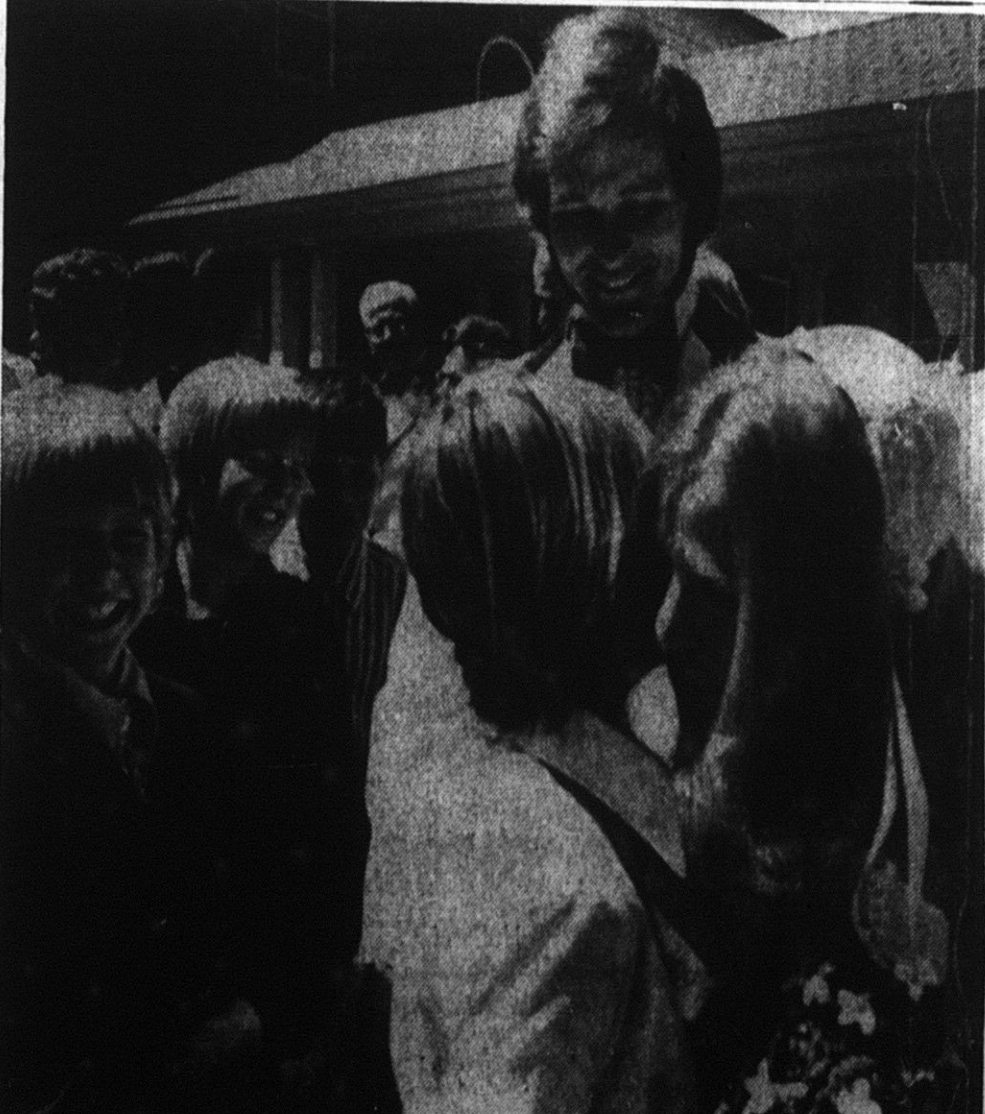

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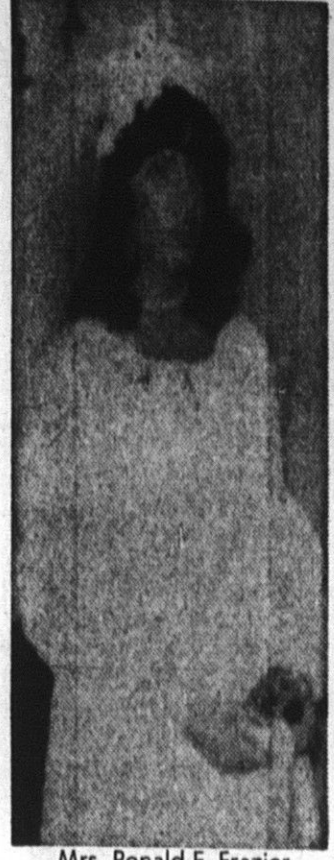

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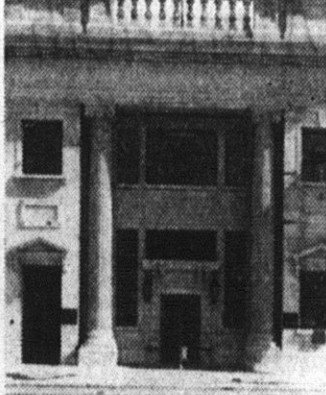

Yoak also finished as his club's leading hitter and RBI man. His .429 average was good for a third spot in the O-K Blue Division this past season.

