ALLEGAN - Richard A. Van Farowe, 16, of 6645 Barry St., Borculo, a novice scuba diver, drowned Saturday at 2:55 p.m. in Dumont Lake when his diving equepment apparently malfunctioned, Allegan County deputies said.

The youth had been diving with two companions, David John Bouwkamp, 16, of Hud-sonville, and David Lafers, 25, Jenison, an instructor in

scuba diving, deputies said.

Van Farowe had been diving for about eight to 15 minutes and failed to surface near the public access site. His body was recovered from about 20 to 30 feet and was given cardio-pulminary resuscitation at the scene. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Allegan General Hospital.

Deputies said the diving equipment had been checked in shallow water before the dive in deeper water by Van Farowe. 