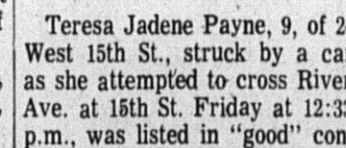

Federal Aide Talks Of Opportunities

Claiming Holland, with its minority groups, was a typical cross section of the country, Equal Employment Opportunity Council Commissioner Raymond L. Telles urged minority-group citizens to take an orderly part in changes afforded in education and employment through federal legislation.

Telles addressed about 160 persons at a luncheon Thursday co-sponsored by the Holland Rotary Club and the Holland Inter City Council at the Woman's Literary Club. His appearance was part of Human Relations Week in Holland.

A native of El Paso, Texas, who became that city's mayor, Telles said he grew up amid the frustrations of the minority group and commended the Spanish Americans for their peaceful work in America in gaining dignity, confidence and recognition without resorting to violence.

Reviewing federal legislation against discrimination in employment and federal programs designed to allow the minorities to enter private businesses, Telles said "plans and pledges are empty words unless equal employment is the law of the land and unless we call for action in industry."

In the seven years since the EEOC was started, Telles said more than 100,000 complaints of alleged discrimination have been filed with 63 per cent found to have reasonable cause. He said 56 per cent of the complaints involved alleged racial discrimination in employment.

The former ambassador to Costa Rica urged the Spanish Americans to "get hold of a good goal and pursue the goals and the opportunities." He said America has always been the land of opportunity "if we are willing to work hard" to reach a goal.

Telles was introduced by Mr. L. W. Lamb Jr., wife of the mayor. His address was the climax of the observance of Human Relations Week in Holland.

After the address, Telles was presented with a pair of wooden shoes by Alex Rivera, chairman of the Human Relations Commission's governmental affairs committee. He also received a hand tooled leather belt from Joe Ramos of the Allegan County La Raza. It was made by Mike Arzamendi of Holland who does leather tooling as a hobby.

Holland Graduates Hear Dr. K. Weller

"There's Good News — and There's Bad News" was the topic of Dr. Kenneth J. Weller as he addressed the graduates of Holland High School at commencement exercises held Thursday evening at the Civic Center.

Dr. Weller, who is the president of Central College in Pella, Iowa, stressed four characteristics of present-day youth as "anti-intellectualism, emphasis on self, emphasis on ethics and emphasis on the present." Expanding on these characteristics, he pointed to strengths and dangers of the positions taken by youth today in a message directed almost entirely to the graduates, suggesting that a synthesis for betterment should be derived through action and reaction to human experience.

More than 2,000 interested spectators observed as the class of 358 graduates marched in the procession to the traditional

strains of "Pomp and Circumstance" played by the Holland High School Festival Orchestra under the direction of Gerrit Van Ravenswaay. Dr. William C. Brownson, Jr., of Western Theological Seminary gave the invocation and benediction.

Richard B. Beedon, senior class president, introduced the speaker, and delivered the class appreciation, in which he indicated gifts to the school of decorative fencing, landscaping and separate contributions to the Holland High School student loan fund and a fund for the improvement of the performing arts center on the campus.

Diplomas were presented by Principal Fred Bertsch and Superintendent Donald L. Ihrman. Following the event, a reception was held in the north exhibition hall for Dr. Weller and the teachers retiring from the Holland Public Schools at the end of this school year.

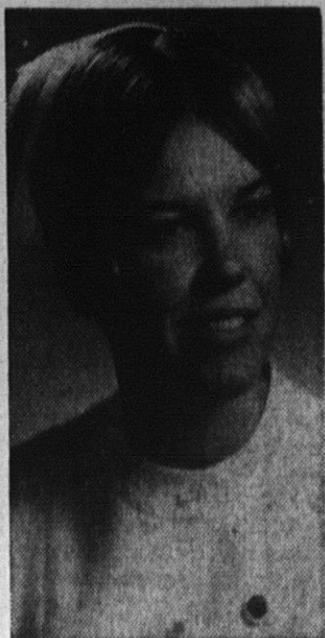

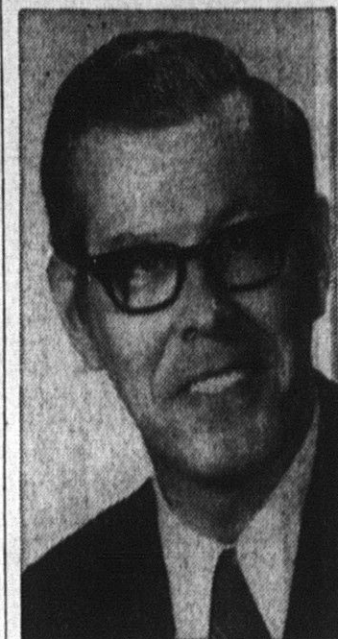

ing satin bow and carried a basket of white daisies, carnations and baby's breath.

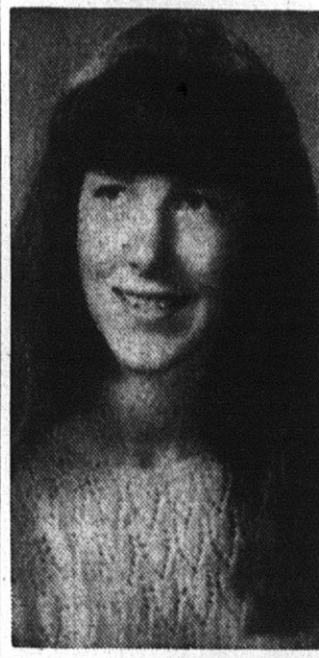
